2020 Rabies Vaccination Schedule

- 1. All cats, dogs and ferrets three months or older must be vaccinated even if they stay indoors.
- 2. Every dog and cat needs two rabies vaccinations one year apart, then one every three years.
- 3. Bring proof of the pet's vaccination history to receive a three-year certificate.
- 4. Ferrets must be vaccinated every year.
- 5. Dogs should be on a leash; cats and ferrets should be in a carrier or pillowcase.
- 6. NO EXAMS WILL BE GIVEN. Please help to move the clinic along. Thank you.
- 7. Owners are responsible to clean up after their animals; supplies are provided.
- 8. A \$5 donation per pet is suggested to defray costs. Thank you.

Herkimer BOCES LPN Open Houses at Remington school building help local adults decide on their nursing career futures

When Little Falls resident Sara Annutto attended a Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Adult Practical Nursing Program Open House about a year ago at the Remington school building in Ilion, she wasn't focused on becoming a nursing student. She heard about the program and thought she would check it out.

In June, she is expected to graduate from the program as a licensed practical nurse. She plans to go on to become a nurse in the dermatology field.

"Here I am," she said, while recently talking about the program while in a lab at the Remington school building. "I love it."

The Herkimer BOCES Adult Practical Nursing Program will be hosting a series of LPN Open Houses from 6:30-7:30 p.m. on the first Wednesday of each month from March to August at the Remington school building, 77 E. North St. in Ilion. The upcoming dates are April 1, May 6, June 3, July 1 and Aug. 5.

Herkimer BOCES offers a full-time LPN program that lasts 12 months and offers part-time day or part-time evening programs that require 20 months. Upon completion of the program, students are eligible to take the NCLEX-PN exam. This exam licenses them with the

state of New York as a licensed practical nurse (LPN). To learn more about the program, visit www.herkimer-boces. org/LPN.

The LPN program is one of several adult and school-aged programs that Herkimer BOCES operates out of the Remington school building, which Herkimer BOCES has leased from Central Valley since 2013. During the current school year, 212 school-aged children from the 10 component school districts and 250 adults from the community have attended programs housed in the Remington building.

As a more permanent solution to its space needs, Herkimer BOCES proposes to purchase the Remington school building. The Central Valley community voted 256-16 on Nov. 12, 2019, in favor of selling the building to Herkimer BOCES.

The next step is for residents of all 10 component districts to vote on Tuesday, March 31, whether to authorize the purchase of the building by Herkimer BOCES.

'An introduction'

The Herkimer BOCES LPN Open Houses allow local adults to learn about the program, meet faculty, view the facilities and find out more about how to apply, Herkimer BOCES Adult Practical Nursing Program Coordinator Sara Nicolette said.

"It serves as an introduction to our program in just one hour," Nicolette said. "I try to give them a realistic sample of what the program is going to be like."

When Annutto, a full-time student, attended the Open House, she enjoyed learning what the classes and clinicals would be like and decided the program was right for her. One thing that stood out to her is how much you can accomplish in a short period of time.

"It's quick," she said. "One year full-time to get your LPN." "It's definitely worth it," she said. "You just have to push yourself really hard for it, and you can do it."

The program for me

Full-time student Kayla Clifford, of Utica, went into the Open House with a different perspective than Annutto.

"I've always known that I've wanted to be a nurse," Clifford said. "This was kind of just my first stop to do.

Meeting the LPN coordinator and staff during Open House helped confirm for Clifford that she wanted to apply.

"It was intimidating at first, but to know they're so supportive of your goals and your success individually, made me realize this is the program for me," she said.

Clifford shared that the faculty can be tough on you, but that gives you a better chance to succeed in the end on your testing and as a nurse.

"This is the best program around because of the support of the instructors and the coordinator," she said.

Another thing Clifford likes about the program is the nursing classroom and laboratory facilities at the Remington school building.

"It's comfortable, and it makes you feel safe," she said. "I love the labs."

