Poland Virtual Science Fair winners announced

Poland Central School District eighth-grader Maddison Haver and sophomore Shelbi Hagues were named the Grand Champions of the Poland Virtual Science Fair.

Students won trophies and more than \$3,000 in prizes during Poland's 33rd annual Science Fair – the first one was that was held virtually. Students who won awards are eligible to advance to the Utica College Regional Science Fair.

Fifty students in grades 7-11 made Google Sites for their projects with video presentations, and 24 judges from three continents signed up to review the projects online. Students with some of the top projects also gave virtual presentations to a panel of five judges.

Junior Level awards go to students in grades 7-9, and Senior Level awards go to students in grades 10-11.

Haver won Grand Champion in the Junior Level for her project titled "Taproots or Fibrous Roots? Which Will Save our Wildlife and Land?" The project looked into how much water the types of roots soaked up. Haver also won the Ben Hill Save Our Earth Award, Excellence in Presentation, the Mounts Creek Farm Award and First Place - Natural Science.

Hagues won Grand Champion in the Senior Level for her project titled "Chunky? Smooth?" The project examined which blenders did the best job making smooth smoothies. Hagues also won Excellence in Presentation, the Scientific Methodology Award and First Place - Math/Technology.

Wedded bliss in times like this

(Family Features) During pre-COVID times, wedding concerns like venue capacity had far more to do with budget and vision than with the health and safety of guests. It's a different world today, but with some careful planning you can still find ways to safely celebrate your love.

As the vows say, marriage is in good times and in bad. It may simply require some flexibility and creativity to make your dream day a reality.

Enlist help from an experienced coordinator. If you weren't planning to use a wedding coordinator, the pandemic is a compelling reason to reconsider. Smoked ham with fresh strawberry sauce

created this impressive 1-inch-wide strips. glazed ham for winter entertaining, but it has become an Easter favorite as well.

- 1 (12-pound) smoked whole ham, fully cooked
 - 3 pints strawberries
 - 2 tablespoons dark brown sugar
 - 2 tablespoons cornstarch
 - 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 jar (10- to 12-ounce) orange marmalade

Radish sprouts or watercress sprigs, for garnish

1. Remove skin and trim some fat from smoked whole ham, leaving about 1/4-inch fat. With knife, score fat covering on ham crosswise, just through to the meat, into

- 2. Place ham on rack in large roasting pan (about 17 by 11 1/2 inches). Insert meat thermometer into center of ham, being careful that pointed end does not touch bone. Bake ham in 325 F oven 3 to 3 1/2 hours until thermometer reaches 140 F (15 to 18 minutes per pound). If ham browns too quickly, cover with tent of foil.
- 3. About 30 minutes before ham is done, prepare strawberry sauce: Reserve 1 pint strawberries for garnish. Hull remaining strawberries. In 3-quart saucepan with potato masher or back of slotted spoon, mash strawberries. Stir in brown sugar, cornstarch, salt and orange

marmalade; cook over medium heat until mixture thickens slightly and boils, stirring frequently.

- 4. To serve, place ham on warm, platter. Arrange sprouts and reserved whole strawberries around ham. Serve with strawberry sauce. Makes 24 serv-

Tips for allergy season

Spring is upon us and for many that means the advent of allergy season. For those who suffer from seasonal allergies this time of the year, it is often associated with sinus congestion, a runny nose and itchy eyes. Along with itching, other common ocular symptoms include redness and tearing.

Remedies and treatment options are broad and abundant. Most importantly, do not rub your eyes, as this will release more histamine from the body, worsening your symptoms. Cool compresses are an effective way to help with inflammation. Many allergy sufferers take over-the-counter or prescription oral antihistamines but still experience itchy and irritated eyes. Some effective over-the-counter antihistamine eye drops that I often recommend to my patients include Zaditor, Pataday and Alaway. These eye drops are to be used twice daily.

Additionally, over-the-counter artificial tears can help provide further relief.

Most of the time these eye drops are all that is needed; however, in some severe cases they may provide only temporary relief or none at all. If you find yourself at that point, it's time to seek an exam from an eye doctor, as further treatment may be required.

Hardy Hibiscus adds a splash of tropical flair to your perennial garden

Fast-growing and fabulous, these plants explode with pinwheel-like flowers the size of dinner plates in late summer. Often confused with their tropical cousins, these plants are actually capable of surviving temps as low as -30° F.

North American gardeners can feel assured knowing they are planting a native perennial. Hardy Hibiscus are hybrids that can be primarily traced back to the species Hibiscus moscheutos. This species can be found growing naturally in wetlands and along riverbanks throughout the Midwest and East Coast.

Know Your Hibiscus

Hibiscus is both the common and botanical name for

a few different popular classes of the plant. Most think of Tropical Hibiscus (Hibiscus rosa-sinensis) when they hear the word, while horticulturists may note the shrub Rose of Sharon (Hibiscus syriacus) also falls in this category. However, neither of these plants fall into what is commonly considered "Hardy Hibiscus."

