Herkimer College students save over \$2.1 million in textbook costs

Herkimer College students have saved over \$2.1 million in textbook costs since the college implemented Open Educational Resources (OER) in 2016.

OER are high-quality, digital coursework materials made accessible to students online rather than in traditional, more expensive hard copy form. The materials are available from the first day of class-

The college adopted the initiative ahead of the Winter 2016 semester to help remove financial roadblocks that could derail students' progress and

spur improvements that would increase the likelihood of degree and certificate completion.

In its first semester, the program only served 10 students for a savings of only \$1,200. But with expanded faculty adoption of open resources (the college now offers three degrees with complete OER compatibility - Science AS, General Studies AA and Social Science AS) in Spring 2020 there are 125 OER course sections with 2,427 registered students, with a total estimated savings of \$291,240.

"We are so excited that

faculty at Herkimer and across the country are helping to create and curate more Open Educational Resources all the time," said Linda Lamb, associate dean of academic affairs. "The result is that our students are saving money without having to sacrifice access to high-quality learning resources.

The State University of New York (SUNY) hopes to double the percentage of general education courses offered with OER. Statewide, OERs have saved SUNY students about \$47 million in textbook costs.



Shamrock Showdown Mite Tournament March 13 - 15 at the Whitestown Community Center and Ice Rink. This will take place March 13 from 5 - 8:30 p.m., March 14 from 8 a.m. - 7 p.m. and March 15 from 8 - 11:30 a.m. at the Whitestown Community Center and Ice Rink, 1 Championship Drive, Whitesboro.

As part of their yearly Mite tournament, the organization wanted to give back in a way that would have a positive impact on the community. They decided to focus on a way to help local veterans. Volunteers from Feed Our Vets, as well as members of the Whitestown Youth Hockey organization, will be on hand throughout the weekend to collect non-perishable food items. Examples of needed items include cereal, pasta, canned sauce, canned fruit, peanut butter, jelly, boxed potatoes, canned pasta, canned raviolis, Ramen noodles, soups, Rice-a-Roni, baked beans, pancake syrup and pancake mix.

Volunteers from Feed Our Vets will also be on hand at the event to pass out brochures about the organization and sell T-shirts to raise money for Feed Our Vets. Monetary donations will also be accepted at the event.

"This is an incredible opportunity for the youth hockey communities attending our event to honor veterans by donating to the Feed Our Vets organization. It also allows us to teach the youth the importance of giving back to those that served our country," said Cyndi St. James, Whitestown Youth Hockey Association president.

Feed Our Vets founders Rich and Michele Synek established the first pantry for Feed Our Vets in Utica in February 2008 while Rich was working as a postmaster in Vernon Center. One day, a World War II veteran came into the post office to purchase a stamp. In speaking with the veteran, he realized that at times the man and his family would not have any food to eat and were on a very limited budget. That night, Rich and his wife purchased food for the veteran and his family and brought it to their home. They recently moved to a larger location at 587 Main St., New York Mills.

Rich is a Navy veteran, a member of the American Legion, VFW, Marine Corps League, American Veterans for Equal Rights, National League of Postmasters, National Association of Postmasters of the United States and is a Master Mason.

"Feed Our Vets would like to thank the Whitestown Youth Hockey Association and the Whitestown Community Center and Ice Rink for their support and hard work helping to make an impact for our hungry veterans who have been left on the battlefield of hunger. It's especially patriotic to see a group of young men and women standing up for our local veterans and thanking them for the freedoms which we enjoy," Rich said.

Whitestown Youth Hockey Association and Feed Our

Vets are also working with Express Employment Professionals Veterans Supply Drive. They will be providing a military vehicle to gather and deliver the food to the New York Mills location. John Calabrese Jr. has been working with many corporate partners since 2016 to establish the Veterans Supply Drive initiative. They currently utilize an M923 military cargo vehicle, as well as an M998 Humvee. To date they have collected over 20 tons of food that has gone directly to local veterans in

Robyn Appler, director of Parks, Recreation, Buildings and Grounds for the Town of Whitestown, said, "Our staff works hard to provide a clean, safe and friendly environment for the community to gather. Whether it's a hockey game at the rink, or BINGO in the community center, this facility is prepared to welcome these events and more. Snow shoveling & snow blowing safety

As winter continues, snowfall reminds us of outdoor tasks, such as shoveling and snow blowing. "By following some simple safety precautions, cold weather tasks can be accomplished safely and without injuries," said Diane Ward, CHN of Herkimer County Public Health.

Most importantly, older people and people with back problems should never attempt to shovel snow. An older person has a greater risk of slipping on ice or snow and causing injury.

