# Poland senior Stein receives rare national recognition

Poland Central School District senior Shayne Stein recently received a Letter of Commendation from the National Merit Scholarship Program - the first time school officials recall a Poland student earning this

The letter states that Stein's performance on the October 2019 PSAT/NMSQT placed him in the top 50,000 out of more than 1.5 million students who took the test nationwide.

"It's pretty cool," Stein said, of receiving the letter, "and it was kind of surprising too."

Stein, 18, said he thought he did pretty well on the test overall - particularly in mathematics, but he wasn't as sure about the reading part. He ended up with a near perfect score in math and a strong overall score.

Poland Central School District provides the PSAT and SAT at the school each year. The PSAT for Poland juniors was on Oct. 29 this year, and the SAT at Poland is scheduled for March 24, 2021.

Poland Principal Greg Cuthbertson said he was proud of Stein for being named a commended student. "This is the first one in my tenure anyway, and it's pretty exciting," Cuthbertson said. "It's a tribute to him though. He's put a lot of work in, so this is a tribute to him and the work he has put in academically."

#### Broaden your horizons

Stein heard about his achievement when Poland Director of Guidance Janice Watrous, a counselor for middle school and high school, called him down to her office to let him know. That evening, Stein told his mother.

"She was very excited," Stein said, noting she also said she was proud of him and that it would be good for college opportunities.

Stein was one of 34,000 students nationwide to receive Letters of Commendation. Those students will not continue in the competition for National Merit Scholarships with the top 16,000 students, but some of these students may be candidates for special scholarships provided by corporate and business sponsors, according to the National Merit Scholarship Program.

The letter to Stein states that his recognition as a commended student is a credit to him, his family and his high school.

"The degree of success you achieve in the future will depend upon you - your use of abilities and your perseverance toward the goals you set for yourself," the letter states. "We offer you our best wishes with the hope that being named a commended student in the National Merit Program will broaden your horizons and encourage you to develop your potential to the fullest."

Watrous said she is very proud of Stein and what he has accomplished. "He is an extremely bright and well-read young man," Watrous said. "His mind is particularly impressive in the way in which he absorbs and processes information, how he comprehends at a deeper level and makes connections. In my getting to work with Shayne as his counselor for the last six years, it is simply amazing to see how he sees the relationships in a problem and how strong his problem-solving skills are, as well as his analytical and reasoning skills.

Watrous said earning the commended student recognition was a student accomplishment, and Stein has always taken an active, leading role in his education. He is open to new ideas and learning opportunities and is very inquisitive.

"He is always looking to find the meaning, the why,

the how and if there is a better way," Watrous said.

#### What happens next

Stein said one factor in why he did well on the PSAT was probably that he was studying similar topics in math at the time of the test. Tests also have always come easy to him, so that helped, he said, but he humbly added again that the results were "a bit surprising."

"I'm just excited to see what happens next," he said. Stein participates in cross country, outdoor track and wrestling at Poland. He has an interest in traveling, and in his spare time, he studies various foreign languages.

After graduating, Stein plans to attend college - possibly on the West Coast or in a different country - to study building trades and construction management. His goal is to own a company that purchases houses, conducts upgrades to the houses and flips them for a

In line with his goals, Stein recently applied and was accepted into the Mohawk Valley Community College Young Entrepreneurs Academy for this school year. He filled out an application and a letter of reference and was accepted in early October.

The Young Entrepreneurs Academy meets once per week for three hours after school, now through May 2021. The meetings take place virtually during part of December and January and will be in-person at MVCC facilities before and after that.

In the program, Stein will learn about creating a business plan, startup costs, running a business and more. There also is an opportunity to earn funding from a board of investors.

Stein said he was interested in the program because it connects to his career goal, and it's a chance to learn business skills he doesn't have yet.

"I think it will be really helpful to learn more of those skills," he said.

#### **Testing sub**

Poland has offered the PSAT to sophomores and juniors every October for the 20 years Watrous has been at Poland. In the last few years, Poland added opportunities for ninth graders and 10th graders to take a practice test in the spring. COVID-19  $\bar{\text{i}}\text{mpacted}$  that last year, and the spring of 2021 is uncertain right now.

