

Schedule your free virtual tax filing assistance session today

Tax Department experts will help you e-file your 2020 federal and state income tax returns at no cost

The NYS Department of Taxation and Finance recently announced that registration for free virtual tax filing assistance sessions is now open. If your federal adjusted gross income in 2020 was \$72,000 or less, you qualify to receive free virtual tax assistance from the Tax Department. We can guide you through the process of electronically preparing and filing your 2020 federal and state income tax returns at no cost. During a prescheduled virtual webinar session using WebEx or Zoom, our department representatives will guide you step by step as needed through the free tax preparation software as you complete and file your own tax return.

"This online tax software is a safe, convenient and secure way to file – and it's free," said NYS Commissioner of Taxation and Finance Michael Schmidt. "I highly encourage all eligible New Yorkers – especially those with simple returns – to take advantage of this free tax assistance service to avoid fees charged by tax software vendors and tax preparers." **Register for a session**

You can register to attend a session directly with the Tax Department or through one of their partners.

Once you register, you will receive an email with a link to the webinar session. You will also receive a link to the free tax software and an intake questionnaire. Review and fill out the intake questionnaire to ensure you have all the documents needed to complete your return during the session.

• Have all tax documents and personal information for each person on the return available for the webinar session

• Use the software link to set up an account in the free software

• Follow up by checking your email within 48 hours once you

submit your return You can review the docu-

ments to have on hand and an explanation of how to create an account to use the free software at tax.ny.gov/fsa.

Additionally, if you're confident enough to file on your own, you can use your own computer, tablet or mobile device to prepare and e-file your income tax returns whenever and wherever you want using the same secure software at no cost. Utica Zoo animal encounters now available through summer

The Utica Zoo announced openings for in person and virtual animal encounters through summer with a wide variety of options available. Due to unpredictable COVID-19 outbreaks, encounter dates have been released slowly to ensure visitors would be able to experience their encounter.

The most popular encounter at the zoo is with the world-famous red pandas. The zoo has announced dates available for booking through August. Red panda encounters are only available on Wednesdays and Saturdays at 2 p.m. from a recommendation from the Association of Zoos and Aquariums Species Survival

Plan. Additionally, dates for Bactrian camel and Nigerian dwarf goat encounters are available through August.

The zoo has also opened California sea lion and "Call with the Wild" virtual encounter dates through April and ambassador animal encounter dates through June. The variety of date openings is due to scheduling and logistical issues and more dates will open in the near future.

py Gilmore.



The long-term effects of COVID-19

As the end of winter draws near, much of the world is marking its one-year anniversary living under COVID-19-related restrictions. That's certainly not a milestone worthy of celebration, and many people across the globe would insist it has felt like much more than a year since their lives were first affected by COVID-19.

By the time the calendar finally turned from 2020 to 2021, tens of millions of people across the globe had been infected with COVID-19. According to Worldometer, which manually analyzes, validates and aggregates data from thousands of sources in real time, by early January 2021 there were more than 87 million documented cases of COVID-19 and nearly two million virus-related deaths across the globe. Nearly 62 million COVID-19 patients recovered from the virus by early 2021, but many of those people may suffer from long-term health effects.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

is actively working to learn more about the potential long-term effects associated with COVID-19. Because of the relative infancy of the virus, it's impossible to know just how long the long-term side effects in recovered patients will last. However, the CDC notes that the following are some of the most commonly reported long-term symptoms, which have been documented to linger anywhere from several weeks to even months after recovery.

- Fatigue
- Shortness of breath
- Cough
- Joint pain
- Chest pain

In addition to those symptoms, the CDC notes that some people who have recovered from COVID-19 have reported experiencing difficulty with thinking and concentration as well as depression. Recovering patients also have reported symptoms like muscle pain, headache, intermittent fever, and heart palpitations.

