SQSPCA reaches \$5 million SHELTER US campaign goal Ribbon cutting at new site set for Saturday, July 17

Following an organizational rebranding, the launch of its SHELTER US capital campaign and just under three years of intensive fundraising, the Susquehanna SPCA (SQSPCA) has reached its \$5 million campaign goal and is poised to move into a brand-new shelter building next month.

"Our vision is becoming a reality," said SQSPCA Executive Director Stacie Haynes.

The SQSPCA's multimillion-dollar campus is possible thanks to a hugely successful capital campaign led by Haynes, the SQSPCA Board of Directors under President Gaylord Dillingham and the SHELTER US Capital Campaign Committee chaired by Anne Keith.

"Foundation grants, matching challenges and a tremendous outpouring of private donations allowed us to reach what seemed like an insurmountable goal," Haynes said. "We are incredibly

thankful for the business, community and foundation support we receive, not only for this project but for the shelter's general operating expenses as well."

The SHELTER US project - buoyed by a \$500,000 New York State Companion Animal Capital Fund Grant through the Department of Agriculture and Markets - is relocating the shelter and thrift store facilities 1.2 miles north of the current location on State Route 28 just south of Cooperstown.

"To accommodate this move - including property purchase, demolition, asbestos abatement, site preparation and upgraded equipment - the price tag to design and construct a new, state-ofthe-art animal shelter, thrift store and campus is coming in at right around \$5 million," according to Haynes. "Thanks to the assistance of an incredible group of volunteers, including Rotary Club of Cooperstown members, the contents of the thrift store have already been moved to the new retail location. We anticipate we can begin relocating the animal shelter in just a few weeks."

The New Leash on Life Thrift Shop will conduct sales online via Facebook until the store is ready to reopen. The shelter transition will continue through the month of June as staff settles into the state-of-the-art facility and adjusts to the cutting-edge equipment. Interior finishes, site work and landscaping are ongoing.

"The official ribbon cutting ceremony and open house at the new location are set for Saturday, July 17. Please save the date," Haynes urged.

The new facilities will improve the daily lives of sheltered dogs and cats by better conforming to guidelines established by the Association of Shelter Veterinarians. Upgraded features will include two entrances separating incoming animals from visitors and animals leaving for their new homes, a sterile surgery suite with safe recovery area, a fresh air ventilation system to benefit visitors as well as animals under shelter care and convenient parking.

"The new shelter and all the improved amenities are much needed and are very exciting, but they come at a considerable price tag," Haynes said. "Our ability to meet and surpass the capital campaign goal represents a tremendous vote of confidence from the community in our abilities for which we are extremely grateful. We're more than ready for any challenges that lie ahead."

In operation since 1917, the SQSPCA is a nonprofit organization committed to caring for homeless, surrendered and seized companion animals and finding them loving, forever homes. For more information or to donate, visit sqspca.org.

Good Housekeeping - Macaroons

Ingredients

- 1 bag (7-oz., 2-2/3 cups) shredded coconut
- 1 cup sliced natural almonds
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/4 tsp salt
 - 4 large egg whites
- 1 tsp almond extract *Directions*
- 1. Preheat oven to 325° F. Grease 2 large cookie sheets. Into large bowl, measure coconut, almonds, sugar and salt. With spoon, mix until combined. Stir in egg whites and almond extract until well-blended.
- 2. Drop mixture by heaping tablespoons,

about 2 inches apart, on cookie sheets. Place cookie sheets on 2 oven racks. Bake cookies 20 - 25 minutes until golden, rotating cookie sheets between upper and lower racks halfway through baking time.

- 3. With pancake turner, remove cookies to wire racks to cool completely. Store cookies in tightly covered container. Makes 18 cookies.
- Each serving: About 105 calories, 6g total fat (3g saturated), 0mg cholesterol, 75mg sodium, 11g total carbs, 0g dietary fiber, 2g protein.





INTRODUCTION

To comply with State regulations, Frankfort (V) Water Works, will be annually issuing a report describing the quality of your drinking water. The purpose of this report is to raise your understanding of drinking water and awareness of the need to protect our drinking water sources. Last year, your tap water met all State drinking water health standards We are proud to report that our system did not violate a maximum contaminant level or any other water quality standard Last year, we conducted tests for over 80 contaminants. This repolt provides an overview of last year's water quality. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to State standards.

