# Poland 2020-21 school budget approved via absentee ballots

POLAND – Poland Central School District residents voted 227-118 to approve the district's proposed \$16.05 million budget for the 2020-21 school year.

Voting was conducted exclusively via absentee ballots in this year's de-

layed budget vote, and the ballots were counted and opened after 5 p.m. on Tuesday, June 16, as directed by executive orders from Gov. Andrew Cuomo.

school budget vote and for showing strong support for the budget," Poland Superintendent Laura Dutton said. "Among all the challenges of this school year, we have discovered with certainty that whether we are all in school or separated at

our homes, the Poland school community is always together."

The 2020-21 budget is an 8.97% increase over the current school year's spending plan. The budget includes a 2.99% tax levy increase, which is well below the 11.6% cal-

culated tax levy limit for the district. For the owner of a home fully valued at \$100,000 who receives the Basic STAR exemption, the proposed tax levy increase will have a tax impact of \$27.30 per year.

One Board of Education seat was also up for elec-

tion along with the school budget vote. Board President Robert Batson ran for re-election and was the only candidate to file a petition to run for the seat. Batson received 271 votes and was elected to a five-year term from July 1, 2020 - June 30, 2025.

## Button batteries are a big risk

Batteries power our world. They make children's toys spring to life, ensure that we can change channels on the television, make it possible for hearing aids to amplify sound, and maintain effective working order in smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. Many families keep various types of batteries on hand, but batteries in the wrong hands can cause serious injury.

The American Academy of Pediatrics warns that more than 2,500 button batteries are ingested each year in the United States. As frequently as every three

# VHS celebrates National Certified Nursing Assistants Day

Thursday, June 18 marked the beginning of National Nursing Assistants Week and Valley Health Services in Herkimer commemorated the invaluable service their CNAs provide in the care of residents day in and day out. CNAs provide a vital role in the treatment and care of residents, creating a culture of safety and compassion for those who need them most.

Lisa M. Betrus, VHS's president, stated, "The fundamental role our CNAs serve in the lives of our residents is phenomenal. They are the best part of care as they bring sunshine and smiles, reassuring, encouraging, supporting and caring for our residents on a daily basis."

VHS provides a community of caring which starts with the CNAs who not only deliver daily living activities to the resi-

tery-related emergency. Button batteries and lithium coin batteries are found in watches, toys, cards, key fobs, calculators, and numerous other objects. Button batteries may appear harmless, but they can be anything but.

The United Kingdom-based organization First Aid for Life says button and coin batteries can easily burn

The United Kingdom-based organization First Aid for Life says button and coin batteries can easily burn through tissues and other blood vessels. The electric current in a button battery rapidly increases the pH of the tissue adjacent to the battery, potentially causing significant tissue injury. The AAP says button batteries can cause burns in as little as two hours and create lifelong injuries.

Burns and tissue damage are not the only injury risks associated with these types of batteries. While many button batteries that are ingested can and do pass through the digestive system, others become lodged in various parts of the body, causing obstructions and perforations. Batteries also do not need to be swallowed to be dangerous. Children can suffer severe injury to their nasal cavities when button batteries become lodged in the nostrils. Batteries that are

lodged in the nasal cavity can cause nasal mucosal injury, periorbital cellulitis, the formation of scar tissue, and nasal septal perforation. Other injuries, including hearing loss, tympanic membrane perforation and facial nerve paralysis, can occur when these miniscule batteries are pushed into the ear canal.

Parents and other guardians need to exercise extreme caution at home. Always check that battery compartments are securely fastened, advises the National Safety Council, and keep toys belonging to older children that might contain button batteries out of reach of younger children.

Place devices that contain button batteries out of sight and beyond the reach of youngsters. When purchasing replacement batteries, look for child-resistant safety packaging. Don't allow children to play with batteries or with battery-powered products that have easily accessible batteries.

If you suspect a button battery has been ingested or someone has sustained another battery-related injury, call the National Battery Ingestion Hotline at 800.498.8666 or take the person to the hospital immediately.

## How to support a loved one with cancer

Support networks are vital for cancer patients. The experts at Weill Cornell Medicine note that the support of family friends, both in the immediate aftermath of a diagnosis and throughout treatment, can help patients regain a sense of normalcy and maintain their emotional stability, each of which improves their chances at ensuring a positive clinical outcome.