Here is a quick overview of how they differ:

Hardy Hibiscus

First, our subject and superstar: Hardy Hibiscus. This set of plants primarily includes the species native to North America (such as Hibiscus moscheutos and Hibiscus laevis), and hybrids of those species. These plants are true perennials, tend to have the largest

flowers, and die back to the ground each year.

Shrub Hibiscus

Shrub Hibiscus, also called Rose of Sharon, most frequently refers to the species Hibiscus syriacus which is native to southern and central Asia. Rose of Sharon has a woody habit and bloom on the same structure each year. These tend to be the largest in size with some varieties getting 15' tall.

Tropical Hibiscus

Tropical Hibiscus, or Hibiscus rosa-sinensis, are from southeast Asia and are technically a shrub-like their cousins, Hibiscus syriacus, though significantly less hardy. These varieties tend to be used in the landscape in southern parts of the U.S. or as patio or house plants since they are not frost tolerant.

Common Hardy Hibiscus varieties to keep your eye out for

through the petals. The leaves of the plants can also vary in color from green to bronze and nearblack.

Water, wait and give them space — how to's for happy Hibiscus plants

Hardy Hibiscus have a history of growing in wet areas such as along riverbanks and around inland lakes. They perform best with consistent watering, particularly if they have been recently transplanted. If your Hibiscus is losing its lowest leaves or aborting buds, you may need to up the water.

This water-tolerant characteristic makes them perfect for areas of the garden that periodically flood, or as a thriller in rain gardens.

Another characteristic of the genus is they are late to break dormancy in spring. They're not dead! When they do wake up they're off to the races growing more than an inch a day.

Depending on the year, Hibiscus may stay dormant through the end of May. Instead of tearing your Hibiscus out and starting over, try planting them with tulips, daffodils, or other spring-blooming that will be out of bloom when Hibiscus are ready to emerge. As an added bonus, the tired foliage of these spring-blooming bulbs will quickly be covered by the wide Hibiscus habits.

Once your Hibiscus gets going, be sure to leave them plenty of space to grow. Mature Hibiscus can get 5-6' wide and grow quickly during the year. If you take a week's vacation in June, you're likely to come back to a plant twice the size you left it.

Full sun is a must. In too much shade the otherwise sturdy habits stretch and get floppy. Over shading will also lead to a decrease in bud count and diminished flowering performance. UV light (full sun) will also bring out the dark foliage colors.

Fire safety for elders with special health needs

Decreased mobility, sight, hearing or cognitive capabilities may limit a person's ability to take the quick action necessary to escape during a fire emergency. People over the age of 65 are twice as likely to suffer injuries or lose their lives in fires compared to the population-at-large, according to the U.S. Fire Administration, part of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

If your elderly loved one has Alzheimer's or Dementia, problems with mobility, or is vision or hearing impaired, there are certain precautions that need to be taken in the event of a house fire. These precautions go above and beyond the traditional fire safety guidelines for families.

Here are some fire safety tips for elderly people with special needs, provided by the U.S. Fire Administration and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA):

Mobility impairments

If your elderly loved one uses a cane, walker or wheelchair, traditional escape routes may no longer be viable.

- · Check all exits to make sure wheelchairs or walkers can get through doorways. Make accommodanecessary tions to facilitate an emergency escape.
- Keep a phone by the bed for emergency calls in case the person becomes trapped and is unable to escape.
- Fire protection devices such as sprinkler systems, fire-safe compartment walls. and flame-resistant blankets can be used. The key is to have the room fireproofed before an emergency happens

Blind/visually impaired

The most important thing a blind or visually impaired person can do to improve his or her chances of surviving a fire is to be prepared ahead of

• Plan and practice

routes from each room in the home. By practicing an escape plan, a blind or visually im-

paired person can escape to safety, without losing time searching and feeling for an exit.

- A blind or visually impaired must rely on other senses - the smell of smoke or the sense of heat. Test doors before opening them. Use the back of the hand, reach up high and touch the door, the doorknob, and the space between the door and the frame. If anything feels hot, keep the door shut and use the second exit route.
- A person may be forced to crawl along the

Conventional smoke alarms that sound during a fire aren't effective for someone who is hard of hearing.

- Consider installing smoke alarms that use flashing light or vibration if diminished hearing is a concern.
- Smoke alarms with high intensity strobes can

be used to wake the deaf or others who have profound hearing loss.

- Pillow or bed shakers are required to be used with strobes.
- Find out if the 911 center is equipped to accept cell phone text messages or text telephone (TTY/TDD) calls.

Alzheimer's or dementia

If your relative has Alzheimer's or dementia, know that even cognitively impaired people often times have an innate understanding that

wrong during an emergency, and may be more clear-headed than you would imag-


- Remain calm during an emergency. Explain what is happening clearly and simply. Validate their concerns, but provide clear direction without losing patience.
- Providing a picture book of emergency procedures, may assist a cognitively impaired person to follow visual instructions more easily.
- Practice escape routes. If escape is practiced continually, instinct

may take over and guide the elder to safety.

