Moments In Time

The History Channel

- On Sept. 16, 1620, the Mayflower sails from Plymouth, England, bound for the New World with 102 passengers. Although headed for Virginia, stormy weather and navigational errors forced the Mayflower off course. On Nov. 21, the Pilgrims reached Cape Cod at what is now Provincetown, MA.
- On Sept. 21, 1780, during the American Revolution, American Gen. Benedict Arnold meets with British Major John Andre to discuss handing over West Point to the British, in return for

money and a position in the British army. The plot was foiled and Arnold became synonymous with the word "traitor."

- On Sept. 20, 1946, the inaugural Cannes Film Festival opens at the resort city of Cannes on the French Riviera. It was to make its debut in 1939, but the outbreak of World War II forced its cancellation.
- On Sept. 19, 1957, the United States detonates a kiloton nuclear weapon in an underground tunnel at the Nevada Test Site, 65 miles north of Las Vegas. It was

the first fully contained underground detonation and produced no radioactive fallout.

- On Sept. 18, 1973, future president Jimmy Carter files a report with the National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena, claiming he had seen an UFO in October 1969. Carter and other witnesses described the object as "very bright [with] changing colors."

Donna's Day: Creative Family Fun

I was in charge of taking meal tickets and handing out plates for an outdoor burger buffet lunch after a family fun run event. Greeting all ages coming through the line, I was caught off guard when two girls looked like "one" (from the waist up, anyway).

Full of kidlike chatter and smiles, the cousins said they were so cold after running, they grabbed an adult-size long-sleeve T-shirt from one of the moms, stretched it over

their heads and shimmied into it.

Jane's right hand came through the right sleeve, while Elouise's left hand came through the other. Snug, warm and famished, they held a plate on each outstretched hand and tried to focus on serving each other burgers, buns, pickles, beans and fries.

As they headed for a picnic table, they were giggling so hard, they soon became a crowd attraction trying to focus on walking in sync while balancing their heaping plates of food. Coopera-

tion was the key.

Engaging in simple family play, just for the fun of it, can happen anytime and almost anywhere. You might want to try the girls' cozy and challenging T-shirt idea in your home by slipping one over two young kids and encouraging them to walk around from room to room. For older kids, go outside and challenge them to do an activity together, like bouncing a ball or raking leaves.

Looking for more cooperative fun? Make dinnertime pizza prep a game.

Here's how:

1. Set bowls of pizza toppings side by side on your counter. The fun begins when the person responsible for assembling the pizza covers his eyes completely with a scarf or headband. The other person gives directions. (Kids like to play this role.)

2. Instruct the pizza maker to roll out the dough, then hand him the ingredients, beginning with the tomato sauce.

3. Ask him to brush on the sauce, then continue by arranging and sprinkling toppings one by one. Since this is a cooperative effort, the person giving the instructions should guide the pizza maker verbally as he works. Don't get the anchovies mixed up with the cheese!

4. Remove the eye covering before placing the pizza in the oven to see the creation.



Now Here's A Tip

• Mirrors make a room feel larger, because they reflect space, essentially doubling the visual area. But for





maximum impact, experts say to hang your mirror on the wall adjacent to your window, not across from it.

- Lunchbox season is here, finally. If you have an issue with odors remaining in your plastic food containers, here's a fix from B.P. in Alabama: "Fill container with hot water, and add a teaspoon of baking soda. This should remove smells. Let sit overnight if necessary."
- Here's a way to remove stickers, especially ones that don't tear off. Rub labels with straight white vinegar or soak a paper napkin with vinegar and lay it over the label. Let it sit for 10 minutes, then remove. You should be able to rub the adhesive right off. Reapply if necessary.
- Whether you recycle because of global warming, landfill overload or environmental issues, the planet thanks you. But remember that recycling is only one part of going green. "Reduce" and "re-use" are just as important. Choose products with less packaging. Have

small appliances fixed instead of automatically replacing them. And keep recycling.

- Clean your coffeemaker this way: Fill your coffeepot with equal parts water and vinegar. Add to machine and run as normal. Halfway through the cycle, turn the pot off and let the heated mixture sit for an hour or more. Complete the cycle, and run another pot or two of plain water through to rinse.
- If your kids have gone wild with new school supplies, here's a tip from A.M. in Indiana to erase crayon marks from painted walls: "Make a paste of equal parts baking soda and water, and apply to the area. Then let it dry and wipe away." This works best on a white or very light wall, as dark colors may lose some color. Also, wipe gently, as baking soda is a mild abrasive.

