

Food Bank of CNY supporting farms and families during COVID-19

New program in partnership with Upstate Farms provides 16,000 vouchers for in-store redemption of milk products

On July 1, State Agriculture Commissioner Richard A. Ball announced the Food Bank of Central New York has purchased 428,167 pounds of surplus food from New York farmers since the launch of Gov. Andrew Cuomo's Nourish NY initiative in early May. This includes 312,274 pounds of nutritious dairy products, such as fluid milk, cheese, butter and cottage cheese, and 77,447 pounds of produce, such as apples, tomatoes, strawberries, onions, lettuce and potatoes as of the end of last week that have been provided to thousands of households in need in the Central New York region.

Ball said, "The Nourish NY program has been very successful in connecting our farms and food producers with consumers at a time of extreme difficulty for many farmers and families. Our partnership with Food Bank of Central New York has been crucial in making the link that has helped keep these important businesses going while keeping families fed. I want to thank Food Bank of Central New York for involving so many Central New York producers in the Nourish NY initiative and Upstate Niagara Cooperative for helping to put more New York milk in the homes of people in need."

The Nourish NY initiative aims to quickly reroute New York's surplus agricultural products to the populations who need them through the state's food banks. The state is providing \$25 million to food banks and other emergency food providers so they can buy surplus milk, yogurt, cheese, vegetables, fruit and more from New York farmers who have lost markets as a result of school and restaurant closures.

In the last eight weeks, the Food Bank of CNY has held more than 30 distributions in Cayuga, Chenango, Cortland, Herkimer, Jefferson, Lewis, Madison, Oneida, Onondaga, Oswego and St. Lawrence counties. The nonprofit agency has also continued to supply food pantries and distributions from other organizations throughout this time. Visit Food Bank of CNY's website and click the box marked "Find Food" to find and register for distributions, locate food pantries and soup kitchens and to learn more.

Purchases have been made directly from New York produce farms and dairy manufacturers, including Hudson Egg Farm, Queensboro Farm Products, Green Empire Farms, Kriemhild Dairy, Smith Quality Eggs, and Hudsons' Dairy in Central New York. Products were also purchased from other upstate farms and producers including Marquart Farms, Williams Farms, Upstate Niagara Cooperative, Empire Cheese, Intergrow Farms, Lucki7 Livestock, Crowley Dairy Products, Great Lakes Cheese, Eden Valley Farm,

Garelick Farms, Wheatfield Gardens Farm, New York Juice Co. and Chobani.

As part of the Nourish NY program and in addition to its drive-thru food distribution events, Food Bank of CNY has also implemented a program in partnership with Upstate Farms to provide vouchers that people can redeem at stores for milk. So far, 16,000 vouchers have been distributed to residents in the Central New York, Mohawk Valley and North Country regions through the agency's 11-county emergency food network to individuals and households seeking food assistance.

Karen Belcher, interim executive director at Food Bank of CNY, said, "We appreciate the continued support and partnership of Governor Andrew Cuomo and the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets as we continue to meet the increased need in our community. Funding through Nourish NY helps us provide nutritious food from upstate growers and producers to children, families and seniors struggling with hunger."

The Nourish NY program is administered by the State Department of Agriculture and Markets and the State Department of Health. The initiative is being led by a special task force created by Gov. Cuomo, which includes Kelly Cummings, Director of State Operations and Infrastructure; Richard Ball, Commissioner of Agriculture; Rossana Rosado, Secretary of State; Karim Camara, Executive Director of the Office of Faith-Based Community Development Services; Fran Barrett, Director of Non-Profits; and Mike Hein, Commissioner of the Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, New York food banks have seen a dramatic increase in demand – in some regions up to 200% – as many New Yorkers struggle to put food on the table. At the same time, New York's farmers and producers have been faced with their own unprecedented extreme financial difficulties. Many have lost up to 50% of their markets through the closure of schools and restaurants, leaving them without a place to sell their perishable products.

Over the past few months, Hyde Hall has strengthened its health and safety plans according to guidelines from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, New York State's regional phased reopening plan, and New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation.

"Hyde Hall has more to offer than ever before," says Jonathan Maney, executive director. "Explore history with us and see fascinating things that you cannot find anywhere else. We are excited to share this beautiful New York treasure!"

Hyde Hall will offer guided tours of the historic mansion with enhanced measures that increase physical distancing, ensure safety and protection, and reduce contact and exposure.

Tours and safety

Tours are available by reservation only, and with a strict limit of six guests per tour. Tours will run daily — on the hour — between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. To reserve tours, guests must call 607. 547.5098 X 7 between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. Hyde Hall team members are prepared to assist guests in selecting the best time to schedule their visit. Hyde Hall asks that guests arrive 15 minutes before their scheduled visit.

