2021 Utica Zoo calendars now available for purchase



Herkimer County Public Health issues warning about increase of COVID-19 cases

Herkimer County is currently experiencing a large and quickly increasing number of positive COVID-19 cases. Public Health is overwhelmed and is having difficulty keeping up with the large volume of cases despite best efforts, and has started to prioritize case investigation/follow-up according to CDC guidance. Therefore, not everyone with a positive result, or contacts of a positive individual, will be contacted so please follow the below procedure:

1. If you have received a positive test result:

• isolate yourself from family, friends, and/or roommates for 10 days from the date of your test or follow

Public Health's instructions.

• notify your contacts that they should **quarantine and monitor** themselves for symptoms for 14 days from the date they last were in contact with the positive case.

2. If you are awaiting test results:

• isolate yourself until you receive your results. If you receive a positive result, follow instructions above. If negative, continue to wear a mask, stay socially distanced, and wash your hands.

Due to the large volume of cases, Public Health is unable to contact everyone. Therefore, please do the right thing and isolate when you are sick or awaiting test results, and quarantine if you are a contact of someone who is COVID positive or are positive yourself.

Symptoms of COVID-19 include fever or chills, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle or body aches, headache, loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or a runny nose, nausea, vomiting, and/or diarrhea.

If you are awaiting a COVID-19 test result or have a positive test and need to seek medical attention, please notify the healthcare facility of your test results prior to just going. If you are a contact of a positive case and develop symptoms, contact your primary care provider for further guidance on testing. If you are a high-risk individual, contact your doctor even if symptoms are mild. Testing sites can also be located by going to coronavirus.health.ny.gov/findtest-site-near-you

Please remember that many individuals exhibit no symptoms. However, they are still highly capable of spreading the virus. Individuals who practice social distancing, wear a mask, don't touch their face and wash their hands are scientifically proven to be less likely to contract COVID-19.

Remember, please contact your primary care provider for further guidance. Herkimer County Public Health is handling a high volume of calls at this time and may not be able to return your call as quickly as desired.







support, and grants like these help us do exactly that.'



Herkimer College announces cancellation of high-risk winter sports

After careful thought, consideration, and dialogue, 27 of the 30 SUNY Community Colleges that are members of the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) have collectively decided to cancel intercollegiate competition for 2020-2021 indoor sports that are considered "high risk" for COVID-19 exposure and spread of infection.

These sports include basketball, cheerleading, dance, volleyball, and wrestling. Campuses will have the option to hold on-campus workouts and training with student-athletes in a structured and monitored environment.

At Herkimer College, this decision affects the men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball, and the dance/cheer teams. The low-to-moderate indoor sports, including bowling and swimming & diving, may compete in a virtual setting and must adhere to COVID-19 protocols.

"NJCAA SUNY Community Colleges will continue planning for what we hope will be the safe resumption of intercollegiate athletics in Spring 2021," said Donald Dutcher, who serves as the men's director of Region III, as well as dean of students/director of athletics at Herkimer College.

An official announcement on the status of spring sports, as well as Fall 2020 sports that have been rescheduled for Spring 2021, will be made in January. Detailed sport-specific guidelines and protocols are currently in development, and Return to Play and Return to Competition plans will be informed by nationally recognized sport-specific agencies, along with NYS, CDC, DOH and governing athletic associations.



"NJCAA SUNY Community College decisions will continue to be guided by best practice and cautious adherence to health and safety protocols that will safeguard the well-being of our student-athletes, staff, campuses, and communities," Dutcher said. "We are committed to ongoing collaborative efforts to develop cohesive safety plans to implement on our campuses in support of our student-athletes."

Put a zesty spin on weeknight meals

Avocado Ranch Sauce:

- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 1 tablespoon well-shaken buttermilk
- 1/2 teaspoon Hidden Valley Ranch Seasoning
- kosher salt
- freshly ground black pepper
- 3 green onions, thinly sliced

2 avocados, peeled, pitted and diced

- **Ranch Spice Crusted Burger:**
- 1 1/2 teaspoons Hidden Valley Ranch Seasoning 1 teaspoon paprika
- kosher salt

freshly ground pepper

- 1 1/2 pounds ground chuck (80% lean) 2 tablespoons canola oil



8 slices American cheese 1/4 cup water

4 brioche buns, split in half

Avocado Ranch Sauce

To make avocado ranch sauce: In bowl, whisk mayonnaise, sour cream, buttermilk, ranch seasoning, salt and pepper until smooth. Fold in green onions and diced avocados; set aside.

To make burgers: In small bowl, whisk ranch seasoning, paprika, salt and pepper.

Heat large cast-iron pan or griddle over high heat. Divide meat into four 6-ounce patties and make deep depression in centers with thumb. Season each with spice rub on one side.

Add canola oil to pan and heat until shimmering. Place on burgers in pan, spice side down, and cook until golden brown and lightly charred, 4 minutes. Turn burgers over and cook 4 minutes, or until they reach desired doneness.

Top each burger with two slices cheese. Add water to pan and cover tightly with lid 10 seconds, or until the cheese is melted.

Place burgers on bottom buns and top each with avocado ranch sauce and top buns.

To make tomato salsa: In medium bowl, combine tomatoes, red onion, jalapeno, lime juice, olive oil and basil; season with salt and pepper. Refrigerate until ready to use.

