Nine tips to make working remotely work for you and your employer

The concept of remote working has been around for a long time. Many entrepreneurs have mastered the ability to work virtually, but it is often a major challenge for those who normally work in a busy office setting to shift to working outside their traditional office environment. Working remotely can feel more isolating than mingling with co-workers in an office setting.

Being effective while you work remotely takes more than a mindset shift. It requires a disciplined approach to planning your activities and seeking out opportunities to interact with your co-workers. Here are nine practical tips you can use to make the most of this experience.

1. Establish a Routine: Just as you have a routine in your normal workday, try to mimic this routine as you work in your remote location. Whether it is at your home, an airport, or a coffee shop, following your normal work schedule is vital to feeling like you are really working. Start your workday at the same time. Make sure you get dressed. Wearing your pajamas might be comfortable, but it does not prepare your mindset for work. It can become easy to get distracted

when you are working in a different environment, so focus on acting like you're still working in a supervised workplace. This approach will help you feel more like you are working.

2. Set up a Dedicated Workspace: Having an area in your home where you do your work is essential to success in working remotely. It is easy to become distracted by the dog, television or the pile of household tasks that need to be completed. When you are in your workspace, you are working. If you combine it with following your normal work times, you can do a better job of staying focused.

3. Convert Commute Time to Learning Time: The time you used to spend on your commute is now extra time that you can use to enhance your value by learning something new. With the plethora of online courses and videos, you can take advantage of this "commute time" to enhance your skills. Even better, you might be able to get a certificate of completion that will make you even more valuable when you get back to a normal office work routine.

4. Take a Lunch Break: One of the most challenging aspects about working remotely is that

it becomes easy to just sit at your desk and eat your lunch. In a normal work environment, you have to walk somewhere and often wait a bit to get your food. At home, your lunchtime could drop from an hour to 15 minutes. Use the extra time to get in your workout or engage in some other activity to benefit your health. Giving yourself a solid break during the day will help reinvigorate you and give you a mental boost.

5. Connect with Others: When you are feeling a little lonely or isolated, take a minute to reach out to someone. Rather than sending a lengthy email, see if a colleague is available to talk live about a project. If they are working remotely too, they might welcome the human contact! Intentional connections like this build team bonds and help sustain you

when you are working remotely. It also offers you additional opportunities to dig even deeper into issues and brainstorm alternative solutions to critical issues.

6. Use Video Conferencing: Using technology applications such as video conferencing is a great way to connect people from different locations. It provides a deeper level of connection and engagement than a phone call or text. Don't worry about looking perfect on camera. The key here is using technology to connect with each other. Remote meetings are often very effective, but you need to make sure everyone is focused on the meeting and not multi-tasking! You can even set up regularly scheduled meetings via video conferencing so you can add more structure to your workday.

7. Communicate Clearly: If you are now relying

on digital communication with your colleagues through email, be sure you are communicating effectively. Sarcasm or snarky comments have no place in written communication as they can be taken out of context without the body language or facial expressions to convey your meaning. Take some time to plan out the structure for your communication. Identify your key messages and what you need to add to support them. This will help you clarify your thinking and be better understood

by others when they are only relying on your written communication.

8. Leverage Your Opportunities for Productivity: You will likely discover you are more productive without all of the interruptions common during an office workday. The lack of interruptions and distractions create additional opportunities for you to be more efficient in completing your normal

work responsibilities. But it also offers you the opportunity to be even more productive. Leverage this productivity and tackle that special project you were hoping to get done someday. That someday is now! Just make sure it is a one-off project, not a permanent addition to your job responsibilities.

9. Be Aware of the Time Trap: It is not uncommon for people to feel guilty that they are not working hard enough when work-


ing remotely. It is easy to fall into the time trap to seek out additional job responsibilities to fill your time. Keep in mind that you won't have the same opportunities for productivity once you go back to a normal office environment. You and your boss should be clear about this so the extra work does not cause complications when you get back into the work setting.

Final Thoughts:

While it is not ideal to have a major shift in how you work, you can adapt

to the situation with practice and focus. Keep in mind that it takes time learning to balance all of the complex aspects of working remotely. Be creative in exploring all your options for maintaining a connection with those you work with. Just make sure you keep your mindset on making a remote situation work for you — and your employer.