Whatchamacallits

Although this isn't a bonafide whatchamacallit (as hopefully everyone knows these are railroad spikes), the silver-plated one has a special story behind it.

I photographed both of them for comparison purposes and I hope you've noticed that the rough one is longer than the other. That is because it was spiked into regular roadbed, on the ground. The silver one was once spiked into elevated trackage and the ties were not as thick.

The Third Avenue Elevated Line, affectionately called the "EL" (pronounced



like the letter L), ran in New York City from 1878 to 1955. Eventually totally replaced by the subway system, the Manhattan portion of the EL was closed in sections from 1950 - 1955.

This spike was a presentation gift commemorating the final Manhattan section closure on May 12, 1955 and was given at Christmas of that year to an extended family member. The giver was Max E. Buck, director of merchandising of National Broadcasting Company Inc. (NBC), which was located in the RCA building at Radio City.

The spike is engraved "A memento of the 3rd Avenue 'EL'/ WRCA and WRCA-TV New York." Part of the personal note reads "There'll never be another Christmas like this one – because the Third Avenue 'EL' will be gone forever."

Kovels: Antiques and Collecting

Prices for antiques and collectibles are determined by many things that change with time age, availability, condition, decorative value. fame of maker, artist or past owner, and even who is bidding and if there is a bidding war. Most of these things change with time, so rare Beanie Babies that cost hundreds of dollars for the few years they were in demand are sold today in a dump display for a few dollars.

In the early 18th centurv. an attractive new stone was found in Treack Cliff Cavern near Derbyshire, England. It was a rare form of the mineral fluorite with bands of purplish-blue or yellow. It came to be "Blue John." called Matthew Boulton, a famous manufacturer in the 1700s, made many urns and other decorative objects using Blue John. The stone became a symbol of British art and was wanted by the elite. Recently, a new vein of Blue John was found, the 15th known, and new jewelry and objects are being made. A pair of antique Blue John and rock crystal obelisks recently auctioned for \$2,176.

G: At an antiques show in Pennsylvania, I saw a small quilt that was labeled a "privy bag." Of course I know what a privy is, but I've never heard of a fancy bag used to hold toilet paper in an outhouse. I have a bet with my husband that it is dealer's joke term.

A: You lose. There are references online dating back to 2010 for books and exhibits in Pennsylvania that feature quilted privy bags made to hold toilet paper. Some exam-

ples were at a recent show and one was priced \$995. There are other kinds, some embroidered, some from fancy fabric and some just reusable cloth food sacks. The quilted ones have almost all been reported from the Lancaster, PA, area.

Privy toilet paper often was pages of the old Sears and Roebuck catalog, or squares of newsprint that were stored on a large nail. A decorative holder was crocheted in the 1920s-'30s from directions in some sewing magazines. A full, round, colorful crocheted skirt was made to fit a small doll. The legs of the doll were stuffed into the cardboard center and the skirt covered the paper. It was kept near the seating area. A few outhouses left in the United States today are in camping and hiking areas. The parks furnish a portable biodegradable kit that is carried out of the park at the end of the hike.

Understanding and living with sciatica

The largest nerve in the human body is the sciatic nerve, which originates in the lower back and travels through the back of each leg. Injury or pressure on this nerve can lead to a type of pain known as sciatica.

People experiencing pain in these areas should consult a physician immediately, as the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons notes that between 80 and 90 percent of people diagnosed with sciatica get better over time without surgery. Many typically feel better within several weeks of beginning treatment.

The first step toward diagnosing sciatica begins at home. People who learn to recognize poten-

tial symptoms of sciatica may be more likely to seek immediate treatment than those who might mistake their pain for something else.

What are the symptoms of sciatica?

The AAOS notes that sciatica may feel like a bad leg cramp that lasts for weeks before it goes away. According Spine-health.com, property of the health publisher Veritas Health, sciatica pain is often described as burning, tingling or searing as opposed to a dull ache. In addition, pain resulting from sciatica may be worse when sitting, even though sharp pain associated with sciatica can make it difficult to stand up or walk. Numbness characterized by a "pins and needles" feeling, weakness or a burning or tingling sensation down the leg are some additional symptoms of sciatica.