After completing the program, Clifford plans to earn a bachelor's degree and become a registered nurse, specializing in a field she will determine along the way. She feels that the Herkimer BOCES program has also helped prepare her for those next educational steps.

"They really teach us not only to be nurses, but also how to study and be a student," concluded Clifford.



Scammers using fake novel Coronavirus phishing emails to target consumers online

The New York State Division of Consumer Protection (DCP) is alerting consumers about scammers taking advantage of fears surrounding the novel coronavirus. Scammers are using fake emails that contain harmful links designed to steal your personal information. While the New York State Department of Health, which is the medical authority on novel coronavirus in the state, has recently stated there are no confirmed cases of the novel coronavirus anywhere in New York, people should still be on the lookout for scammers looking to take advantage of public fears surrounding this issue.

"Unscrupulous scammers are taking advantage of the news of the novel coronavirus by trying to lure people into unknowingly providing their personal information," said Secretary of State Rossana Rosado. "Taking the necessary precaution to avoid coronavirus scams can help protect your hard-earned money and your identity."

"While the novel coronavirus is infecting people throughout the world, in New York State we have had no confirmed cases," said Commissioner of the New York State Department of Health Dr. Howard Zucker. "Unfortunately, the Internet is loaded with misinformation, but simple, proven precautions like washing

Scammers are using fake emails that claim to have information on novel coronavirus updates and include an interactive link where you can look up the numbers of cases near you and more. The links, however, are harmful and redirect to web pages that steal your information instead of providing you with important updates.

DCP provides the following tips to protect yourself from novel coronavirus scams, and similar scams that

typically arise with a major global event:

Don't click on links from sources you don't know. It could download a virus onto your computer or device. Make sure the anti-malware and anti-virus software on your computer is up to date.

Be aware of emails coming from unknown senders. Watch for emails claiming to be from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) or experts claiming to have information about the virus. For the




Contemporary representational artwork on display at **Herkimer College**

Public health emergencies and winter weather

Snow and ice storms and freezing temperatures can turn a winter wonderland into a public health emergency that threatens people's health and safety. People with health problems and those with fragile immune systems are particularly at risk.

Diane Ward, CHN of Herkimer County Public Health, strongly advises residents to "winterize" their family emergency preparedness plans and learn how to avoid exposure to extreme cold conditions that can lead to hypothermia and frostbite.

"At home, make certain that you have extra water and food and know how you will manage during a power outage. A family's winter emergency plan should address how to keep people warm and dry if a winter storm knocks out power and electricity," she said.

Never use a generator indoors to produce electricity

because carbon monoxide fumes can poison your family. When using a non-electric heater or wood stove to warm your house, you must have adequate ventilation to the outside to prevent a build-up of carbon monoxide.

Carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, poisonous gas given off by generators and other alternative heating sources. Symptoms of exposure to carbon monoxide are similar to the flu but without a fever. At lower levels of exposure, a person may develop a headache, fatigue, nausea, vomiting, dizziness and shortness of breath. Exposure to very high levels of carbon monoxide can result in loss of consciousness and even death.

Exposure to lower temperatures can also cause medical emergencies. Hypothermia is a life-threaten-

ing condition that causes the body's core temperature to drop dangerously low. Symptoms of hypothermia include shivering, confusion, memory loss, drowsiness, exhaustion and slurred speech. Infants with hypothermia may have little energy and bright red, cold skin.

Hypothermia can occur unexpectedly even in rooms in which temperatures are set at $60 - 65^{\circ}$ F. People who are 65 and older should set their home thermostat no lower than 65° . Those who are 75 and older should maintain home temperatures of 70° .

Frostbite is another serious cold weather condition, and is especially dangerous because it happens with little warning. "Numbness can occur so quickly that a person may not know it, and may remain outside, which increases the risk of permanent damage to the skin. Older people and those with diabetes are especially vulnerable to frostbite because of poor circulation," Ward said.

