# **Moments in Time** The History Channel

- On Sept. 27, 1540, in Rome, the Society of Jesus - a Roman Catholic missionary organization - receives its charter from Pope Paul III. The Jesuit order succeeded in converting millions around the world to Catholicism.
- On Sept. 28, 1066, claiming his right to the English throne, William, duke of Normaninvades England. On Christmas Day, William the Conqueror was crowned the first Norman king of England. William I also is known for his "Domesday Book," a great census of the lands and people of England.
- On Sept. 24, 1941, the Japanese consul in Hawaii is instructed to divide Pearl Harbor into five zones and calculate the number of battleships in each zone. The United States had intercepted the message, but it was dismissed a month later as being of no great consequence.
- On Sept. 26, 1957, "West Side Story," composed by Leonard Bernstein, opens on Broadway. The show went on to an impressive maiden run of 732 performances. In 1961, a film version was an enormous hit and took home 10 Academy Awards.
- On Sept. 23, 1969, the trial for eight antiwar activists charged with sparking violent demonstrations at the August 1968 Democratic National Convention opens in Chicago. Most were convicted on criminal charges or contempt of court, but none served time after convictions eventually were overturned on appeal or charges dropped.
- On Sept. 25, 1970, ABC premieres "The Partridge Family," which would become a smash hit. The group's songs were not actually recorded by the five siblings and their mom in a garage, but were mostly the work professional musicians in Los Angeles.
- On Sept. 29, 1982, seven people die in Chicago after ingesting overpainkiller the-counter laced with cyanide. No other contaminated capsules were found in a nationwide recall, but the

mass murder led to new tamper-proof medicine containers.

# Three tips to establishing a successful homework area

High school students have a lot on their plates. Today's parents often lament that kids' schedules are far more hectic than their own schedules were when they were teenagers. But for many high school students, a familiar foe their parents have no doubt encountered is proving a considerable source of stress.

Homework has long been the bane of high schoolers' existence. Studies regarding just how much homework is being assigned to teenagers are somewhat outdated, which makes it difficult to determine just how much work kids are being asked to do after school lets out. A 2014 survey from the University of Phoenix found that high school teachers assign, on average, 3.5 hours of homework per week. Multiply that figure by five, which is the number of different teachers many high school students have in a typical school day, and the survey concluded that high school students may be expected to complete as much as 17.5 hours of homework per week.

Though the study, which is the only one of its kind to be conducted in recent years, is older, there's little reason to suspect today's high school students are being asked to do any less than their predecessors were in 2014.

While parents might not be able to do much to lessen their children's homework workload, they can take steps to ensure their homes are as homework-friendly as possible. The following are three ways to do just that.

### 1. Create a communal homework table.

The Harvard Graduate School of Education notes that youngsters who seem reluctant to do their homework may benefit from doing their afterschool work at a communal table. With parents nearby, such students may feel less lonely and may be less likely to procrastinate if they know Mom or Dad is nearby. Students who are not reluctant to do their homework may benefit from working quietly in their bedrooms.

# 2. Clear the area of distractions.

Distractions like televisions, devices that are not necessary to complete assignments and even younger siblings can make it hard for teenagers to concentrate on their work. Designate a time each day for homework, ensuring that the television is off and that devices have been placed on "Do Not Disturb." In

addition, high school students with younger siblings can expect their brothers and sisters to be finished with their homework first. Make sure youngsters recognize the importance of staying quiet until everyone has finished their homework. Encourage younger siblings to leave the homework area and play quietly or read elsewhere in the home.

# 3. Include a break between school and homework time.

Much like parents may like a few minutes to unwind when getting home from work at night, kids likely won't want to dive right into their homework after getting home from school. A break between the school day and homework time can help kids clear their heads so they're more capable of concentrating when they sit down to do their work.

# Tips for making braces more comfortable

Many children and adults wear orthodontic braces. Braces can straighten teeth and improve bite health. While adults who wore braces years ago as youngsters likely recall being apprehensive about their appearance back then, thanks to advancements in braces technology, today's orthodontic braces are less noticeable than braces of yesteryear. In addition, modern braces even feature more effective wires and brackets that can reduce the duration of treatment.

According to Harvard University Health, the science of orthodontics and braces involves placing constant pressure on teeth. The root then presses against the underlying alveolar bone, forcing a portion of the bone next to the root to dissolve, allowing

the tooth to incrementally move into the direction it is pushed. After the tooth migrates, new bone will replace the spot where the tooth vacated.