Chow Line: Healthy eating when stressed

Q: My kids are out of school for several weeks now, as part of my state's efforts to lessen the spread of coronavirus. As a result, I'm stressed, the kids are stressed and I've found myself reaching for rich, high-sugar foods that I typically avoid because they're not the healthiest options. Any tips on how I can eat better during this time of high stress?

A: You're not alone. People often reach for comfort foods during times of high stress. Many times, those foods tend to be high in sugar and low in fiber.

It's best to avoid those foods because they can increase the development of chronic inflammation in our bodies, according to Patricia Brinkman, family and consumer sciences educator with Ohio State University Extension.

That's an issue because high levels of chronic inflammation are believed to cause rheumatoid arthritis, psoriasis, asthma, reduced kidney function, inflammatory bowel disease, and prolonged chronic inflammation increases the risk of cancer, heart disease, diabetes and other diseases, Brinkman wrote in "Eating Healthy During Stressful Times," an Ohioline fact sheet.

Ohioline is OSU Extension's free online information resource and can be found at ohioline.osu.edu. OSU Extension is the outreach arm of Ohio State University's College of Food, Agricultural and Environmental Sciences.

"Even low amounts of inflammation can increase your risk of obesity, depression and the effects of aging," she wrote. "By eating a healthier diet, we may reduce our risk of chronic inflammation and diseases."

Some examples of healthy eating habits can be found by following these three plans, Brinkman said:

- Healthy U.S.-Style Eating Pattern, based on guidance found in the 2015 USDA Dietary Guidelines
 - Healthy Mediterranean-Style Eating Pattern
 - DASH (Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension) Diet
- "All three plans encourage us to eat plenty of vegetables and fruits, whole grains, low-fat or fat-free dairy and seafood and plant proteins," she said. "All three plans limit or encourage people to avoid consumption of empty calories including foods with added sugar, or drinking excess, as well as alcohol, refined grains, saturated fat foods and high sodium foods."

When crafting a healthy eating plan for a person on a 2,000-calorie diet per day, Brinkman said to consider consuming the following:

- Vegetables – 2 to 4 cups
- Fruits – at least 2 cups a day
- Whole grains – 3 to 4 ounces a day
- Fish/seafood – 8 to 16 ounces a week, for omega-3
- Lean plant proteins or meats – 6 to 8 ounces a day
- Nuts and soy – 4 to 6 ounces a week
- Olive oil – 1 to 2 tablespoons a day
- Dairy (1% or skim) – 1 to 3 cups a day
- Alcohol – 0 to 1 drink a day

Brinkman advised that you eat lots of fiber by eating vegetables, fruits, whole grains and nuts, noting,

"Fiber increases the anti-inflammatory properties from these foods. Add some garlic, onion, pepper, ginger, turmeric, oregano, thyme and rosemary for additional anti-inflammatory properties."

"When you are in a very stressful time, choose to eat vegetables, fruits, whole grains, 1% or fat-free dairy, seafood and plant proteins rather than comfort foods or junk foods," she said. "You can also choose to eat fruit for dessert instead of other sweet foods."







Rabid skunk found in Town of Litchfield

Herkimer County Public Health received word on March 24 from Wadsworth Labs that a skunk that was sent in to be tested for rabies on March 23 from the Town of Litchfield has tested positive for rabies.

The skunk was fighting with and killing chickens; the skunk was shot and sent to Wadsworth lab for testing.

The public can protect themselves or their family pets from rabies by practicing the following:

1. Vaccinate your pets against rabies.
2. Spay or neuter all animals to reduce the number of strays.
3. Do not feed strays or handle unknown animals, wild or domestic.

Remind children and adults not to play with unknown animals (wild or domestic). If a bat is found in a house, and there is a possibility it had contact with a person or an animal in the house, call Public Health and we will make arrangements to have the bat tested, if necessary.

Herkimer County Public Health would like to remind the public to check your pet's rabies vaccination records to make sure that they are up to date. If they are not up to date, make an appointment with their vet as soon as possible to have them vaccinated against rabies.



Mount Markham selects two finalists in superintendent search

The Mount Markham Central School District Board of Education has narrowed down its search for the next superintendent of schools to two finalists: Wappingers Central School District Oak Grove Elementary School interim Principal Kathleen Affigne and Richfield Springs Central School District Jr./Sr. High Principal Joseph D'Apice.

