How cold is too cold for dogs? Winter pet care questions, answered A veterinarian advises on winter pet care, outlines steps to take should a pet experience frostbite

While some pets are naturally equipped for the cold weather, many are not. Learn more from Asitha Pillai, DVM, who is an emergency clinician with Oklahoma State University's Veterinary Medical Hospital. Below, she shares answers to common questions pet lovers may have about winter pet care.

How cold is too cold for dogs?

It's a common belief that pets can tolerate cold weather better than humans. When it is cold for us, it is cold for them. But if we can walk outside, they can also walk outside. However, your pet's ability to tolerate cold weather can vary depending on their coat, fat stores, age, health status and activity level. The time your dog spends outside during cold weather needs to be adjusted based on individual tolerance limits. If it is below freezing, let them outside only briefly for potty time. If you don't see your pet for a few minutes after you come inside, be sure to double-check he is safely inside the house.

How can cold weather be harmful to my pet?

Cold-weather injuries are found more often on a pet's extremities, meaning their tail, ear tips and paws. Depending on the height of dog and level of snow, a dog's belly also can be at risk for frostbite. Additionally, the salt used to melt snow and ice can cause irritation and pain when these chemicals come in contact with the cracks in your pet's paws. And while any form of deicer chemical can be toxic, some can be life-threatening. If you suspect that your dog or cat has been exposed to antifreeze, especially one containing ethylene glycol [the most life-threatening of antifreeze chemicals], immediately take them to an emergency veterinary facility.

How do I know if my pet has a cold-weather injury?

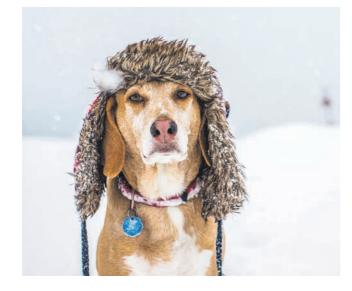
Pale, bluish or greyish discoloration of skin, pain, swelling and injuries like blister formation are indications there may be injury. Their legs also can be very stiff. When pets have frostbite, their body temperatures also can be low, putting them at risk for hypothermia.

What should I do if my pet has frostbite?

Cold-weather injuries can be mild or sometimes, they can be really serious injuries to a point we can see the paw pads or ear tips completely cut off from blood supply. If you fear your pet may have experienced a cold-weather injury such as frostbite, take these steps immediately:

- Bring pets inside where it is warm.
- Remove any ice or snow from their paws.
- Cover them with a warm blanket.
- Call your primary or emergency care veterinarian. How should I care for "outside dogs?"

While dogs should be kept inside most of the time during the winter, in the case that you have an outside dog, definitely provide them with a warm shelter, and make sure that their water is not frozen and that you have a heated pan for water.



Are there special considerations for senior dogs or pets with medical conditions?

Yes, be mindful of senior dogs with diseases, such as heart disease, kidney disease, hypothyroidism, diabetes or arthritis because these diseases may reduce their ability to regulate body temperature. Arthritic dogs can become very stiff outside in the winter and may slip and fall. They also can experience more pain. Schedule a wellness exam with your primary care veterinarian to ask important questions to help keep your senior dog comfortable, such as helping them maintain regular exercise, prevent pain and manage a normal body temperature.

How do I keep cats safe during wintertime?

It is important to keep in mind that cats will seek their own shelter during the cold weather, and one of the main shelters they will find is a warm car engine. They tend to hide underneath your car, or they will climb up and hide inside your hood, near the engine. By making noise or tapping the hood of your car, you can save their life, should they be tucked inside.

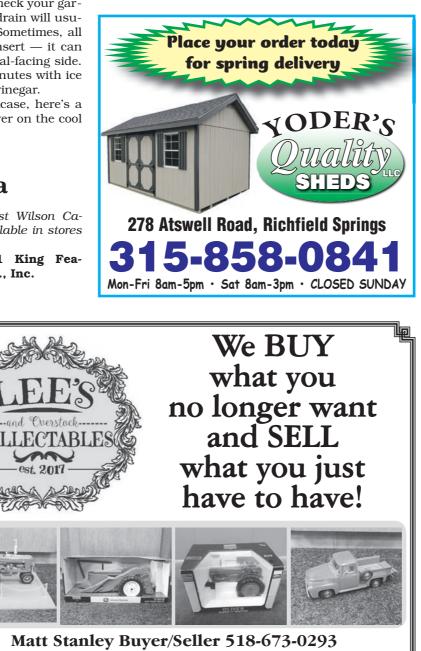

by Keith Roach, M.D. Vestibular migraines often include vertigo

Dear Dr. Roach: Can you shed light on how vestibular migraines are diagnosed and the best treatment? — J.H.

