Local author's thriller series continues with 'Demon Sphere'

MILLERS MILLS - LOcal author Bruce Rubin, writing under the pen name Vincenzo Spiaggi, has published his 15th work of fiction, "Demon Sphere," which is the 13th book in the "Johnny Skull" series.

Approximately 100 terrorists are the targets of World Interconnect (WI-7), an international terrorist-hunting organization. These terrorists, supported by international, like-minded financiers, are on a quest to crumble the U.S. and its culture from within. WI-7 is developing a plan to render the terrorists inoperable by using a new weapon - the Demon Sphere - and by coordinating their efforts with the Boston Mafia.

As the evil histories of the individual terrorists are exposed, a third factor - FATE - emerges to assist in the success of WI-7's plan. Johnny Skull, the most respected WI-7 agent, leads a group of 33 agents in an effort to rid the nation of these bloodthirsty terrorists.

Of course, a plethora of sub-plots emerge - as they always do - to widen WI-7's effort beyond the mere elimination of the terrorists, including the thwarting of a wide-ranging voter fraud/ballot manipulation plan to render future American elections unnecessary.



GTSC warns of spike in motorcycle crash fatalities as Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month Begins




The Governor's Traffic Safety Committee (GTSC) recently held a press event in Albany to mark the start of Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month and urged safety in the wake of an alarming spike in motorcycle crashes and fatalities. According to the Institute for Traffic Safety Management and Research (ITSMR) at the University at Albany's Rockefeller College, fatal motorcycle crashes were up more than 30% in 2020 over the previous year, and fatalities increased nearly 35% from 2019 to 2020, based on preliminary 2020 data.

ITSMR data show that there were 132 fatal crashes that killed 133 people in 2019 compared to 172 fatal crashes that killed 179 people in 2020. So far this year, there has been one fatality and more than 40 reported injuries in just the first few weeks of riding season.

"Despite fewer vehicles on the road last year, we saw a startling increase in deadly motorcycle crashes, and every life lost was someone's loved one," said GTSC Chair and DMV Commissioner Mark J.F. Schroeder. "Everyone sharing the road, whether in a car or on a motorcycle, has a responsibility to help stop these tragedies. As the weather warms up and we continue making progress battling COVID-19, there will be more traffic and more riders, so stay alert, avoid distractions, and never, ever drive under the influence of drugs or alcohol."

Motorcycle riders continue to be overrepresented in fatal traffic crashes. In 2020 alone, motorcycle crash fatalities represented 18% of all motor vehicle crash fatalities in the state. To promote important motorcycle safety tips for riders and motorists, GTSC is using targeted advertisements online. It is also placing important safety messages at more than 150 gas stations across the state. They will be affixed to fuel pump toppers and nozzle handles throughout the riding season. GTSC




also promotes motorcycle safety tips on its website.

Additionally, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is utilizing TV and radio to promote safety as the riding season begins to support the state's ongoing public awareness efforts.

New York was the first state to mandate wearing a motorcycle helmet, and for more than 20 years, the state has had a rider-funded motorcycle safety training and awareness program known as the NYS Motorcycle Safety Program. The program uses a nationally recognized motorcycle training curriculum, developed by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation. The courses teach effective turning, braking maneuvers, tips to avoid obstacles, strategies in traffic, how to select appropriate protective apparel and vehicle maintenance. Motorcyclists can find a training course near them by visiting nysmsp.org.

Motorcycle Safety Foundation Program Manager Ben Zadrozny said, "To all motorcyclists, get trained and licensed; always wear full protective gear including a DOT-approved helmet; never ride under the influence of alcohol or other drugs; ride within your own skill limits; be a lifelong learner. To all car, truck and SUV roadway users, look for motorcycles; never tailgate a motorcycle; use your turn signals; please don't drive distracted!"



Six things dog owners should know about Lyme disease

Lyme disease is one of the most common tick-transmitted diseases in the world. Lyme disease primarily affects people, but dogs also are at risk.

Lyme disease is caused by a spirochete, which is a type of bacterium, said VCA Animal Hospitals. Bacteria are contained in the bodies of blacklegged ticks, which are then passed to the host animal when bitten. Transmission of Lyme disease has been reported in dogs throughout the U.S. and Europe. It is most prevalent in the upper Midwestern states, the Atlantic seaboard and the Pacific coastal states. advised PetMD.

Even though Lyme disease is widely known for its effects on humans, pet parents should learn about the ways that tick bites can affect their furry companions.

1. Lyme disease only causes symptoms in 5% to 10% of affected dogs. Many dogs have it but never show symptoms.

2. The animal health experts at Boehringer Ingelheim say dogs with Lyme disease can experience various symptoms, including joint swelling and pain, fever, lethargy, loss of appetite and kidney problems. Dogs may not exhibit symptoms for weeks or months after being bitten.

