## **Consumer alert: NYS Division of Consumer Protection** reminds consumers of NYS refund policy protections

The Division of Consumer Protection recently reminded consumers that New York State law covers refunds. NY General Business Law §218-a requires stores to clearly post their refund policies. When no refund policy is posted, consumers will have 30 days from the purchase date to receive a full refund or a credit (at the consumer's option), with receipt or any other confirmation given to show that 30 days has not elapsed and as long as the merchandise has not been used or damaged.

gift givers and receivers often change their minds," said New York Secretary of State Rossana Rosado. who oversees the Division of Consumer Protection. "It is important New Yorkers understand businesses are required to post their policies and let their customers know their refund options. Whether shopping online or in person this holiday season, I encourage all New Yorkers to check a store's refund policy to be sure you are comfortable with the terms."

A store's refund sign

must include the following information (at a minimum):

- (a) Whether the store gives refunds and under what circumstances, including:
- merchandise on which had been advertised as "sale" merchandise or marked "as is":
- on merchandise without a proof of purchase;
- at any time or not beyond a point in time spec-
- in cash, or as credit or store credit only; or
- subject to any fees, including a restocking fee, and the dollar or per-

centage amount of each ease of returns. fee: and

(b) Consumers are entitled to a written copy of the store's refund policy upon request.

Be an informed consumer and follow these savvy holiday shopping tips:

- Ask for a copy of the refund policy.
- Ask if the store imposes a restocking fee for returned merchandise.
- Ask if the merchandise has to be in a certain condition for the return to be accepted.
- Save all receipts for purchases to allow for

- Ask for details about the advertised rebate.
- Does the store offer rain checks? If yes, find out the terms and when it expires.
- How does the store notify the customer when the product is available?

Consumers having trouble obtaining a store refund are encouraged to file a complaint with the New York State Division of Consumer Protection.

The Division of Consumer Protection provides voluntary mediation, between the consumer and business, when the con-

sumer has been unsuccessful at reaching a resolution on their own. The Consumer Assistance Helpline 1.800.697.1220 is available Monday to Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., excluding State Holidays, and consumer complaints can be filed at any time at www. dos.ny.gov/consumerprotection. ## Poland transitions to new transportation supervisor

After 10 years' service as Poland Central School District transportation supervisor, Jeff DeLucia has shifted into retirement, and new Transportation Supervisor Eric Taylor has taken the wheel.

Whether it's DeLucia reflecting on his more than 30-year career at Poland Central School District as bus driver and transportation supervisor or Taylor looking ahead to the future of the department, safely getting students to and from school is their predominant goal.

DeLucia worked his last day as transportation supervisor on Monday, Nov. 30, which was also Taylor's first day with the district. Although DeLucia is officially retired, Poland Superintendent Laura Dutton said that DeLucia was offered the opportunity to receive some per diem days to support Taylor's transition. DeLucia also has been appointed as a substitute bus driver on days he's available.

DeLucia said he considers keeping students safe to be the most important focus during his time as supervisor.

"The safety of the students was always my biggest concern," he said. "If all the kids got home safe at the end of the day, then everything else was just minor"

## Prepared, productive, proud

DeLucia started at Poland in October 1990 as a school bus driver and never would have anticipated becoming the transportation supervisor.

When he first started, DeLucia recalls, "I didn't think I'd be here five years."

He went on to spend about 20 years as a bus driver – including a BOCES bus run and special education bus run – before applying for and becoming the transportation supervisor in 2010.

A couple of the accomplishments he is proud of are working with district leadership to get a bigger "drivers' room" for Transportation Department meetings and training and standardizing the school bus fleet with IC buses to make parts and repair functions more efficient.

Most of all, he thinks about students arriving at school and back at home safely each day and times such as snowstorms when his biggest worries were about students being transported safely and all drivers getting back at the end of the day.

"I'm really proud of all the transportation staff," DeLucia said. "They do the job very well. Most people don't know all they do."

## **Experience and Poland connections**

Taylor has worked in transportation for more than 20 years, with a full 19 years at Birnie Bus Service, where he held multiple positions including terminal manager, area general manager, regional manager and vice president of operations.

"Most importantly, I was a school bus driver," he said. These years as bus driver were Taylor's first experiences with school transportation. "That's your main job of getting kids from home to school"

Although Taylor is a certified school

bus driving instructor and NYSDMV 19A examiner, he continued to drive school buses throughout his time in the various administrative positions at Bernie Bus Services.