All juniors had the chance to take the PSAT on Oct. 29 this year, along with the SAT scheduled for March 24. A plan for sophomores is still in development.

# DMV urges motorists to prepare for winter driving conditions

The New York State DMV and the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee (GTSC) offer tips to help New Yorkers winterize their vehicles and prepare to drive in more challenging weather conditions. Drivers are also reminded that they can now install snow tires on their vehicles. Under state law, snow tires can be used from Oct. 16 - April 30.

"We cannot control the weather, but we can control how prepared we are to drive in winter conditions," said Mark J.F. Schroeder, DMV commissioner and GTSC chair. "Following a few simple tips like driving slow, making sure your lights are clear and not covered with ice or snow and having ample windshield washer fluid, for example, will help keep you and others safe on the roads."

- Do not drive during ice or snowstorms unless it is necessary.
- When sleet, freezing rain or snow begin to fall, remember that bridges, ramps and overpasses will freeze first. Be aware that slippery spots may remain after snow is removed.

# The National Highway Safety Administration also offers winter driving tips and suggests keeping these supplies in the vehicle:

- · Snow shovel, broom and ice scraper
- Abrasive material such as sand or kitty litter, in case the vehicle gets stuck in the snow
- Jumper cables, flashlight and warning devices such as flares and emergency markers

24 hours per day by calling 511 or visiting 511NY.org. The service provides real-time traffic conditions and links to information about air, rail and transit services.

The 511NY website features a winter travel advisory system, with real-time travel reports and a color-coded map indicating which state roads are snow covered, ice covered, wet, dry or closed to help drivers determine if travel is advisable. The system provides updated snow and ice conditions for interstates and other heavily traveled roads, as reported by snowplow operators.

## Before driving, GTSC recommends these tips:

- Check tire tread
- Fill the gas tank
- Clear/clean all lights and windows
- Fill the windshield washer reservoir
- $\bullet$  Remove all snow and ice including on top of the vehicle
- Ensure the vehicle's heater and defroster are working properly
- Make sure the recommended amount of antifreeze is in the radiator
- Get familiar with a new vehicle before driving in harsh weather conditions

## When ready to drive, follow these tips:

- ullet Warm up the car so the defroster clears the windows.
- Turn on headlights whenever windshield wipers are on. State law makes this mandatory.
- Do not exceed the speed limit and always adjust speed to the road conditions.
  - Leave plenty of room between vehicles.
- Don't try to pass or weave in and out of traffic. All drivers must be prepared to react if other drivers start

- Blankets
- A cell phone with charger, water, food and any necessary medicine (for longer trips or when driving in lightly populated areas)

Motorists are urged to check 511NY before traveling. The free travel information system is accessible

# Compost for Good initiative receives \$20K grant Project will advance community-scale composting in NYS

A local composting initiative has received \$20,000 in grant funding that will advance its goal to provide technical assistance for organizations, municipalities and other institutions interested in designing and implementing composting programs in their communities.

The Adirondack North Country Association (ANCA), a regional economic development organization based in Saranac Lake, and the Compost for Good (CfG) initiative

are recipients of a NYS Pollution Prevention Institute (NYSP2I) Community Grant. The funds will be used to develop a detailed online toolkit that will inform users about technical and economic aspects of building and large-scale operating composting systems, as well as relevant education and policy materials. AdkAction, a nonprofit that focuses on environmental and social issues in the Adirondacks, will provide administrative support for the project.

initiative will offer key educational resources and assistance as an important extension of the good work of ANCA and AdkAction in this area." said NYSP2I Director Charles Ruffing. "NYS-P2I is pleased to support these efforts to decrease food wastes and increase beneficial use of these organic materials."


NYSP2I, which works with NYS businesses, nonprofits and communities on issues of sustainability, is sponsored

"The Compost for Good by the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation through the **Environmental Protection** Fund and led by Rochester Institute of Technology's Golisano Institute for Sustainability.

In 2014, ANCA was awarded a Cleaner Greener Communities grant from the NYS Energy and Research Development Authority (NYSERDA). The funding included support for the construction of an in-vessel community-scale composter, which has been successfully operating at North Country School Camp Treetops (NCS/CTT) for almost five years. John Culpepper, NCS/CTT director of facilities and sustainability, conceived of and designed the system. To date, it has been replicated in four additional locations - Lake Placid Central School, Hermon Dekalb Central School, the Wild Center in Tupper Lake and the Pingry School in New Jersey.

