# ON-RAMP Summit will advance clean transportation in the region ANCA convenes stakeholders for virtual event, rescheduled from April

SARANAC LAKE, NY - As New York State residents and leaders observed Climate Week (Sept. 21-27) with the intention to reduce climate-altering greenhouse gas emissions statewide, the Adirondack North Country Association (ANCA) geared up for a virtual summit that will advance clean transportation a key ingredient to the state's low-carbon future.

"Clean Transportation: The Adirondack ON-RAMP" will focus on topics including EV infrastructure, public transportation and commercial vehicles as well as strategies and policies for making clean transportation more accessible for residents and communities in northern New York.

The virtual event will include seven one- to two-hour sessions over five days: Tuesday, Sept. 29 - Friday, Oct. 2, with a closing session on Monday, Oct. 5. The summit was originally scheduled as a two-day in-person event for April, but was rescheduled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Participants are invited to register at www.adirondack. org/onramp.

"We're thrilled with the growing momentum around clean transportation at state and local levels," said Jerrod Bley, ANCA Clean Energy Program director. "ANCA is committed to bringing stakeholder interests to the table as we transition to a low-carbon future. ON-RAMP

participants will help provide a holistic plan for our region's transportation system moving forward."

Blev cited the 2023 World University Games and the New York's Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA) as motivating factors for holding the summit this year.

The 11-day World University Games will be based in the Village of Lake Placid, which, along with the greater Olympic Region, was awarded a gold LEED (Leadership in Energy and Design) certification by the U.S. Green Building Council in December 2019. The multisport event provides an opportunity for the region to demonstrate its commitment to environmentally sustainable development, including a low-carbon transit system to serve over 2,400 athletes and their spectators during the Games – as well as the transportation needs of residents, businesses and visitors into the future.

The CLCPA, which Gov. Andrew Cuomo signed into law in June 2019, sets specific targets for reducing carbon emissions and adopting clean energy technologies statewide. The state has pledged to eliminate net GHG emissions by 2050 and to transition its electricity generation to renewable and carbon-free energy sources.

ON-RAMP will convene organizers of the 2023 Games, community stakeholders, New York State and Quebec government policymakers, financial Canadian equipment institutions. manufacturers and energy producers and others with the goal of ensuring a low-carbon transportation system for the Games and beyond. Participants will work together to begin developing an EV implementation roadmap for the region, informed by the goals of the CLCPA and other state programs.

Two community needs sessions, led by a team from Clarkson University's Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering and Institute for a Sustainable Environment, will focus on specific transportation challenges North Country communities face and the solutions they envision. These sessions are free, open to the public and will take place virtually on Tuesday, Sept. 29 from 6 - 8 p.m. and Friday, Oct. 2 from noon - 1 p.m. Individuals who would like to attend the public sessions and are not attending ON-RAMP may register separately with a link provided on the ON-RAMP registration page at www.adirondack.org/onramp.

# Keep Mohawk Valley Beautiful is asking the community to become a "QuaranTeam"

With approximately a month and a half remaining, Keep Mohawk Valley Beautiful (KMVB), a six-county NYS affiliate of the national Keep America Beautiful (KAB) program, is asking the community to stay near home and do a "QuaranTeam" Cleanup before the end of our scheduled effort that ends Oct. 18. KMVB is a standing committee of the Mohawk Valley Economic Development District Inc.

This year marks KMVB's 19th annual Great American Cleanup Effort where community volunteers come together to aesthetically improve our environment by creating cleaner parks, streetscapes and public spaces through litter removal and elimination. While the country begins to open back up and more people are spending time outside, KMVB's "QuaranTeam" Cleanup effort is intended to keep its commitment to bringing people together to beautify our communities, even during a global pandemic.

The KMVB "QuaranTeam" Cleanup is a project for individuals and families who are quarantined together to break up their day by taking a walk outside alone or as a family to clean up litter along their property/streets and surrounding areas. "We intend to have

adults and children in the six-county Mohawk Valley region take action to work on beautifying and cleaning areas across their communities while adhering to federal, state and local public health guidelines regarding the COVID-19 pandemic," said Sam Russo, chair of KMVB Committee.

KMVB reminds volunteers participating in the "QuaranTeam" Cleanup to wear personal protection equipment such as masks and gloves when appropriate during litter cleanups.