After having about 800 employees at Birnie Bus Service, Taylor is looking forward to working more closely with the school community and the close-knit employees in the Poland Transportation Department.

"I'm happy to be back in this kind of smaller scale where I can interact more with the drivers, parents and students," he said. "It's just been nice to kind of come back to the basics of the job."

## Consumer Alert: NYS Division of Consumer Protection informs consumers about warranties and service contracts

Life does not have guarantees, but your warranty should Pay special attention to warranties and service contracts when making large purchases

As part of its seven-part consumer alert holiday series, the New York State Division of Consumer Protection (DCP) recently informed New Yorkers about the differences between warranties and service contracts to help consumers navigate the marketplace this holiday season. Warranties are included in the price of a purchase and service contracts are a separate cost. Consumers are encouraged to understand what is already covered in the warranty before purchasing a separate service contract.

"Warranties and service contracts are often confused in the marketplace," said New York State Secretary of State Rossana Rosado, who oversees the Division of Consumer Protection. "This holiday season don't overpay for something that may be covered under an existing warranty, and always read the terms and conditions to understand what is covered before you buy."

## Warranties

Warranties are legally enforceable assurances about certain parts of a

transaction. Ordinarily, the warranty involves representations about the item being purchased. For example, a watchmaker may warrant that his or her watches can withstand submersion underneath one hundred feet of water, or an appliance company warrants their appliances will be covered for defects up to one year after purchase.

Under New York Law, warranties may be made orally or in writing and can even arise by implication without any verbal statement. Proving a warranty was made is always easier with proper documentation.

## **Service Contracts**

Some products, such as automobiles and appliances, may offer a service contract. Although similar to a warranty and often called an "extended warranty," a service contract is not a warranty. Service contracts are contracts to perform repairs or maintenance on a product. To determine whether you need a service contract, consider the following:

whether the warranty already

covers the repairs and the time period of coverage that you would get under the service contract:

- whether the product is likely to need repairs and the potential costs of such repairs;
- the duration of the service contract;
- the reputation of the company offering the service contract.

Unlike a warranty, service contracts are not included in the price of the purchase. If a warranty is already provided and covers repairs, you may be paying extra for a largely unnecessary service contract, particularly if the service contract is limited to repair of defects. An express warranty is one that is written in the product warranty, whereas an implied warranty is a legally enforceable promise that something will work as intended.

DCP recommends optimizing product and service warranties with the follow-

- Get it in writing. Request oral warranties in writing before purchasing the product.
- Check company reviews. Go online and search for the company name and "warranty complaints" or similar search to see whether consumers face issues with that company's warranties.

- Read and understand the warranty before you purchase the product. Typically, companies will post their warranty terms and follow-up information on their company website so you can review them.
- Save all necessary paperwork such as the original receipt, a copy of the warranty and any maintenance or repair records. When there are issues, the company will ask for basic information like model number, serial number and date of purchase.

Use the product according to the specifications - including getting regular maintenance. Comply with all warranty requirements by maintaining and using the product in the manner specified in the warranty paperwork.

## If something happens and you need to initiate a warranty:

- 1. If there is a written warranty, read it first. The terms of your agreement are essential because they are almost always controlling. Even if the warranty has been breached, the remedy for breach may be dramatically altered by contract.
- 2. Next, contact the warrantor. Write to or call the entity that issued the

## **Reindeer Pecan Brownies**

Prep time: 20 minutes Cook time: 15 minutes Yield: 20 brownies Nonstick cooking spray

1 stick (1/2 cup) unsalted butter, melted

1 tablespoon pecan or canola oil

1 cup, plus 2 tablespoons, granulated sugar

2 large eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 cup all-purpose flour

1/2 cup cocoa powder

1 teaspoon espresso powder (optional)

1/4 teaspoon kosher salt

20 raw pecan halves, cut in half

40 candy eyeballs

20 red chocolate candies

1/4 cup chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 F. Spray mini muffin tin with nonstick cooking spray.

In large bowl, whisk melted butter, oil and sugar until well combined. Add eggs and vanilla extract; beat until mixture is thick and pale in color, about 1 min-

Sift in flour and cocoa powder. Add espresso powder, if desired, and salt. Using rubber spatula, fold dry ingredients into butter mixture until just combined. Batter should be thick.

Using 1-tablespoon cookie scoop, transfer batter to prepared mini muffin tin. Bake 13-15 minutes until toothpick inserted in center comes out mostly clean, with some lingering crumbs.

