Dolgeville announces Joseph Gilfus as next school superintendent

Joseph Gilfus signed a contract Jan. 12 to become the next Dolgeville Central School District superintendent of schools, pending a formal board appointment this week.

Gilfus will join the district effective May 1, initially as the deputy superintendent. Interim Superintendent Theodore Kawryga will remain in the interim superintendent role through the rest of the 2020-21 school year. As of July 1, Gilfus will become the superintendent of schools.

"There's a lot of tradition at Dolgeville Central School District, and I'm honored to be a part of that now," Gilfus said. "The enthusiasm that everyone from teachers and staff to parents and the school community have for providing students a strong education makes me excited to join the team."

Dolgeville Board of Education members decided on Dec. 16 to select Gilfus as the next superintendent of schools, and Gilfus officially signed the contract Jan. 12. Board members were scheduled to vote on Jan. 19 to formally appoint Gilfus and validate the contract.

Gilfus, currently a director at Delaware-Chenango-Madison-Otsego BOCES, previously served more than 16 years at Thousand Islands Central School District as high school principal and director of physical education/health/wellness up until June 2020. He began his career in education as a physical education/ health teacher and coach, serving in four districts for eight years. He has also served as dean of students, athletic administrator and high school assistant principal prior to his appointment as high school principal at Thousand Island Central School District.

Gilfus is in the process of earning a doctorate degree in educational leadership from Syracuse University, and his prior education background includes a teacher certification program at Wells College, a bachelor of arts/English degree and superintendent development program from SUNY Oswego, a certificate of advanced study in education administration and master of science in physical education/athletic administration at SUNY Brockport, along with other professional certifications and credentials.

The Dolgeville Board of Education hired Gilfus following an extensive search and interview process guided by Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES District Superintendent Sandra Sherwood and influenced by input from community and stakeholder groups.

"We had 13 highly qualified candidates to choose from for the next superintendent of schools," Dolgeville Board of Education President Scott Hongo II said. "Through a thorough process that involved Zoom interviews, in-person interviews, district and stakeholder interviews and a virtual community forum, we feel strongly that we've found the right person for the job. We would like to thank Mrs. Sherwood for her help with the process and every community member who participated – because their opinions helped us know that we selected a candidate that will be a fitting leader for the Dolgeville school community."

Hongo said the district will be in good hands as it transitions from Kawryga to Gilfus.

"Mr. Kawryga has done a great job as interim superintendent leading us through an unprecedented school year and will continue to do so while helping us transition to Mr. Gilfus for the start of the next school year," Hongo said. "We look forward to having them working together this spring and then having Mr. Gilfus move the district forward into a promising future."

Gilfus said he looks forward to getting to know the school community better, keeping students and staff safe through these unusual times with COVID-19 and doing everything possible to ensure a positive learning experience for students.

"There are extra challenges this school year, but the Dolgeville school community knows how to overcome obstacles," Gilfus said. "I'm looking forward to joining the district, moving forward and making sure our students go out into the world well prepared."

Pasta e Piselli

- 2. Meanwhile, in 4-quart saucepan or saucepot, heat olive oil over medium heat. Add garlic; cook until golden, about 5 minutes.
 - 3. Remove saucepan from

heat. Then, carefully add chicken broth, tomatoes with their juice, basil and 1/2 cup water. Return to heat; heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer 5 minutes; discard garlic.

4. Add peas and pasta; heat through. Serve soup with grated Parmesan cheese if you like. Serves 5. * Each serving: About 290 calories, 7g total fat (1g saturated), 8mg cholesterol, 705 mg sodium, 46g carb., 11g protein.

Scholarship applications now available through local foundation

The Herkimer Region College & Career Scholarship Foundation is accepting applications for scholarships for 2021. Each year, this local foundation presents approximately a dozen scholarships.

Students eligible for these scholarships include those who are majoring in technical education in their high school program and plan to go to college next year. This includes virtually all students enrolled in the Technical Education Center located at Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES. Also eligible are those adults who wish to enroll in vocational training, such as practical nursing, at Herkimer BOCES.

New this year, the scholarship foundation will also offer a Career Award for students who gain employment in a Career and Technical Education field prior to or soon after graduation and incur expenses as a result of that employment. This award allows the reimbursement of up to \$750 for trade-specific expenses such as employment clothing, personal protective equipment, tools, supplies, certifications, credentials and/or licenses.

Aside from the scholarships that students apply for, there are special incentive awards available for those pursuing careers in certain areas. These special funds are administered by the Herkimer Region College & Career Scholarship Foundation and are in addition to the scholarships offered through the general fund.