By registering your "QuaranTeam" Cleanup project on the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority's website at www.ohswa.org, you will be entered in a prize drawing that will take place following the conclusion of the Great American Cleanup on Oct. 18. "QuaranTeam" individuals and/or groups must have registered through the ohswa.org and submit the reporting form provided upon registration to be eligible to receive prizes.

Jamie Tuttle, recycling educator of the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority and partner in the Cleanup Program, said, "While this year's cleanup effort may not involve large groups gathering together, the actions, large or small, of individuals and families who participate will help KMVB continue its mission to remove litter and beautify the region we call 'home' while inspiring generations of environmental stewards. KMVB is cleaning up, yes, but we are also changing behaviors by engaging the enthusiasm of involved young people."

# USDA announces contracts for Round 3 of the Farmers to Families Food Box Program

Following Donald Trump's approval to include up to an additional \$1 billion in the Farmers to Families Food Box Program, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced the USDA has approved up to \$1 billion in contracts to support American producers and communities in need through the USDA Farmers to Families Food Box Program. In mid-September, USDA reached a milestone of having distributed more than 90 million food boxes in support of American farmers and families affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

"These contract awards will go to vendors who submitted the strongest proposals in support of American agriculture and the American people. The high level of interest and quality of proposals are a testament that the program is accomplishing what we intended - supporting U.S. farmers and distributors and getting food to those who need it most. It's a real trifecta, which is why we call it a win-win," said Perdue. "Thanks to Presimitment to the program with the announcement of an additional \$1 billion in funding, more farmers will be supported, and more families will receive the nutritious food they need during these difficult times."





# Comfort foods made fast and healthy

### Creole shrimp gumbo

Tomatoes are at their all-time peak in late summer. Don't let this "love apple season" pass by without trying this succulent gumbo, especially created with that juicy red tomato in mind!

- 1 cup chopped onion
- 2 cups peeled and chopped fresh tomatoes
- 2 teaspoons chili seasoning
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley or 1 teaspoon dried parsley flakes
  - 1/8 teaspoon black pepper
  - 1 1/2 cups reduced-sodium tomato juice
  - 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
  - 1 (6-ounce) package frozen cleaned shrimp, thawed
  - 1 cup chopped fresh okra or frozen cut green beans
  - 1 1/2 cups cooked spaghetti, rinsed and drained
- 1. In a medium saucepan sprayed with butter-flavored cooking spray, saute onion for 5 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, chili seasoning, parsley flakes and black pepper. In a covered jar, combine tomato juice and flour. Shake well to blend.

# To your good health

### Diet is powerful tool to boost heart health

**Dear Dr. Roach:** I have a strong history of premature heart disease in my family, and I have been having some unpleasant side effects of blood pressure medicine. I decided to try a completely plant-based diet: grains, vegetables, legumes, fruit, seeds and nuts.

After about a month on the new diet, my total cholesterol dropped 44 points to 159, and the other numbers went from borderline to normal, as measured by my cardiologist. My blood pressure, which was often high in the mornings (typically 150+/90), was 118/68 this morning. I've only lost about 5 pounds in the past couple of months, and I'm probably still 8-10 pounds overweight.

I am pleased with the results, but why didn't any of my doctors recommend this? — J.S.B.

**Answer:** Diet is a powerful tool for improving overall health, especially heart health. I believe it is underemphasized by most physicians.

Changing from a meat-based diet to a mostly plantbased diet often prompts improvements in blood pressure, cholesterol and weight. Your results are better than most, but by no means unheard of. You haven't said how you feel, but many people feel more energetic as well. Many others are able to come off of some (occasionally all) of their medications, which of course reduces side effects.

Why don't physicians recommend it? I think it's a combination of reasons. Some doctors don't realize how powerful the effects of dietary change can be. A good deal of patients are highly resistant to making changes, so physicians are used to their dietary advice failing. Also, taking the time to get an accurate diet history is hard, personalizing dietary advice is harder, and writing a prescription is easy.

It is not necessary to have a 100% vegan diet like yours to experience a benefit. A mostly plant-based diet has substantial benefits. It's easier for some people to make incremental changes.

