Community Foundation marks year five of Lead-Free Mohawk Valley Initiative

The Community Foundation of Herkimer and Oneida Counties in Utica and the Lead-Free Mohawk Valley Coalition partners are marking the fifth year of a community-wide commitment to reduce high rates of childhood lead poisoning in Oneida and Herkimer counties. In April 2016, the Community Foundation launched the effort with sustained funding. To date, \$6 million has been committed through the end of the decade.

Over the last five years, Lead-Free MV has worked to raise awareness in the community about lead poisoning and its effects as well as encourage testing in children under the age of six. Through partnerships with organizations like the HomeOwnershipCenter, and state and local governments, testing rates are on the rise and families that qualify are taking advantage of free lead safe repairs to their homes.

With increased lead exposure stemming from more pandemic-imposed indoor time for many, "There are actions that local families, particularly with young children, can take right now to reduce the effects of lead and environmental health hazards," says Caroline Williams, Lead-Free MV program manager.

Protect your child

• If there were any renovations or construction done to your home during the COVID pandemic OR your child did not get their annual well-care visit, ask your medical provider to test the blood lead levels (BLL) for children age six and under. If you don't have a regular medical provider, contact the Sister Rose Vincent Family Medicine Center, 120 Hobart Street, Utica at 315.798.1149 to enroll with a provider to schedule a BLL test.

• You can help protect children by washing their face and hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds when coming indoors, before meals, and before naps and bedtime. Also, wash household items several times daily particularly toys, pacifiers, and objects children put in their mouths.

Make your home safer

- Wet clean windowsills and mop floors that may be covered in lead dust. Keep toddlers and young children away from chipping or peeling paint. Don't let children touch or play near windows.
- If you live in the City of Utica, have young children that spend significant time in your home, and the house was built before 1978; you may qualify for the Lead Safe Utica program to make lead hazard repairs at no cost to you. Become more involved

Notify your landlord if paint needs repair. Make sure all repairs are made using lead safe work practices while the family is in the home. Properly clean up the work area after repairs are completed.

Wreaths Across America and Gold Star Wives of America Inc. enter partnership

On April 15, national nonprofit Wreaths Across America (WAA) announced the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Gold Star Wives of America Inc. (GSW), in an effort to build a stronger awareness for each group's common missions while supporting educational events throughout the nation that will help teach lessons of character and patriotism to the next generation.

Founded in 2007, and headquartered in Columbia Falls, Maine, WAA is best known for its annual wreath-laying ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery, and now more than 2,500 additional locations nationwide, and the yearlong efforts to support its mission to remember the fallen, honor those who serve and their families and teach the next generation the value of freedom. GSW is a Congressionally-chartered nonprofit service organization established 1945. Its mission is to exist to preserve and enhance benefits to surviving U.S. military spouses and children; to help its members and their children face the future with courage and determination; and to honor the memory of their military spouses who made the ultimate sacrifice.

The signed MOU between the two groups outlines nine key agreements, such as establishment of a steering committee with a representative from each organization and collaborative volunteer efforts to provide opportunities for joint event and community service activities that bring awareness to both groups' missions.

"Since WAA was founded, Gold Star Wives have been involved in the mission and its members play an important part in the sharing the stories of character and service we hope to teach to the country," said Karen Worcester, executive director of WAA. "This official partnership is long overdue, and I'm eager to start our work

together. Our combined efforts will no doubt help to shape and inform the next generation of patriots."

The current national president of GSW, Nancy Menagh, has devoted her life to service, not only as a military spouse supporting her husband, Captain Philip S. Menagh, U.S. Marine Corps, but continuing on long after his passing and teaching her children the importance of sacrifice and character – both served in the U.S. Air Force. She said, "Our membership is made up of the men and women left behind. While our loved one made the supreme sacrifice, we are the ones left to live that sacrifice every day. We are an organization that serves ... our spouses served and we serve!"

This year, National Wreaths Across America Day will take place on Saturday, Dec. 18 at over 2,500 participating locations nationwide. "The experience of placing a wreath at the final resting place of one of our nation's veterans and understanding the healing that this simple gesture has for so many families and the opportunity it provides to share the stories of these heroes, makes this an important partnership," Menagh concluded.

Social Security disability benefits and want to work. This program is free and voluntary. Program participants select a service provider to help them prepare for, and find a job. The provider may be a State Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) agency or an Employment Network (EN) - a public or private organization that has an agreement with Social Security -to offer:

- Career planning
- Job placement assistance
- Ongoing employment support.

These career development services and sup-

ports are unique to each individual. Participants work with their service providers to develop a customized plan and identify the supports they need to reach their work goals.

