



### Special guest artists join Concert at Hyde Hall

On July 23, the Musicians of Ma'alwyck return to Hyde Hall in Cooperstown for a concert with special guest artists. Jörg-Michael Schwarz, violin and Katrina Smith, viola, join the Musician of Ma'alwyck's Ann-Marie Barker Schwartz, director and violin, to perform Dvorák's Miniatures paired with the trio of George Templeton Strong.

The program draws on the insights of George Templeton Strong who chronicled the musical scene in early America in his diaries. His sons were friends of the Clarke family and spent time at Hyde Hall; a portrait of Louis Strong still hangs in the Drawing Room. In this elegant string trio, Strong's other son, George, a well-respected composer, is coupled with music from Antonin Dvorák and readings from Strong's insightful diaries.

The artists are firstrate and promise a memorable performance. Jörg-Michael Schwarz is a prize winner in several international violin competitions, one of North America's leading Baroque violinists and co-founder and co-director of the award-winning REBEL-Ensemble for Baroque Music, one of the world's premier early music groups. Katrina Smith is a member of the Glimmerglass Festival Orchestra since 1999, is Co-Principal Violist of the Dallas Opera Orchestra and Assistant Principal Violist of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Philharmonic, and substitutes regularly with the Rhode Island Philharmonic and Hartford Symphony Orchestra. Ann-Marie Barker Schwartz is director and violinist of Musicians of Ma'alwyck, performs with the Glimmerglass Opera Orchestra, teaches as an adjunct professor of violin and viola at Schenectady County Community College (SCCC) and at Union College.

Jonathan Maney, Hyde Hall's Executive Director pointed out that "George Templeton Strong was one of America's most important 19th-century diarists. The fact that his son lived at Hyde Hall for many years makes this concert both fitting and fun.'


"George Templeton Strong, Jr. was a fascinating figure," said Ann-Marie Barker Schwartz. "His musical works reflect the romanticism of Richard Strauss and Gustav Mahler, full of harmonic color and intensity. We pair his trio with the music of Dvorák, who visited America in the 1890s, and left with an ample impression of America's musical potential. The program will include readings from the Strong diaries about 19th-century America and its culture.'

The Concert begins at 7:30 p.m. on Hyde Hall's south lawn. Concertgoers can purchase tickets HydeHall.org through or at Eventbrite. In the event of inclement weather, the performance will be moved to the Milford Community Center.



### Getting the garden ready for vacation

As we finally begin to emerge from the pandemic, and travel options are opening up, many of us are planning to be away from home this summer or fall. Just as we need to make arrangements for the care of our homes and pets, our gardens also will need some attention in our absence.

Other gardeners in your neighborhood may be planning trips as well, so it may be worthwhile to ask around. Take turns checking in on each other's gardens. As an added bonus, you can see how other gardeners manage their space and what they are growing.

There are some things you can do to ensure your garden is thriving when you return, even if you are fortunate enough to have a neighbor or friend who is willing to check periodically.

If your planned absence is a month or more in the future, begin to water

your garden more deeply and less frequently now. This will help the plants adjust to going longer periods without water.

You also can try adding mulch to those beds that require more water. Straw is a great option for this. Avoid using hay as it can contain weed seeds.

You can make a simple drip irrigation watering system out of used plastic water bottles for plants that need to be watered regularly. Dig a hole near the plant to hold the upside-down bottle upright. Use a nail to poke a few holes in the lid of the bottle. Fill the bottle with water and place upside down in the hole you dug. Water will slowly drip out and keep your plant watered. This also is a great solution for containers that dry out quickly. One to two weeks be-

fore travel, begin to work on clearing your garden of weeds. Getting the weeds out will maximize the water available for your garden plants and ensure smaller plants are not blocked from sunlight.

This is also the time to harvest everything that is ripe. Remove all the ripe vegetables from your garden and eat, share or preserve them. Those ripe vegetables will start to rot

and make more to clean up on your return.

Keep an eye on the forecast just before you leave. If it looks like it will be dry during your trip, water the garden well in the days leading up to your departure.

Resist the temptation to fertilize plants just before you go. The plants will need more water because of the increase in growth.

Herbs, tomatoes and other vegetables planted

in containers typically need frequent watering throughout the season so can suffer in your absence. Move them into a shady spot that is protected from wind.

Consider setting up drip irrigation using the plastic bottle technique discussed above. Watering spikes, which work in the same way, can be purchased at your local gardening center.

