### USDA Meals to You partnership delivers nearly 30 million meals

USDA Secretary Sonny Perdue lauded the achievement of its Meals to You partnership, which has now delivered more than 28.5 million meals to the doorsteps of low-income kids in rural communities across America during the COVID-19 health crisis. This program would not have been possible without everyone involved in the partnership and our dedicated McLane Global employees, working tirelessly to feed so many children in need across the country. Thanks to the hard work of so many, we have ensured children in rural areas have access to nutritious meals during this difficult time. This is what we can accomplish when government and private business come together in the fight against hunger," said Denton Mc-Lane, Chair of McLane Global.

Meals to You is an innovative public-private partnership between USDA, the Baylor University Collaborative on Hunger and Poverty, Mc-Lane Global, and Pepsi-Co. It began as a summer pilot project in 2019 but has been successfully leveraged as emergency Meals to You to address pandemic-related nutrition needs in rural areas.


Initially, Meals to You aimed to serve one million meals to children in rural areas. Due to unprecedented need, high requests to participate, and the commitment of USDA and its partners, the initiative rapidly expanded. As of July 11, 28,565,460 meals have been delivered to 268,277 children across the U.S.

Meals to You boxes are delivered directly to children's homes via the U.S.

Postal Service or another delivery service. Each box contains 20 nutritious, shelf-stable meals including 10 breakfasts and 10 lunches/suppers. In participating states, families with students who attend an eligible school or are eligible for free or reduced-price meals may opt-in to receive one box per child every two weeks.

Meals to You is just one of a broad range of actions USDA has taken to ensure children are fed during the COVID-19 health crisis. FNS has issued more than 35 nationwide waivers in its child nutrition programs to make it as easy as possible for children to continue to receive meals during the pandemic. USDA also recently announced several nationwide waivers that extend throughout the entire 2020-21 school year to allow states and program operators to plan for autumn and beyond. ### Tips to spend less money on cooling your home this summer



### Family Living — Learning at Home: Five tips for teaching children financial literacy



(StatePoint) If you have school-age children, you are probably one of the many parents facing the challenge of educating your kids at home. While there are countless learning options available — from virtual music classes to videos about zoo animals — financial literacy is one important subject that should not be overlooked.

Teaching your children financial literacy gives them the knowledge, skills and motivation to responsibly manage their money and achieve their future goals. Learning fundamental financial concepts is not always easy, so experts recommend that you start with the basics. Here are a few ideas to get you started:

• Explain that there are three things you can do with money: spend it, save it or give it away. To illustrate the point and introduce them to budgeting, have your child divide up money they receive from gifts or an allowance. Have them pay themselves first by putting a certain amount into savings. Then teach them

the importance of giving by having them donate a portion of their funds to a charity of their choosing. Allow them to spend the rest.

- Help them distinguish between needs and wants. With older children, you can do this by giving them shopping practice. You could give them a list of things they need, like new clothes, and a budget to shop for these items online. They will have to decide how best to use their limited resources. Should they buy the designer jeans they really want or a lower-priced option that lets them get everything on their list? With younger children, you might instead have them compare the costs of preparing meals at home (food being a need) to ordering from a restaurant (a want).
- Give them firsthand experience with saving money. Many banks let you open savings accounts online. Set one up in your child's name and have them monitor it. By the time they become teenagers, the benefit of saving regularly will be apparent because they will have some money to spend on clothes, food and experiences with friends — and still save for col-
- Involve them in creating a financial mission statement for your family. Ask them what they think is important: Is it planning for a future vacation, saving for college or other goals? Having an open conversation with your children encourages them to think about the meaning of money, the challenge of earning it and the importance of saving for what they truly value.
- Underscore the importance of giving. Explaining to children that other people have less than they do and teaching them to give and volunteer helps develop financial discipline as well as empathy toward others. This will help them stay focused on what is truly important, which can have a profound impact on their finances and every other aspect of their lives.







### Mexican corn family-style

#### by Donna Erickson

How about a quick word game with your kids? Start with "corn." There's corn on the cob, corn mazes, cornflakes, corndogs, corny jokes. Keep going. You might even hear someone exclaim, "can of corn!" referring to an easy catch at the baseball field.

This summer, I've been thinking "Mexican street corn" (elotes), a lightly grilled and slightly charred corn on the cob typically slathered with mayo, rolled in crumbles of tasty cotija (pronounced ko-TEE-hah) cheese and chopped cilantro, then drizzled with fresh lime juice. A dusting of chili powder raises the heat, if you dare. The mix of flavors is dynamic and will be memorable at your next barbecue.