Due to the pressure braces exert, it is common for people who wear braces to experience discomfort. Soreness and discomfort typically occurs when braces are initially put on the teeth and then after various appointments if adjustments are made. The brackets and wires of the braces also may rub the gums or irritate other areas inside the mouth.

Thankfully, there are ways to make wearing braces more comfortable.

• Check for comfort before leaving. During each orthodontist visit, use a finger or your tongue to

check for any areas that are poking cheeks or rubbing gums. Bring this to the orthodontist's attention so that wires can be clipped very short.

• Invest in orthodontic wax. Use the wax to cover up brackets or wires that are causing irritation. Over time, the mouth will get used to the braces and sore spots will not be as prominent.

• Use OTC pain relievers. Over-the-counter pain relief products can alleviate soreness for a few hours until the mouth adjusts to the braces being placed or tightened.

• Enjoy soft foods. When teeth are sore, stick to soft foods. Smoothies, soups, stews, mashed potatoes and yogurt are soft foods that won't increase your pain.

• Follow the rules. Your orthodontist will recommend that you avoid certain foods that can damage or get caught in the braces. Eating these foods can make it even more uncomfortable to have braces on.

• Practice good hygiene. Braces create more crevices and spots where bacteria can accumulate, which could lead to dental caries. Be sure to floss and brush thoroughly to keep the teeth clean to avoid painful cavities.

Having braces means experiencing some discomfort along the way. However, pain and soreness can often be alleviated using a few simple strategies.







# Pause before you pass: Accidents involving tractors & farm equipment found to be deadliest rural road accidents

No one likes being caught behind a slow-moving farm vehicle on the road - especially when there's a manure spreader being pulled in front of you but waiting a couple of minutes to be sure you can safely pass can make a lifetime's difference.

Roadway crashes involving agricultural vehicles were found to be five times more fatal than that of non-ag crashes, according to a recent study published by the New York Center for Agricultural Medicine and Health (NY-CAMH).

Interestingly, accidents involving tractors and other ag-related equipment on rural roads occurred most often on straightaways with a grade, according to the data analyzed. Crashes on straight roads with a grade were twice as common in ag-related crashes than in non-ag crashes. Researchers speculate that this was due to non-agriculture vehicles attempting to pass slower-moving agricultural machinery on straightaways.

For the study, NYCAMH researchers analyzed electronic records from the NYS Department of Motor Vehicle (DMV) Accident Reports (MV-104) for 2010-12. Ag cases were identified using variables for the vehicle body type and vehicle registration. Though only 19 out of every 100 Americans live in rural areas, more than half of fatal

roadway accidents take place in rural areas, according to the U.S. Department of Transportation.

During the three-year timeframe analyzed, NYCAMH researchers identified 203 ag-related accidents involving 381 vehicles and 482 people. They found that incidents involving farm vehicles or equipment tended to be more severe than non-ag crashes in terms of the number of vehicles involved, the extent of the injuries and the number of resulting deaths.

Of the agriculture-related incidents, the most common event was a collision with another vehicle (80.8%). The second most common was a collision with a fixed object such as a ditch or embankment (10.3%), followed by an overturn/non-collision event (3.4%). Poor weather conditions were rarely a factor in these events.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention data have shown that agriculture, forestry and fishing as an occupational group has the third highest rate of work-related roadway crashes.

NYCAMH has worked with the New York State Governor's Traffic Safety Committee on issues surrounding slow-moving vehicle use. These initiatives have brought together the farming community, safety professionals and emergency services to raise awareness of slow-moving vehicles on the

Wrap up the last of summer's harvest with colorful ribbons of orange, green, yellow and red. Abundant zucchini, summer squash and carrots can be woven together with fettuccine pasta for a tasty supper your family will enjoy from preparation to the last bite.

Hand each of your preteen kids their own vegetable peeler, give them a few tips for honing ribbon-making skills, and they'll keep busy and feel useful cutting vegetables while you cook up the pasta. A healthy supper will be ready in minutes.

8 ounces fettuccine pasta, cooked, drained and rinsed in cool water.