Answer: The vestibule of the ear is where the organ of balance is located, so vestibular symptoms relate to balance issues in general, but most commonly, it means vertigo. The term "vestibular migraine" means vestibular symptoms attributed to migraine.

Vestibular migraine thus includes migraine headache - not everyone will have headache with every episode, but most people with vestibular migraine will have headache with at least some of the episodes - and vestibular symptoms. These could include vertigo (a sensation of movement when still), unsteadiness or movement symptoms with a change in head position that persists long after the head has moved. Abnormal sensitivity to sound and vision are also prominent in vestibular migraine.

There is a similarly named condition, basilar migraine, which also has vestibular symptoms. However, basilar migraine has additional symptoms seen during the early, or aura, phase coming from the brainstem, deep in the brain, such as clumsy movements or confusion. These occur most commonly five minutes to an hour before the headache.

Making the diagnosis of vestibular migraine is challenging, since there are many clinical entities with similar symptoms. There is no conclusive laboratory or radiology tests to confirm the diagnosis. In practice, the diagnosis of probable vestibular migraine is made in people with recurrent migraine symptoms associated with vertigo. Often, treatment is begun when the condition is considered probable, and if the person does not respond well to treatment, a more thorough evaluation is considered.

Treatment for vestibular migraine is broken down into treatment for acute attacks and treatment to prevent attacks. Many neurologists use diazepam (Valium) and similar drugs for acute attacks. Preventive medicines come in many different families, and the choice of the best agent depends often on other conditions the person has. Everyone with migraine should try to find and avoid triggers. This includes eating on a reasonable schedule and good sleep hygiene.

If medications are needed, prescription choices include blood pressure medicines (beta blockers like propranolol and calcium channel blockers), antidepressants and seizure medicines. Over-the-counter options include riboflavin, magnesium, feverfew and coenzyme Q10, all of which have some but not conclusive evidence of benefit superior to placebo.

Dear Dr. Roach: Can you tell me the possible causes of psoriasis? I have read that it is related to chronic inflammation. What type of inflammation might this be? — C.K.

Answer: Psoriasis, a chronic skin condition that can sometimes affect the joints, is indeed an inflammatory condition, but inflammation is a set of symptoms and observable signs, not an underlying cause or diagnosis. There are five cardinal signs of inflammation: redness, swelling, pain, warmth and loss of function.

Psoriasis appears to be a problem of a dysregulated immune system. It is unclear what triggers the body to begin responding with inflammation to the skin, but some proteins (called antimicrobial peptides) made by skin cells may start the process. These can be triggered by trauma to the skin, but also by some medications, alcohol, cigarette smoking, infections and stress, all of which can also act as triggers for people with psoriasis. These make the immune system cells specific to the skin become much more active.

Understanding the immune system issues in psoriasis has led to newer and more effective treatments, especially for more-severe psoriasis.

When are pets considered adults?

Kittens and puppies grow up fast. One minute they're small, fluffy balls of fur, and the next minute they're taking up your entire sofa.

Young animals are full of seemingly boundless energy. Young pets may sprint from room to room as they explore the world around them, sniffing, scratching and chewing along the way. All of this can be adorable for the first few months, but many pet owners are left scratching their heads wondering when their pets are going to "grow up" and be less of a full-time job.

The pet resource Rover.com says that puppies are generally considered adults by the time they reach their first birthday. This may vary depending on the breed. The home life guide TheNest.com says that kittens take about a year to reach adulthood.

Just because a cat or dog is considered an adult does not mean he or she will behave more maturely. In

fact, adulthood often means the pet simply won't grow any more. Many behavioral issues associated with young animals may continue into adulthood.

A pet's journey to emotional maturity can take quite a while, but it will come. Hormonal surges will even out, and the animal will begin to settle down. Only when that point is reached will pet owners get an idea of what their animals will be like over the long haul.

