### Main Street needs a hand from Albany

## Statewide Editorial — Small Business Stimulus Proposal (Sales Tax Credit): Week of March 30, 2020

COVID-19 has completely changed the way we all live.

But along with worrying about keeping themselves and their families healthy, thousands of small business owners across New York state are losing sleep over how to keep this virus from killing the businesses they have worked so hard to build.

At the same time, lawmakers in Albany are trying to craft a budget in the face of plunging revenues. Sales taxes — much of them generated by small business — brought in a whopping \$73.6 billion last year. Our schools, as well as other vital government services, rely on these funds. When a business fails — and too many are on the precipice of failure right now — that sales tax revenue goes, too

We believe a simple proposal could help restart local business and bolster sales tax revenues, but swift action is required by Gov. Andrew Cuomo and the State Legislature.

Small businesses are the backbone of our communities. Everyone wants a thriving downtown where they can shop, eat or go to a movie. The good news is that small businesses have always been engines of innovation and entrepreneurship, and we are seeing that again today as they adapt to the new reality. Local gyms are

streaming personal training sessions. Restaurants offer free delivery and online happy hours. Medical practices are expanding their telemedicine capabilities. Car mechanics are making house calls that require no personal contact at all.

Of course, it's vital that these businesses let potential customers know about their services. That's the role of advertising in all its myriad forms. But advertising costs money, and the sad truth is that advertising is one of the first things small businesses cut when times are tough.

Put yourself in the shoes of a local restaurateur with a stack of bills and very little money coming in. By the time she finishes paying the most urgent bills — rent, food suppliers, payroll — there's not much left for advertising. Whatever stimulus money she gets from Washington or Albany will most likely be needed to keep the door open and the lights on. Yet studies show that how well businesses survive a downturn is in large part determined by whether they continue to market and advertise during the hard times.

Fortunately, there is a way for Albany to prime the sales-tax pump to keep revenue flowing to both small businesses and state coffers. Let businesses use some of the money they would have sent to Albany, as sales taxes, to market their new offerings. The formula would

be simple: Every dollar a small business spends on advertising (up to some reasonable limit) would be a dollar saved off that business's sales tax bill.

It would be a win-win-win. Local businesses would be healthier because the increased advertising would jump-start sales. The state would get more sales tax revenue because local businesses would be selling more. And media companies (like ours) would benefit from the additional ad revenue. We'd like to think that we, too, are vital to the character and strength of our communities, not to mention our democracy. Think for a moment of the critical role that journalists have played in getting vital local information out to your community during this unprecedented crisis.

The Legislature has a lot on its plate right now, and the temptation will be to bury this idea, or to take the shortsighted view that we can't afford to do it right now. But right now is when it's needed. We've been impressed with Governor Cuomo's levelheaded leadership in this crisis, and we call on him to back this innovative yet simple policy.

## Herkimer College remains committed to student success by shipping laptops, other supplies to students in need

Herkimer County Community College is removing the barriers to successful education in the wake of COVID-19 by developing a laptop loaner program for students in need, as well as offering other technological assistance, academic support and personal enrichment.

A survey was sent out to students before courses began Monday, March 30 to gauge their top concerns about using alternative modes of delivery. For some, problems began right at the root of distance learning: not having access to a computer or internet services at home.

"It's challenging not to have a working computer to manage your studies from home," said Edris Noori, network administrator at the college. "We are doing anything we can do provide laptops to those who need them as quickly as possible."

The college shipped out seven laptops the weekend before classes started – including expedited shipping to students as far as California – and about 100 more are on their way from the State University of New York. The college's WiFi access also remains open and available from outside the Robert McLaughlin College Center for Herkimer College and other SUNY students who

may not have access to internet at home.

The Housing Office has also been working diligently



with students who inadvertently left their books and course materials in on-campus housing when they left for spring break, before the college announced the move to alternative modes of delivery. Textbooks and other study supplies will be mailed to students' homes to ensure they do not fall behind.

Outside of tangible efforts, the college has expanded the online access of its student support services – including tutoring, personal counseling, career services and library resources – and created alternative means of connecting with admissions staff through virtual information sessions. The Center for Student Leadership and Involvement also compiled a list of virtual events being hosted nationwide for students to take part in.