To prevent hypothermia and frostbite, dress warmly and wear several layers of clothes to trap body heat. Go indoors when you begin to feel cold. Wear outer clothing that is tightly woven to reduce body heat loss caused by wind.

Cold weather also puts an extra burden on the heart. "If you have cardiac problems or high blood pressure, check with your doctor before shoveling or performing any strenuous exercise outside. Healthy adults too should dress warmly when working outside. You should go indoors if you begin to feel cold, and remember that the body is working overtime to keep warm," Ward said.







Ride for Missing Children fundraiser set for March 29

In 2015 four women from the Valley decided it was time for a new adventure. These were not spring chickens - ages 43 - 65. The four had done some amazing stuff: running marathons, completing triathlons and climbing high peaks in the Adirondacks. But this was a physical challenge nonetheless, and one of the four had never thought about it before - the Ride For Missing Children. What intrigued them was learning how to ride a road bike. None of them had ever ridden a road bike before, let alone for 90 miles! The Ride became their new mission. Later it became their passion.

In 1995, after the abduction of Sarah Ann Wood, a group of seven men rode their bicycles from Utica to Washington, D.C., and arrived on the Capitol Steps on May 25, National Missing Children's Day. It was after that the Ride for Missing Children formed. Its purpose is to honor the memory of all missing children, to raise public awareness of the plight of all missing and exploited children and the need for child safety education, to raise funds to support the missing poster distribution (11,541,389 posters distributed to date) and community education for prevention of child abduction and sexual exploitation. The Ride has grown steadily to over 900 participants every year. This oneday ride makes several stops at area schools, bringing a message of safety.

The four women got their road bikes, bike gear and committed to this cause - making our children safer, one child at a time. They also made long-lasting friendships, cried tears of sorrow with families of lost children and celebrated with jubilation when a child was recovered (7,125 to date)! 

Common components of traditional Irish dress

Various things can represent the culture of a people. Food, music, literature and even attire can combine to tell the story of a nation and its people. Traditional Irish attire is no longer worn on a daily basis, but such clothing has retained its importance through folk music and dance. Here's a deeper look at some Irish wardrobe pieces that have been worn through the centuries.

- Leine: Leine are knee-length shirts that were simple and generally worn by peasants. Men wore just the leine, while women often donned these shirts as undergarments and topped them with open-sleeved dresses.
- Trews: Irish dress was sometimes inspired by Gaelic and Norse attire. Checked trews were a form of tartan trouser that many Irish men would wear with fringed coats or mantles. The inside of the trews may have been lined with leather to avoid chafing while riding horses.
 - Dance costumes: Early female dancers wore ordi-

nary peasant dresses embellished with ribbons to form flowers or crosses. In the early 20th century, the dance costume evolved into a hooded cloak over a white dress with a sash. Eventually the dress design and colors were customized by dancing schools to represent their establishments. However, the most common colors used were blue, green and white. Red was deliberately avoided because of its connection to England.

- Kilts: Most scholars will trace the development of the "man's skirt" or kilt, to Scotland. Irish men also wore them regularly, particularly in the early 20th century. The traditional kilt associated with Ireland is the Saffron kilt. It is mustard yellow in color, often with shamrock appliques down the pleat. These kilts were first worn by the Irish military, and they are the most widely worn kilt in Ireland today. Kilts also may be comprised of tartan. Irish tartans are designed to represent the districts and counties of Ireland.
 - Sporrans: A sporran is a pocket attached to the

front of a kilt as a traditional accessory. Many Irish sporrans have shamrocks and green detailing.

- Knee-high socks: Traditional dress in Ireland often includes wearing knee-high socks with ribbons that match the color of the tartan.
- Ghillie brogues: This is a type of Highland shoe that has long laces that wrap around the ankles before they are tied in the front. These shoes are most commonly worn with kilts. Female dancers have a similar, albeit softer, Ghillie dance shoe that also laces up and is worn with tall socks.
- Aran sweater: The Aran sweater (jumper) is a style of sweater that takes its name from the Aran Islands off the west coast of Ireland. A traditional Aran sweater is off-white in color with cable patterns on the body and sleeves. The first of these wool sweaters were made for fisherman and were made from unscoured wool that is naturally water-resistant. These sweaters are a masterpiece of design.