"It's important to stretch and warm up your muscles before you begin shoveling. Many back injuries occur in the morning, because the tissue around the spine is tight after a night of rest. Ironically, people between the ages of 20 and 50 are more likely than older individuals to injure their backs, because they may not be aware that they are out of condition," Ward cautioned.

Herkimer County Public Health suggests the following shoveling tips to prevent back injury and strain:

- Use a proper snow shovel.
- Take small loads of snow, bend at the knees and lift with your leg muscles, not your back.
- Scoop in a forward motion, and step in the direction you throw the snow.
- Avoid twisting, which puts additional strain on your back.
- Take frequent breaks. Stand up and walk around after every 10 minutes of snow shoveling.

"Snow shoveling is extremely hard work. Do not shovel snow unless you are in good physical condition," Ward said. "Cold weather, without any physical exertion, puts additional strain on your heart. People who are overweight, have heart problems or have high blood pressure are at high risk for injuries when snow shoveling."

Failing to take proper precautions while using a snow blower is another leading cause of injury during the winter season.

Herkimer County Public Health suggests the following steps to help you avoid injury while using a snow blower:

WILL REMOVE UNWANTED APPLIANCES FOR FREE

If you have unwanted refrigerators, freezers, washers, dryers, push lawn mowers, riding mowers, bikes, tillers, stoves, hotwater tanks, furnaces in cellar,





• Read the owner's manual thoroughly before operating the snow blower.

- Keep both feet firmly on the ground while starting the snow blower.
- Remove obstacles from your path, and aim the snow carefully. If rocks or chunks of ice are thrown by the snow blower, they may cause injuries or damage property
- Do not unclog the snow blower chute while the engine is running.
- Do not wear loose-fitting clothing, such as a scarf, that may get caught in the snow blower.
- Do not drink alcoholic beverages while operating the snow blower.

- Do not operate the blower over gravel, loose stones or on steep hills to avoid losing control and causing injuries.
 - Know how to shut the machine off quickly.
- Never leave your snow blower running while unattended.

Remember, as with any outdoor activity, you will be more comfortable and safer if you dress properly for the weather. Wear several layers of lightweight clothing, and cover your head. Fifty percent of body heat is lost through the head.





Did you know?

Most parts of North America will begin Daylight Saving Time on March 8 at 2 a.m., respective to their time zones. In the European Union, "Summer Time" begins at 1 a.m. on the last Sunday in March, which this year will be March 29. The change is made at the same absolute time across all time zones respective to Greenwich Mean Time, which also is known as Universal Time.

Slow Cooker Chicken Pot Pie

This recipe from Woman's Day gets to the heart of what makes pot pie so good: the creamy chicken filling. It's so tasty, you can skip the puff pastry altogether and just serve it with some crusty bread on the side, if you prefer.

½ cup dry white wine 2 tbsp all-purpose flour Kosher salt and pepper

4 medium carrots 2 stalk celery

1 onion

1½ lbs boneless, skinless chicken thighs

1 sheet frozen puff pastry

1 egg

1 cup frozen peas

3 tbsp fresh dill sprigs

1. In a 5- to 6-qt slow cooker, whisk together the wine, flour, ½ cup water and ½ teaspoon each salt and pepper.

2. Add the carrots. celery, onion and chicken, and toss to com-

bine. Cook, covered, until the chicken is cooked through and easily pulls apart, 6 to 7 hours on low or 4 to 5 hours on high.

3. When the chicken has 30 minutes left to cook, heat oven to 400° F. Cut the puff pastry into 8 rectangles and place on a parchment-lined baking sheet. Brush with the egg and bake until puffed and golden brown, 20 to 25 minutes.

4. Gently fold the peas and dill into the chicken and vegetables and cook, covered, until heated through, about 3 minutes. Spoon into bowls, sprinkle with additional dill if desired, and top with the puff pastry. Serves 4.



Three strategies to manage your time more effectively

Busy professionals juggling the responsibilities of work and family often feel pressed for time. Adding a 25th hour to the day might not be possible, but busy men and women can make more time by managing their existing time more effectively.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention note that stress and time management are linked. People who effectively manage their time may, as a result, prove more capable of handling stressful situations than those who are not as adept at time management.

Effective time management is an ongoing process that often requires people to revisit their approaches as their commitments change. In addition to making such adjustments when necessary, men and women can employ these

three strategies to manage their time more effectively.

1. Keep track of yourself.

Maintain a log that indicates how much time you're spending on the various tasks you perform throughout the day. Without such a log, it can be difficult to determine where time is being wasted and which activities require the most attention. In addition, maintaining an activity log can shed light on when you

tend to be the most productive and when your energy begins to wane. That's an especially beneficial thing to know, as it may compel you to make changes that can boost your energy levels at times of the day when you can most benefit from a little extra energy. For example, if you notice your productivity routinely slows to a crawl after lunch, you might choose to change your diet so you consume more energy-boosting foods at midday.