- 1 to 2 small-size green zucchini
- 1 yellow summer squash
- 2 medium-size carrots
- 1 scallion
- 1/2 fresh red pepper (optional)

1/2 cup of your favorite vinaigrette-style salad dressing or traditional vinaigrette (see recipe below)

1/2 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese

Chopped parsley or basil

1. Trim off the ends of the zucchini, squash and carrots. Use a vegetable peeler to cut the vegetables lengthwise into long, thin, ribbonlike strips. When you reach the inner seeds of the zucchini and summer squash, stop and continue slicing the other side. Discard the centers. Place all the vegetable ribbons into a large bowl.

2. Trim off the green ends of the scallion. Tear them into thin long strips with your fingers. Add to the vegetables.

3. Add pasta and toss lightly with your favorite vinaigrette dressing or prepare the basic recipe below. Cut thin slices of the red pepper and arrange on top, if you wish. Top with grated Parmesan and parsley or basil. Serve with French bread. Serves 4 to 6.

Tip: If your kids love apples, add one to the salad for sweetness. Peel, core and cut an apple into 4 slices. Peel strips from each slice and add to the vegetable ribbons.

### **Basic Vinaigrette**

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard


1/4 cup white wine or sherry vinegar

3/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

In a small bowl, let one child whisk the salt, mustard and vinegar together. While whisking, another child may slowly add the oil in a stream until the mixture is well-combined. Makes 1 cup. Store covered at room temperature for a week or in the refrigerator for a month.

# Whatchamacallits

This week's whatchamacallits were a bit tricky to gather information on, although they look pretty self-explanatory. That's usually the way it works out – the more common-looking the item, the more difficult it is to find information on it. Also, the name I was given was "faustino knife," but after much leap-frogging from page to page online, I found it is called a fascine knife.

According to "The American Revolution: Documents Decoded" by Neil Gould, fascine knives were used by colonial militia as both a personal weapon and to cut fascines – hence the name.

A fascine is a rough bundle of brushwood or other material used in the strengthening of an earthen structure or for making a path over uneven or wet ground.

In the UK, they are similar to the bill-hook, which gets its name due to the

shape of the blade.

Believe it or not, there is a website (bill-hooks.co.uk) on which I found a wealth of information regarding the use of these tools. Use of the billhook goes way back in British history, with some examples being found in very rural/agrarian regions dating back to the Roman occupation period.

Our examples seem to be homemade or at least forged in a local blacksmith shop. The more square-bladed example is stamped "WHS." The more round-bladed fascine was so well used, the handle had to be repaired several times.

# Exercise caution around brake dust

As cars age, certain wear and tear is to be expected. One of the realities of frequent driving, particularly for drivers who routinely drive in stop-and-go traffic, is the gradual deterioration of brake pads. Doit-yourselfers can replace brake pads on their own, but those that do should be aware of a potential hazard when doing so.

The Mesothelioma Center says that brakes sometimes contain asbestos due to that material's heat-resistant qualities. As brakes start to wear down over time, the asbestos can escape. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) says that while many new automotive components are asbestos-free, asbestos hasn't been eliminated entirely from the industry. That is why mechanics and do-it-yourselfers need to exercise caution when repairing or replacing brakes.

Brake dust may inadvertently expose individuals to cancer-causing asbestos through inhalation or ingestion. OSHA says that exposure to asbestos, if not properly controlled, can cause mesothelioma, lung cancer and asbestosis. Symptoms may not appear for years or even decades after contact with asbestos fibers.

The Mesothelioma Center estimates that asbestos is present in 30 - 80% of brakes and other components. The routine task of "blowing out" brake surfaces, which involves using an air hose to clean the surfaces of brakes and rotors, is one of the most common ways people are exposed to asbestos through brake dust.

Gray-black brake dust is made up of iron particles formed by the grinding of the brake rotor by the brake pads. However, brake dust also can contain some metallic elements and other components housed in the brake pad – including asbestos.

The automotive resource YourMechanic says that while brake dust is not indicative of a poor braking

system, over time brake dust can corrode the clear coat on a car and may eat into the aluminum alloy surface of the wheel. That is why so many drivers try to clean away brake dust, potentially exposing them to dangerous materials.

DIYers may be better off visiting professional service centers to have brakes addressed rather than doing the job on their own. OSHA says all automotive brake and clutch repair facilities in the United States must comply with the OSHA asbestos standard. These include using negative pressure enclosure/HEPA vacuum systems and low pressure/wet cleaning methods.

While asbestos is being phased out of many automotive components, it is always best to treat bakes, clutches and more with extra caution in the event that asbestos is present.

