Reconfigured golf event will aid homeless, abandoned animals

The fifth annual Par for Paws Golf Tournament to benefit the Susquehanna Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SQSPCA) has been restructured this year due to COVID-19.

In order to meet current social distancing restrictions, 2020's event at the Otsego Golf Club will instead be an SQSPCA Golf Weekend running Friday, Sept. 25 - Sunday, Sept. 27.

"Given the shelter's dependence on fundraising despite the continuing concerns regarding COVID-19, we are revamping our one-day tournament into a weekend event stretching over several days," said SQSPCA Executive Director Stacie Haynes.

"Anyone teeing off at the Otsego Golf Club during our Golf Weekend can take part simply by mentioning they are golfing in support of the SQSPCA. The \$40 per person admission charge will cover greens fees for 18 holes, use of a cart, a thank you gift and a hot dog at the end of play," Haynes explained.

In addition, a percentage of each fee will be donated back to the shelter, Haynes said.

Sponsorship opportunities are available for the SQSPCA Golf Weekend, all of which include signage at the event. According to Haynes, sponsorships start at \$300 for a Hole Sponsor, followed by Cart Sponsors

at \$1,000. The Scorecard Sponsor (\$2,500) and event underwriter (\$5,000) will receive player registrations as well, as part of their sponsorship packages.

Located on the shores of Otsego Lake just nine miles from Cooperstown, the Otsego Golf Club is one of America's oldest and most beautiful courses.

"This event is ideal for people who love golf, love animals and who appreciate the history and picturesque greens of the Otsego Golf Club," Haynes added.

Profits from the SQSPCA Golf Weekend will provide much-needed funds to help the SQSPCA fulfill its mission of caring for homeless and abandoned dogs and cats from across the region. These animals are vaccinated, spayed or neutered, and treated for illness or malnutrition as necessary before they are adopted out to a loving new home.

Registration for players as well as sponsors is currently underway.

Herkimer College named #2 online community college in NYS

Cyber safety is important for every grade

People rely on the internet every day. In recent months, reliance on digital technology was pushed even further as social distancing measures had the world going online for school and work and to maintain relationships with friends and family.

A 2018 report from Pew Research Center indicated that nearly 25% of young adults in America reported being online almost constantly. Common Sense Media says teens spend an average of nine hours a day online, compared to roughly six hours for those between the ages eight and 12 and 50 minutes for kids younger than eight.

Students must exercise caution when spending time online. Connectivity can be empowering, but it also puts students at risk from others and even their own, sometimes-irresponsible behaviors. Staying safe online should remain a priority for students who must spend more time on the internet and using digital education tools. These are some tips for maintaining cyber safety:

• Exercise caution when sharing information like your name, address, phone number and other personal data online — check with a trusted parent or teacher before sharing private data.

• Report any online activity that makes you feel uncomfortable, scared or confused, whether it is directed at you or a classmate.

• Think carefully before you post comments online. Data remains online indefinitely, and your words and actions today can greatly affect your future.

• Respect others online by refraining from demeaning or bullying comments.

• Do not try to get around firewalls and blocked websites set up by school administrators. These limitations are there for your protection.

• Stick to school-sanctioned assignments and internet browsing when using school-issued devices. Administrators may have the right to monitor student activity without students' knowledge and you can easily get yourself in trouble.

• It is easy to hide or fake one's identity on the internet, so never take someone you meet or speak with online at face value. Never meet up with someone you do not know or only met online.

• Talk to your parents or educators about extortion and ransomware that tries to trick you into providing



Onboarding dairy farm employees in 2020

Cornell Agricultural Workforce Development is seeking farmers to participate in the second year of an onboarding project funded by the New York Farm Viability Institute.

Employee onboarding is a management process to bring new employees into the farm business, complete necessary paperwork, equip them with safety and performance knowledge and skills and help them feel connected to and engaged with a worthwhile team.

Identified as a priority by New York's Ag Workforce Development Council, the first year of the project "Safe, Productive and Engaged from Day One" worked with 25 farmers to develop tools, trainings and templates to navigate employment requirements and improve human resource management practices. Projects included development of employee handbooks, SOPs, training videos, new hire forms, job descriptions, farm safety plans, checklists, organizational charts, mission statements, written policies and more.

"A successful onboarding process begins with a well-planned orientation, training and compliance, and leads to improvements that benefit both the manager and employees throughout the relationship," said Dr. Richard Stup, Cornell agricultural workforce specialist.

