

Remembering a man of many facets – John Snyder



John P. Snyder Jr. lived a life that was more than the sum of its parts. A dedicated family, community and businessman, he passed away on Dec. 22 at age 56 after a battle with cancer. He is survived by his loving wife Beth and son Matthew.

John, a resident of Canajoharie, was born on April 28, 1964 in Cooperstown to John and Ruth Lee Snyder of Cherry Valley. He attended Cher-Valley High School and worked at Glensfoot Farm from the age of 14. He attended SUNY Cobleskill before he started working for Lee Newspapers, owned by his uncle, Frederick 'Fred' W. Lee Jr. John began his career by delivering papers published by the company before working his way up through the ranks.

"The year was about 1984 when John stood too close to the *Pennysaver* and got bit by the publishing bug!" Fred Lee said. "He spent a couple years in the production department where he learned the business from the ad building end. After a couple of years, he was offered a job selling advertising. John proved to be a very hard worker and a great sales representative and

was highly respected by his coworkers as well as customers. He was offered sales manager positions along the way on a few of our consumer papers out of Schoharie, Montgomery and Herkimer counties.

"As his uncle, it was a pleasure watching him grow and mature in the publishing business. He will be missed by everyone who knew him."

In 1999, John left the family business to take a sales management position at the Utica Observer-Dispatch. He then went on to work as sales manager for Grace Furniture in Marcy. John returned to the family business in 2010, where he accepted the position of sales manager for the Original Valley Pennysaver and maintained that position until the time of his passing.

"I've known John for more than 20 years but worked more closely with him for the last four or five," said Larry Price, publications director at Lee Newspapers. "As a result, I could see more clearly that he was fully invested in ensuring the success of both of his papers, the two editions of the *Country Editor*. This is where he dedicated all

of his energy. He will be missed."

Another coworker and his niece - Lyndsay Pickel also remembers John fondly. "I had the pleasure of knowing John in several capacities. The first was as an uncle figure. Growing up, John was always willing to play games with me and carry me around for hours on his shoulders so I could have a better view of the world. The second was as a coworker here at Lee Newspapers. John was a devoted worker and very detail-oriented. I miss seeing him when he would bounce into my office before hitting the road in the morning. He always had some amazing stories to share about his dogs, which we all enjoyed. His customers adored him as well, as we've seen an outpouring of support from them after hearing about his passing.

"Lastly, I knew John as a photographer," she continued. "He photographed my wedding for me and took beautiful shots that I will cherish forever. He's also done several photo sessions with my boys and always took the time to make sure he captured

Rabid skunk

Herkimer County Public Health received word on Monday, Jan. 4, 2021, from Wadsworth Labs that a skunk that was sent in to be tested for rabies on Wednesday, Dec. 30, 2020 from the Town of Manheim has tested positive for rabies.

The skunk was found

outside fighting with the family dog, and sent to Wadsworth lab for testing.

The public can protect themselves or their family pets from rabies by practicing the following:

- 1. Vaccinate your pets against rabies
 - 2. Spay or neuter all ani-

mals to reduce the number of strays.

3. Do not feed strays or handle unknown animals, wild or domestic.

Remind children and adults not to play with unknown animals, wild or domestic. If a bat is found in a house, and there is a possibility it had contact with a person or an animal in the house, call Public Health and we will make arrangements to have the bat tested, if necessary.

Herkimer County Public Health would like to remind the public to please check your pet's rabies vaccination records to make sure that they are up to date. If they are not up to date, make an appointment with their vet as soon as possible to have them vaccinated against rabies.

Paw's Corner

Dear Paw's Corner: A have a wiry little terrier named "Chip" who is well-behaved inside. However, when it's time for his daily walk, he begins barking nonstop by the door. When I

take him outside on the leash, he keeps barking and pulls hard on the leash. So much so that he almost hurts himself when the collar digs into his neck. Then he'll yelp, as if I had hurt him. It's embarrassing to walk with this hyper, yelping little dog. How can I get him to calm down?
—Charity G., Albany,
NY

Dear Charity: An energetic dog can be frustrating to handle, but don't lose hope. You can work with Chip to improve his behavior.

First, order Chip a properly sized halter online, and use this on walks. A halter will spread out the contact points across the stronger parts of his little body. This will prevent injury when Chip pulls against the leash. Halters also are much more comfortable; the uncomfortable collar may be stressing him

I'd like you to look up a dog trainer in your area who specializes in small dogs, who can be little tornados on a good day. Many trainers are adapting their lessons to an online format, so you can meet with them at home over a conferencing app like Zoom or

Google Meet.