Add chocolate chips to heat-proof bowl; microwave until smooth and melted. Pour melted chocolate into sandwich bag and cut off small portion of one corner to use as tip. Use melted chocolate to "glue" on pecan antlers, candy eyeballs and red candy noses to brown-

Allow chocolate to set before transferring brownies to airtight container.

Note: Brownies will stay fresh for up to three days.

## Poland senior turns running hobby into three cross country 1st places

Without participating in a single practice due to soccer commitments, Poland Central School District senior Christopher Gauthier won the first three cross country races he ever competed in.

After starting to run as a hobby and then being encouraged to join the team by Poland cross country coach Sandy Hitt, Gauthier decided to attempt cross country as a dual sport athlete this fall when he could fit it in around soccer.

"I figured it's my senior year, I can try and see how I do," he said. "And I did pretty good."

The cross country season started on Oct. 3, but because he chose soccer as his primary sport, Gauthier, 17, wasn't able to join the team until Oct. 24. In the span of about a week, he ran - and won - all three of his standard races for the season and competed in multiple soccer games.

"It wasn't easy," he said.

## Learning on the fly

Gauthier's first race took place in Little Falls, and when Hitt saw him coming in about a minute and a half ahead of the second place boys runner, she partially wondered if he had accidentally skipped a turn.

Gauthier remembers a different aspect of the race though - that he had a pretty big lead, but started to hear the clicks of a girls runner's shoes getting closer to him. He was jogging at this point, but the girls runner was in a full sprint, so he sped up to make sure he finished the race before anyone else.

"I thought, 'Oh, that's how you're supposed to finish," he said.

Gauthier's second race was a home meet against Herkimer, except he had never been through the Poland home course before, so he did a walkthrough about a half hour before the meet. The course is challenging and slippery when it's wet, and it was a cold and rainy day, he said.

"Our team had home field advantage – I was the only one on the team that didn't have the advantage," he

That didn't stop him from winning again.

"He didn't train one single practice," Hitt said. "So he's learning on the fly."

Gauthier then also won his third race.

"He really had three good races in a row," Hitt said.

Next, he competed in the Center State Conference championship race, but didn't win that. The races were conducted with just two teams at a time due to COVID-19, so it was hard for him to judge how fast he needed to run - especially without much experience in cross country - so he didn't place as highly as he might have if he had runners ahead of him to try to catch, he and Hitt agreed.

Gauthier said he went into cross country with a mindset of trying his best and not worrying too much about what place he got.

"It's more of a do your best sport, instead of win, win, win," he said.

Once he won his debut race though, his mindset shifted somewhat.

"After I won that first race, I thought it would be pretty cool to win all three races," he said.

## Challenging yourself

Gauthier said he started running on his own just to get in better shape, and he enjoys the individual responsibility of running.

"It's me pushing myself," he said. "I like the fact that it's just you, and you're challenging yourself."

Over time, he got his mile down from 10 minutes to five minutes and 30 seconds.

"It started to become a hobby, and I started to enjoy it more," he said. "You get good at it, and you kind of just want to get better every time you do it."

Gauthier said Hitt, who is a health teacher at Poland, asking him to join the team helped motivate him, and she was a great and supportive coach.

"It just made me want to join that much more," he said. "When a teacher is saying you should do it, you kind of think maybe I'm actually good at it."

Hitt said she encouraged Gauthier to join the team from seeing him running around the community and during soccer games.

"I just tried to convince him to do it," Hitt said. "I knew he was good. I just didn't know how good he was."

Gauthier thought this would be a good chance to try cross country along with soccer, and he wants to run indoor and outdoor track this school year if possible.

"I figured it's my senior year - just go all out and see what I can do," he said.

Hitt tried to recruit Gauthier in previous years, but Gauthier doesn't wish he joined sooner because he made a lot of progress while running to stay productive since COVID-19 started that put him in position for success this year.

"I wouldn't have been able to compete at the level I did this year," he said, of if he had started cross country sooner.

Gauthier's brother, Poland graduate Kyle Gauthier, is about 10 years older and also ran on the Poland cross country team. Running together when they were younger was another big influence on Christopher Gauthier getting into running, he said.

Christopher Gauthier said his brother used to always beat him in races, but now he has some bragging rights of his own.

"He never got a first place, and I'll always have that over him," Christopher Gauthier said, with a smile.