Interest in the in-vessel composter and composting in general was so strong that Culpepper opted to form an initiative with educator Katie Culpepper and ANCA Sustainability Project Coordinator Jennifer Perry to meet the growing demand for technical assistance

to create composting programs for others.

"We are so appreciative of the institute's support for our community composting and education efforts," said John Culpepper, CfG's project lead. "We are passionate about helping others create a high value resource from food waste which benefits both communities and

our environment."

The newly formed CfG initiative entered into a partnership earlier this year with AdkAction, which will help expand the program's reach and impact in the region. The NYSP2I grant is critical to advancing the team's efforts to identify the most

effective path forward for increasing rates of composting across NYS and beyond.

AdkAction Executive Director Brittany Christianson said, "We are thrilled to bring the Compost for Good Project under Adk Action's umbrella and help John, Katie and Jen realize their vision to spark a composting revolution in the Adirondacks."

The toolkit will include educational materials and videos, an online calculator to determine the most affordable composting path feasible, grant resources, legislative updates, access to a design and operating manual and access to contractors. CfG staff will also be available for one-one-one consultations through tours, in-person visits or phone conversations. The toolkit will be especially helpful for organizations and municipalities to prepare for the upcoming "Food Donation and Food Scraps Recycling Law" which will require all larger-scale food waste producers to keep food waste out of landfills and thereby reduce the production of methane, a powerful greenhouse gas.

The group will begin working on the project this autumn.

"ANCA is thrilled to continue to support this project," said Perry, who serves as the project's grant manager. "It has been inspiring to watch the momentum and interest grow from the construction of the first composter six years ago."



Stir in apple; cover and cook 5 minutes or until cabbage is very tender.
- 2. Meanwhile, in covered 12-inch nonstick skillet, heat remaining 1 tablespoon oil with 1/2 cup water to simmering on medium. Add frozen pierogies; cover and cook 5 minutes. Uncover and cook 10 to 12 minutes longer or until pierogies are heated through and pale golden on both sides. 3. Serve pierogies on cabbage mixture, sprinkled with freshly ground black pepper. Yields 4 main-dish servings

even try to escape. I last took them to the vet about three years ago. A friend said I'm supposed to take them every year and get their rabies shot, but I don't see the point. If they never get out, how could they get exposed? Also, vaccinations are expensive. — Terry H., Buffalo, New York

**Dear Terry:** I know it can be tough pulling together the funds to vaccinate your pets every year, but it really is critically important that they stay up to date on their shots.

In addition to rabies vaccination — which is required by law in most municipalities — your cats need to be vaccinated against feline distemper — a group of three viruses that are easily spread (they can even be tracked into the house on your shoes) and can cause severe illness and death in cats. 



# Five ways to make a difference in a senior's life

(BPT) – Did you know that by 2040, 20% of Americans will be 65 and older? As the population of older adults increases, it's crucial to recognize and celebrate the rich depth of experience, talents and unique perspectives of such a large segment of the country. Yet, all too often, older people are overlooked and undervalued.

Eve Gelb, senior vice president of member and community health for SCAN Health Plan, which provides Medicare Advantage coverage to more than 200,000 older Americans, describes ways to "shine a light" on older people in a TEDx talk from February 2020. Her advice for connecting meaningfully with seniors is even more vital in the pandemic landscape, when so many have become isolated from friends and family.

Gelb stresses the importance of empathy – the ability to imagine what someone else's experience is like. She says empathy is crucial for understanding and shining a light on people who might otherwise become withdrawn and disconnected from their communities. To show empathy, Gelb says you need to engage with and be curious about people, listen to them deeply and appreciate their value.

"When people aren't actively engaged, they decline, and they decline faster," says Gelb. "Human interaction has been shown to slow the aging process."

# How to connect with seniors in your community

Gelb recommends what she calls "micro-volunteering." Similar to other kinds of volunteering, micro-volunteering offers the opportunity to brighten someone else's life – and reap the rewards of feeling good by knowing you made someone else feel good.