The role of cancer caregiver is often unlike any other people have played or will play. In recognition of that, the American Society of Clinical Oncology offers the following tips to cancer caregivers as they transition into their new roles.

• Prepare yourself. Caregivers may be so busy looking into what they can do to help a loved one diagnosed with cancer that they overlook or forget the need to prepare themselves. The ASCO recommends that caregivers process their own feelings about a loved one's diagnosis before they begin caring for that person. This can ensure their focus is where it

needs to be when their loved needs help. In addition, caregivers can do everything to learn about their loved one's disease ahead of time. Many patients are not forthcoming about their disease, and even those that are may find it physically and emotionally exhausting to repeatedly share the details of their disease with friends and family. Learning the basics on your own can save the patients from these feelings of exhaustion.

- Let your loved one know it's alright to say, "No." Caregivers may want to give their loved one advice, but it's important that they recognize recommendations, however well-intentioned they may be, may not always be welcome. That can create unnecessary tension between caregiver and patient. Let your loved one know they can decline suggestions, and always ask permission before giving advice.
- Don't forget to have fun. A cancer diagnosis is serious business, but caregivers and patients must make room

for levity throughout the treatment process. The ASCO recommends caregivers make time for light conversation and humorous stories. This can be beneficial to both patients and caregivers, providing a routine respite from discussions about how patients are feeling. Discussions about topics other than cancer, such as sports, movies or hobbies, also can be a respite from the rigors of treatment and caregiving.

- Treat your loved one just as you ordinarily do. The ASCO notes the importance of treating a loved one during treatment just as you normally would. While that may not always be possible, it can help patients feel like they're still a friend or family member first and a cancer patient second.
- Pay attention to your loved one's feelings. Some doctors encourage cancer patients to keep a journal or blog during their treatments. If possible, read their journal or blog entries. Many people are more comfortable sharing feelings in

this way than directly with their caregivers, so the entries can provide valuable insight into how loved ones are coping.

Cancer caregiver is a role unlike any other and presents some unique challenges. Caregivers can employ various strategies and even speak with their loved one's physicians in an effort to overcome those challenges.















# How to plan for changing weather

The allure of the great outdoors compels many people to hike, kayak, fish and engage in myriad other activities in the fresh air. The call of nature can be difficult to ignore, but inclement weather can quickly turn a fun day under the sun into a race to escape the elements.

Regardless of which activity is beckoning you to answer the call of the wild, a few simple safety measures should be taken to ensure your day is not derailed by sudden changes in the weather.

• Do your homework prior to traveling. The Department of Homeland Security advises travelers and outdoor recreation enthusiasts to learn about potentially severe weather in areas they plan to visit prior to beginning their trip. For example, if an area is vulnerable to tornadoes, learn about what to do in the wake of a tornado. The National Weather Service notes that emergency response protocols differ depending on the type of storm or severe weather. For example,

what to do in the wake of a tornado differs from what to do when confronted by a flash flood. Familiarizing yourself with these response protocols can help you make it through unforeseen weather changes safely.

• Take along an extra set of keys. The NWS advises taking along an extra set of keys should your keys get lost due to inclement weather. The spare keys to a vehicle, for example, can help you

escape inclement weather if your vehicle is still accessible and the roads are safe enough for travel. Without a backup set of keys, outdoor enthusiasts may find themselves stranded even if their vehicles can still run.

• Create a communication plan with your family prior to leaving. A predetermined communication plan can help family members keep in touch should the weather suddenly take a turn

for the worse. Before embarking on a getaway, let loved ones who won't be joining you know exactly where you will be staying and how to reach you. This can make it easier for them to get you help should you need it.

• Monitor local forecasts. Changes in the weather can be sudden, so anyone planning to spend significant time outdoors should monitor local forecasts before and during their trips. This is especially important for travelers who will be visiting areas during certain times of year when inclement weather is normal. For example, travelers should be ready to postpone their plans if they will be visiting areas vulnerable to hurricanes during hurricane season.

• Purchase travel insurance. Insuring a trip with travel insurance can serve as a financial safety

net if a trip is not possible due to inclement weather. With such a policy in hand, vacationers may not feel compelled to travel if the forecast is less than ideal.

