CBD oil can interfere with other medications

Dear Dr. Roach: I am a 49-year-old woman who had a massive heart attack in April. My father died of a massive heart attack at 49. I have four stents in three arteries and am on Brilinta, low-dose aspirin, blood pressure medication, etc.

I have essential tremor, first noticing the tremors in middle school. The tremor is in my hands, making writing nearly impossible, and I have head bobs. I have an internal tremor that never stops. A previous practitioner prescribed a month's trial of beta blockers several years ago. I noticed no relief with the tremor but was physically ill for the first 30 minutes of the morning in the first two weeks. Recently, I found an online blog regarding essential tremor and CBD oil. Nearly all of the bloggers found some level of relief using this treatment.

If I choose to try CBD oil to assist with my tremor, is there a risk of it interfering with my heart and blood pressure medications? – M.M.

ANSWER: Cannabidiol, or CBD, is a nonpsychoactive substance found in cannabis, as opposed to tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC, the best-known psychoactive component.

CBD is typically sold as an oil and has been receiving press as a potential treatment for a wide variety of medical issues. Many or most of these claims have no data to support them. Anecdotal reports, such as

most blogs, are neither reliable nor scientific (and may or may not be true). There also is an issue with proving the dosage and purity of products said to contain CBD.

However, in the case of essential tremor, there is some evidence: Studies in mice have shown benefit with CBD, although a single case report showed effectiveness of THC but not CBD in essential tremor. The issue of drug interactions is a significant one. CBD inhibits two powerful pathways the body uses to detoxify drugs, the CPY3A4 and CYP2D6 systems. This is a serious issue for you. Ticagrelor (Brilinta), an anticoagulant, is metabolized by CYP3A4, as are some of the statin drugs usually prescribed to people with heart blockages. The effect of the anticoagulant could be much higher than expected, leading to bleeding risk. Other commonly used heart medications are metabolized by CYP2D6, and the effect on these medications is unpredictable.

I can't recommend CBD products given the medications you are taking, but would suggest you consider alternative treatments. You may have read about deep brain stimulation and ultrasound, two powerful and effective treatments for people whose symptoms have not responded to standard treatments.

Dear Dr. Roach: This question is for my husband. How safe is drinking tea while on warfarin? He has his INR checked monthly, and for the most part it stays between 2 and 3. He watches his vitamin K intake reg-

ularly. He has read conflicting stories of how tea interacts with warfarin by making the INR levels high. – S.J.

ANSWER: Tea comes in two major types: black tea, which is fermented, and green tea, which is not. Black tea has no known interactions with warfarin (Coumadin). Green tea contains small amounts of vitamin K, which could make the INR lower and the warfarin less effective. However, the effect is likely to be small. Further, if he drinks a consistent amount per day, his dose can be adjusted to reflect his vitamin K intake.

Figural doorstop

How do you keep a heavy door from slamming shut? That was a problem by the mid-18th century when huge brass hinges held the doors. It was solved with wedges, heavy rocks or doorstops of many sizes and shapes. Cast-iron figural doorstops were made in the early 1900s but did not become popular until the 1910s, when many American companies began making figural examples.

One of the most interesting is called "Huckleberry

Finn," a figure of a farm boy in blue overalls and a yellow shirt carrying a fishing pole and bait bucket. It's 12 3/8 inches high and has a wedge back. The doorstop is marked Littco and was made by the Littlestown Hardware & Foundry Company that started in 1916. It made doorstops, bookends, hammers and fireplace accessories until 1940 and the war. After the war, the company started making cast aluminum products. In the 1990s, it stopped iron casting. One of Littco's most famous doorstops, "Halloween Girl," a costumed girl with a pumpkin in excellent condition, sold for \$29,500 in 2016.

"Huckleberry Finn" is an important book written in 1884 by Mark Twain. It was the first "bookstore"

book written in vernacular English, and it included swear words and descriptions of good and bad parts of life at the time. An excellent example of the "Huckleberry Finn" doorstop with almost perfect paint sold for \$325 in 2016 at an important Bertoia auction of just doorstops.

g: My daughter was given two Norman Rockwell collector plates 25 or 30 years ago and never displayed them. One plate is titled "Balcony Seat" and the other is "Quiet Reflections." They still are in the original boxes. What are they worth?

A: Collector plates made in "limited editions" were popular in the 1970s and '80s. Some collectors specialized in Norman Rockwell plates, and tried to get all the plates in the series. Interest began to wane in the 1990s, and collector plates don't sell well today. Most Norman Rockwell collector plates sell for less than \$25 in spite of the fact that Rockwell original paintings now sell for up to a million dollars.

Q: I have a small soft-sided Coca-Cola cooler that has two zippered compartments. The top compartment holds six 16-ounce glasses. The glasses are decorated with umbrella tables and chairs and are marked with an anchor on the bottom. What is this worth?