Sciatica can have an adverse effect on everyday life, causing pain that can radiate from the lower back through the hips and buttocks and down the legs.

Does sciatica affect both legs?

WebMD notes that sciatica usually affects only one leg, though the buttock or leg on the affected side may feel like it is in constant pain.

What causes sciatica?

Spine-health.com notes that the following five lower back problems are among the most common causes of sciatica:

- Lumber herniated disc: This occurs when the soft inner material of the disc herniates, or leaks out, through the fibrous outer core, irritating or pinching the nerve root.
- Degenerative disc disease: Discs in the back can degenerate naturally with age and never contribute to a problem like sciatica. However, degeneration in one or more discs in the lower back can sometimes irritate a nerve root and lead to sciatica.
- Isthmic spondylolisthesis: This occurs when a small stress fracture allows one vertebral body to slip forward on another. The combination of collapsing disc space, a fracture and the slipping forward of the vertebral

body can pinch the nerve and cause sciatica.

- Lumbar spinal stenosis: In this condition, which is relatively common among people older than 60, a narrowing of the spinal canal can contribute to sciatica.
- Piriformis syndrome: A muscle found deep within the buttocks, the piriformis connects the lower spine to the upper thighbone, running directly over the sciatic nerve. Spasms in the piriformis can put pressure on the sciatic nerve, triggering sciatica.

Treating sciatica

Sciatica often can be treated successfully without surgery. Doctors may recommend applying heat and/or ice packs for acute sciatic pain. In addition, over-the-counter and prescription pain medications can effectively reduce or relieve sciatic pain. Doctors also may explore other treatments, including chiropractic manipulation, acupuncture, massage therapy, and surgery.



Dear Paw's Corner: My dog Percy loves to jump into the lake nearby for a swim every day, especially on a hot afternoon. But the last time we were at the shore, a neighbor said there was an algae warning and that dogs and people should stay out of the water. Percy has been in that lake all summer and hasn't been affected. Would that algae really do anything to him? - Pet Dad in Texas

Dear Pet Dad: If you doubt your neighbor's warning, check with the city or municipality that manages

the lake to see if an algae advisory has been issued. Signs are often posted at boat ramps and swimming areas.

There is at least one type of algae that is particularly harmful to pets. Blue-green algae, also known as cyanobacteria, can build up around the shores of lakes and ponds where water does not flow quickly especially during the hottest months of summer. It's not always visible, but when large amounts are present it may clump together and appear as a blue-green or "peasoup" - like scum or foam.

Cyanobacteria can be fatal to dogs because it can cause liver failure, and lifelong health problems if a dog survives the initial exposure. Dogs that ingest the bacteria can show symptoms within a few minutes - vomiting, diarrhea, excessive drooling, breathing difficulties, confusion, seizures or collapse. Immediate treatment by a veterinarian is essential when symptoms appear.

So, if you hear a warning about letting your dog go into a specific lake or pond, whether from a neighbor or an official, take it seriously. Keep Percy out of the water until the all-clear is given.

The past few years have produced some unusual weather. Whether you live in an area that has been hit with storm-related power outages or you just want to stock up for the times you're unable to shop, creating an emergency pantry using canned goods as staples is a wise choice.

First, start with a good quality product. Choose canned goods that aren't rusted, dented, scratched or bulging. Home-canned foods should only be made using research-tested procedures, equipment and recipes from sources such as the USDA website.

Here are some tips for creating, stocking and using an emergency pantry:

Canned goods and water:

- Choose foods your family enjoys. Good options include canned beans, vegetables, fruit, breakfast cereal, peanut butter, pouches of fully cooked whole grains, nuts, wholewheat crackers and shelf-stable milk or plant milk (the kind sold in aseptic boxes in the grocery aisle).
- When buying canned foods, choose low-sodium or no-salt-added products, and choose fruits packed in water or their own juice instead of syrup.
- Store canned goods in a cool, dark, dry area away from furnaces, pipes and other places where temperature changes occur. Keep metal cans off the floor, because moisture may lead to rust.
- Always use the FIFO (first-in, first-out) method when using foods from storage so that you use your oldest cans first. If you see that a can or jar has a broken seal or is rusting, bulging or denting, it should be discarded. If any food does not look or smell right, throw it out.
- Keep at least six gallons of water per family member to be prepared for one week. Store water in airtight, food-grade storage containers. Replace water every six months.