Many street corn recipes call for mixing the add-ons before spreading onto the corn, but

I prefer a buffet-style toppings bar to let each guest customize with his or her favorite textures and flavors.

Rather than cooking the husked corn on the outdoor grill, which takes time, skill and space, I opt for boiling it in a big pot on my stove while the main course cooks on the grill. Just before we eat, I set the boiled corn on the empty hot grill until lightly charred on all sides

#### Mexican corn family style

1/4 cup mayonnaise

3/4 cup cotija cheese, crumbled (substitute with crumbled feta or Parmesan)

1/4 cup cilantro, chopped

1 jalapeno chili, seeded and finely chopped (optional)

Chili powder (optional)

2 limes, cut in wedge

6 ears of fresh sweet corn, shucked

- 1. Set up the toppings bar next to a stack of dinner plates. Place mayonnaise, cheese, cilantro and chopped chili in bowls. Arrange in a row on a serving table with a shaker of chili powder and plate of cut limes at the end. Set a brush by the mayo.
- 2. Boil or steam corn until tender.
- 3. Remove corn from cooking pot, pat dry and set on hot grill. Rotate with tongs for a few minutes.
- 4. Arrange on a large platter and set by toppings. Invite family and

guests to take a dinner plate and begin by brushing the corn with mayonnaise. Press cheese and cilantro into the mayo. Add chilies or sprinkle with chili powder if desired, then drizzle all over with squeezed lime juice. Serve hot. Serves 6

TIP: For those who prefer eating corn removed from the cob: Secure the end of an ear of corn in the hole of an angel food cake pan. Slice down with a sharp knife to remove the kernels -- they will fall directly in the pan.



### **Loving Cup**

In past centuries before the invention of the camera, heroes and celebrities were remembered with figurines, prints and plates, and mugs of glass or ceramics. Coronations, royal weddings, major exhibitions and historic events were commemorated by sou-

venirs with depictions of the people or the event. The Royal Doulton Co. made many figurines of attractive imaginary people and animals. The company started making several sizes of small character jugs honoring fictional as well as real people in 1930, and it still makes a few new ones each

year. Most sell today for under \$100.

Thirty limited edition loving cups and jugs (pitchers) about 10 inches high were made from 1930 to 1938, and two that honor Queen Elizabeth, one at her coronation in 1953, the other at her Silver Jubilee in 1977. The pieces designed by Charles Noke, molded with raised figures and decorated in bright colors, are rare. Each has a special mark on the bottom explaining the history of the hero and events pictured. The standard Royal Doulton Co. mark, a lion and crown, also is used. These limited editions were selling for more than \$1,000 each until about 10 years ago, when all Doulton prices

A commemorative Admiral Lord Nelson loving cup auctioned at Skinner Auctions in Boston in 2015 for \$800. Lord Nelson was a naval hero who fought in many naval battles and seemed unstoppable. He lost an arm in one battle, an eye in another, and he was finally killed at the Battle of Trafalgar Bay in 1805. On one side of the loving cup is a picture of the one-armed admiral in his ship; a sinking ship and lifeboat with sailors is on the other side.

**Q:** I have a silver spoon marked with a small hallmark: the letter "S" in the middle of wings. I'd like to know the maker and when it was made.

A: This mark was used by George W. Shiebler, who started his company in Baltimore in 1876. He moved to Brooklyn and the company name became George W. Shiebler & Co. in 1891. It went out of business in 1910. The company made flatware, hollowware, souvenir spoons and specialty items. A sterling teaspoon is worth about \$25 to \$50. A plated teaspoon sells for only \$10 to \$15.

They're low in calories (just 27 per 100 grams) and fat-free, but packed with nutrients, including vitamins and antioxidants that bring numerous health benefits. Eating just five strawberries gives you more vitamin C than an orange. The vitamin content in strawberries drops quickly, so you need to eat them as soon as you can after they've been picked.

The strawberry got its name from the common practice of growing berries under straw to protect them from winter cold and late spring frosts. A member of the rose family, the strawberry sometimes gives off a rose-like aroma. Many speculate about how the luscious fruit was discovered. It is known that the strawberry goes as far back as the Romans, and perhaps even the Greeks.