Online Lotharios' only love is money Think you're immune from getting scammed in an online romance? Think again

Authorities recently charged 80 people with running scams around the world designed to defraud women of money. Only 17 of those crooks have actually been arrested as authorities try to hunt down the rest - no easy feat when it comes to dealing with other countries.

In one scam, a Japanese woman fell for a man she believed was a U.S. soldier in Syria. She hooked up with him through an online pen pal site. In reality, he was in Los Angeles and was part of a whole crew of thieves. In less than a year she sent him \$200,000 - money she had to borrow.

There were quite a few warning signs she didn't acknowledge. She and her new love never talked on the phone, and he wanted her to do some business for him. In this case, it was to manage a shipment of diamonds he claimed to have found. Meanwhile, as the scam progressed, he kept asking

her for more and more money.

One problem is that these investigations take so long. The one above started in 2016. You can't start an online relationship and two weeks later decide to check the news to see if there is a current investigation or string of arrests. It might take years, and meanwhile you're in danger of losing your money.

Some things to think about: These online scammers are experts at what they do. They follow cleverly written scripts when they woo women. They look for your weak points. If you send someone money, understand that you'll never see it again.

If anyone asks you to send money, make a report to the authorities. Yours might be the clues the police need.

# Kovels: Antiques and Collecting

The first Tiffany lamps with dome-shaped stained-glass shades were made in 1895. They became very popular and very expensive. Other lamp and glass companies adapted the idea and made less expensive reverse-painted glass shades, colored glass and metal-trimmed shades, and copies of the originals. None are as expensive as the originals today, but some are considered important and sell for thousands of dollars.

Philip Julius Handel made lamps in Meriden, CT, from 1893 to 1933, and his reverse-painted shade lamps are now selling for up to \$8,000. Almost all of his lamps are signed on the inside of the shade and on the metal lamp base. Price is determined by the design on the shade and the shape of the bronze base. A recent Morphy Auctions of Pennsylvania sold a signed Handel "Elephantine Island" table lamp with a bronze base held by three winged griffins. The shade is a painting of the ancient Egyptian ruins on Elephantine, a small island on the Nile. The lamp sold for \$5,248.

**Q:** My wife was a collector of mustache cups and she accumulated about 50 of them before she died. I'm not sure what to do with them and would like to know if they have any value.

**A:** Mustache cups were popular from 1850 to 1900 when large, flowing mustaches were popular. A mustache cup had a ledge of china or silver that kept the hair out of the liquid in the cup and kept the mustache wax from melting. Mustache cups have sold at auctions in the past year for about \$30 to over \$100. Left-handed mustache cups are rare and have sold for over \$400, but have been reproduced. You can consign your collection to an auction house or contact an antiques store in your area to see what they will offer you for them.

**Q:** I'd like some information about the maker of a bronze statue of a fox marked "Chemin." The letter "N" is backward. Does this increase the value?

**A:** Your bronze fox was made by French sculptor Joseph Victor Chemin (1825-

1901). He was known for his animal sculptures. The backward "N" is part of his mark. It isn't a mistake and does not add value. An eight-inch-long bronze animal by Chemin was estimated at \$300 in a Midwest auction.



# by Angela Shelf Medearis Add more seafood to your menu

At our house, we're always searching for ways to eat healthier ... on a budget. One way to do just that is to add healthly seafood to your menu at least twice a week. This includes both fish and shellfish as the main protein on your plate. Seafood is available in a variety of price points, so it doesn't have to be expensive.

Seafood contains an abundance of nutrients, including healthy omega-3 fats. According to Dietary Guidelines for Americans, eating about 8 ounces per week (less for young children) of a variety of seafood can help prevent heart disease. Here are some tips:

- Choose wisely: Include the types of seafood that are higher in omega-3s and lower in mercury, such as salmon, trout, oysters, Atlantic and Pacific mackerel, herring and sardines.
- Keep it lean and flavorful: Try grilling, broiling, roasting or baking methods that don't add extra fat. Spices or herbs such as dill, chili powder, paprika or cumin, and lemon or lime juice, can add flavor without adding salt.
- Shellfish counts, too! : Oysters, mussels, clams and calamari (squid) all supply healthy omega-3s. Try mussels marinara, oyster stew, steamed clams or pasta with calamari.
- Get creative with seafood: Think beyond fish fillets. Try salmon patties, a shrimp stir-fry, grilled fish tacos, or clams with whole-wheat pasta. Add variety by trying a new fish such as grilled Atlantic or Pacific mackerel, herring on a salad or oven-baked pollock.
- Use in a salad or sandwich: Top a salad with grilled scallops, shrimp or crab in place of steak or chicken.
- Shop smart: Whiting, tilapia, sardines, canned tuna and some frozen seafood are usually lower-cost options. Check the local newspaper, online and at

the store for sales, coupons and specials on seafood.

