Lee Newspapers excited about taking on Empire Farm Days

As announced in January, Lee Newspapers Inc., publishers of Country Folks, Country Folks Grower and Country Editor, is now responsible for hosting Empire Farm Days (EFD). The show will take place at Rodman Lott & Son Farms in Seneca Falls, NY, July 29 - 31.

"We came into Empire Farm Days because we reached out to them about helping them sell vendor space and before we knew it, it had become the latest addition to our trade show lineup," explained Bruce Button, general manager and vice president of Lee Newspapers. "It's an exciting and challenging prospect for us because we usually put an entire year of planning into each show, and with EFD we're seven months away. We are bringing together every targeted marketing effort, including all our publications, our social media accounts and our web presence, to make the show an even more dynamic showcase for our dairy, beef and crop farmers."

Fortunately, Lee Newspapers has a surfeit of experience when it comes to organizing trade shows. The company has been hosting them for more than 30

years, beginning with the Hard Hat Expo, designed for those using construction equipment and services.

"People know our papers, but they don't necessarily know our shows," Button said. "Hosting them seemed to be a natural extension of our trade publications."

In addition to Hard Hat Expo, the Trade Show Division of Lee Newspapers also hosts the Keystone Farm Show, the Virginia Farm Show and manages the Empire State Producers Expo. Now they are leading EFD as well

"We genuinely believe in the trade show concept. It's cooperative advertising and marketing and it's very interactive," Button stated. "We like hosting trade shows rather than consumer shows because they bring in much more targeted attendees, and those attendees are more likely to make meaningful connections – and sales."

EFD features hundreds of ag exhibitors, live demonstrations and seminars. There is something for all types of farmers, whether they run small or large operations. Button mentioned that Country Folks and Lee Newspapers have been a part of this show for 40

years. He added that EFD is "fun, because with it we can expand our demonstrations, as we have 300 acres to play with."

They're also considering possibly hosting VIP events for select producers. Lee Newspapers is focused on expanding the exhibitor base as well. Button said they are enthusiastic about this next step.

Founded in 1965, Lee Newspapers publishes targeted trade publications for the agricultural, heavy construction, aggregate, commercial horticulture and solid waste industries. Their ag trade shows have seen steady growth year over year, both in exhibitor numbers and attendance.

"Our most prominent example is the Keystone Farm Show," Button said. "When we started that in 1998, we had 83 exhibitors. In 2019, we hosted over 500."

"We are excited to be involved with leading Empire Farm Days into the future," said Ken Maring, trade show manager for Lee Newspapers.

Little Falls unveils relocation/marketing website for HGTV Home Town Takeover submission

LITTLE FALLS – Embella Inc. and the City of Little Falls have announced the unveiling of a relocation/marketing site for Little Falls as part of the city's HGTV Home Town Takeover package. The new website, www. thisislittlefalls.com, showcases the city as one of the most attractive small cities in Upstate New York to live, work and play.

Deborah A. Kaufman, a managing partner of Embella Inc., said, "Little Falls has been experiencing a resurgence of interest from Millennials who are relocating to our city for its family-centric lifestyle, year-round activities and idyllic quality of life. We wanted to create a site

Enjoy some over-the-top indulgence this Valentine's Day

There's no such thing as too much chocolate on Valentine's Day. Sweethearts across the country exchange chocolate every Feb. 14, making this beloved confection as emblematic of Valentine's Day as turkey is of Thanksgiving and hot dogs and hamburgers are for July 4.

While a single helping of chocolate might suffice for some couples, those who really enjoy indulging in chocolate may find a single helping simply won't suffice. For such folks, the following recipe for "Triple-Chocolate Cookies" from Michael Recchiuti and Fran Gage's "Chocolate Obsession" (Stewart, Tabori & Chang) can make the perfect addition to any Valentine's Day celebration.

