Take advantage of extra time to file by registering for a free tax-filing assistance session

The New York State Department of Taxation and Finance recently encouraged eligible taxpayers to register for a free virtual tax-filing assistance session.

If your federal adjusted gross income in 2020 was \$72,000 or less, you qualify to receive free virtual tax assistance from the Tax Department. We can guide you through the process of electronically preparing and filing your 2020 federal and state income tax returns at no cost.

During a prescheduled virtual webinar session using WebEx or Zoom, our department representatives will guide you step by step as needed through the free tax preparation software as you complete and file your own tax return.

The NYS Tax Department extended the filing due date for NYS personal income tax returns to May 17 to match the extended due date for federal income tax returns.

"The Tax Department is offering New Yorkers more time to file because of the ongoing pandemic and free filing services for those eligible," said NYS Commissioner of Taxation and Finance Michael Schmidt. "We encourage New Yorkers to save on tax preparation costs for their federal and state returns by taking advantage of this free assistance."

Once you register, you will receive an email with a link to the webinar session. You will also receive a link to the free tax software and an intake questionnaire. Review and fill out the intake questionnaire to ensure you have all the documents needed to complete your return during the session.

Free rabies clinics change to monthly schedule at SQSPCA

In conjunction with the Otsego County Department of Health, the Susquehanna SPCA (SQSPCA) will continue to host free rabies vaccination clinics on-site through the end of the year.

According to SQSPCA Executive Director Stacie Haynes, the shelter is scheduling vaccination appointments one Monday each month beginning in April for pet dogs, cats and ferrets. Individual appointments allow for proper social distancing, Haynes said.

The monthly schedule is as follows but may be subject to change:

- Monday, April 12: 4 7 p.m.
- Monday, May 17: 2 5 p.m.
- Monday, June 14: 2 5 p.m.
- Monday, July 12: 4 7 p.m.
- Monday, Aug. 16: 2 5 p.m.
- Monday, Sept. 13: 2 5 p.m.
- Monday, Oct. 4: 4 7 p.m.
- Monday, Nov. 15: 2 5 p.m.
- Monday, Dec. 13: 2 5 p.m.

Haynes praised Otsego County, local veterinarians and shelter staff for making the free rabies clinics possible. "Otsego County is providing the vaccines and the tags," said Haynes. "The shelter is providing the service and several local veterinarians continue to step up to donate their time to the cause."

Dr. Julie Huntsman, Dr. Bret Meckel and Dr. Jenny Lukovsky all worked free of charge at the clinics during the peak of the pandemic in NYS to administer the rabies vaccinations and they will continue to assist for the foreseeable future, Haynes added.

Registration for the free rabies vaccination clinics is currently underway by calling 607.547.8111 ext. 111. Appointments are on a first come, first served basis. There is a limit of 15 pets per person.

follow Otsego County guidelines:

• Previous rabies vaccination certificate must be presented to receive a three-year booster (no exceptions).

Dogs must be on a leash and under proper control.
Cats and ferrets should be in a pillowcase or carrying case.

According to the Otsego County Department of Health, the vaccine being used gives one-year protection for domestic dogs and cats receiving their first vaccination and three-year protection for domestic dogs and cats receiving a booster.

"Compulsory vaccination is required for all dogs and cats in Otsego County," said Heidi Bond, Otsego County Director of Public Health. "Every dog and cat three months of age or older is required to be vaccinated, even pet dogs and cats that stay inside, and domesticated ferrets require vaccination each year."

NYS law requires all dogs to be licensed. A license will not be issued for a time period extending beyond the date of the dog's rabies certificate. It is also NYS law that any unvaccinated pet exposed to a rabid or suspected rabid animal be euthanized or quarantined for six months at the owner's expense, and that any unvaccinated pet that bites be confined for 10 days at a facility at the owner's expense.

SQSPCA thrift store readies for move to new location; temporary hold on donations announced

As of April 2, the New Leash on Life Thrift Shop temporarily stopped taking donations in preparation for its upcoming move. The thrift store, a local mainstay for more than 40 years, is a primary source of revenue for the Susquehanna Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SQSPCA). In the meantime, the thrift store will remain open for a few more weeks and thrift store manager Sara Lucas will continue to sell merchandise online via the New Leash on Life Facebook page and on Facebook Marketplace before, during and after the move. According to Lucas, the transition is bittersweet but much anticipated. "We are so appreciative of our loyal donors and shoppers, and we'll miss you all, but we absolutely can't wait to see everyone again at the new store," Lucas said.

"It's great to finally be getting back to normal and to work on clients," Comstock said. "The pandemic isn't going to stop us from doing what we love."

Consider these simple tips for recognizing ripe fruits:

• Strawberries: Check the area at the top of the berry near the stem and leaves. A ripe strawberry is fully red; green or white near the top means the fruit is underripe.