"Our priorities at Herkimer College remain firmly centered on our students' health and well-being, and your ability to successfully complete your studies and reach your academic goals," Provost Michael Oriolo said. "Please know that we stand ready to assist you with whatever needs you are experiencing with your courses. We are here for you, so do not hesitate to reach out to us for help and support. We look forward to continuing to work with you, and we wish you success with your studies."













## Herkimer BOCES LPN program shifts to virtual instruction, recruiting

The Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Adult Practical Nursing Program is doing what nurses all over the world are doing – quickly adjusting to the new normal in response to the coronavirus public health crisis.

Herkimer BOCES is continuing its program that trains local adults to be licensed practical nurses (LPNs) by moving to virtual instruction and virtual clinical experiences and is actively recruiting new students through virtual open houses at 7 p.m. every Wednesday in April and May.

"We missed one day of instruction and one week of clinical, which will be made up over spring break," LPN Program Coordinator Sara Nicolette said. "We have not only extremely dedicated staff, but we have extremely dedicated students, who will graduate on time."

Herkimer BOCES received a waiver from the New York State Education Department to continue to operate the LPN program by offering virtual clinical experiences – something many other nursing schools are also doing, Nicolette said. The LPN program is also providing virtual instruction in a lecture format through video conferencing.

Nicolette thanked Herkimer BOCES administrators

and the NYS Education Department for working with the program to allow it to continue to operate.

Students and staff have adjusted to using video conferencing for instruction, and things are going well, Nicolette said.

"We simply have shifted gears, and we did it rather fast," she said.

Recruiting for new students also will continue virtually

Nicolette will be hosting live virtual open houses using video conferencing at 7 p.m. every Wednesday in April and May. The open houses can be accessed through a computer or smartphone. 
"We are eagerly looking for students to come and to join our program," Nicolette said. "Our full-time program takes 12 months, and you're employed in a field that is desperate – absolutely desperate – for health-care workers. Or you can go part-time and continuing working your job."

The part-time program takes 20 months to com-

plete. The part-time day program is two days per week the first year and three days per week the second year. The part-time evening program is three nights per week with clinical experiences on Saturdays.

There are no college prerequisites to join the LPN program, but applicants do need a high school diploma or an equivalency diploma.

The next full-time class begins at the end of June, and the part-time classes begin in September. If the full-time class isn't able to begin at the end of June at the Herkimer BOCES LPN facilities at the Remington school building in Ilion due to the coronavirus public health crisis, the class will begin virtually.

## Unique Easter traditions from across the globe

Easter is the most important day of the year on the Christian calendar. A celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, Easter commemorates the very core of the Christian faith. So it comes as no surprise that such an important day is steeped in tradition.

Easter traditions such as Easter Sunday Mass are widely known. But there are many unique Easter traditions across the globe that, while they may not be as widely known, illustrate the power of this very special day in the Christian community.

• India: India may not be the first nation to come to mind when thinking of countries in which Christianity has a strong foothold. And while only a small percentage of people in India identify as Christian, Easter celebrations in the country are elaborate. For example, in the small state of Goa,

Easter celebrants host carnivals and exchange gifts with fellow Christians. Those gifts include the Holy Cross, which is exchanged after Easter church services have ended. Such services are then followed by Easter parties, where families and friends gather and break bread together, much like Christian celebrants do in other parts of the world.

- Italy: Residents of Florence celebrate Easter Sunday with a genuine flash. In a tradition that dates back several centuries, Florentines load a cart with fireworks before exploding it outside the famed Florence Cathedral
- Europe: Many European Christian communities burn an effigy of Judas Iscariot as part of their Easter celebrations. Christians believe the apostle Judas betrayed Jesus Christ, a betrayal that led to Christ's cru-

cifixion. Despite some groups denouncing the burning of Judas as anti-Semitic, the practice continues in many countries.

• **Spain:** Holy Week commemorates the entire week preceding Easter Sunday, including Holy Thursday and Good Friday. In the Spanish town of Verges, Christians commemorate Holy Thursday by reenacting

scenes from the Passion, which refers to the short period at the end of Christ's life. The "Dansa de la Mort (Death Dance)" is part of that commemoration, and during this dance, participants dress up like skeletons.