Triple-Chocolate Cookies

Makes about 48 cookies

7 oz unbleached all-purpose flour $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz unsweetened natural cocoa powder

½ tsp baking soda

6 oz unsalted butter with 82% butterfat, at room temperature

- 3½ oz granulated cane sugar 4½ oz dark brown cane sugar
- ½ tsp pure vanilla extract
- ½ Tahitian vanilla bean, split

horizontally

- ½ tsp fleur de sel in fine grains 3 oz 41% milk chocolate, roughly chopped
- 3 oz 65% chocolate, roughly chopped

To make the dough:

- 1. Sift the flour, cocoa and baking soda together in a bowl. Set aside.
- 2. Put the butter in the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment. Beat on medium speed until creamy. Add both sugars and the vanilla extract. Scrape the seeds from the vanilla bean into the bowl. Sprinkle the salt over the top. Beat on medium speed just until combined.
- 3. Reduce the speed to low. Add the dry ingredients in three batches, pulsing the mixer to incorporate each batch before adding the next one. Pulse just until a crumbly dough forms. Add both chopped chocolates and mix on low speed just until incorporated.
- 4. Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured work surface. Knead a few times to incorporate any crumbs.
- 5. Divide the dough in half. Roll each half into a log about $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches

in diameter and 12 inches long. As you roll, gently push the ends toward the center occasionally to prevent air pockets from forming and to keep the logs at an even thickness.

6. Wrap the logs in plastic wrap and refrigerate until firm, at least three hours or up to three days.

To bake the cookies:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 325° F. Line the bottoms of two 12-by-18 inch sheet pans with parchment paper.
- 2. Remove the logs from the refrigerator and unwrap them. Using a ruler to guide you and a sharp knife, cut each log into rounds ½-inch thick. If the dough crumbles as you cut it, reshape each slice. Place the rounds on the prepared pans, spacing them 1½ inches apart.
- 3. Bake on the middle shelves of the oven, rotating the pans 180 degrees halfway through the baking time, until set but soft enough to hold a slight indentation when pressed with a fingertip, about 14 minutes. Let cool completely on the pans on wire racks.
- 4. Store in an airtight container at room temperature for up to 1 week.

The flu and you

Here we are, halfway through winter, and the flu season is in full swing. As of now all 50 states have widespread levels of flu. And at this point far too many people still haven't gotten their flu shot.

The senior version of the shot (for those over age 65) has four times the amount of vaccine of three of the four types: two A and one B. While this isn't ideal (it's still missing one B), it's what we have. The high-dose vaccine was created to give our bodies a high immune response. Because of our age, we're in the high-risk group for complications, even if we don't have any medical concerns. Seniors had more hospitalizations from flu than any other age group.

At this writing there have been more than 6,000

deaths from the flu. How many of these could have been avoided by getting the flu shot?

One big concern is that it's possible to be contagious and pass the flu to others days before someone starts to feel sick. Going to the grocery store, attending church, reading to kids at the elementary school ... there are too many opportunities to give the flu to others (or have them give it to you) before anyone even suspects they have it.

But it's not too late to get the shot. Even if it doesn't keep you from getting the flu, it will keep you from getting as sick as you might have.

A delay can arise in areas where they've temporarily run out of the flu vaccine. Don't let that stop you. To get your flu shot, call your doctor's office, the local pharmacies and the closest senior center. You'll find the vaccine somewhere.

No matter what, wash your hands frequently and keep them away from your face.



BOCES VP-TECH student's fundraiser supports military members & veterans

Some active military members and veterans will be receiving hundreds of items such as food, blankets, hats, socks, shampoo, shaving cream, toothbrushes and letters from local children thanks to an effort organized by Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES VP-TECH student Zoe Randall.

Randall, a junior from Central Valley, said she received donations from students and staff at Herkimer BOCES and from businesses and others in the area.

"I couldn't be more proud of everyone in the school and everyone in the community for coming together," she said.

Randall ran the fundraiser from mid-December through mid-January, storing the items at Herkimer BOCES during the process. She and her parents, Fred and Traci Randall, picked up the items on Jan. 29 and delivered them to the American Legion in Mohawk to be distributed to active servicemen and servicewomen and veterans.

"They were very grateful," Randall said of the American Legion members.

Due to taking high school and college classes through Herkimer BOCES VP-TECH while also doing nursing work, Randall had a busy schedule during the fundraiser, but she enjoyed the process.

There were some times it was stressful, but I knew I could get it done," she said. "I knew this was important to me, so I knew I was going to get things done and do it."

VP-TECH focuses on technology, project-based learning and real-world work situations. Students can spend four to six years in the program to earn a Regents diploma, an associate degree in quality assurance from Herkimer College for free, a certification in advanced manufacturing and connections with local businesses.

"I connected with it"

Randall was inspired to start the fundraiser because her father served in the U.S. Air Force for 20 years.

"He loved it because it was like a family to him," she said.

