

Does Oatmeal Contain

Roundup Herbicide?

Dear Dr. Roach: Experts advised us to "throw out sugar-laden cereals" and eat a healthy breakfast, such as oatmeal. Now we are told that oatmeal contains a significant amount of glyphosate, which they say is an ingredient in Roundup! Are we poisoning our children? – A.D.

Answer: There have been traces of glyphosate (an herbicide) found in oatmeal and other cereals. However, as always, the dose makes the poison.

The EPA has set a level of 30 parts per million, below which the exposure is considered safe. A 2018 study by the Environmental Working Group found levels of glyphosate in oatmeal breakfast cereals to be between 0.5 and 1 parts per million. It is unlikely that consumption of these cereals causes any significant health risks. Nobody likes the idea of eating an herbicide, but these are very low amounts, and some experts have questioned the specificity of the detection method used.

The same EWG report found that organic cereals had less, but often still some, glyphosate in them. Although the levels in both conventional and organic cereals were safe, glyphosate itself is found at generally lower levels in organic products. Unfortunately, there have not been good studies on residual amounts of organic pesticides (some of which are substantially more toxic than glyphosate) that might be found in organically grown food.

I agree with reducing the simple sugars found in many cereals, especially those marketed to children. However, I recommend more protein for breakfast than is found in oatmeal. You can add more with nuts, egg whites or seeds.

Dear Dr. Roach: I was diagnosed with high LDL cholesterol 20 years ago. I have been taking higher statin doses and now take Crestor 20 mg. Due to muscle pain, my cardiologist prescribed

Praluent injections of 75 mg every two weeks to lower my LDL to below 77. I am 74 and have two heart stents in my right coronary artery but have never had a heart attack.

Praluent is a monoclonal antibody, and the literature states that it can lower your immunity. I also have low-grade (Gleason 3+3) prostate cancer that has been stable since diagnosed in 2012. Is there a risk that Praluent could cause my prostate cancer to advance? – J.E.

Answer: Although taking a statin (such as the Crestor you were taking to reduce cholesterol) was once thought to increase cancer risk, multiple studies have since found no convincing evidence that this is

the case

Praluent (alirocumab) is in a new class of drugs, called the PCSK-9 inhibitors. They have not been used for very long, but I found no evidence that these drugs increase cancer risk either. There was some concern that the increase in bile acids seen in people treated with these drugs might predispose them to co-

lon cancer, but initial studies have not shown any problems so far with either Praluent or evolocumab (Repatha).

I believe that for you, heart disease is a larger risk to your life than your prostate cancer. Since you can't tolerate a statin, a PCSK-9 inhibitor is more likely to prolong your life by reducing heart disease risk than

it is to shorten your life by increasing prostate cancer risk. There is no evidence that it does so.



COVID-19 vaccine clinics for students scheduled at local schools

Local students now have the option of receiving COVID-19 vaccines right at their school or a nearby school during upcoming vaccine clinics.

The Herkimer County Public Health Department has scheduled several vaccine clinics for students in the Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES

Students who are 12 or older

are eligible to receive the vaccine at any of the locations. Adults accompanying students also will be able to receive vaccines. The vaccines are free to

The vaccine clinics will be walk-in only, with no appointments. Second doses of the vaccine will be scheduled at the time students receive their first dose.

A parent/guardian must be

present for the vaccine clinic for any students who are younger than 18 - or another adult can accompany the student with a note from a parent/guardian including written permission and contact information.

Grilling turns the breakfast tables on a beloved staple

Grillmasters insist that just about everything tastes a little better when cooked over a flame. Even though grilling often is reserved for lunch or dinner, there's something to be said about preparing breakfast on those hot grates as well.

According to Andrew Schloss and David Joachim, authors of the cookbook "Mastering the Grill: The Owner's Manual for Outdoor Cooking" (Chronicle Books), there's reckless abandon involved in standing by an open fire in a robe preparing breakfast. It can turn a mundane morning into one right out of a camping expedition. For their "Grilled French Toast," the extra crunch and slight char grilling provides catapults this breakfast staple to another level of flavor.