**Dear Dr. Roach:** I've been taking Viagra for several years, with good results for my wife and me. Recently my prescription drug coverage administrator has begun restricting my access to 12 pills every 30 days. I've requested an explanation from the company, without success. My prescription is written by my heart doctor, and he is not aware of any reason to restrict my access to Viagra. Is there some danger in taking Viagra (silde-

nafil) on a regular basis? The literature supplied with the prescription, from Pfizer, does not indicate a limit on use. I'd appreciate your feedback on this, as it will affect my wife's and my happiness. — J.R.

**Answer:** The insurance company isn't worried about your safety: Sildenafil (Viagra) and similar drugs are safe for daily use in most people, and your cardiologist is certainly the right person to make that determination, not your insurance company. Instead, the drug limits are there to save money for the insurance company. People can make up their own minds about whether that is reasonable or not, but it is a near-universal finding now.

One way many patients get around this (if they are taking 25 mg or 50 mg) is to get the larger-size tablet and cut it in half (a pill cutter can do this well), since the limit is on the number of tablets, not the number of milligrams.



# Fall-planted bulbs guarantee a colorful spring garden

Some types, such as daffodils and scilla, are reliably perennial. Once established, they will bloom for generations and can multiply to carpet large areas with their cheery blooms. Others, including tulips and hyacinths, are usually treated as annuals, which lets you experiment with new color combinations every year.

### Bulbs are dependable

Each type of flower bulb blooms at a particular time of year and has its own proper planting time. Spring-blooming bulbs such as tulips, daffodils, and alliums, must be planted in the fall for flowers the next spring. Choose a planting location with well-drained soil that gets at least half-day sun.

Planting can begin as early as September and can continue right through early December. For best results, get your bulbs into the ground at least 3 weeks before the soil begins to freeze. Once planted, the bulbs will quickly develop roots and then go to sleep until spring.

### **Bulbs offer lots of choices**

Spring-blooming bulbs are loved the world over for their brilliant colors and ability to tolerate chilly spring weather. The earliest bulbs, such as snowdrops and crocus start flowering just as the snow melts. Others follow in quick succession, delivering wave after wave of color, while most other plants are still waking up.

When selecting bulbs, be sure to include early, mid, and late-season bloomers. This way you will always have new flowers coming into bloom. Spring-flowering bulbs that are planted in fall include:

Pathways Academy focuses on students who have had a difficult time in a traditional school structure or have to catch up on credits but have the ability to get a high school diploma. Pathways Academy classes are project-driven and infuse career and technical education.

The quarterly Pathways Awards are part of the Pathways Academy PBIS program, which includes various aspects including students earning "BOCES Bucks" for positive behavior that they can use on reward days to purchase items or experiences. There also is normally an end of the year carnival with food and fun activities.

During the Pathways Academy Awards ceremony on March 2, before schools closed, 195 awards were given out to 118 students. Organizers are still determining how the awards are going to be handled this school year.

# **Kovels: Antiques and collecting**

### Ivory pie crimper

Old tools can be hard to identify because many are no longer used. A carved ivory leg with a little wheel at the top looks like it might be a toy or a drawing aid, but it would be odd to make a tool of ivory. This auction item, recently sold by Eldred's Auctions, is a pie crimper, probably made by a sailor to give to a girlfriend or mother. It sold for \$3,600 as an interesting, decorated piece of folk art. Those who bake pies know that the wheel is used to cut or seal decorative edges of a pie crust. But there is another bit of history that makes this antique interesting.

In the 1950s when we started writing about antiques, the identification of unfamiliar objects was based on old letters, ads, family stories and guesses. Today, most of the conclusions are considered myths. Sailors had time to carve many small ivory objects, often as gifts. Parts of the human body were considered erotic, and at various times the ankle, leg, neck, bust, buttocks, long hair or

even total nudity were featured in paintings and pictures to set a risque mood. But today the story of the ankle or the leg is considered a myth. Women usually wore boots, long stockings and long skirts for comfort and the leg was rarely visible. So, the pie crimper was a gift of love, but probably nothing more serious.

*Q:* My father owned a butcher shop and grocery store in the 1940s and '50s. I have several tins that held coffee, cookies, pretzels, lard and spices that came from the store. Are they worth anything?

A: The first tin cans were made in the early 1800s. The type of can we use today, with a crimped top and soldered side seam, was first made in 1898. Some collectors of advertising items collect tins. Some specialize in tins for a single product, like coffee, tobacco, beer or oil. Tins with modern graphics and streamlined pictures indicate that they are no older than the 1940s. Collectors want older tins and tins for products that are no longer being produced. Tins with interesting graphics usually sell for more than those with just words. Some sell for a few hundred dollars or more, but common tins sell from about \$50 to \$100.