It can take a cat up to four years to reach emotional maturity. Dogs' journeys to maturity will vary depend-



ing on the breed and the size of the animal. The pet food company Pedigree says a large dog breed will mature into an adult between 15 months and two years, while smaller breeds may only act like puppies for nine months.

Since emotional maturity varies from pet to pet, these signs may indicate it has happened or is just about there:

• Settles down more readily and has fewer episodes of "the zoomies."

• Listens better.

- Responds to social cues from other animals.
- Older animals treat the animal like an adult.
- Responds appropriately to training.

• Doesn't get into the same level of puppy or kitty trouble around the house.

Even as cats and dogs mature physically and emotionally, they may still have some bouts of youngster behavior. But in general, after a year or two pets start to show their true colors and behave more maturely.

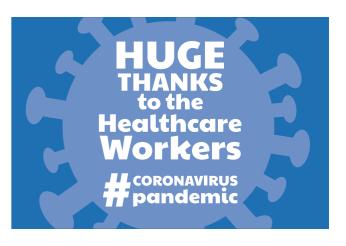

Pets groom themselves to stay clean. but when allergies are present, dogs and cats may spend extended periods of time scratching, licking and biting. While these actions can be problematic for the animals themselves, for those sensitive to sounds, the repetition may induce un-

settled feelings. Psychology Today says "misphonia" is an extreme emotional and physical response to seemingly innocuous, repetitive sounds. While chewing and lip-smacking are common triggers, noises made by pets (like barking or licking) also can cause an issue. The result is a fight-or-flight response to these noises, along with physical tension, disproportionate anger and possible hatred or disgust toward the person or animal responsible for the trigger noise. While studies into misphonia are in their juvenile stages and only recently gained traction, symptoms are thought to begin in childhood or adolescence and increase in severity. Treatment for misphonia is varied, but if aversion to the noise a pet is making can be alleviated by addressing the pet's underlying issue, then people's misphonia may be alleviated as well.

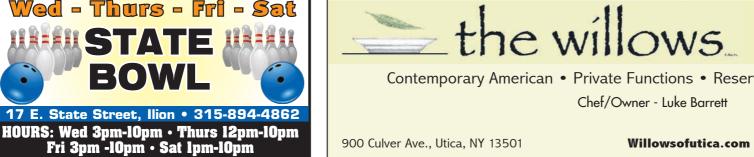

A host of factors can contribute to vision problems in dogs. Age is one such factor, but diseases such as diabetes and hereditary conditions, including progressive retinal atrophy, also can lead to visual impairment. Before dog owners can work with veterinarians to determine the cause of their furry friends' vision loss, they must first learn to recognize signs of impairment. The AKC notes that some of these signs may be obvious while others are more subtle.

• Bumping into walls or furniture: This is a clear indicator that a dog is experiencing vision problems. Dog owners who notice this is happening even when there's nothing to obstruct their dogs' path should book a vet appointment immediately.

• Trouble locating food or toys: Most dogs love to eat and drink and play with their toys. So a sudden inability to find food or water bowls or a favorite toy could indicate the dog is having vision problems. • Reluctance to jump on or off a couch: This symptom can be less noticeable than bumping into furniture or having trouble finding food. Dogs that once loved to jump on or off a couch but now stick to the floor may be doing so due to impaired vision and the fear of not being able to see where they're jumping.

• Clinginess: The AKC notes that some dogs cling to their owners as they experience vision loss.

• Aggressiveness: Dogs may begin to show aggression as they experience vision loss. That's because the loss of their eyesight can make them feel vulnerable, leading some to act offensively as a defense mechanism.

• Physical indicators/behaviors: Dog owners should be on the lookout for red, puffy or swollen eyes. In addition, Memphis Veterinary Specialists & Emergency notes that some dogs may paw at their face in response to vision loss.

Vision loss in dogs can be caused by many things. The first step to helping dogs overcome diminished vision is recognizing its symptoms.

Chow Line: Saving money on meals using slow cookers

One of my resolutions this year is to eat healthier but save time and money on food. Got any ideas?

One budeasy, get-friendly way to save money, time, and energy on food at home is to prepare a hearty meal using a slow cooker.