While you're waiting for that first session, start working on reinforcing Chip's basic behavioral training. Work with him at home on the commands "come," "sit," "stay" and "lie down." During walks, work with him on "heel," "sit" and "stay."

These training sessions also will help Chip work off some of that energy, and he'll be thrilled with all the attention he's getting, too.

In addition to all that, John served as a trustee and deputy mayor for the Village of Canajoharie. He was an active member of the Canajoharie Volunteer Fire Department for over 20 years, retiring in 2019. For many of those years he served the department as its treasurer. He also held the positions of captain and lieutenant through the years. A candlelit memorial service took place in his honor on Jan. 2 behind the Erie

Boulevard firehouse.

Update on vaccine information in Herkimer County

Herkimer County Public Health wants all residents to know that appointments for the COVID-19 vaccine are available at Little Falls Hospital and Mosaic Health for all eligible priority group members. All vaccinating facilities are required to follow the NYSDOH Vaccine Distribution Plan that identifies priority groups eligible for vaccine in phases (1A, 1B, and 1C). The most recent phase was 1A and priority groups included in the week beginning Jan. 4 were (new groups are added weekly):

- All Outpatient/Ambulatory front-line, high-risk health care workers of any age who provide direct in-person patient care. This included, but was not limited to:
 - Individuals who work in private medical practices
 - Hospital-affiliated medical practices
 - Public health clinics
 - Specialty medical practices of all types
 - Dental practices of all types
 - Dialysis workers
 - Diagnostic and treatment centers
 - Occupational therapists
 - Physical therapists
 - Speech therapists
 - Phlebotomists

- Behavioral health workers
- School nurses
- Student health workers.
- All staff who are in direct contact with patients (i.e., intake staff)
- All front-line, high-risk public health workers who have direct contact with patients, including those conducting COVID-19 tests, handling COVID-19 specimens and COVID-19 vaccinations. This includes, but was not limited to:
- Doctors who work in private medical practices and their staff
- Doctors who work in hospital-affiliated medical practices and their staff
- Doctors who work in public health clinics and their staff
 - Registered Nurses
 - Specialty medical practices of all types
 - Dentists and Orthodontists and their staff
 - Psychiatrists and Psychologists and their staff
 - Physical Therapists and their staff
 - Optometrists and their staff
 - Pharmacists and Pharmacy Aides
 - Home care workers
 - Hospice workers

• Staff of nursing homes/skilled nursing facilities who did not receive COVID vaccination through the Pharmacy Partnership for Long-Term Care Program Individuals need to go online and fill out the "NYS-

Individuals need to go online and fill out the "NYS-DOH COVID-19 Vaccine Form" found at: tinyurl.com/y55oqw8w



New Yorkers urged to be aware of COVID-19 scams tied to federal economic impact payments

Scammers using a variety of methods tied to COVID-19 economic impact payments to target consumers

The NYS Division of Consumer Protection (DCP) is alerting consumers about scammers taking advantage of COVID-19 economic stimulus payments. With another round of economic stimulus payments approved by Congress, scammers will be sending phishing emails, texts and phone calls and using social media to try to steal economic impact payments and your personal information. Consumers are reminded that it's important to stay vigilant and aware of unsolicited communications asking for your personal or private information.

"Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, scammers have been hard at work trying to steal money from unsuspecting New Yorkers," said Secretary of State Rossana Rosado. "With this latest round of stimulus funding on its way, I urge all New Yorkers to be extra diligent and follow simple steps to keep your money and personal identity safe."

NYS Commissioner of Taxation and Finance Michael Schmidt said, "We all must remain especially vigilant against scam artists trying to steal this latest round of stimulus funding from New Yorkers. We're sharing valuable information so you can learn how to spot red flags and where to find reliable information so you won't be caught off guard by con artists."

NYS Office of Information Technology Services Chief Information Officer Angelo Riddick said, "New Yorkers are being challenged like never before by a global pandemic, and to make matters worse, we've seen unscrupulous individuals use technology in a desperate and dishonest attempt to scam them out of their own money. Fortunately, New Yorkers can protect themselves against these COVID-related scams if they are armed with the right information. Always be wary of unsolicited phone calls, texts, emails, links or attachments, even if the sender appears to be known. And never send your personal information via email or text."

What You Need to Know About **Economic Impact Payments**

On Dec. 27, the federal government passed a pandemic relief package. An important component of individual relief, Economic Impact Payments, are being issued to New Yorkers from the IRS.