These tips will still apply for travel during September and October as the growing season winds down. You should prioritize being aware of the forecast and adjust watering accordingly. With the cooler temperatures of autumn, you will likely want to water less intensely before you leave.

When you return from your trip, check for readyto-harvest vegetables and tidy up any that have fallen or rotted. Water as needed.

Follow these tips, and your garden might not even notice you were gone.







When my cats used to be outdoors, I saw very few birds killed by them. Generally, it was mice and moles. My cats would kill snakes and scare off the squirrels.

I brought my cats indoors because of coyotes in the area. Also, one of my cats was attacked by a neighbor and had to be put to sleep.

If there were no cats, you would be totally overrun by mice and rats. How would you like that? I suggest that you print

this letter, that you do not shorten it, that you apologize for what you said about cats and that you think twice before you put something like this in writing again. Thank you. - Debra in West Virginia

Dear Debra: I will apologize ... for shortening your letter, as we have limited space. You raise many good points based on your personal experience. Cats do keep many rodents at bay, because they are incredibly good hunters. But they are at grave risk being outdoors, from covotes, from feral cats carrying diseases and from humans who do evil, foul things.

The article that offended you raised many good points about the damage that outdoor cats can do to neighbors' property, and the danger they pose to small creatures. I'm glad you're keeping your cats safe indoors. Doesn't your experience prove the point that cats are safer inside?

showing up in masks, six six feet apart, in a snowstorm and even when your kids were sick," she said.

The part-time day program had two faculty speakers: Marcia Thomas-Bruce and retiring faculty member Mary Prokopienko.

### Safety first when clearing land

New homeowners often see their homes as blank canvasses. Looking at a home as a blank canvas is typically associated with its interior, but it also can apply to landscaping.

Homes are empty of furniture and decorative items like photos and art on the walls when new homeowners move in. That makes it easy to see the interior of a home as a blank canvas. But that's not always so easy in the garden or the yard, where brush, overgrown plants or trees and other eyesores might have been left behind by the previous owners. A landscape must be cleared out before it can be seen as a blank canvas. Though clearing land may seem like a straightforward process, no one knows what lies beneath overgrowth or neglected areas of a yard or garden. Do-ityourselfers can typically clear land on their own, but some safety strategies should be kept in mind to ensure the process goes smoothly.

- appropriate Wear PPE. Personal protective equipment should be worn when clearing land. The appropriate PPE when clearing land includes attire and other gear that many homeowners likely already have on hand. A long-sleeve shirt, puncture proof pants and gloves and slip-resistant work boots should be worn when clearing land. Homeowners also may want to invest in a hard hat if they will be cutting branches off of trees or cutting trees down. A face shield also may be a good bet depending on the scale and potential dangers of the project.
- · Contact your utility company. Overhead power and telephone lines are visible to the naked eye, and homeowners should be conscious of those lines as they cut any high branches. But underground lines are not visible, and that can make clearing land dangerous. Homeowners are urged to contact their utility companies before they begin to clear any land so they can determine if any underground lines are beneath areas they intend to clear out.
- Get a lay of the land. Carefully inspect the area to be cleared prior to

starting the project. Inspections can reveal the density of any vegetation that may need to be removed and reveal if there are any harmful plants like poison ivy growing. Many DIYers can remove small trees on their own, but a professional tree service may be necessary for large trees or those located close to the house. Homeowners won't want to cut down a tree, even a small one, if it can potentially fall onto the house. In addition, homeowners who are unfamiliar with chippers or stump grinders may be better of hiring a tree service to clear

• Don't go it alone. No one should clear land alone. Even small projCarefully inspect the area to be cleared prior to starting the project.

ects are best tackled by at least two people. Should someone get injured during the project, the presence of another person ensures someone can immediately call for help. In addition, clearing land can be more difficult than it appears, and having at least two people to pull old shrubs or carry tree branches reduces the risk

### Herkimer BOCES Board of Education elects 2021-22 leaders, appoints new member

The Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Board of Education re-elected Thomas Shypski to his third one-year term as board president on July 8 and elected Michael Clements to his first one-year term as board vice president.

BOCES Herkimer Board of Education members also unanimously appointed Samuel Luce to the board to fill a seat vacated by Daniel Voce, who resigned due to time constraints from increasing demands of his job. Voce served on the Herkimer BOCES Board of Education for 11 years and as the board's vice president from July 2019 through the end of June 2021.

These decisions were made during the Herkimer BOCES Board of Education's annual reorganization meeting held July 8 at Herkimer BOCES.