The strawberry plant was originally grown in Northern Europe, but wild species also are found in Russia, Chile and North America. At one time, wild strawberries grew everywhere from Canada to the Carolinas and westward beyond the Appalachian Mountains.

Before modern refrigeration, a day of "strawberring" meant a long day of picking, followed by gorging on delicious strawberry treats — pies, tarts, shortcake and all the ripe strawberries the family could consume. Berries that were not eaten were preserved as jam, jelly, sauce, strawberry vinegar and strawberry tonic - a medicinal drink. The remaining berries were dried on flat rocks for several days. These dried berries would be used throughout the fall and winter in breads, cakes,

puddings and porridge.

The first American species of strawberry was cultivated in about 1835. Today, the strawberry is the leading small fruit crop in the U.S. It is farmed from Florida to Alaska, with the largest strawberry growing centers located in California and Florida.

When picking or buying packages of strawberries, look for ripe, shiny and brilliantly colored berries without any soft or brown patches. Never buy strawberries that are green or hard, or that look dry, dull or wrinkled. When buying berries packed in a basket, check the bottom to see if there is a juice stain. This means that the strawberries at the bottom are crushed.

Always dispose of any berries that have signs of mildew or are rotten, as they'll contaminate the rest. Refrigerating strawberries ruins the flavor, and the strawberry aroma is easily picked up by other foods in the refrigerator. Store the berries in a cool place. Strawberries should be lightly rinsed, not washed, before serving, and eaten as soon as possible.

This recipe for Strawberry Flower Cups is an easy way to serve fresh berries as a dessert or to use as a beautiful decoration. The strawberries are cut to resemble flower petals then stuffed with sweetened cream cheese. It's a cool, delicious way to showcase these beautiful berries!

#### Strawberry flower cups

32 fresh, whole strawberries, large 12 ounces cream cheese, softened 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar

1/4 teaspoon almond extract

2 tablespoons semisweet or milk chocolate, grated

1. Lightly rinse the strawberries and gently place them in a colander to drain. Cut a thin slice from the stem end of each strawberry to create a base so that the berries will stand upright on the flattened end. Place the berries, cut side down, on

a cutting board. Carefully cut each berry into 4 wedges, but do not cut through the bottom. Use your finger to gently press down in the center of the berry so that the wedges fan out just slightly, taking care not to break the berries apart. Set the berries aside.

2. Using a small mixing bowl, beat together the cream cheese, confectioners' sugar and almond extract until light and fluffy. Gently fold-in half of the grated chocolate. Use a teaspoon, a plastic sandwich bag with a small hole cut into the end or a decorating bag with decorative tip to fill the berries with the cream-cheese mix-

3. Sprinkle the remaining grated chocolate over each berry. Cover and chill until ready to serve. Makes about 32 filled strawberries.



### Swimmer fears repeat of Legionnaire's Disease

**Dear Dr. Roach** — I'm 73, male and have been swimming a mile in inside pools every day for 10 years. Two months ago, I caught Legionella pneumonia and was in the hospital for three weeks. They said I was critical. I'm afraid to go back to swimming for fear that I'll die if I get that disease again. What are my chances of getting it again if I return to daily swimming? -- D.F.

Answer - Legionnaire's disease is caused by Legionella pneumophila, a bacteria species that lives in water, especially warm water. Legionella is a dangerous infection. It most commonly affects those over 50 or those with other risk factors, including smoking, alcohol use and a suppressed immune system from a medication or medical condition.

Pools are an occasional cause for Legionella infection; hot tubs are more

common. Air conditioning systems and cooling towers are responsible for most large outbreaks. Infection occurs when the aerosolized water droplets contaminated with the bacteria are inhaled deep in the lungs where they can cause infection. I don't know if an investigation was done in your case, but large outbreaks are a significant concern, and often trigger a response by public health officials. The swimming pool is a possibility.

A properly cleaned and treated pool poses little risk. You should discuss your diagnosis with the operator of the pools where you swam in the week or two prior to getting sick, so the water can be tested. I would point them to tinyurl.com/ CDC-legionella-pool for information appropriate to aquatics professionals.

Swimming is a great form of exercise and you should feel safe and comfortable in your pool.

Dear Dr. Roach — Does a person with Eustachian tube dysfunction have to be careful when washing her or his hair? I am concerned that the water that gets into the ear can be felt going down the throat. Or is that another problem? - K.C.H.