You don't need to take any action to automatically receive your stimulus payment if you filed a 2018 or 2019 tax return and are eligible or received one of these benefits (unless claiming a qualifying child under age 17):

- Social Security retirement benefits and survivor benefits
- Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits and survivor benefits
 - Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits
 - Railroad Retirement and survivor benefits
- Veterans Administration compensation (disability, death benefits etc.) or retirement benefits

While most people will receive their payment automatically, if you otherwise have not filed taxes recently, you may need to submit a simple federal tax return to get your check. For more information on the Economic Impact Payments, New Yorkers should visit the NYS Department of Taxation and Finance at tax.ny.gov/ press/alerts/stimulus-checks-information.htm.

Below are tips to help keep your economic impact payment and personal information safe from scammers:

• Rely on trusted sites for information. Visit legitimate, government websites for up-to-date, fact-based information about COVID-19. Visit the IRS website directly for the latest information on the economic impact payments. Remember, the government will never call to ask for your Social Security number, bank account or credit card number.

- Delete emails asking you for personal information to receive an economic stimulus check. Government agencies are not sending unsolicited emails seeking your private information in order to send you money.
- · Avoid clicking on links in unsolicited emails and be wary of email attachments.
 - Don't provide personal or banking information.

Raynaud's patient: Can viagra help cold fingers

Dear Dr. Roach: I have scleroderma with Raynaud's phenomenon, and friends and family members have told me that I might get help from Viagra.

Frankly, I hadn't read or heard that from either my rheumatologists or dermatologists. I already tried a short course of nifedipine over a decade ago (it just gave me a headache), so I just stick with mechanical means to keep my hands warm in winter and, maybe surprisingly to some, in summer. Believe me, air-conditioned grocery stores are torture from April to October. — M.A.P.

Answer: Raynaud's phenomenon is an excessive response of the blood vessels in the skin to changes in temperature, and sometimes to emotional stress. While most people will get cold hands and feet when it is cold, a person with Raynaud's can get a drastic response, even to air conditioning or freezer sections of grocery stores. The skin will turn white and then blue, then quite red on being rewarmed. Not everybody goes through all three colors, however.

Raynaud's can exist by itself, but is often seen in the presence of autoimmune conditions, such as the systemic sclerosis (scleroderma) you have. Treatment for Raynaud's is generally the same with or without other conditions. Everybody with Raynaud's should quit smoking and avoid medications that can trigger an attack (over-the-counter cold and flu remedies are the most common).

The mainstay of treatment is avoiding the tempera-

ture changes wherever possible, but as you point out clearly, it's almost impossible to do so completely. Putting your hand in a refrigerator or holding a cold drink can trigger an attack. Many people with Raynaud's learn to keep gloves with them all the time and dress their entire body warmly. An attack can sometimes be aborted by rubbing hands in warm water or getting them into a warm place.

When medication treatment is necessary, a calcium channel blocker like nifedipine is often the first choice. Headache and dizziness can limit effectiveness of this treatment. Studies have shown these medications can cut the attacks by about 50%.

Sildenafil (Viagra) has been used in people with Raynaud's, and is about as effective as calcium channel blockers. However, for people with scleroderma, ulcers and Raynaud's, sildenafil has been shown in small trials to be very effective.

Dear Dr. Roach: My wife has many allergies and asthma, as well as frequent migraines, about two or three a month. A family friend has been using Aimovig for the past six months with no migraine symptoms. What can you tell me about this relatively new drug? We're concerned that the side effects may interfere with her asthma, or any other negative drug interac-

Answer: Erenumab (Aimovig) has been recently approved for migraine. In the initial study, it reduced the number of migraine days from 8.3 to 4.6 per month. As an injection, it may cause pain and swelling at the injection site, and has also caused some people constipation and muscle cramps. There are very few drug interactions, and I found no indication that it should make asthma worse.

Your family friend has had a much better result than most of the people in the study, and there is no guarantee your wife will do as well. I am awaiting further long-term studies before recommending this class of migraine treatments.

It is given once per month, and costs about \$600 at goodrx.com.

Scammers may ask by phone, email, text or social media for verification of personal and/or banking information saying that the information is needed to receive or speed up your economic impact

payment.

- Do not agree to sign over your economic impayment check. Scammers may ask you to sign over your stimulus payment check to them.
- Be wary of bogus checks. Scammers may mail you a bogus check, perhaps in an odd amount, then tell the taxpayer to call a number or verify information online in order to cash it.
- Do not cash unsolicited checks. Scammers use this tactic to get your bank account informa-

tion, and you will incur fees when the check is found to be insufficient.

