Questions answered about COVID-19 and food safety

In recent weeks, University of Vermont Extension has received several questions related to the coronavirus that produces COVID-19. To help address public concerns about food safety and the virus, Dr. Omar A. Oyarzabal, UVM Extension food safety specialist, has provided answers to some of the most commonly asked questions.

Is the food from the grocery store safe for consumption?

Yes, it is. Food manufacturers and grocery stores already have in place good manufacturing practices (GMPs) as well as cleaning and sanitation practices to reduce the transmission of any food-borne pathogen. These practices are established to reduce the potential for contamination of food-contact surfaces and foods.

Currently, all food manufacturers and retails stores are increasing these practices to ensure the continued safety of the food supply. It is also important to remember that this virus is not a food-borne agent, meaning that it will not be acquired by ingesting contaminated food.

Do we need to wash items once we get home, such

as cans and packaged products?

No, you don't. Besides, it will be quite impractical in some cases. It is important to wash your hands thoroughly with soap after you return home. You also can use disposable gloves, but make sure you use a pair for one single use or activity, and then dispose of them.

Always wash your hands before and after wearing gloves. The type of soap or the temperature of the water when washing hands is not as important as the time spent lathering your hands by rubbing them together before rinsing. The whole process should take at least 20 seconds.

Do I need to keep my food separate at home for several days after buying it and before consuming?

No, there is no need to "isolate" your food, but please follow the normal practice of washing hands before and after touching food.

Could plastic or paper bags from a store be contaminated?

It is highly improbable there is any contamination. In any case, if your store allows it, you can bring your own reusable bags although may be asked to bag your own groceries. Always follow basic hygiene practices, and wash hands before and after touching foods.

Is it safe to have takeout food that was prepared in a restaurant, and are the containers safe to touch?

Yes. However, if you see anyone handling a food container with bare hands, you should advise the employees of that restaurant of the need to wear gloves to increase the use of protective barriers. You should, again, wash hands after returning home.

If I microwave the food, will it kill the virus if the food was contaminated?

Yes, the virus is destroyed by regular cooking processes. Therefore, reheating food to temperatures about 170° F will destroy any potential contamination.

Can pets transmit the disease?

No, we don't know of any transmission from pets. Cats can carry the virus, as this has been well documented with other coronaviruses. There are already cases of dogs testing positive for the current coronavirus in households where at least one person developed symptoms and was positive for this virus. But so far, pets, like foods, are not a route of transmission.

Little Falls Cheese Festival looks to "Keep Cheese Alive"

With New York State's "pause" extended through the month of April and so many people forced to stay home, the Little Falls Cheese Festival committee has launched an initiative to "Keep Cheese Alive" by supporting their vendors, which include regional cheesemakers and more.

"Shopping local is always a good idea – support your friends and neighbors, support your local farms, keep money in the community and region," said Teri Chace of the Little Falls Cheese Festival

planning committee. "But now, it might be an even better idea: your food will be handled by far fewer hands. You can buy directly from the producer. The food will be fresh and wholesome."

The festival features various New York State farm-produced cheeses, from hard cheeses, goat cheeses, spreadable cheeses, yogurts and cheese curds to ice cream, gelato and more, with numerous New York-based gourmet food and craft beverage vendors to complement the cheeses. The Little Falls Cheese Festival website has just been updated with all the confirmed 2020 vendors, and the festival's Facebook page will feature individual businesses so visitors can learn more about what they offer and how to support them.

"Small producers are in dire straits right now. They have been hit very hard and are in danger. We must help them survive," said Chace. "Even amid this crisis, there are ways to safely support them. You can call and see if they ship, do local delivery, have on-site pickup or offer gift cards."

The Little Falls Cheese Festival is New York State's premier gathering of cheesemakers, with an estimated 6,000 people in attendance last year. Coronavirus update: FDA authorizes blood purification device to treat COVID-19

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration issued an emergency use authorization for a blood purification system to treat patients 18 years of age or older with confirmed COVID-19 admitted to the intensive care unit (ICU) with confirmed or imminent respiratory failure.