She also saw that her father had to deal with a friend of his in the military committing suicide and that he had PTSD after serving. Additionally, she knew the struggles military families can face, so all of it combined to make her want to start the fundraiser.

"I connected with it so much, and it was personal too," she said. "I wanted to give back, and I saw what he had to go through. And as a kid, it's hard because you have a parent that leaves, and you never know if they're going to come

The idea of the fundraiser was to send

a positive message to military members.

"We might not be there personally, but we're still by them and watching them, supporting them," she said.

"Became much bigger"

VP-TECH business teacher Andrew Carpenter said Randall approached him with the idea of the fundraiser, and once she received approval, she ran with it from there. She talked to students in various BOCES classes, and students started bringing in boxes of items. The effort got bigger and bigger, he said.

"She did this whole thing," Carpenter said. "I honestly didn't expect it to be as big as it was.'

Neither did Randall. "We thought it was going to be little, and it actually became much bigger,' Randall said. "I was so glad because we all came together as a school and a community."

Her father offered moral support and was able to talk to her about the value of a donated item or letter when serving in the military.

"Even just one little thing meant so much," she said.

Randall's mother also helped, and a donation was received from the Walmart where her mother works.

Other students assisted - either by bringing in items or spreading the word. Her friend Alyssa Bregard, who is also a VP-TECH junior of Central Valley, played a large role - including speaking to classes with her and collecting donations.

Teachers provided information and support to Randall throughout the process as well.

"They pushed through and helped me," she said. "I got so much support through my parents, the school and the students."

"It's time"

Randall spread the message of her fundraiser by writing letters to send home to parents and by presenting to students in other BOCES programs.

As she talked about the pain that members of the military and their families

go through, students looked focused, and they listened and engaged in deep conversations, she said.

"I told them that it's time we did something bigger than ourselves and had a positive impact on the people that are helping us and serving for us," she said. "I told them I think it's time for us to come together and do it."

She asked for any donations people wanted to make. "Even letters mean so much," she said.

Whichever class donated the most items also received a pizza party, but that wasn't the focus, Randall said. The Automotive Technology program won the competition after Automotive Tech student Makayla Lawrence donated 130 items.

Randall appreciated the large response from everyone involved.

"It felt great," she said. "It felt like I had a purpose. It felt like I did something that is bigger than me. It motivated me to do more fundraising.

"Good in the world"

The feelings of the experience hit Randall the most when she and her parents dropped off the items at the American Legion at the end of the fundraiser.

"The support was so overwhelming," she said. "It was emotional.'

With the fundraiser taking place over the course of just about a month - including holidays and a school break in the middle of it – it showed how much can be accomplished in a limited amount of time, Randall said.

The military has to deal with so many negatives such as war, terrorism and other struggles, but the fundraiser brought out the other side of that, Randall

"We as a school showed that there's still good in the world to give," she said.

Chocolate is often described as "decadent," and rightfully so. Few foods can make people feel as if they're being indulgent as well as chocolate. Perhaps that's what makes chocolate such a great fit for Valentine's Day. When giving that special someone some chocolate on Feb. 14, you're not just giving them something delicious, but also a chance to indulge in a forbidden fruit.

But chocolate desserts can be more than merely decadent. In fact, this recipe for "Pasticcio di Cioccolato con Lampone (Individual Chocolate Cakes With Fresh Raspberries)" from Michael White and Joanna Pruess' "Fiamma: The Essence of Contemporary Italian Cooking" (Wiley) is both decadent and, thanks to the fresh raspberries, refreshing. The individual cake is an ideal Valentine's Day gift, as it serves to emphasize how that special someone is the only one for you.

Pasticcino di Cioccolato con Lampone (Individual Chocolate Cakes With Fresh Raspberries)

Makes 8 servings

1 1/3 cups cake flour, sifted

1/3 cups plus 2 tbsp cocoa powder, sifted

1/4 tsp baking soda

6 tbsp unsalted butter

6 large eggs

1 cup granulated sugar

1 tsp vanilla extract

1 cup heavy cream

1/4 cup confectioners' sugar, sifted

1 pint fresh raspberries

Vegetable cooking spray

Pinch of sea salt.

1. Preheat the oven to 325° F. Spray a standard muffin tin with nonstick spray or fill 8 of the cups with paper or foil liners.