- Be aware that scammers are also able to replicate a government agency's name and phone number on caller ID. It's important to remember that the IRS will never ask vou for vour personal information or threaten your benefits by phone call, email, text or social media.
- Hang up on illegal robocallers. If you receive a call about economic impact payment scams, hang up. Don't press any numbers. The recording might say that pressing a number will let you speak

to a live operator or remove you from their call list, but it might lead to more robocalls instead.

- Notify the IRS if you are contacted by a potential scammer. If you receive an unsolicited email. text or social media attempt that appears to be from the IRS or an organization associated with the IRS, like the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System, notify the IRS at phishing@irs.gov.
- Verify a charity's authenticity before making donations. Review the Federal Trade Commission's page on Charity Scams at consumer.ftc. gov/features/how-donate-wisely-and-avoidcharity-scams for more information.
- Review CISA Insights on Risk Management for COVID-19 at cisa.gov/

Estonians erect statue and give home to beloved stray dog

TALLINN, ESTONIA (AP) — Zorik was never the tail-wagging or hand-licking type. But that didn't stop the free-spirited vagabond dog from winning many hearts.

When the black-andwhite mutt, long a pres-

ence in a Tallinn neighborhood, was taken from the Estonian capital to the countryside earlier this year to live out his days in the safe and restful surroundings of a family's back yard, he was missed so much that the residents immortalized him with a statue.

"People donated for the monument. They wanted it and they still follow his fate even though he is already old and frail," said Heiki Valner, an animal rescue volunteer who thought up the idea of the statue of Zorik and organized the fundraising.

Donations were collected and a local artist was commissioned to create the likeness of Zorik, with his upright ears and shaggy hair around his muzzle, along with a cat nestled against him.

The statue, now standing in front of a shopping center, is meant as a tribute both to Zorik and his animal companions, and to all strays. Zorik once had a dog companion who was killed in a car accident. He then took up with stray cats and was seen with them often, even while sleeping.

Residents say that Zorik first appeared as a pup about 12 years ago in a coal storage area in a nearby port, and had been a fixture ever since in Kalamaja, a working-class district that is transforming into a magnet for hipsters.

In a society where the divide between ethnic Estonians and ethnic Russians is acutely felt, Zorik managed to bridge the divide, winning over Russian-speaking old women who fed him, as well as Estonian hipsters, including a group now opening a cafe named "Zorik."

"Zorik was a dog who was able to disappear, he was a dog whom everyone in Kalamaja knew, he touched everyone — young and old, Estonians and Russians," Valner said. "He was a point of social integration."

He was so well-liked that residents would sometimes feed him the best cuts of beef. But nobody could ever catch and domesticate him.

"When people tried to regulate or restrict him, he just escaped," Valner said. "He was just a free spirit." Viktoria Ger, who has given Zorik a new home, in an enclosure with a doghouse behind her own family home, describes him as a "peculiar dog."

"He doesn't want to be close to people so he doesn't like to be petted," she said. Nearby Zorik sat and shivered as a light dusting of snow covered the ground and pine trees dotting the yard.

"Probably he has been hurt by people during his life, so he doesn't trust people," she said.

Valner said Zorik eventually had to be removed from the city for his own safety.

"In the end he was so senile that he would just fall asleep on the railway or tram tracks or just here on the road, so that cars had to drive around him," Valner said, pointing to the area in Kalamaja that was long home to the dog. "We received several calls a day when he was on the road, so finally we had to get him away from the streets in his own interest."

Initially he tried to escape and return to his old roaming territory, but now his frailty has finally won out over his free spirit.

As is to be expected, there were also those over the years who did not want the dog around.

"This was a contest of good and evil," Valner said. "There were those who demanded he be captured and eliminated and others who protected and fed him. This time, kindness won."

Getting to the heart of pet parasite prevention

Pets rely on their owners to look out for their physical well-being. Many serious health issues can afflict pets, and parasites are a common cause of illness and discomfort.

Of all the parasitic worms dogs, cats and other companion animals may acquire, heartworms may be the most concerning. Heartworm disease can result in lung and heart failure, other organ damage, and potentially death. Heartworm disease is caused by a blood-borne parasite known as Dirofilariaimmitis, offers the U.S. Food & Drug Administration. It is spread through the bite of a mosquito. Dogs are often the host of choice. The parasites infect the dog, mature into adults, mate and produce offspring all while living inside the animal. Cats are atypical hosts for heartworms, and most worms in cats do not survive the adult stage.