2. Steer clear of your mobile devices.

A 2019 study from eMarketer.com estimated that people will spend an average of three hours and 43 minutes on their mobile devices each day in 2020. The study found that much of that time was spent using social networking apps. Some professionals may need to use social networking apps as part of their jobs, but those that don't should steer clear of their mobile devices during the day. Doing so may reduce distractions that can have an adverse effect on productivity, thereby helping people get more done in less time. During the workday, turn off unnecessary mobile phone notifications, such as those from sports or social media apps.

3. Make an effort to clear the clutter.

Clutter might not seem like too big a threat to productivity, but studies have found that it is. The National Association of Productivity and Organizing Professionals notes that 54% of adults are overwhelmed by clutter at home and work, with 78% acknowledging they have no idea how to deal with it. One study even found that the average person wastes more than four hours per week searching for papers. That's lost time and time that's certainly not managed effectively. By clearing away clutter at home and at the office, adults may be saving themselves an untold number of hours each

Winter pedestrian safety

When conditions are right, wintertime walks can be exhilarating. However, snowy sidewalks and icy streets can turn a safe stroll into a dangerous activity. Many injuries result from falls on slippery surfaces, warns Diane Ward, CHN of Herkimer County Public Health

During and after a snowstorm, residents should keep their steps and walkways as free of snow as possible to keep them from becoming ice-covered. If sidewalks become dangerous, or if there are no sidewalks, pedestrians may be forced to walk in the street.

Walking in the street may present its own hazards. Road surfaces may make it hard for motorists to stop at traffic signals or to slow down. Drivers may also be distracted by snow-covered signs and landmarks. When this happens, pedestrians are at risk of getting hit by a motor vehicle.

"Older adults should especially careful while walking outside in the winter. An older person's risk for falls increases if they have dementia, impaired vision or impaired hearing," Ward said.

Falls are more likely for people who have limited flexibility and coordination, as well as adverse reactions to some medicines. Falls are a leading cause of traumatic brain injuries, and among older adults falls are the leading cause of injury deaths.

This winter, follow these safe walking tips:

- Wear shoes or boots with non-slip soles. Also, wear reflective or bright-colored clothing, such as a hat or scarf. so motorists are better able to see you.
- Follow all traffic signs and signals.
- If you have to walk in the street, face traffic and stay as close to the curb as possible.
- Before you step off the curb, make sure any oncoming vehicles have come to a complete stop.
- Be aware of your surroundings. A covered patch of ice or a pothole filled with snow may cause a slip or fall.
- Bend your knees a little and take slower steps to limit your chances of falling. Wear gloves to avoid putting your hands in your

pockets. Avoid carrying heavy packages which may affect your balance and block your view.

- If you are pushing a child in a stroller in the road, put the stroller in front of you and as close to the curb as possible. Dress children in reflective or bright-colored clothes
- Hats or scarves that cover your ears can also distort or eliminate the muffled sounds of approaching vehicles. Keep warm, but make sure that you can hear what's going on around you.

Recommended vaccines for adults

Newborn babies endure quite a bit in the first few days and months of their lives. Routine immunizations help newborns overcome these obstacles, and as newborns get old they receive vaccines to prevent measles, mumps, rubella, hepatitis and chicken pox.

A common misconception suggests that vaccines are only for the young. However, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention notes that the protection provided by some childhood vaccines can wear off. In addition, some people may be at risk for certain vaccine-preventable diseases due to lifestyle, existing health conditions and age. As a result, it's important for adults to make sure their vaccines are up-to-date.

Those who are unsure of their vaccine status should discuss their health history with their doctors. In the meantime, adults should know that the following vaccines are recommended for people of various ages.

- Influenza: An annual flu shot is highly recommended. Doctors and health officials indicate that getting the flu vaccine is the single most effective way to prevent seasonal flu or reduce the duration and severity of the illness should it be contracted.
- **Tdap**: This vaccine contains strains of tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis (whooping cough). All three are implicated in serious illnesses or death, according to WebMD. Just about every person, young and old, should receive the Tdap vaccine. The CDC says that every adult should get the Tdap vaccine once if they did not receive it as an adolescent. Then a Td booster shot every 10 years is sufficient.
- Shingles: People who have been exposed to varicella (chicken pox) in their youth are at risk for shingles as they grow older. The CDC says nearly one out of three people in the United States will develop shingles

in their lifetime. A shingles vaccine can protect against shingles and complications from the disease. Adults who are 50 and older should get the vaccine, which is administered in two doses.