Inclement weather can threaten outdoor excursions. But outdoor enthusiasts can take various measures to protect themselves in the face of sudden or unforeseen changes in the weather.

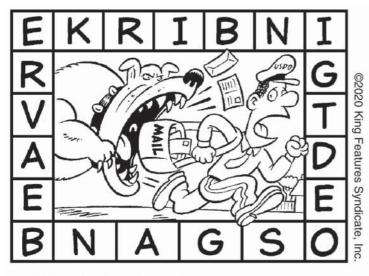

# Enjoy safe bike rides

Riding a bicycle is not only a great way to help the planet by reducing vehicle emissions, but it's also an ideal physical activity. According to Harvard University, biking at a moderate speed of 12 to 13.9 miles per hour will cause a 155-pound person to burn 298 calories in 30 minutes. At a faster rate of 14 to 15.9 miles per hour, a person of the same weight will burn 372 calories.

People can ride bikes at any time of year, but cycling is most popular when temperatures are moderate and precipitation is low. Bike riding has always been in fashion, but it experienced a boost in popularity when people were asked to remain socially distant for COVID-19. Walks and bike rides at a safe distance from others became popular and accessible ways to get fresh air and exercise.

Anyone who rides a bike needs to take certain precautions. Cyclists often share the roads with large and powerful cars and trucks. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration warns there were 857 cyclists killed in traffic crashes in the United States in 2018. Safety is a two-way street, requiring diligence by drivers and bike riders.

• Bike riders should be dressed in bright clothing so they can be seen. A well-fitting bicycle helmet is a must, and

should be worn every time a bike is rid-

- Equip your bike with a horn, bell and bright headlight.
- Cyclists should ride in the same direction as traffic on the far right-hand side
- Ride a bike that fits you well. If the bike is too big, it can be difficult to control
- Carry items in a backpack or strapped to the back of the bike so belongings do not become obstacles.
- Drivers should remain alert of cyclists sharing the road and give wide clearance when possible.
- Vehicle drivers should look in their side mirrors and around them before opening car doors so they do not accidentally knock a cyclist passing by off the bike.
- Safe Kids suggest using hand signals to alert others to your plans. Cyclists can extend the left arm out for a left turn; make a 90-degree angle with the left arm to indicate a right turn. Putting the left arm down with the palm facing backward indicates stopping or slowing.

Cycling safety is important as temperatures rise and more cyclists are on the road.

# Herkimer BOCES adult nursing students graduate after completing program virtually

LPN program still recruiting for part-time classes

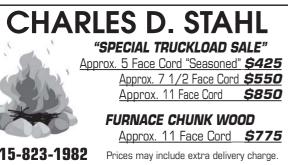
Thirty-three local adults are graduating from the Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Adult Practical Nursing Program thanks to the program continuing virtually following school closures in response to the coronavirus public health crisis.

The nursing program, which gives graduates the opportunity to become employed as licensed practical nurses and/or further their education, was back up and running 24 hours after the school closures by setting up Zoom conference calls for instruction and clinical experiences.

"We were able to teach and complete our classes using a distance-learning format," Herkimer BOCES Adult Practical

Nursing Program Coordinator Sara Nicolette said. "Everybody that was scheduled to graduate has graduated or will be graduating this week, and our first-year parttime students were able to complete their curriculum as well."

Herkimer BOCES offers three adult LPN programs: a full-time program that takes 12 months to complete and part-time day and part-time evening programs that take 20 months to complete.

Students in the parttime evening course were able to complete their requirements early during the distance learning and graduated early – some on April 15 and some on May 15. The full-time students and part-time day students graduated on June 17.

Nicolette is looking into having an in-person, outdoor ceremony for all graduates sometime in July.

In addition to conducting classes and clinical experiences virtually, the Herkimer BOCES LPN program has been recruiting by using virtual open houses.