WHERE DOES OUR WATER COME FROM?

In general, the sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activities. Contaminants that may be present in source water include: microbial contaminants inorganic contaminants; pesticides and herbicides; organic chemical contaminants; and radioactive contaminants. In chemical contaminants; and radioactive contaminants. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the State and the EPA prescribe regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The State Health Department's and the FDA's regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Our water source is a groundwater source consisting of three (3) drilled wells located on Industrial Drive within the Village of Frankfort. During 2020, our system did not experience any restriction of our water source. Our wells depth range from 46-60 feet deep and each well has the capacity to produce 750 gallons per minute. Our raw water is Air Stripped to treat and remove any existing tetrachloroethene (a Principal Organic Chemical discovered in our raw water in the 1990's). We continue to airstrip our raw water as a precautionary treatment. It is then disinfected with a sodium hypochlorite solution. We also add orthophosphate (a polyphosphate solution) for corrosion control with-in the distribution system. After treatment any water not consumed by our customers is then stored in three (3) glass lined

SOURCEWATER ASSESSMENT SUMMARY

The NYS DOH has completed a source water assessment for this system, based on available information. Possible and actual threats to this drinking water source were evaluated actual threats to this drinking water source were evaluated.

The state source water assessment includes a susceptibility rating based on the risk posed by each potential source of contamination and how easily contaminants can move through the subsurface to the wells. The susceptibility rating is an estimate of the potential for contamination of the source water, it does not mean that the water delivered to consumers is, or will become contaminated. See section "Are there conninants in our drinking water?" for a list of contaminants if any, that have been detected. The source water assessments provide resource managers with additional information for protecting source waters into the future.

As mentioned before, our water is derived from 3 drilled

wells. The source water assessment has rated these wells as having a very high susceptibility to halogenated solvents; a high susceptibility to herbicides, pesticides, metals, nitrates, petroleum products and industrial organic compounds; and a medium-high susceptibility to bacteria, viruses and protozoa These ratings are due primarily to the proximity of the wells to permitted discharge facilities (industrial/commercial facility that discharges wastewater into the environment and is regulated by the state and/or federal government), industrial activity, toxic chemical release facilities, hazardous waste sites, mining activity, chemical storage facilities and low intensity residential activities in the assessment area. In addi-tion, the wells draw from an unconfined aquifer of unknown hydraulic conductivity.

While the source water assessment rates our wells as being susceptible to microbials, please note that our water is disinfected to ensure that the finished water delivered into your home meets New York State's drinking water standards for microbial contamination.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Our water system serves a population of 3800 through 1569 metered service connections. This includes the eight (8 - Town of Frankfort Water Districts), that the Village of Frankfort provides finished water to. The total amount of water withdrawn from the aquifer and treated in 2020 was 240,710,000.00 gallons. The daily average of water treated and pumped into the distribution system was 658,000gallons per day. Our highest single day was 930,000 gallons. The amount of water delivered to customers was 223,000,000 gallons. This leaves an unaccounted for total of

17.7 million gallons. This water, used to flush mains, fight fires, and leakage, accounts for the remaining 15.3 million gallons (10% of the total amount produced). In 2020, water customers were charged \$6.40 per 1,000 gallons of water and the annual average water charge per user was \$376.00. It should be noted that these numbers are estimated and customers in the Town of Frankfort Water Districts and those tomers in the Iown of Frankfort Water Districts and those customers paying sewer use fees may differ depending on their circumstances. ARE THERE CONTAMINANTS IN OUR DRINKING

As the State regulations require, we routinely test your drinking water for numerous contaminants. These contaminants include: total coliform, inorganic compounds, nitrate nitrite, lead and copper, volatile organic compounds, total trihalomethanes, haloacetic acids, radiological and synthetic organic compounds. The table presented below depicts which compounds were detected in your drinking water The State allows us to test for some contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Some of our data, though representative, are more than one year old.

It should be noted that all drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. WHAT DOES THIS INFORMATION MEAN?