# The Kitchen Diva

### by Angela Shelf Medearis Green tomatoes: Fruit of the vegetable patch

Every year, my small vegetable garden produces far more tomatoes than I can possibly use. As the season wanes, an abundance of green tomatoes forlornly hang on the vine looking for enough sun to turn them into red jewels. I've begun searching for unique ways to use green tomatoes as a vegetable and as a fruit in my recipes.

Scientifically, tomatoes are classified as a fruit, but since they don't contain the sweet flavor of most fruits and are typically used in savory dishes, they're legally classified as a vegetable.

Tomatoes are low in calories and a good source of vitamins C, A and K. They also are a very good source of molybdenum, potassium, manganese, dietary fiber, chromium and vitamin B-1. In addition, tomatoes contain lycopene, which has antioxidant and cancer-preventing properties.

My recipe for Green Tomato and Or-

ange Relish uses green tomatoes like a pickled vegetable. It freezes well, and makes a delicious change from traditional cranberry relish for holiday meals.

The spices and flavors of my Green Tomato Spice Cake act as a showcase for the tomato's fruit-like qualities. Whether you decide to use your abundance of green tomatoes like a vegetable or a fruit, you can't go wrong with these recipes!

### Green tomato and orange relish

- 4 medium green tomatoes
- 1 large purple or Vidalia onion
- 1 cup orange marmalade
- 2 cups dark brown sugar
- 1/2 cup apple cider vinegar
- 1/8 teaspoon red pepper flakes
- 1. Core the bottom of the green tomatoes and cut them into quarters. Peel the onion and cut it into quarters. Using a food processor, pulse the green tomato and onion 8 to 10 times, until the pieces become small ("pickle-relish" size). Do not puree.

- 2. Using a 4-quart, heavy-bottomed pot, put in all the ingredients at once. Cook over low heat for 15 minutes, stirring until blended and the sugar begins to dissolve.
- 3. Turn the heat to medium and cook for 30 to 40 minutes, stirring occasionally. The relish should be syrupy and slightly thick. If it does not seem to have thickened enough, cook the relish 10 minutes more.
- 4. Cool for 2 hours, and then put the relish in an air-tight container and refrigerate it. The relish can be refrigerated for two weeks. You also can place the cooled relish into plastic zip-lock storage bags and freeze for up to 6 months. Makes 5 cups of relish.

### Green tomato spice cake


- 1 box spice cake mix
- 1 1/4 cups water
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 3 eggs

- 2 tablespoons light brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup pecans or walnuts, chopped
- 1 cup raisins (or dried cranberries, craisins or currants)
  - 1 1/2 cups diced green tomatoes
- 1 large, peeled and diced, Granny Smith apple (about 3/4 to 1 cup)
- 3/4 cup powdered sugar
- 1 cup sweetened coconut, toasted, optional
  - Whipped cream, optional
  - 1. Heat oven to 350 F.
- 2. In mixing bowl, lightly beat the water, vegetable oil, eggs and brown sugar until combined, about 2 minutes. Stir in the spice cake mix and flour, and mix until smooth. Stir in the vanilla, pecans or walnuts, raisins, to-

matoes and apples. Blend well.

3. Spoon the batter into a greased and floured 9-by-13-inch baking pan. Bake for 45 to 55 minutes, or until a wooden pick or cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Loosen the cake from the sides of the pan with a knife or spatula. Cool for 30 minutes.

4. Using a fine-mesh strainer or a sifter, sprinkle the top with powdered sugar. When serving, top each slice with a tablespoon of coconut and/or whipped cream, if desired.



# What's the Medicare Open Enrollment Period?

Medicare health and drug plans can make changes each year - things like cost, coverage, and what providers and pharmacies are in their networks. October 15 to December 7 is when all people with Medicare can change their Medicare health plans and prescription drug coverage for the following vear to better meet their needs

### How do people know if they need to change plans?

People in a Medicare health or prescription drug plan should always review the materials their plans send them, like the "Evidence of Coverage" (EOC) and the "Annual Notice of Change" (ANOC). If they're satisfied that their current plans will meet their needs for next year and it's still being offered, they don't need to do anything.