However, unlike regular volunteering, micro-volunteering does not demand a huge time commitment or a major change to your lifestyle. It simply means finding small ways throughout your daily life to shine a little light on someone who could benefit from the help, the empathy and the attention – even for just a short time – to feel more included in the world around them.

Here are simple ways you can micro-volunteer to make a difference in a senior's life:

#### 1. Call every week

Make it a regular habit to call your older friend, neighbor or family member each week, so they have a friendly conversation to look forward to. Ask them about their life, and tell them stories about yours. Gelb

says this is an activity SCAN encourages by offering employees paid time off to volunteer.

#### 2. Offer to pick something up

Offering to get some groceries or a prescription for an older person can make their lives a lot easier. Don't

wait to be asked for help, as someone living alone may be reluctant to reach out. Just call and say, "I'm heading out to the store – can I pick something up for you?"

# 3. Help them stay safe

Make sure any vulnerable person you know has face masks, hand sanitizer and the ability to order or ask for what they need. Mask up and offer to help them sanitize their doorknobs and phone after you drop by with a delivery. Help them use video conferencing to communicate with family members or friends.

# 4. Find ways to keep them engaged

Drop by with a care package containing things they might like to do: a jigsaw puzzle, a deck of cards, large print books or crosswords. If you're a good cook or have a green thumb, bring them a sample of your latest dish, offer to

help with yard work, or bring them a plant that's easy to care for – and that gives you a reason to stop by to check on them next time

# 5. Be their tech support

To communicate with the outside world, older people may have to rely on smartphones, computers or tablets that can sometimes be complicated or confusing to use. Teach them how to use apps like Zoom, set up a charging station for their phone or tablet, reboot devices so they run better - or just ask if they're having any problems accessing their email or using their phone.

## by Angela Shelf Medearis Toast pumpkin seeds for nutritious treat

Pumpkins are one of the highpoints of the fall harvest. The fruit originated in Central America. Pumpkins — like cantaloupes, cucumbers and squash — belong to the Cucurbitaceae, or gourd family. Most of the pumpkins that are grown in the United States come from Illinois and become available in October.

Whole pumpkins and the carved pumpkin shell are often used as decorative items. The interior pulp is a nutritious addition to savory and sweet dishes, but don't throw out the seeds! Pumpkin seeds make a tasty snack that's low in calories, high in protein and rich in fiber, as well as vitamins B, E and K, and zinc, iron and magnesium. Pumpkin seeds also contain many beneficial fatty acids and amino acids.

The flat, dark-green pumpkin seeds, or pepitas as they are often called, are covered with a yellow-white husk. Pepitas are a key ingredient in Mexican recipes and are often used in the cuisines of many other cultures.

Toasted pumpkin seeds add a nutritious crunch when used as a topping for sauteed vegetables or salads. Grinding pumpkin seeds with garlic, parsley or cilantro and adding olive oil and lemon juice to the mixture makes a wonderful salad dressing. Pumpkin seeds are also a delicious addition to oatmeal-raisin cookies or granola recipes.

Pumpkins seeds are a power-packed addition to sauces, soups and salads, and they're a healthy snack. Roasting and adding spices enhances their flavor. This recipe provides a few suggestions for preparing pumpkin



# Toasted Pumpkin Seeds

- 1 pumpkin (field or sugar), about 2 cups
- 2 tablespoons vegetaole oil
- 2 tablespoons salt, plus more for sprinkling Cooking oil spray
- 1. Cut a fresh, ripe pumpkin in half. Remove the membrane and seeds, and as much pulp as possible. Separate out seeds

(leaving some of the pulp on adds to the flavor).

- 2. Do not rinse the seeds, as they will steam instead of toasting. Pick through the seeds and remove any that are split. Do not place the seeds on a paper towel, as seeds will stick to the paper. Instead, place seeds on a sheet of waxed or parchment paper, or on lightly oiled aluminum foil. Heat oven to 300 F.
- 3. For Spicy Pumpkin Seeds, mix 1/2 teaspoon each of garlic powder, onion powder, salt, cumin,

sugar and coriander and 1/4 teaspoon of cayenne pepper with the seeds before toasting.