In combination with reservation-based tours, strict guest-number limits, and enhanced safety procedures, tour routes have been modified to allow for additional physical distancing — certain areas and tight spaces are temporarily closed. To meet New York State Guidelines, the wearing of face masks is mandatory for guests and staff at all times. For additional protection and to limit exposure between guests and staff, the visitor center has a clear plexiglass barrier installed for contactless admission at check-in. The site has implemented increased disinfection in public and office

Guests will be delighted with the changes that occurred while they were away. The Maple Stair Hall in the West Wing has returned to its original 1831 appearance, the third floor Billiards Room had its plaster rehabilitated, historic wood panels are repaired in several places, two original high back sofas have returned with new slipcovers and the original, early water closet is being restored. Hyde Hall has never looked better. The site proudly continues working toward its goal of making Hyde Hall a better place. With every improvement, the mansion tells another story from the past. For visitors who are unable to visit this season, a virtual tour is in development and will be available soon.

Smullen highlights the USMCA Agreement

Assemblyman Robert Smullen (R, C, Ref-Meco) recently announced that the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) will enter into force. This trade agreement, signed by President Trump in 2018, is a renegotiation of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA).

The USMCA contains modernized approaches to freer and fairer trade between the U.S., Canada and Mexico, including improvements to digital trade and rules of origin. As is the goal with most trade agreements, the USMCA seeks to create jobs as well as help American workers, manufacturers and farmers. Once fully implemented, the USMCA is expected to lift U.S. gross domestic product by as many as 1.2 percentage points and create up to 589,000 jobs, according to the International Trade Commission.

"The United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement received broad bipartisan support, and it should produce real benefits across broad swaths of the economy, including agriculture, technology, manufacturing and other sectors," said Smullen. "The aim of renegotiating NAFTA was to promote more predictable trade relations that will, in turn, spur investment. It is a high priority of mine to draw constituents'

attention to the USMCA's entry into force because of the current uncertainty of underlying financial and job markets.

"As a proponent of agribusiness, the USMCA will largely benefit farmers in upstate New York. With Mexico and Canada being two of the country's largest farm-good buyers, the agreement is a win for our agriculture industry. Dairy farmers will no longer be subject to Canadian underselling of U.S.

products, and rural Americans will face far fewer challenges to accessing Canada's market. The effects of this agreement will be extremely positive for upstate residents."

Assemblyman Robert Smullen represents the 118th Assembly District, which includes Hamilton and Fulton counties as well as parts of Herkimer, Oneida and St. Lawrence counties



- Paper plate
- Small foam paintbrushes or sponges clipped to clothespins

· Pencil with eraser Here's the fun:

1. Lay the one-piece outfit or T-shirt on a work surface. Place a piece of cardboard or wax paper between the two layers of fabric to protect the reverse side from any paint that may soak through.

Choose a cookie cutter for a stencil. A star, moon, heart, duckling! Anything goes. Place it anywhere on the fabric.

- 2. Pour a little permanent fabric paint onto a paper plate. Dip in the small foam paintbrush. Holding the cookie cutter firmly, start dab, dab-dabbing inside it, making sure to reach all the edges. You don't have to put equal density of paint all over the shape. A little variation actually adds interest. When you're through, lift the cookie cutter up to see the beautiful design. Now it's time for a few details.
- 3. Dunk the eraser end of the pencil in a little paint. It can be the same color you used for the cookie-cutter shape or a completely different one. Then stamp it along the neck or sleeves for a fun, whimsical border.





The importance of safety when swimming in backyard pools

Backyard pools provide families with ample opportunities for recreation. It's easy to be distracted by all the fun when swimming in a backyard pool, but it is crucial that homeowners take steps to ensure everyone is safe when spending time in the pool.

Establish a barrier

The Consumer Product Safety Commission warns that drowning is the leading cause of unintentional death in children between the ages of one and four in the United States. Pools attract curious children, so maintaining a barrier between the home and the pool is essential. Many municipalities require some sort of fencing around pools or ladders that selflatch or can be closed off to climbing.

Locks and alarms on windows and doors that face or provide access to the backyard also can serve as barriers.

Keep play under control

Children and even adults may be swept up in the fun and engage in potentially dangerous behaviors. Pool users should not be allowed to run around the perimeter of an inground pool, as the cement can get slippery when wet and lead to falls that can cause injuries.

Exercise caution when using diving boards or diving into pools. It's easy for divers to hit their heads when diving off a board into a pool due to close proximity of the transition wall in the deep end of the pool or by diving into shallow water. The Red Cross recommends a water depth of 11.5 feet for safe diving and the transition wall should be at least 16.5 feet from the tip of the diving board. However, the standard depth for many pools is 7.5 feet of water and a slope beginning seven feet from the board.

Exercise caution with inflatables

The Good Housekeeping Research Institute found that inflatable pool toys are especially dangerous. Such toys can flip easily, putting children at risk for injury (from striking the sides of the pool) or drowning (especially if the children were ejected into deep water). Inflatables also can prevent access to the surface of the water for submerged swimmers.

Choose a backyard lifeguard

At least one person should be designated as backyard lifeguard when the pool is in use. This person should al-

ways direct his or her focus on the pool, counting swimmers and keeping track of who enters and leaves the pool. Safe Kids Worldwide suggests rotating water watchers every 15 minutes.

Pools are fun places to spend summer afternoons, especially when every step is taken to ensure the safety of swimmers.