Mount Markham school board members selected the finalists during a meeting on Thursday, March 19 after completing the second round of interviews.

Affigne and D'Apice were scheduled to participate in virtual interviews with Mount Markham stakeholders and a virtual community forum on March 27.

Affigne was the Millbrook Central School District assistant superintendent for curriculum, instruction and

pupil personnel services for four years, before resigning in June 2018 and retiring in June 2019. Since leaving Millbrook, she has been filling per diem/interim positions including her current one at Wappingers, as well as Wappingers junior high school interim assistant principal and positions in the New Rochelle City School District and the Highland Falls-Fort Montgomery Central School District. Her previous work included over 11 years as Monroe-Woodbury Central School District instrumental music teacher, over three years as Monroe-Woodbury K-12 district music coordinator and 14 years as an administrator at Warwick Valley Central School District – with 10 years as elementary principal and four years as K-12 director of instructional services.

Her education background includes a bachelor's degree in music education from the University of Bridgeport, a master's degree in music education from Central Connecticut State University, a certificate of advanced study in educational administration from SUNY New Paltz and a doctorate in educational administration and policy studies from SUNY Albany – along with other professional certifications and credentials.

D'Apice is in his seventh year as the Richfield Springs Jr./Sr. High principal. His previous work experience included more than eight years as a biology teacher in the Utica City School District. He was a living environment teacher at Proctor High School and a physical science teacher at John F. Kennedy Middle School. He completed an administrative internship in the Utica City School District with the director of human resources and building principal.

His education background includes a bachelor's degree in adolescent education – biology grades 7-12 from SUNY Cortland, a master's degree in literacy education – grades 5-12 from SUNY Cortland, and a Certificate of Advanced Study in educational leadership – school building and district leadership from SUNY Cortland – along with other professional certifications and creden-

tials.

Following the virtual stakeholder interviews and community forum on March 27, the Mount Markham Board of Education reviewed all of the feedback from the community and stakeholders. The Board of Education plans to enter into negotiations with the candidate of choice shortly thereafter. It's anticipated that the new superintendent will begin employment on Aug. 1, 2020.

The Mount Markham Board of Education launched the search for a new superintendent following a Jan. 7 letter to the board from Superintendent Paul Berry that he will be resigning and retiring as of July 31. Dr. Berry has been the Mount Markham superintendent since November 2015.

Poland students create sea display for library project

If you're looking for some positive school news these days, you might need to look under the surface – or more specifically, under the sea.

Poland Central School District students in kindergarten to fifth grade recently (prior to school closures) participated in a library craft project around the Pick a Reading Partner (PARP) theme of "Under the Sea" by creating a large hallway display featuring sea creatures and popular elementary school books.

"We kind of just took that theme and ran with it," Poland school library media specialist Jessie Clough said.

Clough and teaching assistant Tracy Irwin organized the task for students because they thought it would be a fun way for students to collaborate on a project. The display also shows the words "PCS is hooked on reading" with a fishing hook hanging down into the water next to the words.

For the project, fifth graders made jellyfish, fourth graders made turtles, third graders made crabs, second graders made rainbow fish, first graders made seahorses and kindergarteners made a large octopus. Kindergarteners used their fingerprints on the face of the octopus and each made four pieces of paper chain for its legs.

The sea creatures the students made were connected to a character in a book they read or research that students did in the library, Clough said. The project helped students develop reading and research skills in a fun way that added a bright display for the hallway.

Clough credits Irwin with making the project turn out so visually appealing. Clough and Irwin wanted students to work together; the adults collaborated too. Clough applied her media research background to the learning, and Irwin applied her creativity.

Cultivate Something Good – your garden and your well-being

Your yoga classes, meetings, and concerts are canceled. The kids are out of school and you're being encouraged to stay home.

In this time of #Covid-19, here are a few suggestions to cultivate something good.

- Start some seeds. Nothing is more life affirming than checking each morning to see if something spouted.

- Plan a vegetable garden. Grow the veggies you love the most. Read about which varieties to plant from seeds and which ones are better if you purchase plants. Consult garden blogs and books.