Easter celebrations across the globe are steeped in tradition, including some that might surprise even the most devout Christians.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR Accident waiting to happen

Not more than five minutes after my wife and I drove across the deadly intersection of Route 28 and Hyder Road, on the west side of Canadarago Lake outside of Richfield Springs, did we hear and see a state trooper racing westward through town. Later, on the way home from the post office we encountered a detour preventing us from heading home via the same road. In a short time word was out that there had been an accident involving an SUV and a motorcycle.

Where the collision occurred was no surprise to us. We had executed the deadly turn a thousand times before – while thinking something should be done about it.

Heading north on Route 28, if you want to turn left on to Hyder Road you have to drive to the top of the hill and then make the turn at the last second – or else you can't see if a vehicle is coming from the opposite direction. If

there's a driver behind you, he is likely to become impatient with your seemingly slow and late turn.

Now, 20-year-old Kyle Seamon of Burlington Flats, a vibrant young man with a future full of promise, has been wiped off the road of life and the driver of the SUV who was rushed to Bassett Hospital, besides injuries, has been left with an inerasable terrible memory.

The road remains the same – waiting for another driver to fail to make a last minute, deliberately late, left turn. The need for change is obvious. Maybe a blinking yellow light at the top of the hill would warn drivers of the danger. It's the state of New York's call. Combined with the nearby entrance leading to the boat launch, the short stretch of road is to say the least hazardous. Here's hoping, in memory of a lost life, something will be done.


Herkimer BOCES District Superintendent Sandra

### Donna's Day: Creative family fun

#### Easter egg-y ideas are real kid-pleasers

Hop to it! Easter is on its way. Put your busy schedule on hold for an evening or Saturday afternoon and make the traditional craft of egg decorating a family affair

Here are some Easter egg-y ideas that are real kid-pleasers. For the first three, all you need are hard-cooked white eggs, prepared decorating dyes in small bowls and a variety of household items.

#### Rubber-band tie-dye

Wind two or three rubber bands of various widths snuggly around egg. Dye the egg and let dry. Remove the rubber bands to reveal the designs.

#### Sticker designs

Stick peel-off stars, dots or other shapes randomly on an egg. Be sure the stickers adhere completely to the egg before dipping in the dye. Let dry, then peel off stickers while they are still damp to reveal the designs.

#### Tape and draw

Wrap a piece of masking tape around an egg. Dye. Gently remove tape and add your own designs on the white space with markers.

#### How to blow out an egg

If you prefer decorating eggs in which the raw contents have been blown out – so that you can hang them from branches for an egg tree or display in a basket and save them year to year – here is a simple process to empty them, plus two ideas for decorating once they have been blown.

Poke a small hole with a large safety pin at each end of a washed raw egg. Carefully wiggle the pin or a toothpick into one of the holes to break the yolk. Place a drinking straw over the hole on top, and blow through the straw, collecting the contents of the egg in a small dish. Rinse out the empty shell and let dry completely before decorating.

#### Shake and decorate

Squeeze household glue from a plastic bottle in a simple design such as zigzags or an alphabet letter on a shell that is still white or dyed in a light color. Carefully set the egg in a plastic bag with colored sand or glitter and close it lightly in your fist, keeping locked air inside. Gently shake to coat the glue to reveal the design. Remove the egg, and slip onto a skewer through one of the holes and poke into a soft object

like an egg carton to dry.

#### Shredded paper

Brush household glue on eggshell, then press shredded paper randomly around it for a contemporary look. Let dry.

## Community Foundation, United Way VGU respond to pandemic impact Latest grants up total awarded to nearly \$200,000

## Meanings behind the Easter lily

Easter symbols and traditions help make the holiday familiar and special. Eggs, hot cross buns and frilly church dresses help paint the picture, and so does a delicate and beautiful white flower.

The Easter lily plant is native to both Taiwan and the Ryukyu Islands of Japan. The plant's flowering season begins in April and ends in June. The plant produces pure white flowers on top of long stems. Easter lilies often adorn homes and church altars during this time of year.

Tradition states that the Easter lily originated in the Garden of Eden from the teardrops of Eve that spread when she and Adam were cast out of the garden. These were believed to be tears of repentance.

Historians and biblical scholars say that the lily has always been highly regarded in the Christian Church.

Jesus even references the flower in Luke 12:27, stating, "Consider the lilies how they grow: they toil not, they spin not; and yet I say unto you, that Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these." Legend has it that, after Jesus's death and resurrection, lilies were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus is said to have prayed before his crucifixion. They were believed to have sprung up from a drop of sweat from his brow when his head was bent in prayer.