- 2. Sift the flour, 1/3 cup of cocoa, salt and baking soda into a bowl and set aside. Melt the butter in a small saucepan and set aside.
- 3. Combine the eggs and sugar in the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with a whisk attachment. Set the bowl over a pan partially filled with simmering water. The water should not touch the bowl. Using a whisk, beat

the egg-sugar mixture until it feels very warm to the touch and all of the sugar has dissolved. Immediately remove the bowl from the heat and transfer it to the

- 4. Whip the egg-sugar mixture on medium speed for 3 to 4 minutes until it triples in volume and is very thick and light colored. Add the vanilla and whip 2 to 3 seconds longer to blend. Remove the bowl from the mixer and gently fold in the flour-cocoa mixture.
- 5. Place about 1½ cups of the batter in a separate bowl and fold in the melted butter. Do this gently, as you do not want to overwork the batter. Fold this into the remaining batter. Divide the batter evenly among the cupcake tins. Bake in the center of the oven for 20 to 25 minutes, or until a toothpick or knife inserted in the center of one cupcake comes out clean. Remove and cool completely on a rack.
- 6. While the cupcakes are cooling, combine the heavy cream with the confectioners' sugar and the remaining 2 tablespoons of cocoa, beat into soft peaks and set
- 7. Remove the cupcakes from the tin and place them on dessert plates. Spoon the whipped cream on top, divide the raspberries among the plates and serve.

Many 18th century lamps used oil to get light. If whale oil was not available, the lamps could use olive oil. The oil was kept in a reservoir, usually metal, that had three or four burners with wicks. Several were needed to get enough light. A group of these

lamps also had reflectors on a pole, usually shaped like a moth with spread wings. The pole held the needed tools, wick cutters, wick picks and snuffing caps, and could raise and lower the reflector to direct the light. Many were made of brass to withstand heat, and silver was added for decoration where it would not melt. This late 19th-century silver-plated lamp that burned fat has it all – a silver-plated reflector brass pole, tools, moth reflector and a finial.

Q: I have a 1967 Barbie and Ken wedding set in the original unopened (but not perfect) box. It was made by Mattel. How do I get information on the value of this set, and how could I sell it?

A: Quite a few Barbie bride dolls have been made since Barbie was introduced in 1959. Your wedding set is the 1964-65 Barbie Wedding Party Gift Set (No. 1017) by Mattel. It is a set of four dolls dressed in wedding finery, which originally sold from about \$14 to \$20. The set includes a bubble-cut Barbie doll (with blonde, brunette or titian hair) in the outfit called "Bride's Dream" (No. 947); a painted-head Ken doll (in blond or brunet) in "Tuxedo" (No. 7897); a Midge doll (with brunette or red hair) in "Orange Blossom" (No. 987); and a Skipper doll (with blonde, brunette or red hair) in "Flower Girl" (No. 1904). The set came with a wire stand for each doll and a pillow with a wedding ring on it, which was exclusive to this set.

Many Barbie and friends gift sets were offered between 1960 and 1974. Some were department-store exclusives. When found "mint in the box," they are some of the priciest and hardest-to-find Barbie items. Theriault's, an auction company in Annapolis, MD, specializes in auctioning dolls and often sells Barbie and accessories. A wedding set like yours sold at Theriault's for \$1,100 in 2009.

Impress with homemade sweets

Few people can imagine Valentine's Day withchocolate. While heart-shaped boxes of chocolate might be ubiquitous in February, those who want to truly impress that special someone this Valentine's Day can try their hand at baking up their own batch of decadent treats.

This recipe for "Chocolate Coconut Meringues," courtesy of EatingWell. com, makes for a perfect indulgence. Loaded with flavor but not too heavy, these sweet treats can be enjoyed after a Valentine's Day dinner or even as a snack the day after.

Chocolate Coconut Meringues Yields: 30 cookies

4 large egg whites 1/4 tsp cream of tartar 1/4 tsp coconut extract or imitation coconut ex-

1/4 tsp almond extract 1/4 tsp vanilla extract

1/8 tsp salt 1 cup sugar

cup unsweetened cocoa powder

- 2 tbsp semisweet chocolate chips or finely chopped chocolate
- 2 tbsp trans-fat-free white chocolate chips or finely chopped white chocolate, such as Sunspire
- 1. Position racks in upper and lower thirds of oven; preheat to 250° F. Line 2 large baking sheets with parchment paper or nonstick baking mats.
- 2. Beat egg whites, cream of tartar, coconut, almond and vanilla extracts, and salt in a large bowl with an electric mixer on medium-high speed until combined. Gradually beat in sugar, 2 table-

stiff, shiny peaks form, 6 to 8 minutes.