Not only are slow cookers convenient, but they can also help families save money by making less expensive, tougher cuts of meat-such as shoulder, round, and chuck steak-more tender and shrink less. That's a significant consideration for many, considering that food prices are forecast to increase this year, according to the USDA's Economic Research Service.

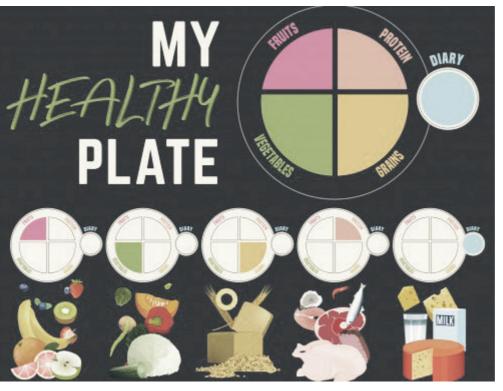
Their research found that food purchased at grocery stores is projected to increase an additional 1% to 2%, and food-away-from-home is projected to increase between 2% and 3% in 2021.

As mentioned in a previous Chow Line, when using a slow cooker, however, there are some precautions you should take to ensure that the meals you cook are both safe and nutritious to eat. For example, two of the more popular food items to prepare using a slow cooker are meats and poultry, which need to be time- and temperature-controlled for safety.

According to the US-DA's Food Safety and Inspection Service, it's important to avoid cooking frozen meats and poultry in a slow cooker. Always thaw them first. This is because frozen beef and poultry won't reach 140° Fahrenheit quickly enough, which could cause a foodborne illness.

Slow cookers work by cooking foods at lower temperatures-typically between 170 to 280 degrees-for several hours. This could be a concern for some foods because the bacteria that cause food poisoning multiply quickest in the "danger zone" between 40 and 140 degrees, according to Foodsafety.gov.

Use a food thermometer to accurately deter-

mine if your food has reached the proper internal temperature to kill harmful bacteria

Here are some other tips from the

USDA:

• Keep perishable foods, especially pre-sliced vegetables, refrigerated and out of the danger zone. Bacteria multiply rapidly when at room temperature. To avoid this, keep your food refrigerated until it's time to add it to the slow cooker.

• Make sure your foods fit. The slow cooker should be half to two-thirds full to ensure your food cooks thoroughly.

• Position foods that take longer to cook on the bottom of the slow cooker, then arrange other solid ingredients on top, making sure to spread them out evenly.

• Keep the lid on. It's important to retain the heat when making a slow cooker meal. Only remove the lid to stir or check for doneness.

• If possible, turn the cooker on the highest setting for the first hour of cooking time and then to low or the setting called for in your recipe. However, it's safe to cook foods on low the entire time.

• Foods take different times to cook depending on the setting used. While foods will cook faster on high than on low, for all-day cooking or for less tender cuts, you may want to use the low setting.

• If you have any leftovers, it's important to store them in a shallow, covered container in the refrigerator within two hours after being cooked. And, when reheating leftovers, don't use your slow cooker. Use your stove top, microwave, or conventional oven to heat the food to at least 165° before eating

How to avoid wedding reception seating mistakes

Weddings are great opportunities for people to gather and celebrate the melding of two families into one. A bigger faux pas is to sit teenagers or twenty-somethings at the kids table even if they seem like youngsters to you. Set a strict cut-off age for a children's table.

Mistake #5: Being too strict in seating. It's one thing to direct couples or singletons to specific tables, quite another to assign specific seats. Do not dictate exactly where at the table a guest should sit. Some people arrive early, others late, and it is up to them to work out how to arrange themselves at the table.

Kovels: Antiques and collecting

by Terry and Kim Kovel Penny toys

Children's toys are valuable records of what life was like in the past. From about 1880 to 1914, inexpensive, mechanical lithographed tin toys known as "penny toys" were popular and affordable in America. A toy rickshaw with a driver and a lady in a small cart was made by George Fischer of Nuremberg, Germany in the early 1900s. The company made many different penny toys, all based on the life of the times. His trademark on most toys was "G.F." in capital letters. But was there really a rickshaw powered by a man riding a bicycle?