## Festive from 5 -

2 tablespoons granulated sugar

2 tablespoons light brown sugar

2 teaspoons gingerbread spice blend

1 pinch salt

Preheat oven to 300 F. Line baking sheet with parchment paper; set aside.

In large bowl, use fork to whisk beaten egg until frothy. Add pecans and stir until coated. Sprinkle pecans with granulated sugar, brown sugar, gingerbread spice and salt. Stir to coat evenly. Spread pecans in even layer on prepared baking sheet.

Bake pecans 40 minutes, stirring halfway through. Allow pecans to cool completely.

Note: Pecans can be stored in airtight container for up to four days.

## No-Bake Pumpkin Pecan Pie Bites

Prep time: 15 minutes Chill time: 1 hour Yield: 12 bites (6 servings)

1 1/2 cups raw pecan pieces

3/4 cup pitted medjool dates (about 7 dates), soaked in hot water 10 minutes

1 pinch pink salt

Filling:

1/3 cup pumpkin puree

1/3 cup full fat coconut milk

1 teaspoon pumpkin spice

1/4 cup maple syrup

1 pinch pink salt

1 scoop collagen peptides (optional)

12 raw pecan halves, for topping

To make crust: In food processor, process pecan pieces, drained dates and salt until combined and "dough" starts to form into ball.

To make filling: In bowl, combine pumpkin puree, coconut milk, pumpkin spice, maple syrup, pink salt and collagen peptides, if desired. Whisk until smooth.

Line cupcake tin and evenly distribute crust mixture, about 1 1/2 tablespoons in each cupcake open-

ing. Use fingers to press crust into even layer.

Evenly disperse pumpkin pie filling among openings until tins are about half full.

Top each with one pecan half and place in freezer at least one hour.

This year, we are only going to have a few family members over on Christmas Day. In past years, I've put our dog, cat and rabbit in the back of the house with plenty of water and beds to sleep in, so the noise and lights and strange people don't stress them out. I feel like we can safely keep the pets in their usual spots this year because there will only be eight people here for dinner and presents. What do you think? - Cheryl in Lake City, FL.

Dear Cheryl: That's your call. You know your pets.

In addition to the size of the gathering, you should consider the personalities of your guests: Are any of them timid or afraid around pets, and would anyone be upset if your dog starts barking?

The big question here is how many strangers each of your pets can handle. Rabbits, for example, are

very susceptible to stress and should be kept in a quiet spot and not handled too much by visitors. A calm, well-socialized dog may be able to handle the influx of people. Same with your cat, who will simply disappear to a hiding spot if things get a little overwhelming.

Even though it's a smaller crowd this year, make a plan and share it. How much time should the pets spend with visitors around? When should they be placed in a separate area? (During dinner or when presents are opened, for example.) If a pet shows signs of stress, such as barking, yelping, meowing, hissing or growling, who will grab them and take them to the quiet spot to calm down?

When everyone knows the strategy, they can act quickly to keep the party calm and pets healthy and safe.

## The Kitchen Diva

## by Angela Shelf Medearis **Christmas Tradition** Gets a Modern Twist

It seems like I was just planning and preparing our Thanksgiving dinner and now Christmas is upon us. If you want to change things up a little for your Christmas dinner, try modernizing an old traditional recipe.

Recently, I've been reading about Christmas customs and holiday meals in Europe. I discovered a tradition called The Feast of the Seven Fishes, along with several delicious recipes for preparing fish. The fish is often used as a symbol of Christianity. Because of the persecution faced by the early church, when a Christian met a stranger in the road, the Christian sometimes drew one arc of the simple fish outline in the dirt. If the stranger drew the other arc, both believers knew they were in good company.

Preparing and eating seafood on Christmas Eve in celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ is an old European tradition with Italian roots. Many families abstain from eating meat and serve only fish or other types of seafood on Christmas Eve. This traditional holiday meal is called The Feast of the Seven Fishes. A typical feast features cod, eel, octopus, calamari, mussels, clams, shrimp and lobster.

This year, you might want to create a holiday dinner menu based on a variation of the Feast of the Seven Fishes. These recipes are budget-friendly ways to incorporate an ancient holiday tradition into a simplified, modern Christmas Eve dinner using just one pot or pan. Merry Christmas and Happy Holidays, ya'll!