Finding a path to financial independence

The road to financial independence looks different for everyone. Whether joining the workforce for the first time or returning after a difficult diagnosis, there are challenges that each person must navigate. Working with a Benefits Counselor and Ticket to Work service provider can help you remove some of the obstacles and learn more about the resources available to you.

This could include Social Security Work Incentives, which are designed to help you transition to the workplace. A Benefits Counselor can help you learn more about Work Incentives, including which ones you qualify for, and discuss how working will affect your benefits.

If you connect with an EN, they can help you find answers to questions, whether they're about reporting your wages to Social Security, requesting job accommodations, or even how you can advance your career to earn even more money.

DMV reminds motorcyclists to renew registrations by April 30 Registrations can be renewed and most motorcycles can be registered online

The NYS Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) is reminding motorcycle owners to renew their registrations before they expire April 30.

Motorcycles are registered for one year and all motorcycle registrations expire on April 30. Renewals can be done easily online, and most motorcycles that are being registered for the first time can be registered online. You can learn more about registering your motorcycle for the first time, as well as renewing your registration, on the DMV website at at https:// dmv.ny.gov/registrations-0.

"New York is a beautiful place to ride in the spring and summer, and we want to make sure every rider has that opportunity. Renewing your registration online is fast, easy and convenient,' said DMV Commissioner Mark J. F. Schroeder. "As the weather continues to get warmer, drivers should expect to see more motorcyclists on the road, so I urge everyone to watch for riders and share the road responsibly.'

Motorcycles must be inspected at least once every 12 months at a station DMV has licensed to perform motorcycle safety inspections. Customers should look for a yellow and black sign reading "Official NYS Motorcycle Inspection Station." You can look up registered businesses on the DMV website.

You cannot renew a registration that is suspended or revoked; is expired for more than a year; or if the motorcycle has not been inspected in the past 12 months. If the registration is expired for more than a year, you will have to reregister it at a DMV office or by mail.

To be operated on public roadways, motorcycles must have liability coverage. This applies to motorcycles registered out-of-state as well as to those registered in New York.

Drivers are reminded that they are likely to see an increase in motorcyclists sharing the road. Drivers should watch for and give motorcyclists' room, just as they should be increasingly aware of bicyclists and pedestrians who are more commonly out in the warmer months.

Safety tips for drivers:

• Always allow a motorcyclist the full lane width never try to share a lane.

blind spots before entering or lane of traffic, and at

• Check mirrors and exiting a

intersections.

- Always signal your intentions before changing lanes or merging with traffic.
- Allow more following distance - three or four seconds - when behind a motorcycle so the motorcyclist has enough time to maneuver or stop in an emergency.
- Never tailgate. In dry conditions, motorcycles can stop more quickly than cars.
- Never drive while distracted.

Safety tips for motorcyclists:

- Avoid riding in poor weather conditions.
- Wear brightly colored protective gear and a DOT-compliant helmet.
- Use turn signals for every turn or lane change.
- Combine hand signals and turn signals to draw more attention to yourself.
- Use reflective tape and stickers to increase conspicuity.
- Position yourself in the lane where you will be most visible to other drivers.
- Never drive while impaired.

Newspaper and mulch key to keeping weeds at bay

Managing garden weeds is a challenge all gardeners face, but Skip Richter, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service horticulture agent, Brazos County, and host of Garden Success, KAMU FM/HD-1, offers some advice to keep the weeds at bay that can be easily implemented with a bag of mulch and a few newspapers.

The importance of removing weeds

A weed is classified as any unwelcome plant in your garden. It could be an invasive plant, or just a volunteering plant of some sort, but if it is not something you want to grow in your garden area, then it may be considered

Aside from possibly not adding any beauty or benefit to your garden, weeds can take away water, nutrients, soil and sunlight from plants you wish to thrive in your garden area. Weeds may also harbor plant viruses or even attract pests that could then move on to your garden plants. As

weeds grow larger, removing them by hand pulling or hoeing can disturb the roots of your garden plants.

Without proper maintenance or prep work, gardeners may find themselves pulling weeds yearround, when a few steps at the beginning of the season could significantly reduce or even eliminate your days of weed pulling all together.

How to manage your weeds

Mulch may offer protection from weeds in several different but similar ways. Mulch can help deter weeds, prevent surface crusting and minimize runoff. Organic mulches include leaves, pine needles, dried grass clippings, compost, shredded bark or other organic materials.

The first mulching option is simply to use an organic mulch on the soil

"Weed seeds need light hitting the soil to germinate," Richter said. "In fact, we say wherever sunlight hits the soil, nature plants a weed."

By placing mulch over the surface, the sunlight is blocked out, which prevents weed seeds from getting started.