As you can see by the table, our system had no violations. We have learned through our testing that some contaminants have been detected; however, these contaminants were detected below the level allowed by the State.

IS OUR WATER SYSTEM MEETING OTHER RULES THAT GOVERN OPERATIONS?

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitor-ing are an indicator of whether or not your drinking water meets health standards. In 2020 our system met all the Rules and Regulations that govern Operations.

DO I NEED TO TAKE SPECIAL PRECAUTIONS?

Some people may be more vulnerable to disease causing microorganisms or pathogens in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. Schmid attributes some specific experiences to helping inspire her future field of study. She remembers her fourth grade teacher, Barbara Crabtree, giving an assignment involving architectural structures in the Poland community, and it helped her appreciate the beauty of the buildings.

"I think it was one of the first times I heard the word architecture," Schmid said.

The other inspiration comes from her father being a cabinetmaker and woodworker and having a box of scrap wood and materials. She would be able to look at the pieces and envision how they could be turned into various structures. Schmid has both technical and creative sides to her and likes science, physics and mathematics, she said.

Going to school in Poland has prepared her for the next steps of her life, she said. She was able to experience a variety of beliefs. Her teachers used a variety of teaching styles, which is good preparation for college and life. Teachers that have been particularly impactful for her and her architecture career path include art teacher Emily Dusart helping her create a portfolio of about 15 pieces of art over a short period of time, technology teacher Mark Harlander with his technical drawing and architectural drawing classes, math teacher Linda Tullar for math and physics teacher Barry Smith.

Schmid said even though she wasn't aiming to necessarily be the valedictorian, her approach to school involved striving for success. "I've always been pretty goal-oriented," she said. "When I start something, I want to finish it and be proud of the product no matter what it is. Sometimes, I strive for perfection, but it isn't ultimately the goal in the end - it's more about the process of getting there.'

Borner is the daughter of Judy and John Borner of Deerfield. She is still deciding on where she wants to go to college, but plans to pursue a bachelor's degree in biochemistry and then a career in optometry or epidemiology.

"I've always loved science," she said. "I think especially through the science fairs I realized how much I love science and research. I like the research and being able to explore and find new things."

Borner said going to school in the Poland community helped prepare her for her future. "I think the small community just kind of taught me who I want to be and where I want to go from here," she said. "I like the small community, and at the same time, I'm ready to go to a bigger community. And with all the teachers, just being able to go to whoever at any time has been really helpful throughout my years."

Borner said some particular teachers that had a big influence on her were science teacher Kevin Ford through his role as an advisor for the Poland Student Council and involvement with the NYS Council on Leadership and Student Activities, as well as science teachers Barry Smith and Jessica Meyer for assisting with inspiring her plans for a science-based career.

Component school boards approve Herkimer BOCES 2021-22 administrative budget

The Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES component school boards have approved the \$3,291,726 Herkimer BOCES administrative budget for the 2021-22 school year.

Component district school boards took a vote on whether to approve the BOCES administrative budget and then cast an overall vote as a board. The 10 Herkimer BOCES component school districts conducted votes on the budget, and the 10 boards unanimously approved the budget.

The Herkimer BOCES component school boards also unanimously voted for three Herkimer BOCES Board of Education members. Current members Thomas Shypski, representing Richfield Springs Central School District; Michael Clements, representing Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District; and William Miller, at-large representing Little Falls City School District, were re-elected to three-year terms from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2024.

Shypski also recently received the Level 4 Board Lifetime Achievement Award from the New York State School Boards Association's Recognition Program, which is designed to acknowledge school board members who strive to continually expand their governance knowledge and skills. It's comprised of four achievement levels, which are reached by accumulating points for participating in various NYSSBA training activities – including statemandated training workshops, board officers' academy, legal workshops, convention-related events and custom board retreats.

Shypski, who has also served on the Richfield Springs Board of Education since 2004, has been on the Herkimer BOCES Board of Education since 2009 and is currently in his second year as Herkimer BOCES board president. He previously served six years as the Herkimer BOCES board's vice president.

Shypski has a business management/economics degree from Albany State, worked most of his career in agribusiness on the family Cullen Pumpkin Farm just outside of Richfield and is now retired from his position as water superintendent for the village of Richfield Springs.