The special incentive awards are:

- The Paul A. Bouck Memorial Fund provides a scholarship to a student who is entering a field of study that relates to agriculture, a rural-related field or other related areas.
- The Robert A. Moore Memorial Scholarship provides a scholarship to a student who has completed the Herkimer BOCES Visual Communications Media Arts program and plans to further their training in the


field of radio and TV broadcasting.

- The Special Nursing Fund provides a scholarship to a nursing student in need of financial assistance.
- The Mower Family Farm Fund provides a scholarship to a student who will be pursuing occupations in the field of agriculture.
- The William E. Whitehill Jr. Scholarship provides a scholarship to a student in the Technical Education Center who demonstrates the most improvement while in the program.
- The Chris Brockway Memorial Scholarship Award provides a scholarship to a student who completes the Criminal Justice program.
- The Papaleo/Dady Family Scholarship provides a scholarship to a student who successfully completes a two-year technical education program at BOCES with a minimum GPA of 85%.
- The Harry J. Enea Sr. Memorial Scholarship provides a scholarship to a student entering the mortuary science field
- The Chester A. Scerra Memorial Scholarship provides a scholarship to a student pursuing an education in the field of culinary arts.
- The William E. Busacker Scholarship Award provides a scholarship to a student who has demonstrated leadership in causes that promote change to the status quo, compassion for the less fortunate, animal rights or other issues.
- The Hummel Family Scholarship Award provides a scholarship to a student who demonstrated community-minded focus throughout the student's high school career.

Application forms are now available from guidance counselors in all Herkimer BOCES area school districts, the Technical Education office at the Herkimer BOCES William E. Busacker Complex at 352 Gros

Blvd., East Herkimer, online at herkimer-boces.org/scholarshipfoundation or by calling Shawn Maxson at Herkimer BOCES at 315.867.2023. The deadline for submitting an application is March 1.

The Herkimer Region College & Career Scholarship Foundation is unique because all scholarships go to technical education majors, Herkimer Region College & Career Scholarship Foundation Board President Sharon Baisley said. Among the colleges being attended by winners of last year's scholarships are Herkimer College, Marywood University, SUNY Polytechnic Institute and Brown University. Several nursing students were awarded scholarships to attend the Herkimer BOCES School for Practical Nursing.

Consumer alert: NYSDOT and DMV warn of text message phishing schemes

The NYS Departments of Transportation and Motor Vehicles recently warned New Yorkers of ongoing text message phishing schemes. These illegitimate text messages ask recipients to update their driver license information. The messages link to a non-listed URL. Anyone who received such a text message should delete it right away.

Phishing texts are fraudulent messages scammers use to obtain data or sensitive personal information. That information can be used to commit identity theft or trick the recipient into installing malicious software onto a computer or mobile device.

To help protect against phishing

or smishing (SMS phishing) scams, the NYS Office of Information Technology Services (ITS) recommends the following precautions:

- **Do exercise caution** with all communications you receive, including those that appear to be from a trusted entity. Inspect the sender's information to confirm the message was generated from a legitimate source.
- **Do keep an eye out** for tell-tale signs of phishing poor spelling or grammar, the use of threats, the URL does not match that of the legitimate site. If the message does not feel right, chances are it is not.
- **Don't click on links** embedded in an unsolicited message from an unverified source.

- Don't send your personal information via text. Legitimate businesses will not ask users to send sensitive personal information through text message.
- **Don't post sensitive informa- tion** online. The less information you post, the less data you make available to a cybercriminal for use in developing a potential attack or scam.

SBA re-opens Paycheck Protection Program

The U.S. Small Business Administration, in consultation with the U.S. Treasury Department, re-opened the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan portal to PPP-eligible lenders with \$1 billion or less in assets for First and Second Draw applications on Friday, Jan. 15. The portal fully opened on Tuesday, Jan. 19, to all participating PPP lenders to submit First and Second Draw loan applications to SBA.

Earlier the same week, SBA granted dedicated PPP access to Community Financial Institutions (CFIs) which include Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFIs), Minority Depository Institutions (MDIs), Certified Development Companies (CDCs), and Microloan Intermediaries as part of the agency's ongoing efforts to reach underserved and minority small businesses.

SBA will continue its emphasis on reaching smaller lenders and businesses by opening to approximately 5,000 more lenders, including community banks, credit unions, and farm credit institutions. Moreover,

the agency also plans to have dedicated service hours for these smaller lenders after the portal fully re-opens.

