Sue Perkins is planning to retire at the end of 2020. In 1982, after graduating from Cazenovia College with an associate's degree in Museum Studies, she volunteered at the Herkimer County Historical Society. A short while later, she was hired as a registrar then as an administrative assistant. In 2006, she became the executive director. Perkins has been involved with the society for 38 years.

During that involvement, she has promoted the society and kept the history of Herkimer County alive and well. During the 1990s, she assisted with the creation and presentation of the major exhibition "All in a Day's Work," which is still on display at the Suiter Building Museum. She, staff and volunteers recently put on two major relevant 100year anniversary exhibits, "The Great War (World War I)" and "Women's Suffrage." Both exhibits are from a Herkimer County perspective.

Perkins has also co-authored several books ("Herkimer Village," "Frankfort," "German Flatts" and "Little Falls"). She also co-edited the recent book "Murder and Mayhem in Herkimer County," which are true stories authored by different local authors. These books and

others are available at the society's gift shop, online at herkimercountyhistory. org, through the society's Facebook page and on Amazon and Barnes & Noble.

Perkins has continued to promote Herkimer County and the society by giving classes, presentations and tours. Her tours have included local cemeteries, highlighting famous people of the past. Other tours she's given in the Suiter Building Museum including yearly tours to school students and Scout troops. She's also provided walking tours of various villages, informing groups of the different architectural features of buildings. With the COVID-19 pandemic, Perkins has started to host virtual presentations through Zoom.

Besides being the society's executive director, Perkins is the Town of Manheim Historian and secretary of the Save the 1884 Jail group in Herkimer.

After 38 years, her retirement is well earned, but she will be missed by those at the society. She has a vast wealth of knowledge of Herkimer County history that we hope she will continue to share from the comfort of retirement. A donation in honor of Perkins's retirement can be made to the Herkimer County Historical Society, 400 N. Main St., Herkimer, NY 13350 or through the website. The society is open Monday - Friday from 10 a.m. - 3 p.m. Because of the pandemic, when you visit a mask, hand washing and temperature check are required.

The challenge often comes in how to prepare them. Nothing brings out the flavor profile of vegetables more than roasting. Roasted vegetables achieve a caramelization factor that leads to vegetables that are crisp on the outside while being tender on the inside with a sweetened flavor that tantalizes the taste buds.

Almost any vegetable can be roasted, the only variation necessary is the length of cooking time. The range in temperatures for roasting vegetables are between 350° - 425° F. Higher temperatures shorten the roasting time required, but vegetables that are cut small or are delicate do better at lower temperatures for a longer time period. The following are approximate cooking times for roasting vegetables cut into one-inch pieces at 400° - 425° . Don't forget to toss the vegetables half way through the suggested cooking time:

Asparagus – 20 minutes Bell peppers – 20 minutes Broccoli – 25 minutes

Brussels sprouts (halved) – 25 minutes Butternut squash – 30 minutes Cabbage (cut into one-inch thick slices) – 30 minutes

Carrots (cut into one-inch chunks or whole baby carrots) – 30 minutes

Cauliflower – 25 minutes

Corn (cobs left whole with husks) – 40 minutes

Green beans – 20 minutes

Kale – 15 minutes (it doesn't need to be in a single layer)

Onions - 35 minutes

Potatoes – 45 minutes

Sweet potatoes – 30 minutes

Tomatoes (grape or cherry) – 15 minutes

Yellow squash – 20 minutes

Zucchini – 20 minutes

Euclimi – 20 minutes

If the vegetable you want to roast isn't listed here, just pick the timing required for a vegetable with a similar density. For instance, if you were roasting radishes (halved or whole) they would be similar in density to

er. If the baking sheet is getting crowded, split the vegetables between two sheets to prevent steaming instead of roasting. When using two sheets be sure you put the top rack in the upper third of the oven and the lower rack in the bottom third of the oven. This will allow the heat and air to circulate better to help get the vegetables tender and caramelized. If the baking sheets are only an inch or two apart, the bottom vegetables will steam rather than roast. Be sure to rotate baking sheets between the racks half way through to ensure even roasting at the same time as you toss the vegetables. Third, you can add different vegetables to the baking sheet in stages - start roasting the hardest, longest-cooking vegetables first, and then add softer, quicker-cooking vegetables later on. If the baking sheet starts to get full, split the vegetables between two pans so you don't crowd them. Doing it this way allows the vegetables finish roasting around the same time, and remember: A



little extra roasting time is unlikely to hurt.

How to Roast Any Vegetable

Serves 4-6

Ingredients

- 1- $2\ \text{lbs.}$ of any vegetables, cut to a like size
- $1\mathchar`-2$ tbsp of oil or vegetable oil spray
- 1/2 tsp of salt (optional)
- 1/4 tsp of pepper

1/2 - 1 tsp of additional seasonings of your choice Directions:

Arrange oven rack to the middle of the oven then preheat to 425° .