- Plan to grow flowers that make you happy. Suggestions: sunflowers, nasturtiums, zinnias or marigolds. These are #EasyFromSeeds and you can grow many plants for less money.

- "Buy Local" Some garden centers are offering curbside pickup so you can place your order for plants and then pick them up at the store, keeping social distancing in mind but still fulfilling your need to buy plants.

- Redesign the plantings in the front of your house. Research plants that grow well in your area, and make a plan for spring renewal.

- Take an online class about plants or gardens, or watch some YouTube instruction videos.

Learn about seed starting, taking cuttings, or how to grow vegetables.

- Plan an herb garden. What herbs do you like to cook with? Which herbs make the best cocktails or tea? If you don't have in-ground space, grow herbs in pots. #foodies #aromatherapy

- Pull out the garden or plant books you bought in the past and read them...maybe for the first time! Revisit those copies with lovely garden photos and be newly inspired.

- Take a walk in a nearby natural area: woods, field, desert, beach or park. Look closely at leaves, bark,

mosses, and flowers. Notice the number of plants that grow in a community. Look up, look down.

- Take this time to groom or repot houseplants. Remove dead leaves, refresh the soil, take cuttings of favorites so that later you can share the wealth with friends.

- Go to on-line seed and plant companies and learn about varieties you're not familiar with. Join plant or garden groups on social media. Search for posts about the flowers and plants you see listed.

- Order a new book about plants or gardens. Once it arrives, hold a #GardenRetreat hour or afternoon. Sip your favorite beverage, read and make a list of garden inspirations.

- What plants remind you of family members or friends? Write those memories down. Consider turning those recollections, along with photos of the plants and people, into a small book that can be passed to others in your family.

- Decide to plant a tree. Research which varieties grow well in your area. Look to see where you have the right amount of space and sunlight.

- Create a new indoor display of plants. Make a row of small pots in bloom on your kitchen counter or the windowsill above your sink. Move an unused side table in front of a window or slider, creating a new place for plants.

- Plan a new group of containers for your deck, porch or patio. Flowers, herbs, and vegetables await your creativity... go for color, fragrance, and flavor.

- Help to get a young person out into the natural world. Plan a garden for your kids or grandchildren. Donate supplies to a local children's garden or school garden.

- Plan a garden vacation. Decide on an area of the country, and research public gardens, national parks, and plant destinations that are in the region.

Getting to the heart of pet parasite prevention

Pets rely on their owners to look out for their physical well-being. Many serious health issues can afflict pets, and parasites are a common cause of illness and discomfort.

Of all the parasitic worms dogs, cats and other companion animals may acquire, heartworms may be the most concerning. Heartworm disease can result in lung and heart failure, other organ damage and potentially death. Heartworm disease is caused by a blood-borne parasite known as *Dirofilaria immitis*, according to the U.S. Food & Drug Administration. It is spread through the bite of a mosquito. Dogs are often the host of choice. The parasites infect the dog, mature into adults, mate and produce offspring all while living inside the animal. Cats are atypical hosts for heartworms, and most worms in cats do not survive the adult stage.

While heartworm infection has been reported

in all 50 states, it is most common along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts. Heartworms also can occur in the warmer regions of Canada where summer temperatures are high enough for the worm larvae to survive inside carrier mosquitoes. Once inside a new host, it takes approximately six months for the larvae to develop into sexually mature adult heartworms, advises the American Heartworm Society. Once mature, heartworms can survive five to seven years in dogs and up to two to three years in cats. Each mosquito season can increase the number of worms in infected pets.

Prevention is key to ensuring the health of a pet. Adult heartworms can infect the heart, pulmonary artery and adjacent large blood vessels. A blood test can reveal whether a pet is affected by heartworms, as early infection may not yield noticeable symptoms.

Apart from keeping pets away from mosquito-heavy areas, pet owners will find that annual heartworm testing as well as monthly prevention medications can provide the protection needed to keep animals safe. Heartworm preventives must be purchased from a veterinarian or with a prescription through a pet pharmacy in the United States.

The FDA warns that the treatment for heartworm disease is not easy on the dog and it is costly. Treatment can be potentially toxic to the dog's body and can cause serious complications, such as the development of life-threatening blood clots in the dog's lungs. Preventive medicines can reduce pets' risk of developing heartworm.