In Easter celebrations, the lily represents Christ's Resurrection, and thusly new birth and new life. The delicate, white blooms can be viewed as pure, innocent and untainted by the world.

The flower itself is used in various ways to tell the resurrection story. The bulb is buried in the ground as

a representation of Christ's tomb. The trumpet-shaped fragrant flowers also announce life after death, since bulbed flowers often regrow year after year, according to the religious resource All About Jesus. And the trumpet shape signifies the angel Gabriel's trumpet call.

It's common for Easter lilies to decorate homes, churches, gardens and more throughout the Easter season.









## **Enjoy hot cross buns this Easter**

A number of foods are enjoyed during Easter celebrations, from hard-boiled eggs to ham to roasted lamb. Sweets such as candies and chocolates also take center stage on Easter Sunday. In addition to these traditional favorites, hot cross buns have become must-haves for many Easter celebrants.

Hot cross buns are yeast-based sweet buns that are lightly spiced and studded with raisins or currants. The tops are marked with a cross that is often piped with icing. While there's no clear explanation of how hot cross buns came to be, there are indications that they once were reserved only for Good Friday. Others say they were consumed throughout Lent. The cross is a Christian symbol of the crucifixion and Christ himself.

Hot cross buns are soft and sweet, and they're easily created. Enjoy this recipe, courtesy of King Arthur Flour

#### **Hot Cross Buns**

Yield 12 to 14 buns

#### Buns

1/4 cup apple juice or rum

½ cup mixed dried fruit

 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup raisins or dried currants

11/4 cups milk, room temperature

2 large eggs, plus 1 egg yolk (save the white for the topping)

6 tbsp butter, room temperature

2 tsp instant yeast

¼ cup light brown sugar, firmly packed

1 tsp ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp ground cloves or allspice

¼ tsp ground nutmeg

1¾ tsp salt

1 tbsp baking powder

 $4\frac{1}{2}$  cups unbleached all-purpose flour

#### **Topping**

1 large egg white, reserved from above

1 tbsp milk

Icing

1 cup + 2 tbsp confectioners' sugar

½ tsp vanilla extract

Pinch of salt

4 tsp milk, or enough to make a thick, pipeable icing Lightly grease a 10" square pan or 9" x 13" pan.

Mix the rum or apple juice with the dried fruit and raisins, cover with plastic wrap and microwave briefly,



just until the fruit and liquid are very warm and the plastic starts to "shrink wrap" itself over the top of the bowl. Set aside to cool to room temperature. Note: If you worry about using plastic wrap in your microwave, simply cover the bowl with a glass lid.

When the fruit is cool, mix together all of the dough ingredients (including the eggs and egg yolk from the separated egg); hold out the fruit for the time being.











Knead the mixture, using an electric mixer or bread machine, until the dough is soft and elastic. It'll be very slack, sticking to the bottom of the bowl and your hands as you work with it (greasing your hands helps). Mix in the fruit and any liquid not absorbed.

Let the dough rise for 1 hour, covered. It should become puffy, though may not double in bulk.

Divide the dough into billiard ball-sized pieces, about 3¾ ounces each. A heaped muffin scoop (about 1/3 cup) makes about the right portion. You'll make 12 to 14 buns. Use your greased hands to round them into balls. Arrange them in the prepared pan.

Cover the pan, and let the buns rise for 1 hour, or until they've puffed up and are touching one another. While the dough is rising, preheat the oven to 375° F.

Whisk together the reserved egg white and milk, and brush it over the buns.

Bake the buns for 20 minutes, until they're golden brown. Remove from the oven, carefully turn the buns out of the pan (they should come out in one large piece), and transfer them to a rack to cool.

Mix together the icing ingredients, and when the buns are completely cool, pipe it in a cross shape atop each bun.

## Finding faith during Easter celebrations

For many Christians, modern Easter celebrations would not be complete without bonnets, bunnies and colored eggs. As fun as those components can be, Christianity is at the

heart of Easter, which is the most important date on the Christian religious calendar. Easter Sunday marks the culmination

of events that shaped the beliefs and teachings of an entire faith.

marks Easter Resurrection of Jesus

Christ, which Christians believe occurred within days of his crucifixion and burial. The New Testament indicates that the Resurrection of Jesus is one of the chief tenets of the Christian faith and established Jesus as the Son of God. Easter is an example that God will righteously judge the world by sacrificing His son for the sins of others. And any person who chooses to follow Jesus receives everlasting life thanks to Christ's Resurrection.