The virtual open houses for upcoming classes will continue at 7 p.m. every Wednesday through Aug. 12, and anyone interested can email Nicolette at snicolette@herkimer-boces.org for an invite to a virtual open house. More information can also be found

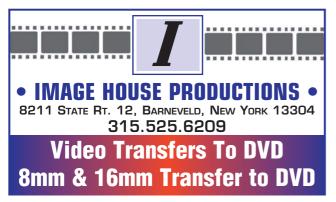

September, Nicolette said. "Those are two-year programs - they run two secondary-school calendar years - and they allow you to meet your financial obligations, your family obligations, and I have to say, the bulk and majority of our students go through part-time," Nicolette said. "We have a good reputation with those part-time programs. We've been doing part-time days for 20-plus years, and we've been over 10 years doing our evening program, and it's a true evening program - classes run three nights a week from 5:30 - 9:30, and then clinicals are open on Saturdays."

### Prevent injuries with ladder safety

The moderate temperatures of spring and summer make these great times of the year to tackle jobs around the house. When cleaning or remodeling goals involve reaching heights, ladders are often put to use.

The American Ladder Institute reminds do-it-yourselfers and professionals that ladders are tools, and it is the responsibility of people to follow safety precautions when using ladders just as they would any other tool.

#### Choose the right size

The right ladder makes a job safer, as it prevents the user from having to stand on the top rung or step, which can throw off DIYers' balance. Ladders come in various sizes and types, from step to straight to combination. Do not exceed the maximum load rating of a ladder. When calculating, include the weight of the person or persons who will use the ladder and any tools and equipment he or she may carry on the ladder during a job.

#### Keep it steady

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration advises against shifting or moving a ladder while a person or equipment is on the ladder. Use the ladder only on a stable and level surface, unless it has been secured to prevent displacement. The proper angle for setting up a ladder can help keep it steady. The base of the ladder should be at one-quarter of the working length of the ladder from the wall or other vertical surface, says OSHA.

#### Climb carefully

Never use a ladder if you are feeling dizzy, tired or impaired, as such feelings can cause accidents. Be sure to place a ladder where the climb will not be impeded by electrical wires, obstacles or even wind and other weather conditions. The National Safety Council recommends wearing slip-resistant shoes with clean soles for maximum traction. Always grip the rungs and climb the ladder while facing it, all the while maintaining three points of contact with the ladder (two hands and one foot or two feet and one hand). Hang tools from a tool belt while climbing or have them handed up to you after you've safely reached your height.

#### Be smart

Do not overreach while on a ladder. Go slowly when ascending or descending, being deliberate where hands and feet are placed. Avoid distractions while working on ladders to further reduce the risk of balanced-related accidents.

By the time men see a physician, the window of opportunity to screen for early health problems may already have passed, and now it becomes essential to treat complications of a disease.

Men are at a higher risk for certain health conditions than others. Among the 15 top causes of death, men lead women in all of them, except for Alzheimer's disease, according to WebMD.

1. Cardiovascular disease: The American Heart Association says more than one in three adult men have a form of cardiovascular disease. High blood pressure is a maior concern and stroke affects more than three million men. Changing one's diet, exercising and getting routine health examinations can go a long way toward preventing the onset of heart disease.

2. Liver disease: High levels of alcohol and tobacco use among men can put them at a risk for diseases of the liver, such as cirrhosis and alcoholic liver disease. Globally, cirrhosis caused more than 1.3 million deaths in 2017, two-thirds of which were men. And experts at the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation at the University of Washington School of Medicine say hepatitis B and excessive use of alcohol are notoriously high in men, contributing to liver issues. In addition, nonalcoholic fatty liver disease, which is especially prevalent among obese individuals, can contribute to cirrhosis.

3. Respiratory diseases: COPD and other respiratory conditions can lead to life-threatening conditions. The American Lung Association says more men are now being diagnosed with lung cancer than in years past. Smoking remains the leading cause of lung cancer.

4. Depression: Men can experience depression and suicidal thoughts. Researchers at The National Institute of Mental Health estimate that at least six million men in the United States suffer from depressive disorders, including suicidal thoughts, each year. Men may exhibit different symptoms of depression, such as fatigue and irritability, than women. Although more women are likely to attempt suicide, men are more likely to die by suicide. Anyone who needs help is urged

to call the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 800.273.8255.

5. Unintentional injuries: Risky behaviors, such as driving reckless-

ly, can lead to injuries and accidents. In 2016, unintentional injuries were the third most common cause of death in men above the age of 20,

according to the CDC.

Men need to assess their risks for various medical conditions and take charge of their personal well-being.