Yes. It is thought that the first rickshaw was invented about 1869 by an American missionary to Japan who used it to transport his invalid wife. The idea became popular, and by 1872 there were about 40,000 rickshaws in use in Japan. There are many styles and names like bike taxi, pedicab, tricycle taxi and even modern electric models. Men pushed or pedaled the rickshaw because they were less expensive than a horse. The driver and passenger of the Fischer rickshaw pictured here are wearing 1910 clothes, so the toy may have been made then. The price for this toy is no longer a penny; it sold for \$5,400 at a Bertoia auction.

g: I have a J.H. Cutter bottle similar to a bottle pictured on your website that

sold for over \$300 a few years ago. Mine isn't a clear amber color like the one pictured on your site, unless it's held up to the light. It has an iridescent color down one side with shades of blue-green and orange, maybe from something that was stored in it. I found it near the Boston seaport. Any information would be greatly appreciated.

A: The color of a bottle affects the price. Bottles in rare or desirable colors sell for more than those in other colors. "Amber" can include honey amber, olive amber, orange amber, deep tobacco amber and other shades. Sun turns glass lavender or dirty brownish beige. Iridescence on the outside can come from being in water; on the inside it might be from contact with food. It takes an expert to tell the difference and determine the value of the bottle.

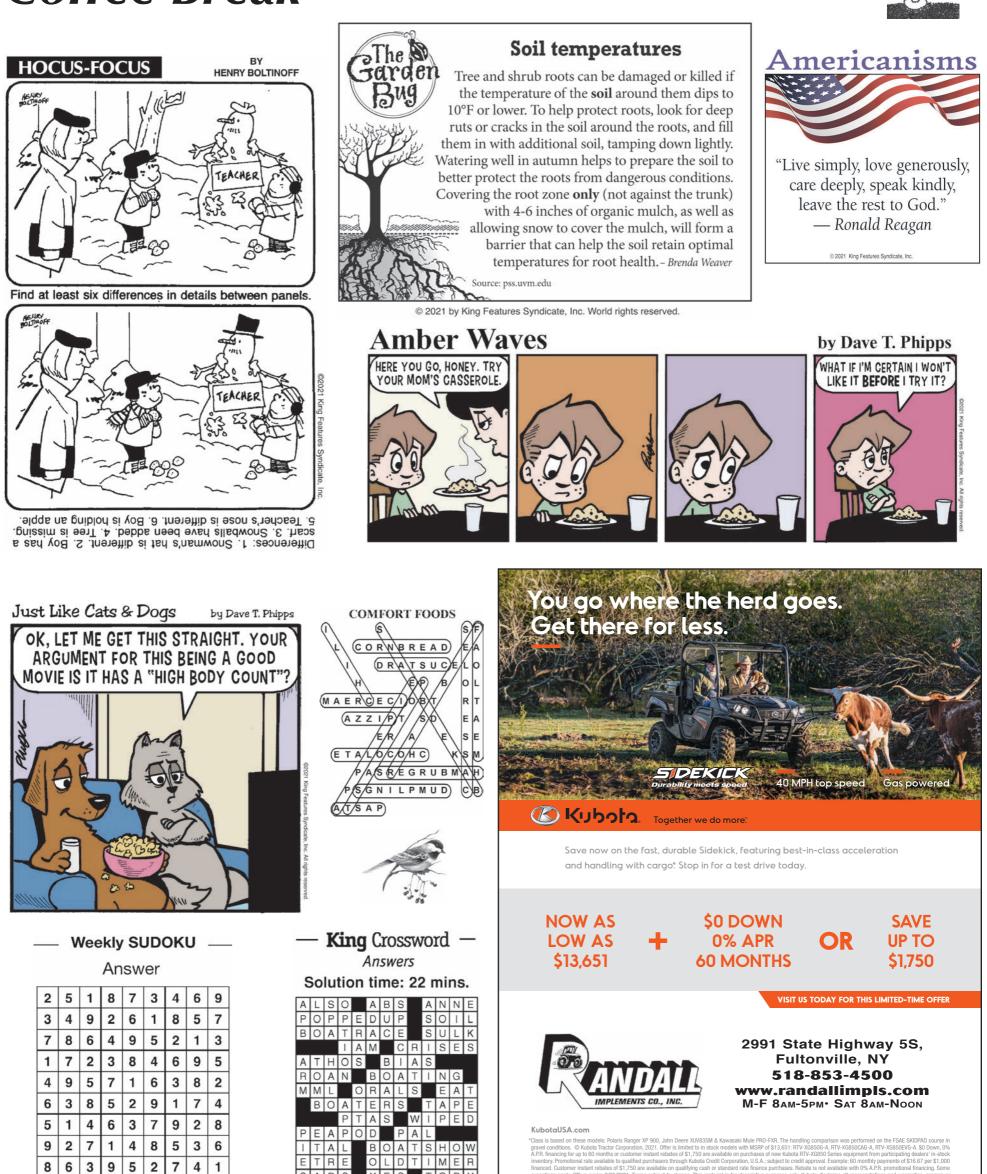

Pros and cons to pet doors

Pets quickly take up residence in their owners' homes and hearts. Many pet parents treat their pets as full-fledged members of the family, with the same privileges and attention they devote to other family members.

A 2016 Harris Poll found 95 percent of Americans consider their pets to be part of the family, and there is not much they won't do for their companion animals. Pros

Cats may chase bugs or small animals. Dogs may run around the yard and play with a ball or stick. Easy access to outdoor play can take some of the burden off of busy pet owners.

Cons

As convenient as pet doors can be, they may disconnect pet owners from their pets. People may feel they don't need to spend the time in the yard or walking the animal, and that can adversely affect the bonds between pet owner and pet.

Another potential disadvantage concerns alpha-driven pets. Giving pets control over their comings and goings may reinforce ego and potentially cause the animal to be less responsive to his owner's commands.