- Grow up healthy with seafood: Omega-3 fats from seafood can help improve nervous-system development in infants and children. Serve seafood to children twice a week in portions appropriate for their age and appetite. A variety of seafood lower in mercury also should also be part of a healthy diet for women who are pregnant or breastfeeding.
- Know your portions: To get 8 ounces of seafood a week, use these as guides: A drained can of tuna is about 3 to 4 ounces, a salmon steak ranges from 4 to 6 ounces and a small trout is about 3 ounces.
- Keep seafood handy: Canned seafood (think canned salmon, tuna or sardines) is quick and easy to use. Canned white tuna is higher in omega-3s, but canned "light" tuna is lower in mercury.

My delicious recipe for Pasta Puttanesca With Sardines uses inexpensive jarred sardines packed in olive oil. Sardines are sustainable and are full of healthy omega-3 fatty acids. They are a nutritious replacement for anchovies in most recipes.

# Pasta Puttanesca with Sardines

- 1 pound linguine
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 medium onion, finely chopped
- 1 (4.25 ounce) canned or jarred sardines packed in oil, reserve the oil
  - 3 cloves garlic, finely minced
  - 2 tablespoons Italian seasoning blend
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
  - 1/4 teaspoon stevia, honey or sugar
  - 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
  - 1/8 teaspoon red pepper flakes or cayenne pepper
- 1 medium tomato (approximately 1/2 pound), seeded and chopped into 1/2-inch pieces, or 14.5-ounce can diced tomatoes
- 1 (6-ounce) can pitted black olives, olives halved crosswise; or sliced, canned pitted black olives, drained
- 1 tablespoon capers, drained, rinsed and finely chopped
- 1/4 cup shredded or shaved Pecorino Romano or Parmesan cheese



- 1. In a large pot of boiling, salted water (approximately 6 quarts boiling water and 3 tablespoons kosher salt), cook the linguine according to label directions until it is al dente. Reserve 1 1/2 cups of the pasta cooking water for adding to the Pasta Puttanesca at the end of the cooking time.
- 2. In a large saute pan or skillet, heat the olive oil over medium heat, then add the onion and cook until translucent, about 3 minutes. Add sardines and their oil, then the garlic and Italian seasoning, 1/2 teaspoon each salt and pepper, the honey, stevia or sugar, cloves, the red pepper flakes or cayenne pepper, tomatoes, olives, and capers.
- 3. Turn heat to low and cook until the tomatoes are softened and the sardines are breaking apart, about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- 4. Add the linguine to the pan, then pour in 1 cup of the reserved pasta cooking water, stirring well to combine all the ingredients. If the pasta still looks dry, add the remaining pasta cooking water, 1/2 cup at a time. Season with the remaining 1/2 teaspoon of salt and pepper, and the Pecorino Romano or Parmesan

# To Your Good Health

### Heart attack symptoms not always painful

**Dear Dr. Roach:** My very healthy husband collapsed and died on the way to the hospital. They worked on him for a long time but could not revive him. They didn't do an autopsy, and they declared his death as "atherosclerotic vascular disease." He was 79 years old and had no health problems. He came into the house and said that something was in his throat and he couldn't swallow. He tried to cough it up, but nothing came up. He then collapsed. He had no pain. I am still puzzled by that symptom of a heart attack. Have you ever heard of that? I am really curious and still in shock. I hope you can explain. — T.S.

**Answer:** I am very sorry to hear about your husband. I think he likely did have a heart attack, which is the leading cause of death in the industrialized world.

Although many people have symptoms of heart disease that they ignore, some people have no symptoms until sudden death. Atherosclerosis, hardening of the arteries due to cholesterol plaque and calcium in the blood vessels of the heart, almost always is present in people with a heart attack.

The initial symptom of a heart attack varies widely. Throat discomfort is not rare. Cough is a common symptom, as the heart becomes damaged and the pressure in the lungs increases. The classic symptom of chest pain certainly does happen, but there are many variations. Both men and women can have atypical presentations.