A: The anchor mark was used by Anchor Hocking of Lancaster, Ohio. The cooler with six glasses sells online for about \$10 - \$15.

Whatchamacallits

For the next few weeks, our whatchama-callits will feature a series of tools that were used in the leather working trade – from the long and recent past. Our first item was called a "sizing stick," used in the making and selling of shoes, boots and clogs. Some of us may remember a metal version that was used to size our foot before the shoe store owner actually went into a stockroom to find the size and style for us that we wanted to try on – but I digress.

This antique sizing stick is marked "Belcher Bros. & Co. New York." It is made of boxwood – which was apparently the wood of choice for measuring sticks (or rules, as they were also called) – and has brass accents and hinges. Thomas Belcher began making assorted measurers in 1822, and by 1831, three Belcher brothers were working together. The official "brothers" business name changed three times and by 1853, it was

what we see on our size stick.

This is a beautifully crafted foot/shoe sizer. It has foot/shoe measurements on the inside, with the outside being marked as a standard 12-inch ruler. The shoe sizer is pretty accurate to today's sizes, as I used it on one of my shoes and it gave the size 7.5 correctly.

Other measuring sticks produced by the Belchers included Gunter's scales (precursors to the modern slide-rule), tailor's rules and squares and wantage rods, which were used for measuring the empty part of a barrel or cask.

The company was at one time the largest American manufacturer of rules, but by the second half of the 19th century,

Stanley overtook their sales market. Belcher stopped manufacturing rules circa 1877.

Rabid skunk found in Town of Stark

Herkimer County Public Health received word on Sept. 13 from Wadsworth Labs that a skunk that was sent in to be tested for rabies on Sept. 12 from the Town of Stark has tested positive for rabies.

The skunk was found in the yard of a residence and fought with a dog; the dog owner killed the skunk.

The public can protect themselves or their family pets from rabies by practicing the following:

- 1. Vaccinate your pets against rabies.
- 2. Make sure animal enclosures are secure so small animals cannot get in.
- 3. Spay or neuter all animals to reduce the number of strays.
- 4. Do not feed strays or handle unknown animals, wild or domestic.

Remind children and adults not to play with unknown animals (wild or domestic). Due to the high percentage of bats that can carry the rabies virus, if there was any possibility a bat found in a house had contact with a person or an animal in the house, call Public Health and we will make arrangements to have the bat tested.

Herkimer County Public Health would like to remind the public to check your pet's rabies vaccination records to make sure that they are up to date. If they are not up to date, make an appointment with your vet as soon as possible to have them vaccinated against rabies. Herkimer County Public Health's next rabies clinic will be held on Oct. 3 at the Town of Little Falls Garage, 478 Flint Ave Ext., from 5:30 - 7 p.m.

Share your photos and ideas on their Facebook page when you can. It's always great to see people enjoying outside adventures.





Returning a pet to a shelter

Dear Paw's Corner: I am a disabled senior citizen with two beautiful dogs. Recently I was told that I need to move from my apartment to an assisted living facility that doesn't allow pets. There is no one to take my dogs. Will a shelter take them in? What will happen to them? — Michael G., via email

Dear Michael: The first thing to do is reach out for help. You're making a huge life transition and should find out what options you have. Contact your city's senior services department, the United Way or the AARP for assistance. Tell them your dilemma. Ask if there are assisted living facilities available that will allow your pets to stay with you.

If you cannot take your dogs with you, contact the shelters in your city or region. Explain your situation, and that you must surrender your pets. Not all shelters are able to accept surrenders, but all of them can give you information on other places to call for help. When you find a shelter that will accept your dogs, the shelter will probably schedule a day and time for you

to come in.

You'll bring your dogs, in carry-cages if possible, and will fill out a surrender form. There will probably be a fee for surrendering them. If you need assistance filling out the form, or if you cannot afford the fee, tell the shelter as soon as possible. Once surrendered, the shelter will do its best to find a new home for your dogs.

Thank you for thinking of your dogs during this stressful time and making sure they're cared for no matter what happens. I wish you the best.







The Kitchen Diva

I've prepared lunches for my family for several years, and one thing I know for sure, you've got to have a plan! Eating out every day is not only too expensive, the meal choices are typically unhealthy. And if your child is a picky eater like mine, buying school lunches is a waste of money.

A nutritious lunch prepared at home does not have to be boring or cost you a fortune. Making small changes can save you money, like planning a lunch with ingredients that also work well for dinner meals. Remember that well-nourished adults and children have a greater chance of success at work or at school.

Proper nutrition also is a key ingredient for back-to-school success because it fuels brain cells and gives your child the energy and nutrients needed for optimal learning. Packing your child's lunch lets you know exactly what he or she is eating.

Follow these tips, and not only will you save money, you'll also pack a nutritious lunch that your child will enjoy!