- 3. Sift cocoa over the mixture and gently fold together with a rubber spatula until combined.
- 4. Spoon the meringue into a gallon-size sealable bag (or pastry bag fitted with a ½-inch tip). Seal the bag, pressing out as much air as possible. Cut a ½-inch hole in one corner of the bag. Pipe the meringue into 2-inch circles, about 1 inch apart, on the prepared baking sheets.
- 5. Bake on the upper and lower racks for 50 minutes. Turn off the heat and let the meringues stand in the oven with the door closed until completely dry, about 11/2
- 6. Melt semisweet and white chocolate (see below) and drizzle or pipe

spoons at a time, until onto the cooled meringues. Let stand until it

> Tips & techniques: To melt the chocolate, place it in a bowl and microwave on medium for 45 seconds. Stir: continue microwaving on medium in 20-second intervals until almost melted, stirring after each interval. Continue stirring until completely melted. Or place in the top of a double boiler over hot, but not boiling, water. Stir until melted. To decorate cookies with melted chocolate, use a pastry bag fitted with a fine writing tip to pipe the melted chocolate or dip tines of a fork in chocolate and drizzle. You can improvise a pastry bag with a small plastic bag. Add melted chocolate to the bag, cut a tiny hole in one corner and squeeze the chocolate out.

To Your Good Health

Is overexercise cause of 'knots in the back'?

Dear Dr. Roach: My wife is 69 and in very good health, exercising at least two hours a day. She has suffered from "knots in the back" for over 10 years. It is extremely painful, often bringing her to tears. It comes on suddenly at any time of the day or night, and lasts hours, days and occasionally weeks. She has been to several physicians, whose recommendations are to "live with it." She has tried chiropractic, massage therapy, prescription and OTC painkillers, stretching and home massage, all to no avail. I cannot see the knots, but I can feel a tightness when I attempt to rub them out, which usually does nothing. A glass of wine is the only reliable relief, and it lasts only a few hours. Is there any recourse to this condition? – J.P.

Answer: I am sure you and your wife must be frustrated. The fact that it comes on suddenly, can be felt as tightness and gets a bit better with alcohol makes me strongly suspect she is having muscle spasms. These most often come on in the legs and feet, but they can affect the back too.

Two hours a day of exercising sounds like a lot, and she may be overexercising some muscles, while possibly not exercising others. This can lead to imbalances in muscle strength.

Another common problem stemming from exercising is inadequate stretching. Stretching is the first place to start for many people with muscle cramps. A physical therapist or physiatrist may be of immense benefit, and your wife should explain in detail what her exercise regimen is. We are taught to think carefully of the mechanism of injury, and I am concerned the exercise may be that injury.

Abnormalities in electrolytes (blood salts, especially potassium, sodium, magnesium and phosphate) are only rarely the cause, although many people write me that they have been helped by taking one or more of these. Primary muscle diseases, side effects from medications and inadequate hydration are possible, but also unlikely.

In absence of detailed knowledge about her exercise regimen, I'd recommend she try backing off a bit, maybe using ice after exercise, stretching the back under supervision and trying a hot bath or shower before bed.

Dear Dr. Roach: I am a 78-year-old who runs 15-20 miles per week, with prostate gland enlargement and reduced urinary frequency with occasional use of Advil. As a runner, I have been reluctant to make ibuprofen a daily regimen because I have read that inflammation is part of the body's response to tissue damage, which is crucial

to the healing process and is important for muscle growth. When ibuprofen's anti-inflammatory effect reduces symptoms, does it affect the healing process also? Can you comment on the pros and cons for runners? – B.M.

Answer: High-dose ibuprofen was shown to inhibit muscle protein synthesis following weightlifting exercise. This led to a suspicion that it might impair the gains in muscle strength

that are made with exercise. However, a Canadian study showed that moderate doses of ibuprofen (400 mg after exercise) did not impair muscle growth or gains in strength. Using ibuprofen for occasional muscle soreness or for the purpose of reducing prostate inflammation should not adversely affect your performance in running.