• The person should sleep in a room that has easy access to the outdoors, a ground floor bedroom is best.

Regardless of their disability, all elderly people should live in a home with working smoke alarms and sprinkler systems. A working smoke alarm can reduce the risk of dying in a fire by as much as 60 percent, FEMA says.

Practicing escape plans is also vital for all elders. Knowing their escape plan is one of the most important steps elders can take to save their life in a fire. Plan the escape around your loved one's capabilities. Know at least two exits from every room.

(Culinary.net) You can almost feel spring in the air, and with the warmer weather comes delicious, delectable foods. From casseroles to fresh fruits and wholesome vegetables, a change of season offers something to look forward to for nearly every foodie.

A spring dish that is sure to impress is this cheesy asparagus tart. It has melty cheese, cooked asparagus and an under layer of puff pastry baked to golden brown perfection.

Start by cooking your asparagus on the stove top in 5 cups of water for 5-8 minutes. Then soak it in an ice bath until cooled. Transfer to a mixing bowl to add vegetable oil, salt and pepper for tasty, seasoned veggies.

Now it's time to work with your puff pastry. Sprinkle some flour on a flat countertop. Roll out the thawed puff pastry to a 16-by-10-inch rectangle. Move to a lined baking sheet and prick with a fork to create a thin, flaky texture. Bake around 12 minutes and cool.

The final steps: mix the cheeses, shallots, egg yolks, nutmeg, salt and pepper. Spread this mixture across the pastry and lay asparagus over the top. Bake 5 more minutes.

For a little extra flavor, add lemon zest over the tart. This tart is a perfect appetizer before Sunday brunch or to cut up and take outside for some al fresco dining this spring.

It's got gooey, melted cheeses, is seasoned well and has hearty asparagus on top. Plus, it's a yummy way to add vegetables to your kids' diet (and yours, too).

Cheesy asparagus tart

Servings: 8-10 5 cups water

1 pound asparagus

ice water

2 teaspoons vegetable oil

1/4 teaspoon salt, plus additional, to taste, divided

1/4 teaspoon pepper, plus additional, to taste, di-

flour, for dusting

- 1 sheet frozen puff pastry, thawed
- 1 cup grated fontina cheese
- 1 cup grated gruyere cheese 1 tablespoon shallot, minced
- 2 egg yolks
- 3 tablespoons milk
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 lemon, zest only
- Heat oven to 400 F.

In large skillet, add water and asparagus. Cook 5-8 minutes until asparagus is bright green.

Drain asparagus and soak in ice water.

In large bowl, mix drained asparagus, vegetable oil, salt and pepper until combined.

Flour surface area. Using rolling pin, roll out pastry to 10-by-16-inch rectangle. Transfer pastry to parchment-lined baking sheet. Prick pastry with fork. Bake about 12 minutes, or until golden brown. Cool slightly on baking sheet.

In large bowl, mix fontina cheese, gruyere cheese, shallot, egg yolks, milk, nutmeg and salt and pepper, to taste, until combined. Spread cheese over pastry, leaving 1 inch around edges. Lay asparagus over cheese mixture.

Bake 5 minutes, or until cheese has melted.

Sprinkle lemon zest over tart and serve.

Iron doorstop

Iron doorstops have been very popular collectibles since 1985. They were first made in England, where they were called door porters. The invention of a hinge that let a door close automatically inspired the iron figure that stopped the door from closing. Soon after, doorstops became popular in the United States. Companies that had been making cast iron toys and other items began designing and making doorstops that resembled people, animals, flowers and other figures. Five companies were the largest suppliers, and each had a name or logo that was usually molded into the flat back. Look for Bradley and Hubbard's "B & H" mark; Hubley's paper label with the name across a circle; and Judd Co.'s mark, "CJO."

In the 1980s, iron doorstops went for high prices, and hundreds of copies were made and sold in gift shops, antiques events and auctions. Fakes usually have perfect bright paint; a rough texture to the unpainted iron on the back; modern slotted screws; and, if made in two parts, a seam that is not perfectly smooth. This 12 1/2-inch antique lobster doorstop was made early in the early 20th century. It sold for \$1,800 at an Eldred auction in Massachusetts.

Q: I have a bar pin that pictures two clenched hands doing a "fist bump." The pin is gold-colored metal and has a figural mallet, ax and something that looks like a block on the top. The hands, with shirt cuffs and part of the jackets showing, are on a white enamel piece attached to the metal. What does it represent?

A: The log, ax, mallet and wedge are symbols used by two fraternal organizations: the Modern Woodmen of America and WoodmenLife (Woodmen of the World). Joseph Cullen Root founded the Modern Woodmen

of America in 1883 in Lyons, Iowa. He resigned after disagreements with other officers in 1880 and moved to Omaha, where he founded Woodmen of the World. Both organizations are still in existence and provide life insurance and other benefits to members. The fist bump has been found on other unmarked pins that date from the late 1800s or early 1900s.