Refrigerated and frozen foods:

If electrical power is off, eat foods from the refrigerator first. These foods are not safe to eat if they've been at room temperature for more than two hours. Foods in the freezer will stay cold depending on the size of the freezer and the amount and kind of food in it. A large freezer full of meat will stay the coldest longest. Keeping frozen jugs of water in the freezer will help maintain

Alternative cooking methods:

the cold temperature.

Many foods can be skewered, grilled or wrapped in foil and cooked. Disposable covered catering pans with Sterno holders, wood-burning fireplaces, candle warmers or fondue pots may be used to heat foods. Outdoor grills, camp stoves or charcoal burners should only be used outside – the fumes can be deadly.

Here are a few recipes using ingredients that should be in every emergency pantry – grains and beans! They are nutrient dense, packed with protein, versatile and are very filling. These No-Cook Emergency Pantry Recipes (courtesy of Trisha Calvo, a writer for Consumer Reports) are simple and easy to prepare no matter what the weather may be.

No-cook emergency pantry recipes

Overnight Oats: Mix rolled oats with water and let sit overnight on a counter. In the morning, add peanut butter, raisins or other dried fruit and a little cinnamon.

Chunky Gazpacho: To a can of

diced tomatoes with juice, add chopped onion, chopped cucumber, a little Tabasco sauce or cayenne pepper and a dash of salt and pepper. You also can add chopped red or green peppers if you have them. Drizzle with olive oil and top with fresh parsley or cilantro if you have it. To make this a heartier dish, add a can of chickpeas (drained).

Corn Salad: Combine drained canned corn with vegetables you have on hand (tomatoes, peppers and onions, for example), chopped. Add a drained canned black beans if you like. Toss with a dressing made of one part apple-cider vinegar and one part olive oil, with fresh or dried basil and a little salt and pepper.

Power Bean-and-Grain Salad: Combine drained canned beans with a pouch of precooked grains, olive oil and any herbs and spices you like. You also can add chopped veggies and nuts, if available.

Salmon or Tuna Stuffed Avocados: Combine chunks of canned salmon, tuna or smoked trout with chopped tomato and cucumber. Toss with a dressing of lemon juice or white vinegar, olive oil, paprika, and salt and pepper. Stuff into avocado halves; use to top lettuce greens or as a sandwich filling.










Which is more important to recognize, emojis or road signs?

(BPT) — If you were to take a quiz to test your ability to identify common emojis and road signs, how do you think you'd fare?

According to the results from a recent survey by Mercury Insurance, 1,890 respondents did not do so well. The meaning of the "yawning" emoji was correctly identified by 85% of the respondents, but only 31% of quiz-takers correctly identified the meaning of the "lane reduction" road sign. Additionally, 71% knew the "in love" emoji, but the "keep right" road sign was correctly identified by only 51% of quiz-takers.

Emojis are continually being added to

our texting and messaging vocabulary, and for the most part, we're able to keep up with this ever-changing landscape. Fortunately for the more than 200 million licensed U.S. drivers, road signs are highly regulated and consistent, and are designed to help keep drivers safe and easily guide them to their destinations. The bad news, however, is that far more people are able to identify emojis than road signs. And what's worse is that many times they're looking at these cute little icons while they're driving.

"Sure, emojis are a fun, modern-day form of shorthand, and may be more intuitive, but there's a time and place to

"A picture may be worth a thousand words in some cases, but it certainly isn't worth getting into a collision and risking someone's life. Most collisions are avoidable if drivers focus on their main task of safely operating a vehicle."


Distracted driving — anything that takes a driver's attention away from the road, including texting and talking on a phone — accounted for 3,166 fatalities in 2017, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Texting while driving is extremely dangerous, as it takes your eyes off the road for five seconds on average - whether you're reading or sending the message.

The results of the quiz also highlight the importance of knowing what each road sign means, so you and those around you are safe. "These signs are instantly communicating to drivers what actions to take, much like emojis instantly communicate what friends or family members might be trying to convey in a text," said Quinn. "It's OK to only somewhat understand an emoji, but it's imperative to know exactly what a road sign is telling you; otherwise it could lead to disastrous results on the road where no one can afford a misunderstanding. And being an attentive driver who knows the rules of the road and safely gets where they're going might earn you a smiley face from your auto insurance company, just don't read it while you're operating a vehicle."