Chocolate Pudding

For a sweet treat, we tweaked this chocolate classic from our 1927 cookbook. Now with a double dose of antioxidant-packed bittersweet chocolate and cocoa, it will satisfy any sweet tooth.

½ cup sugar

2 cups whole milk

4 oz bittersweet chocolate

¼ cup unsweetened cocoa

3 tbsp cornstarch

2 large eggs

1 tsp vanilla extract Sweetened whipped cream and chocolate shavings (optional)

1. In 3-quart saucepan, with wire whisk, combine sugar and 1½ cups milk; heat on medium-high until bubbles form around edge of pan. Remove from heat and add chocolate. Let stand 1 minute, then whisk until chocolate melts.

2. Meanwhile, in me-

dium bowl, whisk cocoa, cornstarch and remaining ½ cup milk until smooth. Whisk in eggs until blended. Whisking constantly, add ½ cup hot chocolate mixture in slow stream.

3. Heat chocolate mixture remaining in pan on medium-low. Whisking constantly, gradually add egg mixture to pan. Cook, whisking constantly, 10 minutes or until mixture becomes very thick and begins to bubble. Whisk in vanilla. Divide among 6 small serving cups.

4. Refrigerate until cold, 4 hours or up to 2 days. Top with whipped cream and shaved chocolate.

Tips for buying jewelry this Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day is rife with tradition. Couples may have their own unique traditions, but others, like Valentine's Day date nights, are widely popular.

One Valentine's Day tradition many couples embrace is the exchange of gifts. Shoppers might not need much advice when purchasing heart-shaped boxes of chocolates or flowers for their sweethearts. However, when shopping for jewelry, Valentine's Day celebrants may feel as though they're in over their heads. The following tips, courtesy of the Better Business Bureau®, can help shoppers as they navigate the potentially confusing process of buying jewelry.

Diamonds

The BBB notes that diamonds' value is based on color, cut, clarity and carat. Often referred to as the "4 Cs," this criteria refers to the grade of the color (color), the way the diamond is finished (cut), how flawless the diamond is (clarity) and its weight (carat). When shopping for diamonds, the BBB advises asking jewelers if they have the most up-to-date testing equipment, which makes it easier for them to distinguish between diamonds and lab-created gemstones. That's important, as lab-created gemstones resemble diamonds and may not be detectable if jewelers are using testing equipment designed to identify cubic zirconia.

Colored gemstones

Colored gemstones are very popular, and the BBB notes that various new stone treatments have been developed to improve their appearance and durability. However, the BBB also notes that such treatments may adversely affect the value of the gem and necessitate special care in order to maintain the gem's appearance. When shopping for colored gemstones, ask the jeweler if an item has been treated and if there's any special maintenance required. Imitation or assembled stones may look like natural stones, so shoppers should ask if a stone is natural, synthetic or imitation before purchasing anything.

When used alone, the word gold implies an item is all gold or 24 karat gold. But the BBB notes that gold is naturally soft and, as a result, is typically mixed with other metals to improve its hardness and durability. The karat-quality marking indicates what proportion of gold is mixed with other metals. For example, the most common mark for gold jewelry is 18K of 750, which signifies an item is 75% gold. Lower-karat gold jewelry may include copper, silver, zinc or other metals. Consum-

ers should ask about these alloys and determine if the item's ultimate recipient is allergic to certain metals or if he or she has a high acid content in their bodies. People with high acid content in their bodies may have their jewelry turn black as a result.

Straciatella with Escarole

Straciatella is the Italian version of egg drop soup. The straciatella are the "little rags" of egg that form when beaten egg is drizzled into hot broth.

- 3 cans (14- to 14½-oz) chicken broth
- 3 cups water
- 1 head (12-oz) escarole, trimmed and cut into 1-inch pieces
 - 3 large eggs
 - 1/3 cup freshly grated Pecorino Romano cheese
 - ½ tsp salt
 - 1/4 tsp coarsely ground black pepper
- 1. In 4-quart covered saucepan, heat broth and water to boiling on high. Stir in escarole; reduce heat to medium and simmer 5 minutes or until escarole is tender and wilted.
- 2. Meanwhile, in 2-cup liquid measuring cup or small bowl, whisk eggs, Romano, salt and pepper until combined.
- 3. Drizzle egg mixture from measuring cup into simmering broth, gently stirring just until egg shreds are

set. Ladle soup into warm bowls and serve immediately. Yields 10½ cups (4 main-dish servings).