More serious long-term complications are being investigated by the CDC. Such complications have thus far appeared to be less common, though the CDC cautions that more research and time is needed to determine clinical care for COVID-19 as well as how many people may ultimately experience these symptoms

• Cardiovascular: Inflammation of the heart muscle

- Respiratory: Lung function abnormalities
- Renal: Acute kidney injury
- Dermatologic: Rash, hair loss
- Neurological: Smell and taste problems, sleep is-

sues, difficulty with concentration, memory problems • Psychiatric: depression, anxiety, changes in mood

coffee are sometimes debated, though many historians trace the beverage to a stormy night in Ireland. One fateful night in 1943, Irishman Joe Sheridan was called back to work at the restaurant and coffee shop at the Fovnes Airbase Flying Boat terminal in County Limerick. A flight that had recently departed for Newfoundland was forced to return to the airport that night due to inclement weather. According to the Foynes Flying Boat and Maritime Museum. Sheridan was asked to

make something for the passengers to help them stay warm. Before serving some freshly made coffee, Sheridan decided to add a little Irish whiskey, and the rest is history.

The popularity of Irish coffee is undeniable, and some of that popularity likely stems from how easy it can be to make the drink at home. Though Irish coffee is a straightforward beverage, the Foynes Flying Boat and Maritime Museum offers the following tips for those who want to whip up a batch that would make Sheridan proud. 1. Preheat an Irish coffee glass by filling it with boiling water. Keep the water in the glass for five seconds, and then pour the water out.

2. Add 1 teaspoon of brown sugar and a good measure of Irish whiskey into the warmed glass.

3. Fill the glass to within 1 centimeter (a little less than half an inch) of the brim of the glass with hot and strong black coffee. Stir well so all of the brown sugar dissolves.

4. Carefully pour lightly whipped cream over the back of a spoon. The goal is to ensure the cream floats on top of the coffee. 5. Do not stir after add-

ing the cream. It's important to avoid stirring because the Irish coffee will be most flavorful if you drink the coffee and whiskey through the cream.

A pint of Guinness might be a must for millions of St. Patrick's Day celebrants across the globe. But those who want something a little warmer can try their hands at Irish coffee as they toast the patron saint of Ireland this March.

Make managing eczema easier

(Family Features) More than 30 million Americans, including nearly 10 million children, have eczema, the umbrella term for a group of noncontagious, inflammatory and painful skin conditions marked by an itchy, rash-like appearance. Because one of the most challenging aspects of eczema can be its unpredictability, the National Eczema Association (NEA), designed an app to help people and parents easily track what's important and make sense of it.

The app, called EczemaWise, aims to revolutionize how people living with the condition manage it with a faster, more efficient tracking system that helps uncover trends and makes preparing for doctors' appointments easier.

People with eczema tend to have an overreactive immune system that produces inflammation on the skin when triggered by a substance outside or inside the body, such as food or pollen, along with factors like stress and sleep. Experts say tracking and recording symptoms and possible triggers is key to managing the condition, but it can be time-consuming, and many people struggle to keep thorough notes in journals or on their smartphones.

"One of the best things out there to help keep track of your child's eczema is EczemaWise because it's so easy to use," said Aisha Bryant, mother of a 3-year-old with eczema. "Within a few days of using it, I was able to identify that tomato sauce was causing my daughter to flare."

The app can help track nine different disease and care factors, including:

• **Itch intensity** on a scale of 0-10

• Pain on a scale of 0-10

• **Skin symptoms** using a body map to note affected areas

• **Stress** on a scale of 0-10

 \bullet Sleep problems on a scale

of 0-10

• Weather, which auto-populates using your location

• Triggers, which track ex-

posure to materials such as metals, chemicals, irritants and environmental allergies

• **Diet** with tracking of water

• **Treatments** logged by time of day

The free app, which is available for Android and iOS as well as a web app, is designed to identify trends and patterns so people and their doctors can better determine the most effective treatments. NEA recommends tracking a minimum of three times each week - and ideally daily - though people can log as many or as few factors as they like. App users can also print their health data to share at doctors' appointments.