cern. Although there are smart doors that can only open when triggered by a chip on the pet's collar, one never knows what pets may bring indoors. Cats may present dead rodents and dogs may dirty the house with muddy paws.

Weather is another concern. In colder climates, pet doors may be another source of drafts, contributing to inefficient heating and cooling situations.

Dogs or cats who are prone to roaming could get into trouble if left to their own devices outside.

Pet owners should consider a host of factors before installing pet doors in their homes.

How to add high-quality protein to your diet

(BPT) - Recent diet trends encourage balancing food sources for optimal health. and oils, not red meat. Americans, on average, eat fewer than two ounces of beef daily, which is in line with 2015 Dietary Guidelines.

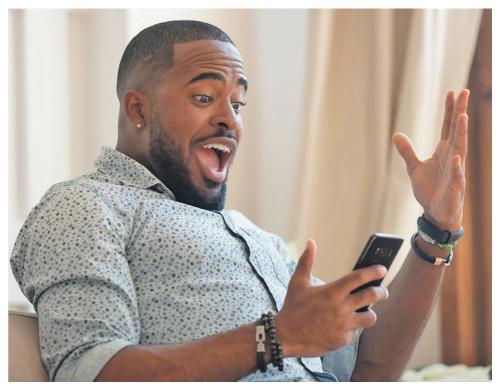

Tips to find the right dog trainer

• Ask about a trainer's philosophy. Dog trainers use various methods, but the AKC emphasizes the importance of finding trainers who use positive reinforcement training. Such a philosophy rewards appropriate behavior and teaches alternative behaviors in place of inappropriate ones. The AKC notes that positive reinforcement training is science-based and fosters a love of learning in dogs while strengthening the bond between dogs and their owners.

• Find out which services the trainer offers. Trainers offer different services. Some may specialize in one-on-one training, while others train in class-like environments that can promote socialization.



The AKC offers the following tips to dog owners searching for the right trainer.

Each dog is different, so a training environment that works for one dog may not work for another. Speak with various trainers about their services and then choose the one that most aligns with your dog's personality.

• Ask for a trainer's credentials. The AKC notes that certification with certain organiza-

tions is not mandatory, though certifications may indicate how serious a trainer is about training dogs. Trainers should be forthcoming about their credentials, including any certifications they may have. The Association of Professional Dog Trainers (www.apdt.com) can help dog owners learn about the various types of

certification so they can make the most informed decisions possible when choosing a trainer for their dogs.

• Take note of your own comfort level with the trainer. The AKC reminds dog owners that dog trainers teach dog owners, who will need to be comfortable with a trainer to get the most of his or her services. Ask to observe a training class and take note of the trainer's interactions with both the dogs and their owners.