Principles of first aid everyone should know

Emergencies can strike at any time. When such situations arise, emergency care often must administered to someone who is sick or injured, and that care can mean the difference between life and death.

Being prepared for emergencies means understanding basic first aid procedures that can help a person navigate a crisis or at least stabilize the situation until paramedics arrive. The following are some first aid principles that individuals should know and practice, courtesy of the American Heart Association, American Red Cross and CPR Certified Indigo Medical Training. They should not replace formal first aid training, but can assist a person when he or she is providing medical care to someone in need.

Bleeding

Bleeding can almost always be controlled until more help is available. Severe bleeding can lead to shock and death, so bleeding needs to be addressed immediately. Cloth should be used to cover the wound, and direct pressure should be applied to stop the blood flow. Do not remove the cloth; add more layers as needed. Tourniquets may do more damage to a limb than good, so they are generally no longer recommended. Nosebleeds can be treated by pinching the nostrils for a few minutes until the bleeding stops. Wounds to the head and mouth tend to bleed a lot even if they are superficial. So keep a level head when addressing these areas.

CPR

Cardiopulmonary resuscitation is one of the most important medical procedures to know. If the heart is no longer pumping blood, a person can die quickly. Immediately start chest compressions hard and fast in the center of the chest, allowing recoil between compressions. Many buildings also have automated external defibrillator devices that can help save lives. If you're not trained in CPR, then provide hands-only CPR, says the Mayo Clinic. That means uninterrupted chest compressions of 100 to 120 a minute (the beat of "Stayin' Alive" by the Bee Gees) until paramedics arrive. People who are trained also may perform rescue breathing. The Red Cross and other medical groups offer first aid and CPR certification classes that train people on how to perform CPR and use an AED.

Someone suffering shock or fainting needs blood to get back to his or her brain. Victims should lie on their backs with their feet elevated.

Choking

The Heimlich maneuver can be performed when someone is choking. Contrary to popular belief, people who are choking do not typically make any sounds. Stand behind the victim and wrap your arms around them. Place a fist between the person's rib cage and belly button, and place your other hand over the fist. Deliver a quick thrust upward, and keep doing this until the foreign object is dislodged. Choking in children is handled differently depending on the child's age. Parents can get training in child maneuvers.

Sprains and fractures

Sprains and fractures occur readily, especially among active adults and children. Immobilize the limb, apply a cold pack, elevate it and offer anti-inflammatory drugs for discomfort and swelling. A doctor should be seen for further diagnosis and treatment.

Common first aid procedures can help save lives or reduce the severity of injuries when promptly offered.






butterflies?

Eight sweets for your sweetheart

- 1. Bananas Foster: This treat is made from bananas and vanilla ice cream. A sauce made from butter, brown sugar, cinnamon, dark rum and banana liqueur is placed over the cooked bananas and ignited like a flambé to create a caramelized dessert.
- 2. Black forest cake: This chocolate cake

marries layers of chocolate sponge cake with a rich cherry filling. It is based on the German dessert, schwarzwälder kirschtorte. Whipped cream often tops off this rich cake.

- 3. Cannoli: These Italian pastries originated on the island of Sicily. They consist of tube-shaped fried pastry dough filled with a ricotta cheese-based cream.
- 4. Cheesecake: Cheesecake often is made with a crust of crushed cookies, graham crackers or sponge cake. A thick layer of batter made from sour cream, cream cheese, eggs and sugar is cooked into a semi-soft consistency. Some cheesecakes are light and fluffy, while others are dense and decadent.
- 5. Chocolate truffles: Not to be mistaken for their fungi cousins, chocolate truffles are made by forming balls out of choc-

olate ganache (made from heavy cream and melted chocolate), and rolling them in cocoa powder.

- 6. Cream puffs: These tasty morsels are made from a French choux pastry dough filled with a moist filling of sweet cream or custard.
- 7. Napoleon: The French offer a layered dessert, and it comes by way of mille feuille, also known as a Napoleon pastry. Puff pastry dough sandwiches vanilla custard or cream in various layers.
- 8. Tiramisu: Meaning "pick me up," tiramisu is the Italian take on a layered dessert made from ladyfingers cookies dipped in coffee and a whipped mixture of mascarpone cheese and cream, topped with cocoa.

Dessert and other sweets are often a part of Valentine's Day celebrations.