A saint who's not a saint

St. Patrick is a man revered in Ireland and around the world. Despite being an influential figure in the history of Ireland and Christianity, St. Patrick is a saint in name only.

Millions of people around the world celebrate whom they believe to be an official saint each year on March 17. However, according to Irish Central and writer Ken Concannon, the formal canonization process in the Roman Catholic Church was not in place during its first millennium, a period of time in which Patrick was active. The official process for canonization was not instituted until around the 12th century, long after Patrick died. St. Patrick joins two other Irish saints who were never formally canonized. The only Irish saint to be canonized is Fergal, also known as

St. Virgil of Salzburg. He was canonized by Pope Gregory IX in 1233.

St. Patrick became a "saint" by popular opinion. In the early years of the Church, many martyrs and those whose lives were especially holy were considered saints, even if they were not canonized. It is probable, with the approval of a bishop, that St. Patrick was considered a saint for these reasons

The concept of St. Patrick not being an official saint adds to the mystery of the man, who was born in Britain and was said to have converted the Irish

from paganism with fabled symbolism that borrowed from ancient traditions

Even if his status as saint is informal, St. Patrick certainly made his mark, with a world-renowned celebration commemorating his achievements.

It's always the right time of year for fresh apple pie

Certain foods are synonymous with particular holidays or times of year. For example, few people can imagine celebrating Valentine's Day without ample supplies of chocolate on hand. And what summer barbecue is complete without grilled hot dogs and hamburgers? While these foods and others are must-haves during certain times of the year, that doesn't mean they cannot be enjoyed whenever a craving arises.

Apples, and particularly apple pie, are a staple of many holiday season celebrations. But apple pie is just as delicious in March, April, May, etc., as it is during the weeks between Thanksgiving and Christmas. That's especially true when the apples are fresh. Whether yours is a seasonal or non-seasonal craving for apple pie, be sure to satisfy it with this recipe for "French Apple Pie" from Mollie Cox Bryan's "Mrs. Rowe's Little Book of Southern Pies" (Ten Speed Press).

French Apple Pie

Makes one 9-inch pie
1 recipe Plain Pie Pastry (see below)
Raisin Filling
2/3 cup raisins
6 tbsp water
½ tsp lemon juice

¼ cup light corn syrup

1½ tsp all-purpose flour

1½ tsp sugar

2 apples (preferably a tart variety)

¼ cup brown sugar

½ cup sugar

1/4 tsp ground cinnamon

½ tsp ground nutmeg

1½ tsp cornstarch

Icing

1 cup confectioners' sugar

2 tbsp water

1 tbsp butter, softened

To make the raisin filling, combine the raisins, water and lemon juice in a heavy saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a boil, then lower the heat to medium-low and cook, stirring occasionally until the raisins are plump, about 15 minutes.

Separately, combine the corn syrup, flour and sugar and mix well, then add to the raisins and continue cooking, stirring occasionally, until thick and syrupy, about 10 minutes. Remove from the heat and cool until the mixture is just warm, about 10 to 15 minutes.

Preheat the oven to 400° F. Line a 9-inch pie plate with one rolled-out crust.

Peel the apples, cut them into thin wedges and put them in a large bowl. Separately, combine the sugars, cinnamon, nutmeg and cornstarch, then add to the apples and gently stir until evenly mixed.

Spread the apple mixture in the crust in an even layer, then spread the raisin filling evenly over the apples. Brush the rim of the crust with water, cover with

the second rolled-out crust, seal and flute or crimp the edges and cut a steam vent in the center.

Bake for 40 to 50 minutes, until golden brown. Cool on a wire rack for 1 to 2 hours, until completely cool.

To make the icing, combine the sugar and water and mix well. Add the butter and mix until smooth. Brush over the top of the cooled pie before serving.