Grilled Stuffed French Toast

Makes 4 servings

1 loaf Italian bread

8 ounces cream cheese, at room tem-

perature

4 tablespoons confectioners' sugar 1/2 teaspoon almond extract

3/4 cup blueberries

5 egg

1 1/2 cups half-and-half or milk

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Pinch of kosher salt

Oil for coating grill grate

1/4 cup Orange Honey-Butter Glaze (see below)

1. Cut off and discard a small diagonal slice from each end of the bread. Cut the bread on the diagonal into about eight 1 1/2-inch-thick slices. Cut a slit through the top crust of each slice to form a deep pocket.

2. In a medium bowl, mix together the cream cheese, 3 tablespoons of the confectioners' sugar, and the almond extract. Stir in the blueberries and spoon the filling equally into the bread pockets. Lay the stuffed slices of bread in a shal-

low 4-quart baking dish, such as a 15-by-10-inch

3. Clean and dry the bowl, then use it to whisk together the eggs, half-and-half, vanilla extract, salt, and remaining 1 tablespoon confectioners' sugar. Pour the mixture evenly over the bread. Carefully tilt the pan and swirl the egg mixture to completely coat the

bread. Let sit for 30 minutes, or cover and refrigerate for up to 8 hours.

4. Heat the grill to 350° for a gas grill, medium ash for charcoal and medium ash for wood.

5. Brush the grill grate and coat it with oil. Put the French toast on the grill and cook until nicely browned and crisp on the outside, about 5 minutes per side. Transfer to a platter and, using a pastry or basting brush, brush both sides with

the Orange Honey-Butter Glaze.

Orange Honey-Butter Glaze

Makes 1/4 cup

2 tablespoons butter, well softened

1 tablespoon honey

1 tablespoon grated orange zest Pinch of grated nutmeg

In a small bowl, mix all ingredients until creamy and spreadable like icing. Refrigerate for up to two weeks. Soften to a spreadable consistency before using.







Fresh vegetables are the star of summertime meals

When the mercury rises, savvy cooks know lighter fare is the name of the game. Light recipes can be made even better by incorporating fresh produce that's full of vitamins and minerals. It's even possible to grow many of these foods right in your own backyard garden.

"Baked Peppers with Rice Stuffing (Bajogues Farcides)" is a delicate stuffed peppers recipe that originated in Alcoy, Spain. Rich flavors from pork and chicken pair with sweet peppers, tomatoes and corn for a filling yet not overly dense dish that's perfect for warm a weather lunch or a light dinner. This recipe comes courtesy of M. Teresa Segura's "Spain: Authentic Regional Recipes" (Fall River Press).

Baked Peppers with Rice Stuffing

Serves 6

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 large chicken breast, diced
- 5 ounces lean pork, diced
- 4 ounces ham or smoked bacon, diced
- 7 ounces short-grain rice
- 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 2 pounds ripe tomatoes, skinned, seeded and
 - 1 green bell pepper, finely chopped
 - 3 tablespoons corn kernels
 - 2 teaspoons paprika

Pinch powdered saffron


- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 6 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
- 6 large red bell peppers

Heat the oil in a large saucepan and fry the chicken, pork and ham or bacon until colored on all sides. Take the pan off the heat and reserve.

Meanwhile, cook the rice in plenty of boiling salted water until done - usually about 15 minutes, but follow the instructions on the package. Drain and reserve the rice.

Add the garlic, chopped tomatoes, green bell pepper, corn kernels, paprika, saffron, salt, pepper and parsley to the pan containing the meat. Let the sauce simmer and reduce the volume of liquid by about half. Stir the rice into the sauce.