ANSWER: The ear has three compartments: external, middle and inner. The external ear is all of the part you can touch, all the way to the tympanic membrane (eardrum). It is watertight (unless there is a perforation or a doctor has placed a tube in the eardrum). The middle ear is the location of three bones that connect the eardrum to the cochlea. the organ of hearing. The cochlea and the organ of Corti, from which you derive your sense of balance, comprise the

The Eustachian tube runs from the middle of the ear into the back of the throat, and it allows the pressure in the ear to equalize with the pressure in the atmosphere. Eustachian tube dysfunction is when the tube fails to open, causing pressure changes in the ear. This often comes with reduced hearing and a sensation of ear pressure, and sometimes with ear pain, itching or tinnitus, the sensation of ringing in the ears or other noise. Eustachian tube dysfunction is a complicated issue I can't explain fully here.

However, showering with Eustachian tube dysfunction is not a problem. A sensation of water going down the throat during showering could possibly be from a wide-open hole in the eardrum, but it is more likely a referred sensation, meaning the body is misinterpreting the data from its own nerves.







### Improve soil quality for a better lawn

A lush, green lawn can vastly improve a home's curb appeal. Thick, healthy grass indicates that homeowners care enough about their properties to invest the time, effort and money to make them beautiful.

According to the landscaping tool company Troy-Bilt, soil fertility is the foundation of healthy lawns. In fact, the quality of the soil is essential whether one is growing acres of grass, potted plants or vegetable garden beds. No matter which type of soil a homeowner is working with, there are various ways to make it better.

#### Remove thatch


Thatch is a tightly knotted layer of leaves, grass roots, stems, and other debris that accumulates between the grass blades and the soil. Too much thatch can hinder the movement of water, air and nutrients into the soil. According to organic fertilizer company Organo-Lawn, thatch often occurs if the production of dead organic material in the lawn exceeds the ability of the microorganisms in the soil to break down that organic matter. A half-inch of thatch is normal. If thatch gets too thick, it will need to be removed. The home improvement resource DIY Network says dethatching can take place in the summer, fall and winter using a thatching rake.

#### **Aerate**

A lawn aerator will create holes in the soil. This can improve drainage and encourage worms and helpful microorganisms that require oxygen to thrive in the soil. The Briggs & Stratton Company says the best time to aerate a lawn is during the growing season when the grass can heal and fill in any holes, such as spring and fall. Aeration can help develop deeper grass roots for a healthier lawn.

#### Test and amend soil

A great lawn has loamy soil, which



has a key ratio of clay, silt and sand. Silt is a granular material of a size between sand and clay that originates from quartz and feldspar. It is the most fertile of the three types of soil components. Sand does not retain water, but it helps to create spaces in the soil that permit air

to circulate. Clay particles are small and bind together tightly, but clay is naturally nutrient-rich. The home improvement site BobVila.com says loamy soil should have equal parts sand and silt and half as much clay.

If the lawn is not yet established, loamy soil can be created and then the grass seeds planted. For established soil, after removing thatch and aerating, top-dressing the lawn can help. This involves adding a thin layer of soil over the lawn. It can improve the soil without killing the existing turf. Ideally, it should be done in early fall or spring, as this gives the grass time to grow through three to four more mowings before severe heat or cold

Healthy soil is vital to a lush lawn. It takes a little work, but improving soil can create vibrant, healthy,

Dear Paw's Corner -My cat "Blaze" has figured out how to lift the lid on the kitchen trashcan. He'll hop in there at any opportunity to get at the food scraps. I don't want him eating those, and I'm worried he'll get sick from raw or spoiled food. How can I stop this behavior? — C.J. in Santa Monica, CA

**Dear C.J.** — I know that's annoying. Cats are opportunists, escape artists and seemingly expert lockpickers that will take every chance to explore something that smells interesting. A trashcan filled with food scraps is often irresistible.

Once a cat has figured out where all the good table scraps are, it's going to be very hard to train them

out of that particular behavior. You can still try some deterrents. When you're in the kitchen and see Blaze creeping toward the trash can, hiss loudly and say "Nyah!" or "Leave it!" Or, keep a shaker can filled with pennies within reach and shake it at him when he approaches the trashcan.

When you're not in the kitchen, Blaze may still keep trying to get into the trashcan. For now, bungee or tape down the lid so that he can't pry it upward with his paws. Then, look for a trashcan that has a locking lid, which will be much harder for your cat to lift up. This will be a huge help at night, when you can't rush into the kitchen to try and stop Blaze from his nighttime