Plain Pie Pastry

Makes two 9-inch pie crusts

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 tsp salt

2/3 cup vegetable shortening

5 - 7 tbsp cold milk

Sift the flour and salt into a bowl. Cut in the shortening with a pastry blender until it is the size of small peas. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon of the milk over part of the flour mixture. Gently toss with a fork and push to the side of the bowl. Sprinkle another tablespoon of milk over another dry part, toss with a fork and push to the side of the bowl. Repeat with the remaining milk until all of the flour mixture is moistened.

Press the dough together to form 2 equal balls, then flatten into disks. Roll out the crusts right away, or wrap the dough tightly, smoothing out any little wrinkles or air pockets and refrigerate for up to two weeks. On a lightly floured surface, roll out each ball to a thickness of 1/8 inch. Use a light touch and handle the dough as little as possible.

Serve braised pork for an Irish-inspired dinner

Items like stew made of mutton, beef or lamb, cod fish cakes and potato dishes are notably associated with Irish cuisine. However, many may be surprised to learn that pork has been a key part of the Irish diet for centuries. In fact, dating back to Neolithic times, large amounts of pig bones have been found near ancient habitations in what is now Ireland, likely indicating that wild boar, and eventually domesticated pigs from farms, were a prime source of food.

In the 18th century, Ireland was a major exporter of pork, butter and cheese. Irish cured bacon and ham were coveted, as were pork sausages, which are staples of traditional Irish fare. That is why "Cider-Braised Pork With Apples, Onions and Thyme" can be the perfect recipe for St. Patrick's Day or Irish-American Heritage Month. Enjoy this recipe, courtesy of "Edible Seattle: The Cookbook" (Sterling Epicure), edited by Jill Lightner.

Cider-Braised Pork with Apples, Onions & Thyme

Serves 6

2 tbsp all-purpose flour

Salt

Freshly ground black pepper

- $1\ (2\ensuremath{\mbox{3}}\xspace^{4}\mbox{-lb})$ tied pork shoulder roast, netting or string intact
 - $1\ \mbox{tbsp}$ peanut or vegetable oil, plus more, if needed
 - 1 tbsp olive oil
 - 2 medium leeks, halved lengthwise and cut into

half-moons

2 cloves garlic, finely chopped

½ lb small yellow pearl onions, peeled

1 tbsp chopped fresh thyme

3 - 4 cups hard apple cider

1 tart apple, peeled, cored and cubed

1 tbsp Dijon mustard

1 tbsp chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley

- 1. Preheat oven to 325° F. Heat a large, heavy, ovenproof soup pot or Dutch oven (with a tight-fitting lid) over medium-high heat. Place the flour on a small plate. Season the flour liberally with salt and pepper. Pat the pork dry; then coat it on all sides with the flour mixture.
- 2. When the pot is hot, add the peanut oil and sear the pork (leaving the string on) until nicely browned on all sides, 3-4 minutes per side. Transfer the pork to a plate, and carefully wipe the pot clean with paper towels. Reduce the heat to medium.
- 3. Add the olive oil to the pot, then the leeks, and cook, stirring, for 3 minutes. Add the garlic, onions and thyme, and season with salt and pepper. Cook and stir for 2 minutes, then nestle the pork in among the vegetables. Add the cider until it comes about halfway up the sides of the pork, cover the pot, and transfer it to the oven. Braise for 1 hour; then turn the pork over, add the apple cubes, and braise for another hour or so, until the pork yields completely when poked with

a skewer

- 4. Transfer the pork to a platter, cover with foil, and let rest. Meanwhile, return the braising liquid to the stove top, and simmer until considerably thickened, about 15 minutes. Stir in the mustard; then season to taste with salt and pepper. Stir in the parsley.
- 5. Slice the pork and top with the apples, vegetables and braising liquid.

Serving suggestion: This dish is tailor-made to be eaten with a bowl of mashed potatoes, or try it with some traditional Irish colcannon.