Prepare vegetables by washing, peeling (if desired) and cutting into uniform pieces so they cook evenly. If your vegetables still have some moisture after washing, be sure to pat them as dry as possible; the drier the vegetable, the better it will roast.

Put the vegetables in a large bowl. Add the oil and toss to coat. Vegetables should be lightly coated and glistening but not doused in oil or spray with vegetable oil spray.

Spread the vegetables out on a rimmed baking sheet or in a baking dish. Make sure they are in a single layer with a little space in between. Use two baking sheets if needed to prevent crowding. Sprinkle vegetables with

salt, pepper and seasonings.

Estimate your cooking time based on the vegetables you are cooking and the method you chose if roasting combined vegetables.

Place the vegetables in the oven and begin roasting. Toss vegetables halfway through the cooking time, if using two racks rotate baking sheets at this time.

Continue roasting until the vegetables are easily pierced with a fork or knife and they are showing crispy, browned bits at the tips and edges.

Remove from oven and transfer the vegetables to a serving dish.

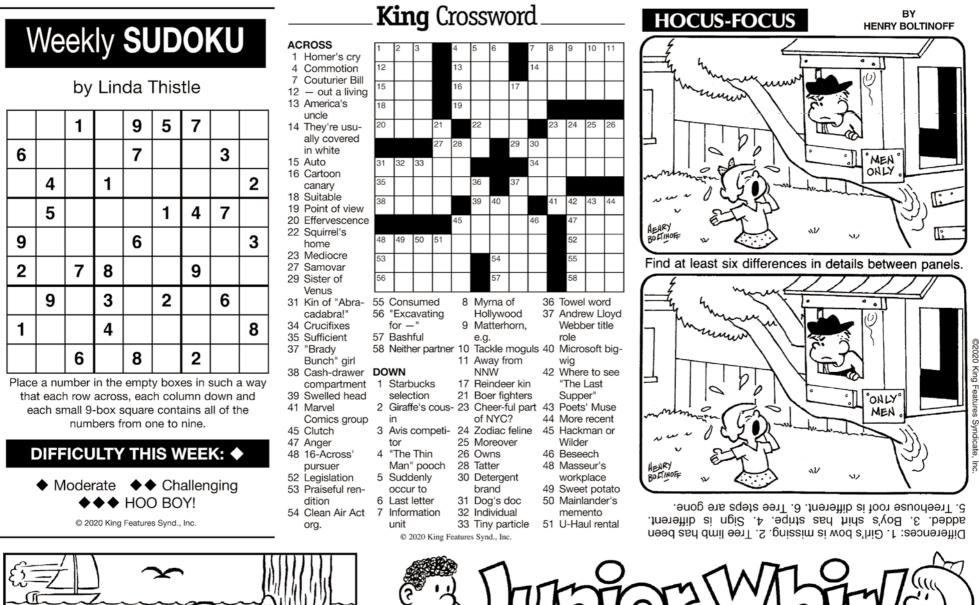

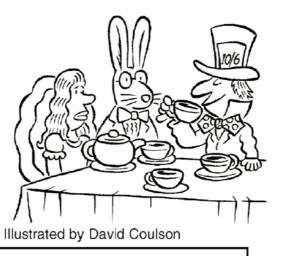

Keyboard-loving cat sees computer as rival

Dear Paw's Corner: Whenever I'm videoconferencing from home, my cat insists on jumping into my lap and pawing at the screen and the keyboard. If I put him outside the room, he will meow loudly and nonstop until I let him back in. Once the call is finished, he quiets down and goes away. To my co-workers, this is just a funny distraction, but I worry that it will have a negative impression on clients. How can I calm him down? — Mela-

nie in Pittsburgh

Dear Melanie: This is a tough one that many cat owners have faced. And now that so many of us are exclusively working from home, it's going to continue — unless you take some proactive steps.

Cats jump onto your keyboard because they know it gets your attention. They're not trying to figure out how to write social media posts. They just want you to pay as much attention to them as you do to the laptop screen. And locking a cat out of the room can trigger separation anxiety or just plain frustration that they can't get in to be with you.

Try this: Before a video call, give your cat 10 to 20

minutes of undivided attention. Pet him, play with his favorite toys, scratch his belly. This may help stop or reduce the number of times he jumps into your lap.

Use positive reinforcement to teach your cat to do more of what you want and less of the things you don't want him to do. To learn more about this training method, go to napahumane.org and search for "cats, positive reinforcement training." Its basic premise is to reward your cat when he does something right.

The Kitchen Diva

This summer has produced a bountiful crop of fruits. My local farmers market and grocery store have supplied an abundance of budget-friendly ingredients for my favorite summer dishes. While I often take advantage of the fruits on sale, I sometimes have questions about how to prepare and store them.