While heartworm infection has been reported in all 50 states, it is most common along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts. Heartworms also can occur in the warmer regions of Canada where summer temperatures are high enough for the worm larvae to survive inside carrier mos-

quitoes. Once inside a new host, it takes approximately six months for the larvae to develop into sexually mature adult heartworms, advises The American Heartworm Society. Once mature, heartworms can survive five to seven years in dogs and up to two to three years in cats. Each mosquito season can increase the number of worms in infected pets.

Prevention is key to ensuring the health of a pet. Adult heartworms can infect the heart, pulmonary artery and adjacent large blood vessels. A blood test can reveal whether a pet is affected by heartworms, as early infection may not yield noticeable symptoms.

Apart from keeping pets away from mosquito-heavy areas, pet owners will find that annual heartworm testing as well as monthly prevention medications can provide the protection needed to keep animals safe. Heartworm preventives must be purchased from a veterinarian or with a prescription through a pet pharmacy in the United States. Check requirements for those living in Canada.

The FDA warns that the treatment for heartworm

disease is not easy on the dog and it is costly. Treatment can be potentially toxic to the dog's body and can cause serious complications, such as the development of life-threatening blood clots in the dog's lungs. Preventive medicines can reduce pets' risk of developing heartworm.



Most glass bottles identified the contents inside with embossed letters on the container or a paper label. But a special group, usually apothecary bottles or special gifts, were made with "labels under glass." The medical bottles usually had a label with a black

name written in a fancy type style, gold leaf trim, plus a solid glass cover for the label. It was made to fit into a shaped indent on the side of the bottle, making a smooth bottle with a protected label.

There also were bottles with labels under glass made with color pictures of attractive women, season's greetings or other messages used for gifts, or barber product containers displayed in barber shops. They were made from the mid-1800s to the early 1900s. Decorative "back bar" bottles were often whiskey bottles refilled with colored water when the whiskey was sold. They were probably made

before Prohibition. Condition of these bottles is important. The glass label may crack, and the glue used for the paper label discolors.

A small, round flask with a label under glass picturing a girl was in the recent sale by Glass Works Auctions in East Greenville, PA; it was made at the end of the 19th century and sold for \$468.

A: The first Beanie Babies were issued in 1993 and sold for \$5 each. The first Princess Diana Beanie Babies were made in August 1997, two months after Princess Diana's death. They were made

until April 1999. Proceeds were given to the Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Fund. Although there are online sites asking as much as \$135,000 for the "first edition," a First Edition Princess Diana bear stuffed with polyvinylchloride (PVC) is listed on Amazon for \$39; a bear with polyethylene pellets (PE) for \$22.



My Easy Supper Shakshuka is a popular dish with variations served in North Africa and the Eastern Mediterranean. It's also known as Eggs in Purgatory because of the spicy sauce the eggs are cooked in.

This simple, versatile one-pan dish features eggs nestled in a flavorful tomato sauce enhanced with onions, garlic and spices, and sprinkled with Feta cheese. It can be served for breakfast or brunch right out of the pan with toast and breakfast sausage or bacon, or with a salad and crusty garlic bread for lunch or supper.

Easy supper shakshuka:

2 tablespoons olive oil 1 small onion, chopped

1 teaspoon red chile flakes or 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper or 1/4 teaspoon hot sauce

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon ground black pepper

1 teaspoon paprika

1/2 teaspoon ground cumin

1/8 teaspoon ground cloves or cinnamon

2 cloves garlic, minced 2 cups prepared marinara sauce

2 cups fresh baby spinach

4 eggs

1 1/2 cup feta cheese Cilantro, basil or parsley leaves, chopped (optional)

1. In a large skillet over medium heat, add the olive oil, then add the chopped onion, the chile flakes or cayenne pepper or hot sauce, salt, pepper, paprika, cumin and cloves or cinnamon, and cook for 5 minutes, or until the onion becomes soft and translucent. Add the garlic and cook for another 1-2 minutes.

2. Stir in the marinara sauce and turn the heat to high to bring the sauce to a boil. Add the spinach, one handful at a time, and stir it in to wilt

3. Turn the heat to low. Using the back of a large spoon, make 4 indentions (wells) in the sauce to place the eggs. Gently crack the eggs in the skillet into the indentions in the tomato sauce and cover the skillet with a lid for 3 to 5 minutes, or until the whites of the

eggs are cooked and set.

4. Sprinkle the feta cheese around the eggs and on top of the sauce. Garnish with the cilantro, basil or parsley, if desired, and serve warm with crusty bread or rolls to mop up the sauce. Serves 4.