Watermelon: The "field spot," or the area where the melon sat on the ground, should be yellow, and a tap on the rind should produce a hollow sound.

• **Cherries:** Flesh should appear dark with a crimson color and feel firm.

• Blueberries: Similar to cherries, color should deepen to dark blue. A reddish or pink color may be visible in unripe berries.

• Blackberries: Look for a smooth texture without any red appearance. Because blackberries don't ripen after being picked, they tend to spoil quickly.

Cantaloupe: You should detect a sweet smell, and the melon should feel heavy upon lifting.

• Peaches: A sweet, fragrant odor should be apparent. Skin should feel tender but not soft.

• Pineapple: Smell is again an important factor for pineapple - a sweet scent shows it's ready, but a vinegary one likely means it's overripe.

• Raspberries: Generally follow the same rules as blackberries. Best eaten within a couple days of purchase, a bright red color represents ripe berries.

• Bananas: A ripe banana features a peel lightly spotted without significant bruising. Your best bet may be to purchase still bananas slightly green and allow them to ripen at home.

Three techniques to keep mosquitoes out of your backyard oasis

Remove these potential breeding grounds when you find them, and do so each day, as mosquitoes mature from eggs to nymphs in roughly four days.

2. Mow regularly

Mowing the lawn so the grass never gets too high is another way to make a backyard less hospitable to mosquitoes. The pest experts at Terminix® note that mosquitoes seek tall grass to protect them from the elements, including wind and hot summer sun. Mowing enough so grass never gets too high in summer

can make backyards less inviting to mosquitoes.

3. Plant with mosquitoes in mind

The home remodeling experts at HGTV note that plants can be part of homeowners' strategy to repel mosquitoes. Various plants have mosquito-repellant qualities. For example, bee balm releases a fragrance as it grows, and mosquitoes don't like that fragrance. Homeowners can speak with a local lawn and garden professional for recommendations about plants that can thrive in their region and repel mosquitoes at the same time.

Mosquitoes can make it hard to enjoy a backyard oasis. But various strategies can help homeowners keep these unwanted guests out of their backyards.

This stunning species can be invasive, but it can be managed by planting within a hoop or submerged woven basket, indicates Happy DIY

Home. Other free-floating plants to consider are duckweed, fairy moss and butterfly fern. Floating plants look beautiful and

they can help filter water and control algae growth. Submerged plants

Submerged plants are a necessity in water features that have fish. Submerged plants are grown in weighted pots placed on the bottom of the pond. They provide shel-

ter for fish and help oxygenate the water. Hornwort, anacharis, water milfoil, and dwarf sagittaria are some examples submerged of plants.

Water features attract wildlife, including potentially pesky insects. Planting pitcher plants in submerged pots can help reduce the presence of unwanted insects in a water feature.

Some wa-

ter-loving plants are invasive, so it is always best to check with a cooperative extension or DEC office to see if certain floating or submerged plants are restricted where you live. For those who want to contain plants, placing pots of cascading greenery and flowers near to fountains, pools and ponds is another way to add appeal without having to dig in the ground.



Sometimes modern art is hard to understand, and often it is meant to be a joke. David Gilhooly (1943-2013) was a successful contemporary artist who often included big or small realistic or comic frogs in his sculptures. He is known as the founder and father of the Bay Area Funk Art group in the 1960s. Although he had dozens of exhibitions and made art from papier-mache, plastic, clay and trash, he is best known for the green frogs. His most controversial sculpture is a crucified frog, now in a museum collection. Almost all his sculptures were fantasies, meant to be funny or have a satirical message. He sculpted frogs in salads, wedding cakes, pizzas, frying pans and with hats.

Look carefully at this Gilhooly sculpture. It sold for \$2,125, although it is only 8 inches high. Nice-looking realistic sandwich with tomato, cheese, lettuce, pickle and onion on a sesame seed bun and - April Fool! — don't forget the bright green frog.

Q: What can you tell me about a Red Comet Fire Grenade salesman's kit that dates to 1943. It's complete with lightbulb shape bulbs, testimonials from users, price list, training manuals and liquids to start small fires and put them out in customers' homes.

A: The Red Comet Company started in Denver in 1919. It made several different types of fire extinguishers. The glass bulbs are called grenades. Metal brackets fastened to the wall held the grenade until it was needed. When the grenade was thrown on the

Antiques and collecting fire, it broke open and tried to put the fire out. The company also made heat-activated brackets with spring-loaded triggers that could break the glass bulb to release the liquid. Early grenades were filled with saltwater. Later, carbon tetrachloride was used. That substance was banned in 1980.

Kovels:

The U.S. military used Red Comet fire extinguishers doing World War II. After the war, the company hired salesmen to sell Red Comet fire grenades door-to-door. The company is in business, now in Englewood, CO. It no longer manufactures fire extinguishers but sells and services other brands of extinguishers

and equipment. Current prices