To make quesadillas: Preheat oven to 450 F.

In large saute pan over medium-high heat, heat oil. Add mushrooms and season with 1 1/2 teaspoons ranch seasoning. Cook until mushrooms are golden brown and liquid has evaporated. Set aside to cool.

Place tortillas next to each other on baking sheet. Sprinkle thin layer of cheese on eight tortillas. Add cooled mushrooms to four tortillas and shredded chicken to other four tortillas. Season each layer with salt and pepper. Stack tortillas to create four, two-layer quesadillas. Cover each with remaining tortillas; brush top tortillas lightly with canola oil and sprinkle with remaining ranch seasoning.

Bake 6-8 minutes until cheese is melted and tortillas turn lightly golden brown with crispy edges.

Cut each quesadilla into four pieces. Garnish each slice with dollop of sour cream. Add dollop of tomato salsa on top of sour cream and garnish with basil. #15480





Watch holder

There has always been a need to tell time, and early methods — sundials, hourglasses, water clocks or even large arrangements of stones and shadows were not accurate. The first mechanical clocks were invented in the 14th century, the pendulum clock in 1656, and by the 1700s there were many clocks in church towers that rang bells to tell citizens the time. The small watch that could be carried by a person was developed after 1810. Then came pocket watches worn on a chain, and in 1868 the wristwatch was made. But there was still no affordable clock for home use.

An unknown person made the first watch holder in the early 1800s. The holder was a small decorative stand that held an available pocket watch on a table. They were made of ceramics, metal, wood — anything that could be shaped into a stand with a large hole. Some were even made by famous artists and jewelers of bronze or gold, or by a company that made ceramic dishes or statues. Most were not signed.

The watch holder is often a "whatsit." The hole in the middle is confusing to a 21st century person who tells time with a wristwatch or cellphone. A Neal Auction in New Orleans sold an early 19th century watch holder of gilt bronze. It is shaped like a harp held by swans on a pedestal base. When the watch is inserted in the hole near the top, it creates a decorative "clock." It sold for \$875.

G: We have an iron doorstop from my grandfather's house. It has five black and white puppies hanging on a log fence and is 8 inches high and 12 inches wide. We'd like to sell it, but don't know what it's worth. Can you help?

A: Cast iron doorstops were made beginning about

1890. They became popular around 1910 when several companies in the United States began making figural doorstops. Vintage figural cast iron doorstops made from 1890 to the 1930s, and in good condition, usually sell for the highest prices. New designs and reproductions of old doorstops sold in gift shops, home decorating stores and online are worth less. The doorstop you describe was made in China and is not old. It sells online for \$30 to \$60.







Here's how to reduce risk of heart disease

Dear Dr. Roach: I'm a 70-year-old female who had a stress test, echocardiogram and carotid study. I passed all tests. My cholesterol is 173, with my HDL 56, LDL 95.6 and triglycerides 108. My blood pressure is 110/64. The cardiologist put me on 5 mg of Crestor. He feels this will help my numbers. He also has me taking CoQ10 and vitamin D3 in case my legs start aching from the Crestor. I've been taking everything now for two weeks, and my legs are starting to ache. Is it really necessary to stay on Crestor? — J.S.

Answer: I put all your numbers into the standard

risk calculator at www.cvriskcalculator.com, and your risk for heart disease or stroke in the next 10 years is 6.8%. That is in a range where medication therapy is not usually recommended.

Of course, I can't tell you to stop taking the medication your doctor has recommended. He may know something about you that I don't. It's possible you have a less-common risk factor your cardiologist may not have told you about.

Some people with very good cholesterol and blood pressure numbers have high levels of C-reactive protein, for example, which confers an increased risk for heart disease. That's true even in people with desirable cholesterol levels, and people in that situation would clearly benefit from taking Crestor or a similar medicine. All of these medicines have the risk of muscle aches, although the risk of serious muscle damage is very small.

Nearly everyone can reduce their heart disease risk



by having a diet with very little meat but high in vegetables, legumes and nuts, along with whole grains and fruits. Regular moderate exercise is as important as diet. Keeping stress levels low, having good close relationships and sleeping 7-8 hours daily are underappreciated beneficial factors to reduce heart risk as well.

Dear Dr. Roach: I am 76, female, healthy, do not take any meds and am scheduled for a total knee replacement. During the testing, they made an incidental discovery on the CT scan of "a possible right sided right Hutch diverticulum of the bladder" and "two prominent right external iliac lymph nodes, measuring up to 15 and 13 mm in short axis."

My surgical team did not respond, and my internist says "do not worry," with no explanation. I would greatly appreciate your opinion. — L.M.

Answer: A Hutch diverticulum is a congenital condition, a small pouch in the wall of the bladder. They are seldom diagnosed in adults. They can be associated with infection and stones, but if you have had no problem with either of those conditions, I would certainly advise against doing anything about it.

The external iliac lymph nodes are structures in the hip, and like all lymph nodes, may enlarge in the presence of infection or inflammation. Yours are definitely enlarged, with less than 8-10 mm considered normal. Although we worry about enlarged lymph nodes as a symptom or sign of cancer, it's thought to be cancer only about 1% of the time. After you recover from surgery, it may be worth taking another look to see if they have shrunk. If they are persistently enlarged, especially if they are growing, some physicians would recommend a biopsy to be sure it is nothing to worry about.