**Dear Dr. Roach:** My husband has Parkinson's disease. He also has a stent in his heart. We have been to many doctors to address a breathing problem: fast breathing. He experiences this daily, and we are told that it is anxiety. It is difficult to watch him go through this. It sometimes happens before he is due for his Sinemet, but other times right after taking it.

He has been prescribed Xanax, clonidine, cannabidiol-infused gummies and a few others. One doctor says it is from Parkinson's, but the rest say it is anxiety. — E.W.

**Answer:** Shortness of breath can have many causes, but someone with Parkinson's disease has an unusual possibility, called "respiratory dyskinesia" (which just means "abnormal movement of the muscles of breathing"). This is an involuntary rapid

breathing that causes distress, and it usually happens an hour after taking a medication like Sinemet. Changing the dose can help with diagnosis, and working with a neurologist to adjust the dose of the Sinemet (which comes in fast-acting and slow-release formulations) can solve the problem. I would start with an expert on Parkinson's. Keeping a diary of when he takes his medication and when the breathing trouble starts and stops will be helpful, as would a video of what it looks like when happening.

Having Parkinson's doesn't make someone less likely to have other causes of shortness of breath, and anyone with a stent in the heart (meaning a history of blockages of at least one heart artery) is at risk of developing further blockages. Poor blood flow to the heart is another potential cause. Get the Parkinson's evaluation first.

I would not recommend anti-anxiety medications unless there is clear evidence of benefit. Ascribing a physical symptom like shortness of breath to anxiety without a thorough workup is unwise.

# Extracurricular activities for non-athletes

Sports are a popular activity for adults and children alike. While adults may not have the time to hit the hardwoods or toss the ball around as much as they used to, sports continue to be as popular as ever among young people. According to the State of Play: 2018 report from the Aspen Institute, 69% of children between the ages of six and 12 participated in a team or individual sport at least once in 2017.

As popular as sports are, some students are not inclined to lace up a pair of cleats or compete with

their peers on the athletic playing fields. In fact, the State of Play: 2018 report found that just 37% of kids between the ages of six and 12 participated in a team sport on a regular basis in 2017. Lack of interest in sports is nothing for parents to worry about, though it is important that parents encourage their kids to participate in extracurricular activities, which can pay a host of dividends.

### Why participate in extracurricular activities?

Extracurricular activities do more than just provide something for kids to do once they're dismissed from school. Certain activities may help kids perform better academically. In analyzing data on more than 25,000 second school students, the U.S. Department of Education found that those who reported consistent involvement in instrumental music during middle school and high school performed significantly better in mathematics by grade 12 than kids who did not participate in music programs.

Participation in extracurricular activities as a youngster also may pay dividends well into the future. A 2017 study from researchers at Rutgers University found that people who were involved in extracurricular activities in high school were likely to stay involved in their communities throughout their lives.

#### Extracurricular activities for non-athletes

Sports might be a popular extracurricular activity, but there are still plenty of additional activities for kids who have no interest in sports.

- **Music:** School bands or community music programs provide opportunities for kids to learn an instrument and connect with fellow music lovers.
- **Volunteering:** Many organizations welcome teenager volunteers, recognizing that kids who volunteer as teens are more likely to continue doing so as adults, which can help charities and other organizations meet their missions. Volunteering even allows kids to further indulge an existing passion. For example, kids who love the beach can volunteer with a local environmental organization that works to clean up local beaches and waterways.
- **Writing:** Youngsters with an interest in writing can participate in local creative writing groups. Such groups can be great places to brainstorm story ideas and learn about the creative writing process.









# Interesting facts about autumn

Weather is often the first indicator that the seasons are changing. For many people across the globe, the hot days of summer will soon be giving way to the more crisp days of autumn.

For those who live in regions where summer only subtly gives way to autumn or is seemingly gone before the end of August, the 2019 autumnal equinox occurs on Sept. 23. That marks the official beginning of autumn.

• A season by any other name... "Fall" is the term most often used to reference the season succeeding summer in the United States. But the season is referred to as "autumn" in other parts of the world, including Great Britain. Autumn was once even known as "harvest" because of the harvest moon, which appears close to

the autumnal equinox.