To Your Good Health

Harm from aromatherapy is generally limited to allergic or non-allergic irritation of the nose and skin. Essential oils are not to be taken internally, and even topical use can lead to problems, as they can be absorbed into the body directly through the skin.

Dear Dr. Roach: Why are there two names for every drug? In a recent article, for example, you mention fluoxetine (Prozac) and bupropion (Wellbutrin). Clearly the name in parenthesis is the common name people use. Why does the other name exist, and why is it used at all? This adds unnecessary complexity and confusion. For example, a nurse asked me about Efudex, and I didn't know what she was referring to, as the label on the medication I had reads "fluorouracil." — C.P.

Answer: Every drug has at least three names: a chemical name, a generic name and a brand name. The chemical names are so complex that nobody (but chemists) uses them. I prefer using generic names, since they are the same regardless of country, and generic names often give a clue to the type of medication. Generic names are lowercase.

Brand names (capitalized) are the ones most often known (drug companies often try to find easy-to-remember brand names and hard-to-remember generic names), but not always. In the example you gave, Efu-

dex is one brand name (Aducril and Carac are others), and fluorouracil (or 5-fluorouracil, often abbreviated 5-FU) is the generic name.

Just how effective are essential oils?

Dear Dr. Roach: I have a relative who sells one of the popular brands of essential oil products and related equipment. She sends out many social network postings about the benefits of these products, including sharing postings from others who sell the products.

I do not purchase these for several reasons. I am sensitive to many airborne scents and have a scent-free home, but my primary concern is that she seems to be practicing medicine by claiming what I believe to be unproven health benefits. These are very costly and, at a minimum, harm is done by persuading people to spend a great deal of money for products that may not do what they are claimed to do. I am also concerned that families with young children seem to be using these products — my relative has even sent some to her children's school for use in the classroom.

Can you please comment on possible benefits/harm from these products? — J.R.

Answer: Essential oils from plants have been used to scent the air for millennia. There are certainly many claims about purported health benefits, but there is little evidence to support their use for those purposes. Health claims for aromatherapy should be taken with skepticism. One exception is that several reviews have found that some aromatherapies can reduce anxiety levels, and possibly some symptoms of depression.

As I frequently note, however, the placebo effect is powerful, and if you expect that a treatment, such as aromatherapy, will help your symptoms, it very well may. As such, I have no objection to people who want to use them for mild symptoms. I do object when people forgo potentially effective treatment for serious illness.

Your point about cost is a real issue, but essential oils do not have to be very expensive.

Safety a vital component of DIY projects

Many homeowners enjoy DIY projects around the house. Weekend warriors should recognize that having the right tools and using them in a correct manner is essential to successful, safe projects.

Tools are vital for projects, but without proper understanding and usage, they can cause grave injuries. Studies

published by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Consumer Product Safety Commission found that certain tools are more likely to cause injuries than others. Power nailers, for example, are among the most dangerous tools DIYers can use. Chainsaws, table saws, circular saws and riding mowers are some additional tools that have very high injury rates.

The following are some safety guidelines all DIYers should heed when using power tools.

- Use tools that are the right size and right type for the job. If you are uncertain about which tools to use, watch online tutorials, contact tool manufacturers or seek advice

at home supply stores.

- Always wear eye protection and the right safety equipment when manufacturers recommend doing so. Gloves, sturdy work boots, hearing protection and hard hats can protect DIYers from injury.

- Keep cutting tools sharp and in good condition to reduce kick back and potential injuries.

- Regularly inspect tools to make sure they are in working order.

- Never carry tools up a ladder by hand; use a bucket or bag to hoist tools.

- Never leave tools lying out in any area where they can present a hazard. Unplug power tools when not in use.

- Secure work with a clamp or vice grip when appropriate to keep things from slipping.

- Ensure that the handles of tools like hammers and axes fit tightly into the head of the tool.

- Keep work environments tidy to avoid clutter, as cluttered workspaces can contribute to accidents.

- Read the manual and operate the power tool as instructed.

- Do not force open a safety on a power tool or modify a tool to override safety features.

- Cut away from yourself when using chisels and other edged tools.

Let common sense prevail when using tools. If it doesn't seem like a good idea, it probably isn't. Safety is important to avoid injuries and help prevent delays on the job.