The authorized product works by reducing the amount of cytokines and other inflammatory mediators, i.e., small active proteins in the bloodstream that control a cell's immune response by filtering the blood and returning the filtered blood to the patient. The proteins that are removed are typically elevated during infections and can be associated with a "cytokine storm" that occurs in some COVID-19 patients, leading to severe inflammation, rapidly progressive shock, respiratory failure, organ failure and death.

"We continue to work across all sectors to expedite the development of numerous innovative potential preventive and treatment approaches by both facilitating emergency access for patients, to the extent we can, and supporting the evaluation of potential therapies," said

FDA Commissioner Stephen M. Hahn, M.D. "With today's authorization of a blood purification device, we are expediting the availability of a treatment option for patients in the ICU to help reduce the severity of the disease. Our staff will continue our around the clock review of all medical products to expedite the availability of treatments to help fight this devastating disease."

The FDA issued this emergency use authorization to Terumo BCT Inc. and Marker Therapeutics AG for their Spectra Optia Apheresis System and Depuro D2000 Adsorption Cartridge devices.

The FDA, an agency within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, protects the public health by assuring the safety, effectiveness and security of human and veterinary drugs, vaccines and other biological products for human use and medical devices. The agency also is responsible for the safety and security of our nation's food supply, cosmetics, dietary supplements, products that give off electronic radiation and for regulating tobacco products.

DEC announces New York is open for hunting; spring turkey season starts May 1

Hunters should always follow safety tips to prevent injuries and limit spread of COVID-19

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Commissioner Basil Seggos announced recently that spring turkey season opens May 1 in all of New York north of the Bronx-Westchester County boundary. In addition, DEC's annual youth turkey hunting weekend will take place April 25 - 26. The youth turkey hunt for junior hunters aged 12 - 15 is open in all of Upstate New York and Suffolk County.

"Many New Yorkers are eager to spend time outdoors and turkey hunting is one great way to reconnect to nature," Seggos said. "Whether participating in the upcoming youth hunt with your children, or heading out on your own in pursuit of a wary gobbler, be sure to hunt safe and hunt smart by following the important guidelines in place both to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and to support hunting safety.'

Turkey hunters took about 17,000 birds in New York during the 2019 spring season. Spring harvest success is often tied to productivity two years prior, as hunters like to focus on adult gobblers (i.e., two-year-old birds). While the cold, wet start to the 2019 breeding season meant low reproductive success and poor recruitment in many areas, conditions were better in summer 2018. The population gains made in 2018, combined with good overwinter survival because of abundant food in autumn and relatively mild winter conditions this year, may offset 2019's poor reproductive success.

Important details for the Youth Turkey Hunt

- Hunters 12 15 years of age are eligible and must hold a hunting license and a turkey per-
- Youth 12 13 years of age must be accompanied by a parent, legal guardian or adult over 21 with written permission from their parent or legal guardian. Youth 14 - 15 years of age must be accompanied by a parent, legal guardian or adult over 18 with written permission from their parent

or legal guardian

- The accompanying adult must have a current hunting license and turkey permit. The adult may assist the youth hunter, including calling, but may not carry a firearm, bow or crossbow, or kill or attempt to kill a wild turkey during the youth hunt
- · Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to noon each day
- The youth turkey hunt is open in all of New York, north of the Bronx-Westchester County boundary
- The bag limit for the youth weekend is one bearded bird. This bird becomes part of the youth's regular spring season bag limit of two bearded birds. A second bird may be taken only in Upstate New York beginning May 1
- Crossbows may only be used by hunters age 14 or older
- All other wild turkey hunting regulations remain in effect

Other important details for the Spring Turkey Season, May 1-31

- Hunting is permitted in most areas of the state, except for New York City and Long Island
- Hunters must have a turkey hunting permit in addition to their hunting
- Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to noon each day
- Hunters may take two bearded turkeys during the spring season, but only one bird per day
- Hunters may not use rifles or handguns firing a bullet. Hunters may hunt

with a shotgun or handgun loaded with shot sizes no larger than No. 2 or smaller than No. 8, or with a bow or crossbow

• Successful hunters must fill out the tag that comes with their turkey permit and immediately attach it to any turkey harvested

• Successful hunters must report their harvest within seven days of taking a bird. Call 1.866.426.3778 (1.866.GAMERPT) or report harvest online at DEC's Game Harvest Reporting website

- Point your gun in a safe direction
- Treat every gun as if it were loaded
- Be sure of your target and beyond
- Keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot
- Stalking stinks! Set up with your back against a tree or other object wider than your shoulders and call birds to you

DEC also encourages all hunters to wear blaze orange or blaze pink when moving between hunting spots to make themselves more visible to other hunters. A blaze orange or blaze pink vest or other material can be hung in a nearby tree when you are set up and calling birds so other hunters are alerted to your presence.