• The colors of fall foliage are actually present year-round. Autumn is known for its colorful foliage. But the pigments responsible for those colors are actually present year-round. According to the SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry, green, yellow and orange pigments are present year-round. However, during spring and summer, the leaves serve as factories where many foods necessary to help the tree grow are manufactured. That process takes place in the leaf in cells containing chlorophyll, which gives the leaves their green color. This process ceases as hours of daylight decrease and temperatures drop. As a result, chlorophyll breaks down, the green color disappears and the vivid colors of fall foliage begin to appear.

- Squirrels have a (sophisticated) plan out there. Squirrels hiding food in autumn for the upcoming winter is a familiar sight. And squirrels are more organized than many people may know. Groundbreaking research released in 1991 found that, even when squirrels bury that stash of nuts closely to one another, they will each return to the precise location of their personal cache. Recent research also has shown that squirrels bury their stash based on certain traits, such as the type of nut being buried.
- Babies born in autumn are more likely to see the century mark. Researchers at the University of Chicago studied more than 1,500 centenarians born in the United States between 1880 and 1895. They

then compared birth and death information with those centenarians' siblings and spouses so they could compare their early environment and genetic background and their adult environment. Their research found that most centenarians were born between September and November.



That the season the follows summer seem-ingly goes by two different names is just one of many interesting facts about fall.



# Chiropractors can help with various ailments

Anyone who has experienced pain understands that it can be debilitating. these impulses originate to help release tension and nerve irritation. In addition, adjustments can improve blood circulation, which may help signal the brain to turn off its "rally to action" response to stressful situations.

• Fibromyalgia: Fibromyalgia is marked by widespread musculoskeletal pain in the joints, muscles, tendons and other soft tissues. It can be combined with temporomandibular joint

syndrome (TMJ) as well as irritable bowel syndrome, among other illnesses. Chiropractors can remove subluxations, which are misalignments of the vertebrae in the spine and joints that lead to pain responses. A Florida State University study found that those with fibromyalgia who combined resistance training with chiropractic treatment two times a week saw improvements in their symptoms.



# **Walnut-Crusted Chicken Cutlets**

This quick and easy chicken recipe is ready in less than 30 minutes.

Olive oil nonstick cooking spray

1/2 cup panko (Japanese-style breadcrumbs)

1/8 teaspoon ground red pepper (cayenne) Salt and pepper

1/2 cup walnuts, toasted and cooled

1/4 cup fresh parsley leaves, loosely packed

1 large egg white

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

1 1/2 pound chicken-breast cutlets, thinly sliced

3. In pie plate, whisk egg white and Dijon until wellmixed.

4. One at a time, dip 1 side of each cutlet in eggwhite mixture, then into walnut mixture to coat side evenly; press firmly so mixture adheres. Arrange chicken on rack in jelly-roll pan, coated-side up; lightly spray with cooking spray.

5. Bake chicken 10 to 12 minutes or until topping is golden-brown and chicken is no longer pink throughout. Serves 6.

# Reduce the risk for sports eye injuries

Encouraging children to play sports can be good for their minds and bodies. However, players risk injury anytime they engage in sports play, and the eyes are among athletes' most vulnerable body parts.

The American Family Physician says sports cause more than 40,000 eye injuries each year, though 90% or more of them can be prevented. A 2018 study in the journal Pediatrics found that basketball caused almost 16% of eye injuries in children between 1990 and 2012. The next activities to cause the highest amounts of eye injuries included baseball/softball and nonpowder gun use, such as airsoft rifles and pel-

The American Academy of Ophthalmology advises that the single best way to protect the eyes during activities is through the use of protective eyewear. Regular glasses alone are not effective. The AAO indicates that protective evewear should feature a type of lens made of a shatterproof plastic known as polycarbonate lenses. This eyewear should be utilized during basketball, racquet sports, soccer and field hockey. Polycarbonate lenses are impact-resistant and are the thinnest and lightest lenses available. Look for products that meet standards set forth by the American Society of Testing Materials.

Some sports may require more extensive gear, such as a face mask. It can still be advisable to wear eye protectors under the face mask. The AFP says this is particularly true for "one-eyed athletes," or those who have less than 20/40 vision in one eye, even when corrective lenses are used.

The National Eye Institute says that currently, most youth sports leagues do not require the use of eye protection. In order to safeguard young athletes, parents and coaches can insist that children wear safety glasses or goggles

during games, even if the league doesn't mandate it.

An eye doctor can examine children's eves and make recommendations for prescription or non-prescription eye protection to be used during sports play. Learn more about eye health at www.aao.org .