Effective onboarding helps retain valuable employees. The first days and weeks on the job set the course for a new farm employee. Given the tight labor market, a successful onboarding program can be an essential tool to help reduce employee turnover, increase employee safety and productivity and contribute to a farm's success. Recent research on large dairy farms indicates annual employee turnover rates range from 20% - 80%.

If an employee has a positive onboarding experience, their likelihood of staying at the place of employment for more than three years is about 69%, according to the Society for Human Resources Management. In addition to less turnover, employees are approximately 50% more productive and 54% more engaged.

Conversely, if an employee is poorly onboarded, this sets employees up for failure. The first impression can be the make-or-break of whether that employee returns tomorrow or leaves as soon as they can find another job. The onboarding process sets the tone for inclusion as a valued new farm team member, and should focus on the new employee as a person, not just as a worker, and not just on the business.







Popcorn Wagon

Popcorn wasn't a popular snack food until the 1890s, when Charles Cretors created a steam-powered machine to roast peanuts, coffee and popcorn to sell from a wagon on the street near his Chicago candy store. He kept improving the machinery and the product, and in 1885, he started C. Cretors and Co. In 1893, he took his popcorn wagon to the Chicago Columbian Exposition to sell his new product - popped corn. He made individual horsedrawn popcorn wagons for customers, and by 1900, he made the first electric popcorn wagon. He made more changes as the popcorn-eating public went to the movies. Cretors changed his business to make things for the war effort in the 1940s. His machines were modernized by the 1950s, but the company still made old-fashioned popcorn wagons for use and display.

Today, you may find a popcorn wagon, horse-drawn or motorized, at an antiques auction. A 15-foot-long horsedrawn Cretors 1910 wagon recently sold at a Kamelot auction in Philadelphia for \$34,000. It even has a custom-made travel trailer for long trips. Back in style again are modern food trucks that can go where the crowd is, and the popcorn wagon is still one of the most popular.

• Minimize smoke alarm reactions. Dogs may become unsettled or anxious when a smoke alarm sounds, running and hiding rather than heading toward the door. Particularly if your pet shows signs of agitation when you test the alarm, enlist assistance from professional trainers to help your canine friend learn how to properly respond. Some websites offer tips too.

• Use window cling alerts. In an emergency, first responders need to be able to quickly assess the number of pets in a home. Consider attaching a non-adhesive decal to a window near your front door to let rescuers know how many animals are inside.

• Account for pets in evacuation plans. Pets should always be included in a family's evacuation plan. Always involve your pets and stay aware of their typical hiding spots or safe places where they often nap, in case you must evacuate quickly. Be sure to practice your evacuation plan periodically. Also assign a family member to be responsible for each pet's escape. Keep an emergency kit with food, medication, a leash and collars near the exit.

• Keep alarms current. Smoke and carbon monoxide alarms must be replaced after 10 years. In addition to testing alarms once each week, check the manufacture date on your smoke and



Pulmonary fibrosis needs exact diagnosis

Dear Dr. Roach: My husband was recently diagnosed with mild to moderate pulmonary fibrosis. His mother died from pulmonary fibrosis. From what we have read there is no cure, only palliative care. The thought of doing nothing to try to stop the progression is totally unacceptable when there have been such successes with immunotherapy and stem cells. Would he receive more aggressive treatment going to a pulmonary fibrosis care center that has lung disease programs? — C.D.

Answer: There are several diseases that may cause fibrosis of the lung, so having an exact diagnosis made by an expert is critical for getting the right treatment. The most common type of pulmonary fibrosis is called "idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis" (it also has been called "usual interstitial pneumonia" and "cryptogenic fibrosing alveolitis"), and I am going to discuss that diagnosis.

The cause of IPF is unknown (both "idiopathic" and "cryptogenic" mean "of unknown cause"), but cigarette smoking is a risk factor. It is usually diagnosed in people who are in their 50s and 60s, although some familial cases may come on earlier. IPF can run in families.

Although it is a rare disease, it seems to be on the rise. The major symptoms are cough and shortness of breath.

There is no cure for IPF, but there are treatments available. Two drugs, pirfenidone and nintedanib, are approved for use in the U.S. and Canada. Both of them slow progression of lung disease, reduce exacerbations and have been proven to reduce mortality from the condition, if only slightly. I am concerned that you and your husband apparently haven't heard of these drugs.