"A second round of PPP could not have come at a better time, and the SBA is making every effort to ensure small businesses have the emergency financial support they need to continuing weathering this time of uncertainty," said SBA Administrator Jovita Carranza. "SBA has worked expeditiously to ensure our policies and systems are re-launched so that this vital small business aid helps communities hardest hit by the pandemic. I strongly encourage America's entrepreneurs needing financial assistance to apply for a First or Second Draw PPP loan."

"We are pleased to have opened PPP loans to CDFIs, MDIs, CDCs, and Microloan Intermediaries. The PPP is already providing America's small businesses hardest hit by the pandemic with vital economic relief," said Secretary of the Treasury Steven T. Mnuchin. "As the Program re-opens for all First and Second Draw

borrowers next week, the PPP will allow small businesses to keep workers on payroll and connected to their health insurance."

First Draw PPP Loans are for those borrowers who have not received a PPP loan before Aug. 8, 2020. The first round of the PPP, which ran from March to August 2020, was a historic success helping 5.2 million small businesses keep 51 million American workers employed.

Second Draw PPP Loans are for eligible small businesses with 300 employees or less, that previously received a First Draw PPP Loan and will use or have used the full amount only for authorized uses, and that can demonstrate at least a 25% reduction in gross receipts between comparable quarters in 2019 and 2020. The maximum amount of a Second Draw PPP loan is \$2 million.

- Get plenty of liquids to help prevent viruses and bacteria from taking up residence in your body. According to Dr. Riva Rahl of the Cooper Clinic in Dallas: "The mucus in your nose is actually one of the key physical barriers that keep germs out of your body. When you're not well-hydrated, it dries up and doesn't provide that barrier."
- Protein is a building block for a healthy immune system. Choose lean red meats, poultry and fish, dried beans and soy. You also can choose protein-rich plant sources with heart-healthy fat, like peanut butter and nuts.

Office test alone can't diagnose COPD

Dear Dr. Roach: I am a healthy 70-year-old woman. The only prescription medication I take is for dry eyes. I recently visited my new primary physician for the first time, and she had me do a breathing test, where I exhaled into a tube to measure airflow. I was told to breathe deeply and exhale completely into the tube three times in succession. It took less than a minute to complete. It is apparently a routine test she orders for new patients.

She then told me I have COPD, on the basis of that test alone. She asked if I had ever smoked or been exposed to secondhand smoke. That was her only question — coughing or shortness of breath was never mentioned. I have never smoked, but my father was a smoker when I was growing up. I actually do have a slightly productive cough most mornings. I probably walk about 10 miles a week, and I do notice some shortness of breath on long uphill sections, though I can walk briskly in level areas for miles with no problem.

She said it is not advanced enough to require an inhaler at this time. I am bothered by this very easy "diagnosis" on the basis of one simple test. I wonder if I should ask to be referred to a pulmonologist for a more thorough evaluation. — O.P.

Answer: The test your doctor performed is called office spirometry, and it is useful for monitoring known pulmonary diseases, especially COPD and asthma. However, by itself, it is inadequate to make the diagnosis of COPD, which I am not sure you have.

The diagnosis of COPD is made in people with persistent respiratory symptoms, usually shortness of breath or coughing. Spirometry will usually show obstruction to airflow. Formal pulmonary function testing, which is an extensive process taking an hour or so with a skilled and experienced technician, is ideal for determining severity.

The problem with getting a breathing test in someone who has no significant symptoms is that you can find someone whose test results are at or just below

the lower limit of normal, and the diagnosis is unclear. The prognosis for people with mild airway obstruction but with no symptoms of COPD is much better than for people with COPD and who continue to smoke. For this reason, using spirometry as a screening test for everyone is not recommended.

Without knowing the exact results of your spirometry, I suspect you do not have COPD, given your absence of smoking and your extremely mild symptoms. A comprehensive exam by a pulmonologist would be definitive and may help you be less anxious about the results you have now.

Dear Dr. Roach: I saw your recent column on enlarged prostate, and I have the same problem. I have no history of cancer, but I do have a high PSA and symptoms of frequent urination. Because of other

medications, I cannot take ibuprofen, so I am curious if Tylenol has the same anti-inflammatory effect. I do occasionally use Tylenol for headaches and arthritis pain. — J.B.

Answer: The exact mechanism of how Tylenol reduces pain remains a mystery. However, it is not an anti-inflammatory drug like ibuprofen, so would not be expected to have the benefit in prostate symptoms that some men get from taking an ibuprofen at bedtime.