## **Christmas Eve** seafood paella

1/3 cup extra-virgin olive oil

8 ounces (16 to 20) shelled, deveined shrimp

8 ounces squid (bodies), rinsed, patted dry and sliced into rounds

1 1/2 teaspoons salt

1 teaspoon turmeric

1 teaspoon paprika

1 medium onion, finely chopped

1 can (14 ounces) fire-roasted diced tomatoes, drained

1/4 teaspoon red chili

flakes or cayenne pepper 3 garlic, cloves chopped

1 1/2 cups Arborio rice 3 1/2 cups seafood, chicken or vegetable broth

1 bottle (8 ounces) clam juice

12 littleneck clams, scrubbed

Parsley and lemon wedges, for garnish

1. In a deep 12-inch cast iron skillet, heat oil on medium-high until hot but not smoking. Add shrimp, squid, 1/2 teaspoon of the salt, 1/2 teaspoon of the turmeric and 1/2 teaspoon of the paprika. Cook 2 minutes or until shrimp start to brown, stirring once. With slotted spoon, transfer the shrimp and squid to medium bowl.

2. Reduce heat to medium. Add the onion, tomatoes and the remaining salt, turmeric, paprika and the chili flakes or cayenne pepper. Cook 8 minutes, stirring often. Add garlic; cook 2 minutes. Add rice; cook 2 minutes, stirring.

3. To skillet, add broth and clam juice, stirring to distribute rice evenly in pan. Heat to boiling on medium-high. Boil, without stirring, 15 minutes.

4. Gently press the shrimp, squid and clams on top of the rice. Cover skillet with lid or foil; cook another 10 to 16 minutes or until the clams open and rice is just tender. Remove from heat. Let stand, covered, 10 minutes before serving. Garnish with parsley and lemons. Makes 6 servings.





## Prostate-shrinking medicines and cancer

Dear Dr. Roach: I've had low-grade prostate cancer for several years and am presently on "active surveillance." My PSAs have been high but steady, running around 7.8 to 9.2. I have a greatly enlarged prostate, which I believe contributes to the high PSA numbers.

I would like your opinion regarding finasteride (Proscar), as I am considering taking it. I see one of its side effects is that it increases the risk of developing a very serious form of prostate cancer. Since I already have this cancer, am I at an increased risk of mine growing more aggressive? — D.N.W.

Answer: A 2013 study showed that although finasteride reduced the overall risk of prostate cancer from 15% to 10% in men followed up to 18 years on finasteride, there was a small increase in high-grade, aggressive prostate cancer, from 3% to 3.5%. However, there was no increased risk of prostate cancer death among treated men.

Several follow-up studies have suggested that the apparent small increase in aggressive prostate cancers reflected an easier ability to find these cancers, since finasteride shrinks prostate tissue, making it easier to both biopsy and read the results. My view is that the apparent increase in aggressive prostate cancer is unlikely to represent a real danger in taking finasteride. There is no evidence to suggest that finasteride would change the behavior of an existing tumor.

Dear Dr. Roach: I have breast cancer and am being recommended anastrozole. Can you tell me the side effects, both short term and long term? — Anon.

Answer: Anastrozole is an inhibitor of the enzyme aromatase, which converts androgens made in the adrenal gland to estrogens. Anastrozole thus has the effect of dramatically reducing estrogen levels in the blood. For women with estrogen-sensitive tumors, this

means less stimulus for the tumors to grow. Aromatase inhibitors like anastrozole have had a significant effect on improving cure rates and survival in women with estrogen receptor-positive breast cancer.



Aromatase inhibitors have been used for over 20 years; however, that's still not long enough for a comprehensive understanding of long-term effects. There are short-term effects, and these limit the ability of some women to tolerate their use for the five years they are usually prescribed. About a third of women do not complete the course.

The most common reason I see for women stopping anastrozole is the musculoskeletal pain that often accompanies it. Symptoms can be severe in up to a third of women, but regular exercise and anti-inflammatory drugs are effective in reducing these symptoms.

There are sexual side effects for many women. The loss of estrogen due to anastrozole can cause vaginal dryness, which may lead to painful intercourse. This can be treated with lubricants, and most data suggests that low-dose vaginal estrogen is both safe and effective, although I recommend an individualized discussion with her oncologist before a woman takes that.

Fatigue, forgetfulness and poor sleep are often reported by women on anastrozole. Bone loss (osteopenia and osteoporosis) is more common in women on anastrozole. Nonpharmacologic strategies include regular exercise, calcium and vitamin D, and smoking cessation. However, many women need medical therapy if the bone density becomes dangerously low de-

While there are certainly downsides to taking anastrozole, they need to be balanced against the improved survival rates in women who take them compared with other treatments.