- Pneumococcal polysaccharide vaccine (PPSV23): This vaccine protects against serious pneumococcal diseases, including meningitis and bloodstream infections. It is recommended for all adults age 65 and
- Pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV 13): This protects against serious pneumococcal disease and pneumonia. Adults 65 years or older who have never received a dose of PCV13 should discuss PCV13 with their physicians.

Vaccines protect the very young from various diseases, but there are many vaccines that are still vital to health in adulthood.

Things to know before drafting a living will

During the prime of their lives, people typically don't give much thought to scenarios in which they become ill or are facing the end of life. Sickness and mortality are not easy conversations to have, but it is important for everyone to approach these heavy topics with close family members so that individuals can rest easy knowing their needs will be met if or when their

health falters.

An advanced healthcare directive - also known as a living will - is a legal document in which a person lists the specifics of medical care and comfort actions they desire should the individual no longer be able to make decisions for themselves due to illness or incapacity. The legal advice resource Legal Zoom says the living will may

list certain things, such as whether life support is desired or if pain medication should be administered. A living will should not be confused with a traditional will, which is a legal document that explains wishes for financial and personal assets after a person dies. Living wills also differ from living trusts, which address how assets will be managed if a person becomes

incapacitated.

A living will is not always a necessity if a person does not have strong feelings about decisions made on their behalf while not cognizant. However, for those who do want to have a say in care, a living will is the best method for ensuring choices will be carried out. The following are some other questions people should ask themselves concerning living wills.

- Do I want to remove the burden of tough choices from my loved ones? A living will relieves grieving loved ones of the responsibility of making challenging decisions of invoking life-saving procedures or not - particularly if they're not sure what you desire.
- Do I have firm feelings about life-saving methods? A living will allows you to spell out preferences on insertion of feeding tubes, if you want specialized hydration, if you want to be hooked up to life support if brain function is minimal and a host of other scenarios.
- Is cost preventing me from drafting a living will? Cost need not be a factor in setting up a living will. You can download a free template from any number of online legal sources. Local hospitals often have forms as well, which can be notarized for only a few dollars. These forms are generally comprehensive and can help you answer all the questions and write in specifics.
- Have you selected a trusted person to carry out wishes? A health care proxy, according to the American Bar Association, is a person appointed by you with the authority to make decisions for you if you are unable to express your preferences for medical treatment. Together with the living will, the health care proxy, also called a durable medical power of attorney, can fulfill your wishes accordingly.

A living will is an important component of medical and estate planning.





The difference between broth and stock

Q: My dad asked me to pick up chicken stock from the store for a meal that he wanted to make for dinner. When I got to the store, I bought chicken broth and brought it home. He sent me back to the store because he said stock and broth aren't the same thing. But aren't they really?

A: No, they are not.

Your dad is correct. There is a difference between broth and stock, and depending on which recipe he was making, the difference between the two could have an impact on the outcome of the meal. This is because, generally speaking, broth is lighter and more flavorful, while stock is thicker.

To understand the difference, it's important to understand what stocks and broths are. Stocks and broths are liquids used to make sauces, soups, stews and other recipes.

The main differences between stock and broth are the use of bones or meat, the length of cooking time and the type of seasonings added, writes Jenny Lobb, an educator in family and consumer sciences for Ohio State University Extension.

"Unless it's a vegetable stock, stock is made using bones, water and a mixture of aromatic vegetables including onions, carrots and celery. It's simmered for two to six hours and generally has added seasonings," Lobb wrote in "Broth versus Stock," a blog posted at Live Healthy Live Well.

The site, which can be found at livehealthyosu.com, is a free information resource that offers science-based consumer information and insights.

The boiling of the bones – generally chicken, beef or pork – allows the bone marrow and collagen to be released from the bones, thus making stock much thicker than broth.

However, "broth, on the oth-

er hand," Lobb writes, "takes less time to make, and contains meat (unless it's a vegetable broth), vegetables and seasonings, and is generally simmered on the stove top for no more than two hours."

Stock is typically used in sauces, gravies, stews and as a braising liquid for meat, while broth works well as a base for soups, stir-fry dishes, dumplings, stuffing and for cooking grains and legumes, she said.

"Although broths and stocks can be purchased in cans and cartons at the grocery store, it is fairly easy to make your own at home," Lobb said, noting that, "making broths and stocks from scratch can be a cost-saving activity if you save and utilize meat and vegetable scraps that would otherwise be thrown away."

And with the cold days ahead during the remainder of this winter, soups and stews are a great comfort food to keep you warm on the inside!