# What is octane and should it affect drivers' decisions at the pump?

Anyone who has ever driven their vehicles into a filling station is no doubt familiar with the word "octane." But few drivers may know what octane refers to and how it might affect their vehicles.

According to Kelley Blue Book, octane is a colorless component that boils at high temperatures. Octane is added to fuels, including gasoline used in vehicles, to eliminate preignition in combustion engines. The higher the octane rating, which is a measure of a fuel's ability to resist "knocking" or "pinging," the less likely the fuel is going to explode unexpectedly. In fact, KBB notes that gasoline with a high octane rating can withstand more compression than gas with a low octane rating.

What does this mean for the average driver when they arrive at the pump and have to choose between 87, 89 or 93 octane gasoline? Likely very little. The U.S. Department of Energy notes that most gasoline vehicles are designed to run on 87 octane gasoline. However, some vehicles are still designed to run on higher octane fuel, so drivers should always consult their owners' manuals to determine which octane is best for their vehicles.

Using a lower octane fuel than the one mentioned by the vehicle manufacturer can damage the engine over time. The DOE even notes that using a fuel with an octane rating other than the one recommended by the vehicle manufacturer may actually void the warranty. That gives drivers even greater incentive to consult their owner's manuals before filling up for the first time.

Drivers may wonder if using a higher octane fuel than the one recommended by their car's manufacturer will improve performance. In certain instances, it might. The DOE notes that higher octane fuel may improve performance and gas mileage and reduce carbon emissions when towing or carrying heavy loads. However, there's typically no such benefit when driving in normal conditions.

Drivers encounter octane anytime they visit a filling station. Learning more about octane and what it does for vehicles can help drivers become more informed motorists.







### Steamed Broccoli with Gremolata Crumbs

We dress steamed broccoli with a mixture of breadcrumbs and gremolata, an Italian garnish of lemon, parsley and garlic that is served as a topping on anything from stews to vegetables.

- 1 lemon
- 1 bag (12-ounce) broccoli florets
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1 clove garlic, crushed with press
- 1 slice firm white bread, toasted and crumbled
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley leaves
- 1. From lemon, grate 1/2 teaspoon peel and squeeze 1 tablespoon juice.

- 2. In microwave-safe bowl, place broccoli and water. Cover with vented plastic wrap and cook in microwave on High 4 to 5 minutes or until tender-crisp.

# Three potential indicators of engine trouble

Many drivers have found themselves stranded on the side of the road at one point or another. Whether the culprit is engine trouble, a flat tire or another issue, finding oneself stranded on the side of the road in need of assistance is an often helpless feeling that no one wants to experience twice.

Even drivers whose automotive clubs or insurance companies provide roadside assistance services want to avoid using such services. One way to do just that is to learn about potential indicators of engine trouble.

# 1. Warning lights

Vehicle warning lights exist for a reason. According to the automotive retailer

Pep Boys, a check engine light typically illuminates when vehicle sensors detect there are issues stemming from a loss of power. This can be dangerous, and Pep Boys recommends drivers pull over and call for a tow the moment the light comes on. In addition to check engine lights, drivers should heed warning lights referring to oil pressure and oil levels.

#### 2. Poor gas mileage

An easy way for drivers to monitor vehicle performance is to keep gas mileage in mind. If a vehicle suddenly feels like it's not getting as much mileage out of a tank of gas as it used to, this might be indicative of engine troubles. A fuel additive such as a fuel injector cleaner

might be helpful because it can clean clogged fuel injectors that can affect performance and lead to poor acceleration. However, the automotive retailer Advance Auto Parts notes that such products are not a one-size-fits-all cure. If vehicles continue to suffer from reduced gas mileage, drivers should bring them to a mechanic for a thorough examination.

#### 3. Jerking

Some signs of engine trouble are not as subtle as reduced gas mileage. Vehicles that begin to jerk while they're being driven are likely suffering from some form of engine trouble. Jerking might put a scare in drivers, but it's not necessarily the result of a major problem, even if it is one that should be addressed immediately. A jerking vehicle that stalls puts drivers, their passengers and other motorists at risk of accident, so bring this issue to the attention of your mechanic immediately. Poorly functioning spark plugs may be the culprit behind jerking, and that's a relatively inexpensive and quick fix. However, other issues can cause jerking as well, so don't delay in speaking with your mechanic.

Vehicles may indicate engine troubles in various ways. Drivers should contact their mechanics immediately whenever they suspect engine trouble is affecting their vehicles.