3. Lyme disease is diagnosed based on the presence of certain symptoms. A Lyme disease antibody test can identify the presence of the disease, but only if the dog's body has produced antibodies. Testing is recommended no sooner than four weeks after a tick bite. Other tests include a polymerase chain reaction and an enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay.

4. Lyme disease is a year-round threat. Ticks do not die in the winter. Rather, they hide out and wait for the first warm day to arrive to move around. It's important to keep up with tick-control treatments no matter the month.

5. Most tick control remedies do not actual-

ly repel ticks – they just kill the tick shortly after the tick has bitten. That's good news since there is a greater chance of bacteria being transmitted the longer the tick is attached. Only tick collars repel ticks, but there are pros and cons to such products.

6. Ticks latch on to dogs in areas where blood vessels are closest to the surface of the skin. This includes the head, the neck and the ears. However, since adult ticks are quite big, dogs will attempt to bite them off if they are seen. Ticks tend to hide in places like inside the ears, between the toes and around the neck.


Pet owners should use gloves, tweezers or a tissue to form a barrier between the tick and their skin when removing ticks. The bacterium that causes Lyme disease can pass through a wound in the skin, said VCA Hospitals. Annual vaccination also can help dogs maintain immunity.

Good Housekeeping – Gingered Pear & Dried Fruit Crisp

Dessert doesn't get much easier than this. Canned pears are mixed with chunks of dried fruit and a sprinkling of cinnamon, then topped with crumbled gingersnap cookies.

- 2 cans (28 to 29 oz. each) pear halves in light syrup 1 tbsp cornstarch
- 1 cup mixed dried fruit, cut into large pieces
- 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 1/2 cups gingersnap cookies (about 20 cookies)
- 3 tbsp butter or margarine
- 2 tbsp brown sugar
- Fresh mint sprigs for garnish

1. Preheat oven to 400° F. Drain pears, reserving 1 cup syrup. With wire whisk, mix cornstarch into reserved pear syrup until blended. In shallow 2 1/2-quart glass or ceramic baking dish, toss pears with reserved syrup mixture, dried fruit and cinnamon until evenly mixed. Bake filling, covered, 15 minutes.

2. Meanwhile, in food processor with knife blade attached, blend gingersnap cookies, butter and sugar until finely ground and evenly mixed. With fingertips, press cookie mixture into small chunks and scatter over pear filling.

3. Bake crisp, uncovered, 10 to 12 minutes longer or until filling is hot and bubbling and cookie topping is crisp. Spoon into dessert bowls; garnish with mint sprigs. Serves 8.

Low-maintenance lawn alternatives

A traditional lawn may not be right for every property nor desired by every homeowner. There is no denying that lawns take time and effort to establish and daily or weekly maintenance to thrive. Homeowners who find that a traditional lawn is not practical can explore some low-maintenance alternatives.

Wildflower meadow

Homeowners with wide swaths of property may discover meadows are cost- and time-efficient. Stores sell special wildflower meadow mixes of seeds or homeowners can use wildflower plug plants throughout areas where grasses are left to grow longer. This natural area can be a home to wildlife and an idyllic backdrop to a home. Most meadows only require a spring or summer and autumn cut to thrive and look good.

Ornamental grasses

Partition areas of the property for ornamental grasses to grow. The gardening resource Elemental Green says ornamental grasses tend to be drought-resistant and low-maintenance. They won't need much fertilizer and are often resistant to pests as well. Ornamental grasses grow in tufts or sprays and will not require mowing. However, they are not ideal for areas that get foot traffic.

Moss

Moss can thrive in shady areas and ones where the soil tends to stay a bit damp. Moss is velvety soft and green, so it can mimic the look of a traditional lawn but won't require mowing and other upkeep. Because it spreads quickly, moss can take over quite rapidly. You will need to protect areas where you do not want moss by creating barriers to stop spread.

Gravel

Stone and gravel areas can reduce maintenance in the landscape and require very little upkeep. When gravel is installed correctly, weeds may not grow readily. Gravel installation may include laying heavy-duty, semi-permeable landscape fabric, which is available in home improvement centers. Gravel is cheaper than pavers and can be just as beautiful.

Artificial turf

If the desired look is a lawn without all the upkeep, there are various artificial grass options on the market. Homeowners who opt for artificial turf can save money and space devoted to lawn mowers and other lawn tools.

Grass may be ideal for some, but there are alternatives for people who have troublesome landscapes or desire a low-maintenance product for their homes.

Lawn watering and fertilizing techniques

A lush, green lawn is a sight to behold. Many variables are involved in growing and maintaining grass — and water and fertilizer are among the most important components.