I strongly advise you get a referral to a center for lung disease in order to get your husband the best care. I found 35 IPF trials recruiting patients in the U.S. and six in Canada. A clinical trial will help scientists understand this condition as well as determine the best current treatment. You also can find out what centers have expertise on this condition by seeing where the

Lemon-Soy Steak

An Asian-influenced marinade adds a new dimension to beef. We call for sirloin, which needs only 30 minutes of marinating time. But you can use economical chuck too; just marinate 4 hours or overnight to tenderize it. 2 medium lemons

2 tablespoons soy sauce

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 clove garlic, crushed with garlic press

1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

1/4 teaspoon ground red pepper (cavenne)

1 boneless beef top sirloin steak (about 1 1/2 pounds, 1 1/4-inches thick)

1. From 1 lemon, remove 3 strips peel (3 inches by 1 inch each). From both lemons, squeeze 1/3 cup juice.

2. In bowl, mix lemon peel, lemon juice, soy sauce, oil, garlic, black pepper and ground red pepper.

3. Pour marinade into large self-sealing plastic bag; add steak, turning to coat. Seal bag, pressing out excess air. Place bag on plate; refrigerate 30 minutes.

4. Remove steak from bag. Pour marinade into 1-quart saucepan and reserve.

5. Place steak on grill over medium heat and cook 12 to 15 minutes for medium-rare or until of desired doneness, turning once.

6. Transfer steak to cutting board. Let steak stand 10 minutes to allow juices to set for easier slicing.

7. Meanwhile, heat reserved marinade and 2 tablespoons water to boiling over high heat; boil 2 minutes.

8. To serve, thinly slice steak and serve with cooked marinade. Serves 6.

Dear Dr. Roach: My niece recently was diagnosed with breast cancer. Radiation was recommended. Her mother said that first she'd have to boost her immune system. Is it possible to actually do that? - P.P.L.

Answer: Radiation is a common treatment after breast cancer surgery. It's done to reduce the risk of recurrence, depending on the exact type of cancer.

Boosting the immune system is a new adjunct for many types of cancer. There are several ways to do this: One is to genetically modify the patient's own immune

T-cells, but many other techniques are in trials now.

However, if your niece's mother is talking about supplements, I'd be cautious. Supplements that are promoted to boost the immune system generally are ineffective at doing so. Making sure your niece has proper nutrition, gets good sleep and experiences as little stress as is manageable are ways to prevent stress on the immune system. Everyone could benefit from those deceptively simple steps, but especially a person being treated for cancer.

Donna's Day: Creative family fun

Weave nature finds, yarn on stick loom

My friend Bonnie is a professional weaver. I know she's a pro, not only because it says so on her labels, but when I watched her weaving at her traditional Swedish loom, I was taken by her focus and the talent and patience her artistry requires.

I admire her commitment because I'm more of a "start and finish a project in one afternoon" kind of personality. As a kid, I had a simple, small metal toy loom and made oodles of potholders with colorful cotton loops. At summer camp, I graduated to constructing my own loom out of sturdy sticks and twine, and wove yarn and nature finds.

Weaving on a stick nature loom is a craft I still enjoy with kids. First, there's the hunt in the woods, or rooting through a backyard woodpile for three or four perfect sticks. Then we gather items to weave into the loom, such as a feather, leaf or vine.

It's an artful way for kids to weave their own story of an outdoor summer adventure. Who knows, perhaps the craft will inspire your child to become a professional weaver someday, like Bonnie.

Here's the stuff you need for a rectangular 12inch shaped loom:

• 4 straight sticks, measuring 14 inches or longer, about 1/4 to 1/2 inch diameter. To cut sticks, score with scissors, then snap off excess and trim any pointy ends with pruning shears. My favorites have some moss growing here and there.

• Twine or yarn.

• Yarn for weaving and/or nature finds that are suitable for weaving in and out of the loom, such as feathers, leaves, stems of lavender, etc.

Here's the fun:

Construct the loom

Arrange sticks overlapping at each corner by an inch or more. Tie sticks together at each corner tightly with

the twine or yarn. Twist around two or three times. **Create the warp**

Tie the yarn with a square knot at one corner. Bring yarn directly to other side. Wrap around the stick twice, then criss-cross to opposite sides evenly from top to bottom leaving a 1/2-inch space between, and keeping

the yarn tight as you go. Ask a friend to hold the "frame" for you as you wind. Tie off a knot at the end.

Weave yarn and or nature finds in and out of the strings. When done, tie a string hanger to the top around a loom stick and display in a window or on your front door.

Note: For a triangular-shaped loom, tie three sticks at ends.