## Kitchen from 12 -

1 pound uncooked shrimp (31-40 per pound); thawed, peeled and deveined

- 1 cup chopped parsley leaves
- 2 large lemons cut into wedges

1. In a 5 quart slow cooker, combine the potatoes, until potatoes are tender, 4 1/2 to 5 hours.





- 2. Stir in stock, broth or water, and the scallops or fish, and shrimp. Cook, covered, until scallops are opaque, and shrimp turn pink, about 4-6 minutes
- 3. Sprinkle with parsley and serve with lemon wedges and warm crusty bread. Make 9 servings (about 2 quarts).

TIP: If you're peeling and deveining your shrimp, use the shells to make shrimp stock. Place the rinsed shrimp shells, 1 chopped carrot and stalk of celery, the onion skin and parsley stems in a large saucepan. Cover with 2 cups of cold water. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat and simmer uncovered for 30 minutes while preparing the recipe. Use the shrimp stock according to directions above.

Whether we're children or adults, we all like to feel useful and part of the holiday festivities. Now's the time to enlist the kids in the fun and creative job of gift-wrapping. But before you go out and purchase rolls of wrap, save money by making a beautiful batch for this year's gifts.

Gather big paper bags from your recycling bin, plus marbles and bright poster paint, and you'll be ready for family fun.

Here's the stuff you'll need:

- One large, sturdy cardboard gift box approximately 12 by 18 inches, or similar container with sides
- several marbles (one for each paint color)
- liquid poster paint in several colors
- spoons (one for each color)
- plain brown paper grocery bags, construction paper or butcher paper
- recycled deli or margarine tubs
  - scissors

• newspaper Here's the fun:

- 1. Cover your work surface with newspaper. Cut open the paper bags and trim a sheet to fit the bottom of the box. (Or, if using construction paper or butcher paper, cut to size.) Place the paper inside. Pour a small amount of each color of paint into the containers.
- 2. Drop a marble in one of the paint containers. Shake the container gently until the marble is thoroughly coated with paint, or use a spoon to move the marble around in the paint. With a spoon, drop the marble in the box and shift the box back and forth so the marble rolls in all directions, leaving paint on the paper. Repeat the process, using a different marble for each color of paint desired.
- 2. When the colorful, abstract design is complete, remove your paper of modern art and let it dry.

TIP: For smaller packages, "shake and create" gift wrap using a clean, large cylindrical potato-chip can with a lid.

Loosely roll a sheet of paper inside the can so that it lines the interior. Using one color at a time, roll a marble or two in paint (as described above) and drop in the can. Snap on the lid, shake a few times, remove the lid and put the marble or marbles onto newspaper. Repeat with a marble or two in another color. Remove the paper to reveal your art. You might want to paint jingle bells along with the marbles for a fun, festive sound while shaking.

## Chocolate chip peanut butter cookies

What's a holiday without a few holiday goodies — not too festive, that's what! This ultra-easy cookie should brighten things up.

1/2 cup cold water

1 1/2 cups nonfat dry milk powder

Granular sugar substitute to equal 1/2 cup sugar, suitable for baking

3/4 cup reduced-fat peanut butter

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

2 cups reduced-fat baking mix

1/4 cup mini-chocolate chips

1. Place cold water in a 2-cup glass measuring cup. Stir in dry milk powder until mixture makes a smooth paste. Cover and microwave on HIGH (100% pow-

er) for 45 to 60 seconds or until mixture is very hot but not to the boiling point. Add sugar substitute. Mix well to combine. Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours. (What you've just made is fat-free and sugar-free sweetened condensed

2. When ready to make cookies, preheat oven to 375 F. In a large bowl, combine cooled milk mixture, peanut butter and vanilla extract. Add baking mix. Mix well to combine. Stir in chocolate chips. Shape into 36 (1-inch) balls. Place balls on an ungreased baking sheet. Flatten each ball with a fork.

3. Bake for 6 to 8 minutes. Remove cookies from baking sheets and cool on wire racks. Makes 12 (3 cookies each) servings.

- 3. In small bowl, with mixer at medium speed, beat heavy or whipping cream until soft peaks form. With wire whisk, gently fold whipped cream into custard
- 4. To serve, pour eggnog into chilled 5-quart punch bowl; sprinkle with nutmeg for garnish. Makes about 16 cups or 32 servings.