"Using EczemaWise will empower patients with eczema," said dermatologist Eric L. Simpson, MD. "The app allows them to communicate a much broader story about their disease than we can typically capture in a 15-minute visit."

Winter squash are prominently displayed at grocery stores in the fall and winter months, but many shoppers pass them by because they don't know how to make them. Winter squash are easy to prepare and are a healthy addition to any meal.

The Cucurbitaceae family is the Latin name pumpkins gourds, for and squash. The terms Summer and Winter can deceptive. Summer be squash types are on the market all winter; Winter squash types can be found in late summer and fall, as well as winter. This terminology was never meant to confuse — it just dates to a time when the seasons were more crucial to man's survival than they are now. Vegetables that would keep until December became known as winter vegetables.

Winter squash are picked when they are fully mature, and they have a thick, inedible skin. This thick skin provides a protective covering for the squash and allows for a long storage life. Winter squash can be stored for three months or longer in a cool, dry place, preferably in a single layer.

Every part of the squash plant can be eaten, including the leaves and tender shoots, which can be cooked in omelets or made into soup. Winter squash are a good source of vitamins A and C, potassium and fiber. One-half cup of cooked winter squash has only 40 calories. Some of the most popular types of winter squash are butternut, spaghetti, acorn squash and Delicata.

• Butternut squash is tan in color and has a long, bell-like shape.

• Spaghetti squash is oblong or oval in shape and vellow in color.

• Acorn squash is actually shaped like an acorn. It is dark green and has a ridged rind or skin.

• Delicata squash is oblong, ridged, and yellow and green. The skin is soft and edible.

When shopping, look for squash that are heavy for their size, free of soft spots and have a dull sheen (a shiny skin is an indicator the squash is not fully mature).

butternut Once or acorn squash is cooked and cooled, it can be peeled away from the skin, cut into cubes, and used in soups, stews and casseroles along with other vegetables. Butternut or acorn squash can be used interchangeably in recipes.

Spaghetti squash is the exception. Once it is cooked, use a fork to peel the flesh away from the skin. It looks just like spaghetti as it peels away. Sauce and serve spaghetti squash like regular noodles.

Delicata squash is the easiest squash to prep and cook because of its soft, edible skin. It contains seeds in the center, but they can be easily removed by scraping them out with a spoon.

This delicious recipe for Southwestern Stuffed Delicata Squash is a wonderful side dish or vegetarian entree on a cold winter's day.

Southwestern Stuffed **Delicata Squash**

2 Delicata squash 2 tablespoons vegetable oil

1 1/2 teaspoons salt 1/21 teaspoons ground black pepper

1 cup cooked rice 1/2 tablespoon chili powder

rice. Before adding water or broth to the rice, season with the remaining salt and pepper, the chili powder, cumin and cayenne pepper or hot sauce. Mix well and proceed with the directions for preparing the rice.

6. When the rice is done, add in the beans, chopped peppers, cilantro and chopped tomatoes. Mix together and heat on low for 3 minutes, stirring once.

If pets could speak, caring for them would be that much easier. But pet owners must rely on physical cues to determine if their beloved pets are doing well or feeling under the weather.

Various animals display different symptoms when they are not feeling well or suffering from illness. It is important for pet owners to become familiar with what is "normal" for their pets so that they can readily identify behaviors or symptoms indicative of illness. Keep in mind that symptoms that would indicate illness in one pet may not do the same with other animals. That is why it is key to establish a baseline. According to Mark Stickney, DVM, director of general surgery services at Texas A&M University College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences, any change in a pet's behavior from what is normal is reason to consult a veterinarian.

This generalized symptom list may give pet owners pause to speak with a vet about the health of their furry friends.