Easter is linked to the Jewish celebration of Passover due to its proximity on the calendar and the fact that Jesus was Jewish. The Bible states that Jesus participated in the Passover meal during the Last Supper. At the Last Supper, Jesus identified the matzo (bread) and wine as his body and blood, soon to be sacrificed and shed. Christians believe the Last Supper marked the first transubstantiation, or the turning

of bread and wine into the actual substance of Christ's body and blood. This also was the first celebration of the Eucharist and Holy Mass that would become another core component of the Christian faith

Easter is a time of great celebration that is preceded by Lent, a weeklong period of reflection, prayer and repentance. The days immediately prior to Easter are commonly referred to as Holy Week. This encompasses Palm Sunday and lasts through Holy Thursday (the day of the Last Supper), Good Friday (when Jesus was crucified and placed in the tomb) and Holy Saturday (the 40-hour-long vigil that the followers of Jesus Christ held after his death and burial).

On Easter Sunday, four women, including Mary Magdalene, went to Christ's tomb to anoint his body with spices and oils. They found the tomb was empty and were met with an angel who told them that Jesus had been raised from the dead. A biblical account in John 20:14-16 indicates that Mary Magdalene was the first to speak with the risen Jesus. She mistakes Jesus for a gardener and says to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her. "Mary!" She turned and said to him. "Rabboni!"

Easter is a time of joy and celebration, and a great opportunity for Christians to immerse themselves in their faith.







#### To Your Good Health

What are the benefits
of medical ID tags?

**Dear Dr. Roach:** My question is about medical bracelets and necklaces. I've never seen any recommendations as to what conditions would warrant wearing one

nor what the inscription should say. When are they either necessary or beneficial? – D.A.M.

**Answer:** Medical ID tags can be useful. They serve to alert medical personnel of potentially important medical conditions when someone is

not capable of providing that information, whether due to temporary incapacity (such as being unconscious in a motor vehicle accident) or permanent disability (such as intellectual disability). In my opinion, the most appropriate use of these

tags is when there is a potentially life-threatening medical condition that would not be obvious to emergency medical personnel.

Some examples of these would include anaphylactic reaction to medications or latex; the presence of an illness that can cause temporary disability (epilepsy, diabetes, Addison's disease); and medical conditions that might affect use of some common treatments, such as bleeding disorders, organ transplant status and medical implants (such as implantable defibrillators). Personal and contact information is a natural set of complementary information to have on a medical tag.

Some newer tags include electronic information, but this is in its

infancy. These include the use of near-field technology to let emergency personnel read the information (if they also have the technology); phone numbers the emergency personnel can call to get more information; and QR codes to allow emergency personnel with a smartphone to go to a webpage with more detailed information. Most smartphones also have the ability to store information that can be read in an emergency, even by someone without the person's phone password. I recommend taking advantage of this feature.

Many of the ID tags I see have information that is not likely to be helpful. Listing chronic conditions like high blood pressure or high cholesterol is not necessary.

Finally, one of the big-

gest benefits of a medical ID tag is a little peace of mind.

**Dear Dr. Roach:** Regarding a recent column: If a body does not need help in maintaining pH balance, why does the consumption of different foods cause changes in urine pH? – K.F.

Answer: The body has two main organs with which to regulate pH, the acid/base status of the body based on food intake, exercise, medications and other causes that would perturb the body's pH, which is very tightly regulated and slightly alkaline at about 7.4.

The more important and faster-acting is the lung. By increasing the respiratory rate, we excrete more carbon dioxide, which is in equilibrium with carbonic acid. Breathing more deeply and quickly can move the blood pH toward the alkaline side. This usually happens without our being aware of it.

The kidneys are the other important organs for long-term regulation of pH. The kidneys can regulate reabsorption of carbonic acid in the tubule, increasing or reducing acid secretion. So, urine that is more acidic than normal may mean the body is ridding itself of excess dietary acid and thus making blood pH more alkaline. Ammonia is another way the kidney can regulate pH balance. Blood pH does not vary more than a minute amount from its expected level except in cases of critical illness, disturbances in kidney function or diseases that affect control of breathing.