The following tips can help you prepare and enjoy fresh fruits and keep them at their most flavorful. The recipe for Rainbow Fruit Salad also is a great way to use a variety of your favorite fruits.

Which fruits continue to ripen after they're picked?

Apricots, bananas, cantaloupe, kiwi, mangoes, nectarines, peaches, pears, plantains and plums continue to ripen at room temperature after they're picked. To speed their ripening, put them in a loosely closed brown paper bag or ripening bowl at room temperature. (NOTE: Ripening bowls are sold at many stores that sell kitchen supplies for the home.) Plastic bags don't work for ripening. Once fully ripened, fruits may be stored in the refrigerator to lengthen their storage time. Though the outside skin of a refrigerated banana will turn dark brown, the inside will remain light-colored.

Fruits that should be picked or bought ripe and ready to eat include apples, cherries, grapefruit, grapes, oranges, pineapple, strawberries, tangerines and watermelon.

Should fruits and vegetables be washed before they're put away?

Here are some Food and Drug Administration guidelines for safely handling fruits and vegetables:

• Thoroughly rinse raw fruits and vegetables under running water before eating them. Don't use soap, detergents or bleach solutions.

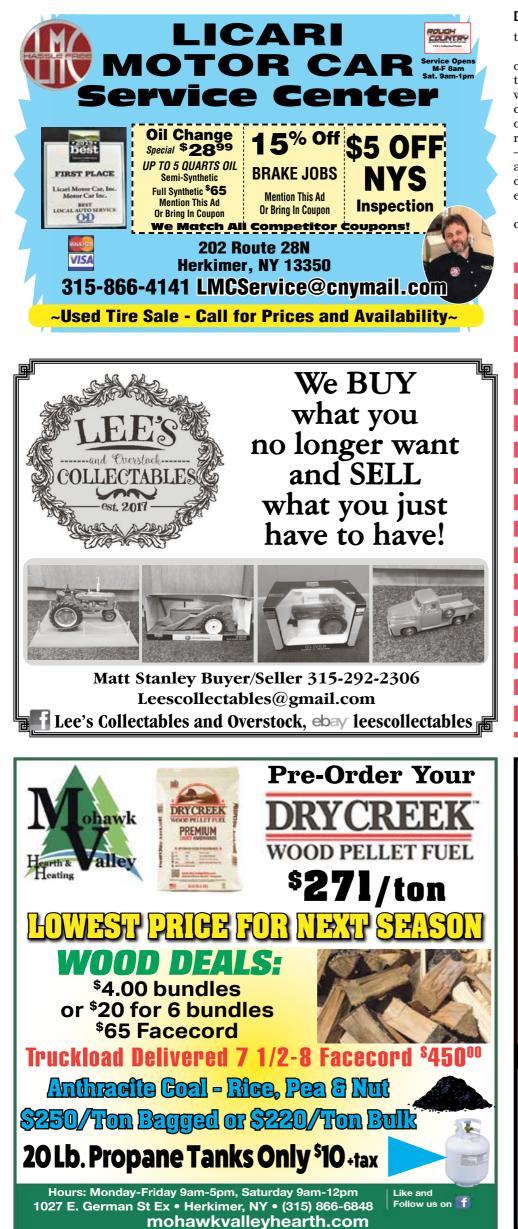
• Always scrub firm produce — such as melons and cucumbers — with a clean produce brush to remove surface dirt.

• Try to cut away damaged or bruised areas; bacteria can

thrive in these places. • Any bacteria on the outside of fruits can be transferred to the inside when the fruit is peeled or cut. To prevent this, thoroughly rinse fruits that require peeling or cutting – such as cantaloupe and other melons - under running water before eating them.

• If buying fresh, cut-produce, be sure

mango? If you find yourself trying to tango with a mango, try this method:

1. Wash the mango. Cut in half lengthwise by slicing off each fleshy cheek of the mango vertically along the flat side of the center seed.

2. Hold one mango half peel-side down and score the fruit down to the peel (but not through it) in a tic-tac-toe fashion.

3. Hold the scored portion with both hands and bend the peel backward so that the diamond-cut cubes are exposed. Cut cubes off peel, then remove any remaining fruit clinging to the seed.

How can I keep cut fruit from turning brown?

Keep cut fruits such as apples, pears, bananas and peaches from turning brown by coating them with an acidic juice such as lemon, orange or pineapple juice. Or use a commercial anti-darkening preparation, frequently called a "fruit protector."

Cut fruits as close to serving time as possible. Cover and refrigerate cut fruit until ready to serve. Avoid leaving cut fruit at room temperature for more than two hours.

the pan with unsalted butter to keep the milk from filming and sticking to the sides. Lightly coat all sides of the pan with butter, and the milk is sure to not leave scum, which can take away from the rich flavor of the milk.

Try setting aside time after you come home from the grocery store for prepping fruits and vegetables. Pre-bag snack sizes of carrots, celery, strawberries, grapes, cantaloupe and apples.