Cats

Cats will spit up on occasion, particularly if they have been grooming themselves and have to pass a hairball. Cats who roam outdoors may gobble down a kill and later vomit back up indigestible parts, like feathers or fur. But frequent vomiting may be indicative of a food allergy or intolerance. Sometimes it may be the symptom of gastric irritation from parasites like roundworms.

It is difficult to gauge if cats are ill because they can be so stoic. Blood in vomit or feces, decreased activity, straining to urinate, or urinating in inappropriate places can be signs of illness in cats.

Dogs

Dogs are a little better than cats at conveying illness. Generally speaking, normally upbeat and boisterous dogs that are now lethargic and uninterested in interaction are probably sick. Fetch by WebMD says disinterest in food for several days, vomiting, diarrhea, or changes in urination might indicate illness. Quite often pet owners do not discover their dogs are suffering from diabetes until they have to frequently refill water bowls and their normally trained pets start urinating inside the home.

Hamsters

According to The Spruce: Pets, common signs of illness or injury in hamsters include inactivity, huddling in a corner, unkempt coat, discharge from the nose or eyes, wetness around the tail, or hair loss. Bring the hamster in for a checkup if it exhibits any of these symptoms.

Lizards

Determining if your pet lizard is sick can be challenging since lizards, and most reptiles, have such slow metabolisms that they often do not show signs of illness until a disease has progressed. Different species have varying nutritional requirements and light requirements. They also have their own specific temperature and humidity needs. PetMD says lack of appetite, fewer droppings, lethargy with hiding under bedding, sunken eyes, sticky mucus in the mouth, and weight loss, particularly thinning of the tail, are signs a lizard may be sick.

Getting to know pet behaviors and indications of wellness can make it easier to determine if a pet is sick and needs medical attention.

Tasty slow-cooker granola

We're a granola-eating family. When the tall jar in our pantry reads almost empty, it's time to stir up and bake a new batch. It's never a chore, because the fresh homemade taste of heart healthy oats with nuts and dried fruit always satisfies, whether combined with vogurt and berries at breakfast, or sprinkled over a scoop of ice cream for an evening dessert.

No wonder I was curious when a friend suggested I make granola in my slow cooker instead of baking it in the oven. Skeptical, I gave it a try and loved the results. In fact, it's a game-changer.

I stick with my basic recipe that never disappoints. The hand-crafted, economical blend is open to variations, like substituting cashews for the almonds or pecans. When I buy a jug of fresh local maple syrup, I leave out the brown sugar entirely. For variety, I'll cut up something unusual, like dried persimmons, to toss in at the end with the raisins.

Tasty slow cooker granola

Cooking spray or olive oil

4 cups old-fashioned rolled oats (not quick cooking)

- 1/2 cup brown sugar*
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup coarsely chopped whole almonds

1/2 cup coarsely chopped pecans

- 1/2 cup canola oil

- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 egg whites, slightly beaten
- 1/2 cup raisins**

1. Prepare the slow cooker: Spray the cooking spray on the bottom and sides of a 3-quart or larger slow cooker, or lightly coat with oil.

2. Combine the oats, brown sugar, cinnamon, baking powder, salt and nuts in a slow cooker.

3. Stir together the oil, vanilla and egg whites in a small bowl. Add to dry ingredients and toss well until fully coated.

4. Turn slow cooker to high. Set a wooden spoon under one side of the lid to hold the lid open, slightly ajar. Cook for 1 1/2 to 2 hours until toasted, stirring mixture well every 30 minutes.

5. Stir in raisins and spread mixture on a baking sheet to cool. Store in jars or in an airtight container. Makes about 6 cups.

*Substitute brown sugar with 1/2 cup maple syrup, honey or agave syrup, and combine with liquid ingredients before tossing with dry ingredients.

**In addition to (or instead of) raisins, use your favorite dried fruit, chopped.

TIP: To give as a gift, let kids draw a label to glue to a mason jar. It might say "The Johnsons' World's Best Granola.'