A hunter education class is required for all new hunters. To prevent the spread of COVID-19, hunter education courses have been cancelled through April 30. To find a hunter education class in your area, visit DEC's Hunter Education Program website or call 1.888.HUNT.ED2 (1.888.486.8332).

"Hunting Safe" also means following social distancing and other guidelines to prevent the spread of COVID-19:

- Purchase licenses and/or turkey permits online to avoid visiting busy stores or because stores may be closed or have limited hours
- Hunt close to home. Opt for day trips instead of staying at a hunting camp to avoid close contact with other hunters
- Avoid crowds at parking areas and other locations where people congregate. Keep a distance of six feet or more from others

- Avoid high-traffic destinations. If a hunting location is crowded, choose a different spot or time to visit. For alternative hunting locations visit DEC's website.
- Hunt alone. If hunting with someone not from your household, whether an adult or youth, practice social distancing, take separate vehicles to the hunting location and make sure to maintain at least six feet



- of distance. Only share a hunting blind with someone
- from your household.

 Carry hand sanitizer and avoid touching your face and wash mouth calls after handling
- If hunters do not feel well, they should stay home. Anyone 70 and older or with a compromised immune system should postpone their trip.

DEC is encouraging hunters, trappers and anglers to purchase sporting licenses online to help further limit the community spread of COVID-19. Sporting licenses may be purchased online at any time, and anglers may use their privileges immediately by simply carrying their transaction number (DEC-LS#) with them while afield. Anglers, hunters, and trappers may also use the HuntFishNY mobile app to display an electronic copy of their license. The HuntFishNY app is available for download through the Apple App or Google Play stores. Back tags and carcass tags must still be mailed, and customers should allow 10 - 14 days for receipt of their tags. Visit our website for more information about sporting licenses.





#ClickLocal may buoy small businesses through COVID-19 crisis

As small businesses throughout the U.S. face unprecedented challenges due to the COVID-19 pandemic, a collaboration of North Country business owners and economic development organizations are promoting a grassroots movement to support the region's businesses during the crisis. The #ClickLocal campaign focuses on increasing consumer awareness about purchasing locally during this time, as well as providing e-commerce development support for small businesses.

Since mid-March, businesses, support organizations and community members have using the #Click-Local hashtag to share information and stories about online purchasing, alternative pick-up and delivery options and relevant online educational opportunities. The Adirondack North Country Association (ANCA), an economic development nonprofit organization based in Saranac Lake, is spearheading outreach about the #ClickLocal campaign. Information, tools and resources can be found at www.adirondack.org/ClickLocal.

"The Click Local concept emerged organically – directly from the small businesses who need this kind of community support the most," said Danielle Delaini, ANCA's Business Transition Program Coordinator.

Delaini said the idea came up at a March 25 phone conference meeting, which was developed by CITEC and SUNY Canton SBDC at Clinton Community College to address the strategic planning needs of small businesses. In response to mandated closures and dramatically decreased sales, the focus of the meeting shifted

to the urgent needs of local businesses. Tammy Loewy, co-owner of Green Goddess Natural Market in Lake Placid, coined the term "Click Local" during the call.

The #ClickLocal call to action, for those who can afford to make purchases during this time, is to do business with local establishments whenever possible.

"This is a critical time for people to support local businesses," Loewy said. "If our community shops and restaurants are to survive this crisis, we need people to consider when shopping online that they can still choose local businesses over big box stores and large online retailers. Keeping spending dollars local is essential to small businesses, their staff and their communities."