Shypski, representing Richfield Springs Central School District on the BOCES board, has also served on the Richfield Springs Board of Education since 2004. He has been on the Herkimer BOCES Board of Education since 2009 and is now starting his third

year as Herkimer BOCES board president. He previously served six years as the Herkimer BOCES board vice president.

Clements, representing Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District on the BOCES board, has been on the Frankfort-Schuyler Board of Education for the past seven years. He is now starting his fourth year on the Herkimer BOCES Board of Education.

Shypski, Clements and board member William Miller, at-large representing Little Falls, were also sworn in during the reorganization meeting after being re-elected to the Herkimer BOCES board by component district school boards this spring to serve three-year terms from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2024.

Prior to Herkimer BOCES board members appointing Luce, Herkimer Central School District Board of Education members nominated him to fill the seat representing their district on the BOCES board. He will serve the remainder of Voce's term, which ends on June 30, 2022. The seat will be up for election in spring 2022 for a three-year term.

Luce has a bachelor's degree in theology, a mas-

ter's degree in biblical and theological studies and a master's degree in Christian and classical studies. He has served for three years on the board of the International Network of Children's Ministry including two years as board president. Luce is a pastor at Redeemer Church in Utica and has served as the education director there for 24 years.

# and DMV warn of text message phishing scam

Scammers Use Fake Text Message to Try to Get Users to Click on Fraudulent Link

The NYS Division of Consumer Protection and the Department of Motor Vehicles recently warned New Yorkers of a text message phishing scheme. Phishing texts are fraudulent messages designed to obtain data or sensitive personal information to be used to commit identity theft or trick the recipient into installing malicious software onto a computer or mobile device.

The illegitimate text messages reference the Secretary of State NY Drivers License Facility and tells recipients they are required to update their data for their current NY Drivers License. Anyone who received such a text message should delete it right away.

To help protect against phishing or smishing (SMS phishing) scams, the NYS Office of Information Technology Services (ITS) and the Division of Consumer Protection recommend the following precautions:

• DO exercise caution with all communications you receive,

including those that appear to be from a trusted entity. Inspect the sender's information to confirm the message was generated from a legitimate source.

- DO keep an eve out for telltale signs of phishing - poor spelling or grammar, the use of threats, the URL does not match that of the legitimate site. If the message does not feel right, chances are it is
- DON'T click on links embedded in an unsolicited message from an unverified source.
- DON'T send your personal information via text. Legitimate businesses will not ask users to send sensitive personal information through text message.
- DON'T post sensitive information online. The less information you post, the less data you make available to a cybercriminal for use in developing a potential attack or

scams.

here is in the splashing of the creek a great spray of diamonds. As each youngster sails like an astronaut out on the tire swing, then releases the hold on the earth to flail, suspended in time and space for that brief second or two, there is a timelessness, a postponement of all things evil and destructive, an affirmation of joy.

The swimming hole in Lewis Creek has been there since Indian times, of course, and the tire swing was probably preceded by simply a rope with knots in it. It is one of the summer lodestones of our existence. Each summer we have to make our pilgrimage in the hot sun to the hole below the little waterfall, to the place where Lewis Creek widens and deepens for the benefit of hot, dry people before becoming just a creek again. And in this widening of the creek, this sacred place in our summer lives, we also play witness to the passage of years.

Across the creek from the tree with the tire swing, the gravelly bottom extends gently with almost no current for 10 feet or so. This is the baby beach, where

squealing tots are allowed to cool off without benefit (or hindrance) of any more covering than the smiles of their parents. As the children grow, they venture farther out into the current of the creek and test their strength against the forces of nature. By the time a youngster is eight or 10, the seduction of the tire swing becomes overwhelming and the flailing of the arms and legs against the blue of the sky begin. Later still, when gangliness becomes fluidity and sleekness, and we want to make catlike moves to attract the opposite sex, the tire is used as a swinging platform for exquisite dives into the deep part of the creek where the big trout lie in cold holes.

And as we age, and we watch our children come to love the hole in Lewis Creek, and as we sip lemonade in the shade as our grandchildren work their ways up the swimming hole chain of life, we can look at the splashing of the creek and see, with each sleek dive, with each laughing bellyflop, the diamonds of the creek sent skyward, and the laughter stays with us and keeps us strong and makes us feel rich, and fortunate.



It is unnecessary to say the hole in Lewis Creek is an important part of our lives, because it, along with so many other treasures of the years, really is our lives.