- 4. For Sweet Pumpkin Seeds, mix 3 tablespoons of dark brown sugar and 1/4 teaspoon of salt with the seeds before toasting.
- 5. Spread the vegetable oil on a shallow pan. Sprinkle seeds over oil in single layer. Bake 10 minutes, stir and spray with the cooking oil spray. Bake for another 10 to 15 minutes, stir and spray with the cooking oil spray. Bake for an additional 10

to 15 minutes as needed or until lightly browned, being careful not to burn them.

6. Remove from the oven and sprinkle with salt. The seeds will become crisper as they cool. Shell the seeds, or for more fiber, eat them whole. Store in an airtight container.



DEAR PAW'S CORNER: My two cats, "Sandy" and "Frankie," are cats, "Sandy" and "Frankie," are indoor cats who never go out and never even try to escape. 



#### **Tavern Table**

Although antique dealers tell us early 1900s oak furniture doesn't sell — average Chippendale pieces are not wanted and fancy French designs of the past are out of style - some average examples and even good copies can be useful and a good investment.

In 1899, Wallace Nutting started photographing, hand-coloring and selling scenes that had a "Colonial" look. He bought and borrowed the furniture and accessories, and sold thousands of the pictures. There were some historic flaws in the pictures, like hooked rugs in front of the fireplace in an early 1700s scene. Eventually, he started to make and sell accurate copies of his furniture. Today, there are collectors of Wallace Nutting furniture as well as the photographs.

In the 1920s, Peter Hunt decided to paint early wooden furniture with the colorful peasant designs he developed. It became popular as a style, and today, Peter Hunt furniture sells for more than the type of furniture he repainted. Costume jewelry also was made to look like expensive gold and gem-set originals. Nowadays, the best of signed costume jewelry can sell for thousands of dollars. A Wallace Nutting tavern table made in the early 20th century as a copy of an 18th-century table sold at a Garth's auction for \$469.

Q: We have the first two albums recorded by the Beatles in excellent condition. What is their value and how would we go about selling them?

A: These albums sell at auctions for over \$1,000. Their value depends on rarity and condition. The first Beatles album released in the United States was "Introducing the Beatles," by Vee-Jay Records on Jan. 10, 1964. Capitol Records released its first Beatles album, "Meet The Beatles," on Jan. 20, 1964. It released "The Beatles' Second Album" on April 10, 1964.

"Introducing the Beatles" was made with three different backs. The backs of the first covers were blank because the album was rushed into production to get it out before anyone else. Later back covers had ads or titles in columns. Recent prices for the album range from \$1,250 to \$5,250. The highest price was for a very rare "column back" stereo version of the album in original Sears sleeve. It sold for \$52,500. "The Beatles' Second Album" sold for \$2,000-\$5,750. "Meet the Beatles" sold for \$275.



The Mayo Clinic notes that the medical term for hair loss is alopecia. It can affect the scalp or the entire body. Hair loss may be permanent or temporary as well. It's normal to lose up to 100 hairs per day, though many men and women shed more than that. Certain things can contribute to hair loss. Here's a look at some of the more common causes.

#### Hormonal changes

Hormone fluctuations can contribute to hair loss. During or after pregnancy is a common time for women to experience hair loss. For men, this is a receding hairline and bald spots, while thin-

ning hair along the crown of the scalp affects women

# Illness

WebMD indicates that hair loss can be a sign of disease or a byproduct of certain treatments. Thyroid diseases, anemia, ringworm, high fevers, chronic stress, radiation and chemotherapy, and diabetes can contribute to hair loss.

#### Hair styling

Being rough on hair while washing and brushing, or overstyling it with chemical or heated devices, can lead to hair loss, too.

Once individuals determine what's behind their hair loss, they can then take steps to alleviate the problem. Medications or supplements can be adjusted, greater care can be used when styling the hair and illnesses can be treated. Those with genetic hair loss can speak with a dermatologist about the array of topical or surgical hair replacement solutions available.





# Answering common questions about handwashing

# Should I use warm or cold water?

According to the CDC, when combined with soap, water removes the same amount of germs whether it's warm or cold. Water's role in handwashing is to help create a lather, and lathers can be created with hot or