The #ClickLocal campaign also includes an online version of ANCA's annual artisan trade show, Adirondack Buyer Days, which was scheduled for March 31 and April 1 but canceled due to the coronavirus threat. The annual event features over 90 artisan makers and attracts hundreds of retailers looking for locally made gift products. The show's online catalog, which will be posted on ANCA's website at www.adirondack.org/Adirondack_Buyer_Days, allows consumers and shops to purchase handmade goods directly from regional makers.

"We were disappointed to have to cancel the in-person event, but we see a silver lining in the potential to increase e-commerce opportunities for Buyer Days vendors," said ANCA Artisan Programs Coordinator Lauren Richard. "Regional makers really stand to benefit by developing their online markets."

In order to boost #ClickLocal opportunities for regional businesses, ANCA and Clarkson University's Shipley Center for Innovation, in partnership with the North Country Center for Businesses in Transition, are providing e-commerce development resources for small businesses. The partners are offering webinars and one-on-one consultations for businesses to help improve their e-commerce skills and online presence.

Two webinars, "Getting Paid Online" and "Intro to E-Commerce," are available on the ANCA website at www.adirondack.org/E-commerceSupport. Information about the North Country Small Business E-commerce Development Support initiative can also be found on the webpage.

"We are already starting to see Click Local take off as people and businesses share the hashtag on social media," said Richard. "This is a community effort, where we all band together to support our local businesses when they need our support the most. If we want them to still be here when the coronavirus pandemic has passed, we need to support them now."

Division of Consumer Protection urges New Yorkers to be aware of latest crop of novel coronavirus scams

Scammers using a variety of methods tied to novel coronavirus to target consumers

The New York State Division of Consumer Protection (DCP) is alerting consumers about scammers taking advantage of the novel coronavirus. Scammers are using techniques that typically arise with a major global event such as falsely claiming to be online sellers of popular goods; setting up fake charities; sending fake emails and texts that contain harmful links designed to steal your personal information; and using robocalls to pitch novel coronavirus treatments and work at home schemes. People should be on the lookout for scammers looking to take advantage of public fears surrounding this issue.

"Unscrupulous scammers never take a break and they are now trying to cash in on the news of the novel coronavirus by trying to lure people into unknowingly providing their personal information." said Secretary of State Rossana Rosado. "During this public health emergency, there are simple steps you can take to avoid

novel coronavirus scams that can help protect your hard-earned money and your identity."

"New York State's coordinated multi-agency response to managing the novel coronavirus includes raising awareness about deceptive and dishonest attempts to take advantage of people during this outbreak," said Commissioner of the New York State Department of Health Dr. Howard Zucker. "The best ways to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and other respiratory illnesses involve proven precautions, like washing your hands, sneezing or coughing into your elbow and staying indoors when you feel sick to help prevent the spread of infection all year."

Below are tips to protect yourself from novel coronavirus scams:

 Research online sellers before placing an order. Check out the seller by searching online for the person or company's name, phone number and email address, plus words like "review," "complaint"

or "scam." If everything checks out, pay by credit card and keep a record of your transaction.

- Don't click on links from sources you don't know. It could download a virus onto your computer or device. Make sure the anti-malware and anti-virus software on your computer is up to date.
- Be aware of emails coming from unknown senders. Watch for emails claiming to be from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) or experts claiming to have information about the virus. For the most up-todate information about the coronavirus in New York State, visit the New York State Department of Health website.
- Ignore online offers for vaccinations. If you see ads touting prevention, treatment or cure claims for the coronavirus, ask yourself: if there's been a medical breakthrough, would you be hearing about it for the first time through an ad or sales pitch?
 - Be aware of emails

asking for donations. Do homework when vour it comes to donations. whether through charities or crowdfunding. Don't let anyone rush you into donating. If someone wants donations in cash, by gift card or by wiring money, don't do it.

- Be alert of high prices on critical goods. Any New Yorker who sees excessively priced consumer goods and services that are used primarily for personal, family or household purposes to prevent or respond to novel coronavirus should file a complaint with DCP. New Yorkers can now report sudden and unexpected increases in consumer goods such as hand sanitizer, cleaning supplies or other health and sanitation related products by calling the consumer hotline toll free at 800.697.1220.
- Hang up on illegal robocallers. If you receive a call about scam novel coronavirus treatments to work-at-home schemes. hang up. Don't press any numbers. The recording

might say that pressing a number will let you speak to a live operator or remove you from their call list, but it might lead to more robocalls instead.