Mulch over newspaper

However, perennial weeds can push right through a light mulch, Richter said. So, for some perennial weeds and for germinating weed seeds,

six sheets of newspaper down on the surface of the soil and then throw a mulch of leaves, dried grass clippings, compost, shredded bark or other organic materials on top of that, it will block out most weeds for the remainder of that particular gardening season," he said. "It lasts about three

Lawns Chardens

When you get to a plant, do any more weeding any split the page, and lay the paper on either side of the plant. Then spray the newspaper with water and place the mulch over

time soon. If a weed does appear, it may be due to a hole in the newspaper, so simply pull back the mulch, remove the weed and lay another piece of

it helps to place newspaper on the soil surface to create more of a boundary between the soil and mulch to keep the sunlight from penetrating.

When you put four to

or four months."

A tip to keep in mind as you lay down the newspaper is to wet it as you lay it so that it does not blow away. Richter likes to lay the newspaper four to six sheets at a time and overlap it by a few inches.

After you have placed all the newspaper down with a mulch over the top, there should be no newspaper visible. The "mulch-over-newspaper" technique will keep weeds out, so you shouldn't have to come back and

newspaper over the hole. Then cover it with the mulch.

The newspaper and organic mulch technique works well before weeds germinate but can also help capture lost ground by smothering young weeds before they get too large. It helps to wet the weeds and soil before laying the newspaper and mulch. Those young weeds will die and decompose under the newspaper cover, releasing their nutrients back to the soil.

For larger areas where you are not growing plants but just want to keep down the weeds, you can take it up a notch and use large sections of cardboard covered with leaves or even shredded branches to create a longer term weed block over the soil.

The Kitchen Diva

I was looking for a new spring vegetable to explore (move over asparagus and spring peas) and discovered a wealth of information about radishes. I should have titled this article "Everything You've Ever Wanted to Know About Radishes but Were Afraid to Ask."

The red and white Cherry Belle and French Breakfast European varieties are available in the spring and are the most familiar type of radishes to many shoppers. The large, white Japanese Daikon radish has been a part of a variety of Asian dishes for hundreds of years. It's a vegetable that can be prepared in a number of ways, from raw slices to picked to roasted until slightly crisp, giving it a texture like a roasted potato.

You can find a vast array of radishes throughout the year, and best of all, you can eat a radish from the leaves to the bulb, so there's no waste. When selecting radishes, make sure that they are

firm to the touch, and the tops are fresh without any signs of wilting.

They are a root vegetable and a tuber in the Brassicaceae family, along with bok choy, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, collard, rutabaga and turnips. Radishes come in numerous shapes, colors, sizes and varieties, including the beautiful watermelon radish with its pink and white swirls. and the spicy black Spanish radish.

Radishes are a nutritional powerhouse. They're an important source of anthocyanins and flavonoids, and are extremely rich in vitamin C and folic acid, which medical studies found to be positively linked to the decrease of some cardiovascular diseases. They're also strong allies in the fight against cancer cell reproduction, particular colon cancer, kidney cancer, intestinal cancer, stomach cancer and mouth cancers.

Radishes are packed with fiber, have a low glycemic index, are high in

potassium and help with the treatment and prevention of disorders of the liver, stomach, gall bladder, kidneys and urinary tract. Radishes also function as a diuretic and a type of detergent and disinfectant for the body by washing away toxins gathered in the kidneys, purifying the blood and stimulating bile production to relieve constipation.

This is particularly im- $\quad \text{portant for the treatment} \\$ of jaundice. Radishes, especially the leaves and bulbs of the black radish. reduce red blood cell distribution, which occurs in people who suffer from jaundice, by increasing the fresh oxygen supply to the blood.

Another way to reap the health benefits of radishes is to pass the leaves and bulb through a juicer and drink the juice. Radish juice is a natural way to reduce fevers and help prevent inflammation and burning sensations in the digestive and urinary tract, and infections of the kidney and immune system by removing excess toxins.

If you're only using spring radishes as part of a salad or a decorative garnish, and you've never tried the wide varieties and flavors that radishes impart to everything

from pesto to stir fries and roasting, you're missing out on indulging in both the nutritional benefits and the flavors of this overlooked tuber.

- 2. Place a large skillet over medium heat and melt the butter. Add the olive oil, garlic and salt, cook, stirring occasionally, until garlic is tender, about 1 minute. Add in mushrooms, soy sauce, pepper and 1/2 of the radishes, and cook until soft, about 3-4 minutes. Add in the radish greens and the vinegar, and cook until greens are soft, about 3-4 minutes.
- 3. Place the mushroom and greens mixture evenly on the slices of bread. Sprinkle the remaining radishes and

then the feta cheese on top of the greens mixture. Place bread slices under the broiler; broil for 2-3 minutes until the cheese is melted and slightly brown. Serves 2 to 4.