Knowing how much water and fertilizer to apply and when to apply it can make a big difference in the appearance and health of a lawn. That's because a well-fed and watered lawn will develop a better root system, which makes the lawn less vulnerable to stressors like drought, mowing, foot traffic, and heat, according to the Scotts® company.

Fertilize

There is no magic formula governing when to fertilize a lawn. The type of grass and how well-established a lawn is must be considered. Experts suggest having the soil tested to determine its pH levels and if any nutrients are lacking. A fertilizing schedule can then be developed after testing.

Keep in mind that overfeeding a lawn will not make it grow any better and actually can damage the turf. Several small applications of fertilizer during the lawn's most active growing period may be helpful, advises the home improvement resource Tools Around the House. An annual application (late spring for warm-season grass or fall for cool-season grass) may be all that's needed.

Certain fertilizers need to be applied and watered in. Others may be combined with weed-control products and must be set on top of damp grass. Read packaging to determine the right application.

Water


The right watering schedule and techniques can help a lawn thrive. Scotts® says adjusting for climate and nature can help grass to grow strongly. A lawn that has a grayish cast or appears dull green is telling an owner that it needs water. Another test is to step on the lawn. If footprints disappear quickly, the grass blades have enough moisture to spring back.

Water the lawn in the morning before 10 a.m. when it's cooler and the winds tend to be calm so that the water can soak in. For those who must water at night, do so in early evening so that the water can dry before nightfall and will not contribute to disease.

Scotts® says to water an established lawn until the top six to eight inches of soil is wet. Most lawns need one to 1.5 inches of water per week from rain or a hose to soak the soil that deeply. Newly established lawns may require more water to keep the soil moist but not soggy.

How to reduce risk for Lyme disease

When the weather warms up and hours of daylight increase, few people can resist the allure of the great outdoors. Nature beckons each spring, and those answering that call must do so safely.

Lyme disease is a potential threat for people who live in certain regions. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that Lyme disease cases have been reported in nearly every state, though residents in certain states are more vulnerable than others. For example, CDC data indicates that incidence rates were highest in several states in New England, including Maine, New Hampshire and Rhode Island, while rates in Oklahoma, Missouri and Wyoming were especially low.



Everyone should take steps to prevent tick bites when going out into the great outdoors.

Lyme disease is spread by the bite of an infected tick. Playing, hiking, camping, or working in wooded or grassy places where instances of Lyme disease are high increases a person's risk of being bitten. But that doesn't mean those in areas like New England, the mid-Atlantic or the upper-midwest must avoid such activities. However, they should take steps to prevent tick bites when going out into the great outdoors.

• **Recognize where ticks live.** The CDC reports that blacklegged ticks cause Lyme disease and that such ticks live in moist and humid environments. In addition, the Lyme Disease Association notes that ticks are most likely to be in certain areas, including woods, areas where woods meet lawns and where lawns meet fields. Ticks also may be living in tall brush/grass,

under leaves, under ground cover, near stonewalls or wood piles, or in shady areas. Ticks also may be drawn to areas around bird feeders or outdoor areas designated for pets.

Wear insect repellent. The CDC recommends wearing insect registered repellents with the Environmental Protection Agency. Repellents should contain DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, 2-undecanone. The EPA even has a tool on its website that can help people choose the right repellent products for them. That

Guide to adopting a shelter pet

pandemic has The brought a lot of changes to daily life. One of the positive effects of COVID-19 is that many individuals have turned to pets to tame loneliness or bring some brightness into their lives amidst all the uncertainty and turbulence.

In April 2020, the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals said applications to foster dogs and cats was up 200%. Expense



What is heartworm? The American Veterinary Medical Association notes that heartworm is a serious and potentially fatal disease caused by a parasite that primarily infects dogs, cats and ferrets. cally have three or fewer worms and may not have any adult heartworms. The AVMA noted that diagnosing heartworm in cats is more difficult than diagnosing it in dogs, perhaps due to the smaller number of worms in infected cats than in infected dogs. Various tests may be needed to determine the likelihood of heartworm infection in cats, but such tests are not always conclusive. But potential warning signs of heartworm in cats include coughing, respiratory distress and vomiting.

The AVMA indicated that dogs may show no signs of illness if they were recently or mildly infected with heartworms. Signs may only develop when the worms reach adulthood. Dogs may cough, become lethargic, lose their appetites or experience difficulty breathing. In addition, the AVMA indicates that dogs with heartworm infections may tire rapidly after only moderate exercise.

The good news for pet owners and their pets is that heartworm is entirely preventable. Various preventive medicines are available, and pet owners can speak with their veterinarians to determine which product is best for their pets.

Heartworm is a serious yet preventable disease. Pet owners who suspect their pets are infected with heartworm should report those suspicions to their vets immediately.