• Be alert to "investment opportunities." The Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) is warning people about online promotions, including on social media, claiming that the products or services of publicly-traded companies can prevent, detect or cure coronavirus and that the stock of these companies will dramatically increase in value as a result.

The profound health benefits of gardening

As we endure the current coronavirus pandemic, precautions need to be taken in all activities outside our homes. But during such a difficult time, we also should be aware of the singularly profound health benefits of gardening.

Many people work in community gardens, where new rules of operation are being formulated for this spring, but such guidelines should not prevent us from enjoying our gardens, at home or elsewhere. Of course, no one needs to tell you about the benefits of being outside after a long winter, but science is filling in the how and why.

Fresh air: Studies have shown that fresh air is good for cleaning the lungs, improving circulation and providing greater energy and vitality. Increased oxygen intake helps boost brain levels of serotonin, a neurotransmitter nicknamed the "happy chemical" because it combats anxiety and depression and helps maintain a healthy emotional state and general well-being.

Sunlight: While there are obvious risks to too much unprotected exposure, moderate amounts of sunlight bring many benefits. For starters, the UV rays in sunlight are known to kill and suppress germs and bacteria. (Experts say it's not strong enough to kill the coronavirus, but the overall disinfectant effect is still a good one.)

Upon exposure to sunlight, the skin

metabolizes Vitamin D, the only major vitamin produced in this way. Vitamin D is essential for numerous body functions, and sunlight has been shown to lower blood pressure and improves bone strength and brain functioning.

Not surprisingly, sunlight also provokes the brain to produce serotonin, which is why sunlight is an effective anti-depressant and treatment for Seasonal Affective Disorder. (Its relative absence in winter is the primary cause of SAD.)

Soil: This is where it gets really magical. Any gardener can tell you that the health of a garden and its plants is bound up in the diverse abundance of microbial life in the soil. Some microbes are bad (pathogens), but most are either benign or, in fact, necessary for increasing nutrient uptake by plants, decomposing organic matter, controlling disease and numerous other basic soil functions.

But what if the microbes that make for healthy soil also promote the health of humans who work in it?

We know that exposure to soil microbes, particularly in childhood, helps to build a more robust immune system and resistance to asthma and allergies. Recent studies demonstrate that soil microbes such as *Mycobacterium vaccae* can act as anti-depressants as well, activating groups of neurons responsible for producing, you guessed it, our friend, serotonin.

Physical activity: Gardening and landscaping activities provide moderate

to vigorous physical activity, particularly when most of the work is performed using hand tools. It's a form of stealth exercise in which you are lifting, squatting, pushing, pulling and stepping without even realizing it. Gardening provides health-enhancing, weight-bearing exercise that increases caloric expenditure, builds strong muscles and bones and supports balance and endurance.

It gets even better. That's because gardening gives you the opportunity to grow food – awesome, fresh food. Nothing maintains your immune system and

general health and energy like fresh fruits and vegetables, which are most nutritious right after harvest.

In addition, kids and adults are more likely to eat fruits and vegetables tended with their own hands. Gardeners can control how the food is grown, often resulting in no or less herbicide and pesticide use.

These are challenging times, and it is more important than ever to stay healthy. One of the healthiest things you can do is to grow food in your own garden. So be careful. Stay safe. But by all means, get your gardening on!


















Mamrosh receives award from LeadingAge New York 2020 Art Competition

Some surprising effects of insufficient sleep


Many people wish they could get more sleep. Whether they're professionals facing the challenges of demanding careers or parents juggling the responsibilities of work and family, many people find it difficult to

get a full night's sleep.

A restless night here or there likely is not much to worry about. However, a recent study from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that more than one-third of adults in the United States were not getting enough sleep on a regular basis. Routinely failing to get a good night's rest can have a profound effect on a person's overall well-being, including some surprising side effects.

According to the National Sleep Foundation, insufficient sleep will not make a person sick any more than getting enough sleep will prevent illness. That vulnerability is linked cytokines, a type of protein made by the body that targets infection and inflammation. 