Kovels: Antiques and collecting

Many small porcelain figures were made in France, Germany and England in the 18th century, and many were made to resemble the work of the German Meissen factory. Realistic figures dressed in the robes of an unfamiliar country, or vases with scenes and additional raised floral decoration were best sellers even if the factory marks were symbols or initials that were nearly unknown. Jacob Mardochee Petit (1796-1868) started a porcelain factory in Bellville, France, in 1830. He also bought another

factory in Fontainebleau, then moved it to Avon in 1851. The company went out of business in 1862. Its early ware sold well, but in later years the firm concentrated on making Meissen and other copies. It made small figures and vases less than six inches high. The work in the 1850s was of lower quality and was less popular.

But today Jacob Petit perfume bottles are favorites of perfume bottle collectors, and there seem to be a few in every perfume bottle auction. Many are unmarked. The best-known mark is the underglaze letters "JP" in blue or incised.

Other marks are "JP" with a dot below and above the J and a dot below the P. There also is a diamond-shaped mark with the letter J outside the left corner and the letter P outside the right. Beware, they are best known for making copies of Chinese Export, Sevres and Meissen pieces that have fooled many collectors. A pair of authentic 7 1/2-inch-high figures of a Sultan and Sultana

in elaborate clothing sold at a 2019 Neal Auction in New Orleans for \$1,220.

g: My stepdaughter has a Chatty Cathy doll that she received about 1970. We are wondering if it has any value.

A: Chatty Cathy dolls were made by Mattel from 1960 until 1964. They were re-issued in 1969 and again in 1998-99. The original dolls were vinyl and 20 inches tall. They were available with

blue or brown eyes, and blonde, brunette or red hair. Dolls made closer to 1964 had hard plastic faces. In played-with condition, 1960s Chatty Cathy dolls sell for \$25 to \$75. In mint condition and in the original box, the value is closer to \$100 to \$150. The most expensive Chatty Cathy dolls are African American versions from the early 1960s. Examples of these dolls have sold

from \$450 to more than \$800.

Turn holiday photo cards into a matching game for toddlers and preschoolers. They'll enjoy playtime trying to pair up the faces and settings in your colorful pictures that you cut in half and mount on boxes.

- 1. Paint all of the boxes or cover with adhesive-backed paper.
- 2. For each photo, trim off holiday greetings, then cut in two parts to fit the top of two boxes. Glue in place.
- 3. To play, mix up the boxes and start matching pairs. You might say the names of the people or locations to your child as you go, as well as how they are related. Share a story or two about them.

When done, keep box pieces in an empty net bag. If you weave a string through the tops, you can hang them on a hook for easy storage between play.



Dear Paw's Corner: So many people are out of work right now, and there is little to no assistance available to them just to pay rent, much less buy food for themselves. I am wondering how will people be able to feed their pets in this desperate situation? Jamie G., Atlanta

Dear Jamie: One of the bright spots in this pandemic is the way that individuals have responded to help each other and fill the needs of tens of thousands maybe millions — of pets.

Shelters in many parts of the country have opened or expanded food pantries for pets to help owners keep their dogs and cats healthy and fed. Napa County, CA, for example, transformed two empty shipping containers into a community pet pantry offering free supplies this summer. (Search for "Napa County's new pet pantry" to learn more.)

In Tuscon, Cody's Friends, a charity started

in 2010 by a 10-yearold boy, has seen a huge surge of demand for pet food and is distributing to area shelters and clinics as fast as possible (codysfriends.org). And in North Carolina, the Davidson County Animal Alliance extended its holiday pet food collection drive because there was so much need.

If you are struggling to pay for pet food for any reason, contact your local shelter first and ask if there is a pet food program available. You may not be able to pick up food directly from a shelter; it may be distributed at a different location. Contact local food banks, churches and municipal offices. And of course, search online or on Facebook for these services as well.

Also, if you've been waiting to donate food, pet supplies or cash to a local shelter or charity, now is your moment to



Italian tuna and white bean salad

- 1 lemon
- 1 can (6 ounces) solid white tuna in water, drained
- 1 can (15 to 19 ounces) white kidney beans (cannellini), rinsed and drained
 - 1 medium tomato
- 1/2 fennel bulb (about 1 1/4 cups), cored and chopped
 - 2 tablespoons red onion, chopped
 - 2 tablespoons kalamata olives, chopped
 - 2 teaspoons fresh rosemary leaves, finely chopped
 - 1 tablespoon olive oil

Salt

- 1 bag mixed greens
- 1. From lemon, grate 1 teaspoon peel and squeeze 2 tablespoons juice; place in medium bowl.
- 2. With fork, flake tuna into bowl with lemon. Add beans, tomato, fennel, onion, olives, rosemary, oil and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Toss to mix well. (Tuna salad can be made ahead up to 6 hours; refrigerate, covered.)
- 3. To serve, divide greens among 4 dinner plates; top each with tuna salad.