- Practice good nutrition yourself. Children learn by association - you need to be a role model. Discuss with them the benefits of healthy eating.
- · Plan ahead and have a list when you go to the store. The more time you spend in a store, the more money you spend.
- Use foods from each of the five food groups: Carbohydrates, protein, dairy, fruits and vegetables. Choose whole-

grain products like bread, tortillas, pita bread, bagels or whole-grain crackers. These are more nutritious, have more fiber, vitamins and minerals, and keep blood sugar steady for optimal learning.

- Include the kids in the preparation process and give them choices. Take them along when grocery shopping. Let them pick a new fruit or vegetable to try each week.
- Buy what's on sale each week, then work it into a menu. Use fruits and vegetables that are in season.
- Make your own ingredients. Look beyond lunch meat. Slice your own meat or grill a chicken breast and cut it into strips or cubes. Avoid prepackaged lunches, since they are high priced.
- Let your children help prepare dinner and use the leftovers to pack their lunch. Invest in a good insulated food container to keep food warm.

You can use my recipe for Mediterranean Chicken Two Ways as a delicious dinner and a nutritious lunch. It makes eight servings (four for lunch and four for dinner). One meal with two ways to save money!

Mediterranean Chicken Two Ways

- 2 cups plain fat-free Greek yogurt
- 1 tablespoon packed fresh mint or
- 1 tablespoon fresh dill, chopped, or 1/2 tablespoon dried dill
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cumin
 - 3 cloves garlic, finely minced
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons ground black pepper

- 4 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
 - 1/2 cup olive oil
- 2 tablespoons poultry seasoning
- 1 teaspoon dried orega-
- pounds chicken breast tenders
- 1 English (seedless) cucumber
 - 2 large ripe tomatoes
 - 4 whole-wheat pitas
- 1. In small bowl, combine yogurt, mint, dill, 1/2 teaspoon cumin, 1/3 of the garlic and 1/2 teaspoon each salt and pepper. Let stand for 15 minutes. Place half of mixture in a covered container and refrigerate to use for lunch.
- 2. Using a shallow container or pie plate, combine 2 tablespoons of the lemon juice, 1 1/2 tablespoons oil, poultry seasoning, oregano, 1/2 teaspoon each salt and pepper, 1 teaspoon cumin and 1/3 of the garlic. Add chicken, turning to coat. Let stand.
- 3. Heat a grill pan or heavy skillet on medium-high. Grill chicken 10 to 12 minutes or until no longer pink in center, turning once.
- 4. Meanwhile, cut cucumber and tomato into chunks; toss, in large bowl, with the remaining 1/2 teaspoon salt and pepper, and remaining lemon juice, oil and gar-

For Dinner: Divide the chicken, yogurt sauce and the cucumber and tomato mixture evenly. Place half of the ingredients in sealed contain-

ers. Transfer remaining chicken to serving plates and serve with the remaining cucumber mixture and yogurt sauce. Prepare a side of orzo or couscous to serve,


For Lunch: Toast pitas in a large dry pan over medium-high heat on the stovetop, or on the top rack of an oven, or in a toaster oven until lightly browned, about 1 minute on each side, turning once. Fill the pitas with the remaining chicken, and top with yogurt sauce and the cucumber mixture. Place in a reusable container in a lunchbox along with fruit.

Chow line: Fall vegetable options plentiful

I love to eat seasonal produce such as strawberries in the spring and sweet corn in the summer, but besides apples, I'm not sure what's in season now. Can you tell me which fruits and vegetables are seasonal in the fall?

Your question is very similar to another that was asked in a "Chow Line" column from September 2017, so it's best answered by reissuing that column here.

Autumn is a good time to start looking to buy pears, apples and hard squash, among many other seasonal fruits and vegetables. In fact, those are some of the items that many grocery stores typically start to promote heavily at discounted prices in their grocery aisles, according to the National Retail Report, a weekly roundup of advertised retail pricing information compiled by the USDA.

While improved technology and agricultural innovations mean that consumers can access fresh fruits and vegetables year-round, fruits and vegetables naturally grow in cycles and ripen during specific seasons. When ripe, produce is fresher and typically has

its best taste. Seasonal fruits and vegetables are also typically cheaper to purchase because they are easier to produce than fruits and vegetables that are grown out of season.

How do you know which fruits and vegetables are in season?

To find seasonal foods near you, try using the app and website developed by Grace Communications Foundation, a nonprofit organization that advocates for sustainable foods. The app compiles data from the USDA and the Natural Resources Defense Council on over 140 varieties of produce to show users which fruits, vegetables, herbs and nuts are in season on a state-by-state basis.

Called the Seasonal Food Guide, the app and website allow users to check which produce is in season in half-month increments in each state. Other sources to check for what's in season include the USDA Seasonal Produce Guide, among others.

Chow Line is a service of Ohio State University College of Food, Agricultural and Environmental Sciences

and its outreach and research arms, Ohio State University Extension and the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center.