Oil a deep ovenproof dish big enough to take all the peppers. Cut off "lids" at the stalk ends of the peppers and remove the seeds. Stuff them with the meat and rice mixture and replace the lids. Tuck the peppers into the dish, cover with foil and bake at 325° for 1.25 hours.





Rain gardens for stormwater management

Water plays a significant role in the health of our landscapes in more ways than meets the eye.

Stormwater is water that collects on the surface during and after a rainstorm or from melting snow. Depending on the permeability and slope of the surface it hits, stormwater can slowly infiltrate into the earth or wash over impermeable surfaces picking up oils, debris and pollutants along the way.

Without sustainable mitigation strategies in place, this warm, polluted water can end up in our local rivers, ponds and lakes, adding silt and pollution directly into our beautiful natural resources, lowering water and habitat quality.

While stormwater management requires collaboration at many levels, including state, community and private landowner, there are strategies each of us can implement to help manage stormwater runoff.

Utilizing plants in your landscape is an excellent way to help treat stormwater runoff. In addition to adding beauty and food for wildlife and insects, plants prevent soil erosion, slow down water speeds and soak up water and nutrients.

One way to utilize plants for stormwater management is to build rain gardens. Rain gardens temporarily collect stormwater, allowing it to slowly infiltrate into the earth.

Rain gardens often are planted with a plant species that can tolerate both wet and dry soils because there will be times when the rain garden is either saturated or dry. Try to pick plants that are native and pollinator-friendly. This will turn your rain garden into an area that not only manages stormwater but provides food and shelter to beneficial insects and pollinators.

Plants such as cardinal flower, butterfly weed, Joe-pve weed, blue flag iris and red twig dogwood are great plants to test out in rain gardens.

Soil infiltration is incredibly important for the success of a rain garden. Not every natural low spot will make a good place for a rain garden. If your soil is compacted or heavy in clay, water may not soak into the soil quickly enough, causing your plants to struggle and water to sit too long on the surface.

The size of your rain garden should be based on the amount of stormwater you plan to collect. First, you have to determine where the water is coming from. Is it from

your roof or driveway, or a gutter or patio? Measure the surface area of these sources to help determine the overall area of the rain garden that you need

Looking for other ideas for how you can help mitigate stormwater runoff? A few simple things you can do are trying to mow your lawn less often, cutting the grass no shorter than three inches, or even con-

If you have any open soil, plant a cover crop or add mulch to help keep the soil from eroding in rainstorms or snow melts.

sidering what areas you

could leave as meadow.

If you live close to a river or pond, make sure to leave a large planted buffer between the water's edge and lawn. This will help filter stormwater runoff and pollutants from entering the water and lowering water quality.

Every one of these small changes can make a big impact on improving water quality, and creating a more sustainable world. Test one out and see the difference it can make!

Phlox and powdery mildew management

Phlox is a highly versatile perennial with powerful blooms that can extend through much of the season. From spring-flowering, low-growing creeping phlox (Phlox subulata), to its taller, summer relative, garden phlox (Phlox paniculata), there are many cultivars with an endless variety of flower and leaf color, height and bloom time.

Garden phlox's powerful presence and rainbow of colors, from pinks, purples and blues, to reds, oranges and white, can add incredible visual impact to the late summer garden. That is, if they make it that long.

Unfortunately, phlox is susceptible to being eaten by animal visitors such as deer and being covered with an unattractive, white substance known as powdery mildew.

Powdery mildew is a group of fungi that attaches to the leaves and stems of plants including phlox, bee balm and peonies. It makes the surfaces of the plant look almost dusted with white and brown specs.

Its spores are spread by wind and once attached, the fungi absorbs nutrients from the plant in order to continue spreading. While this sounds extreme and doesn't look very nice, if the affected plant is still growing and flowering as it should, you don't need to do anything to treat the mildew.

If you notice that your phlox is suffering from stunted growth, dying foliage or decreased flowering, or if you want to test out possible improvements, there are some non-chemical, pollinator-friendly methods you can use to manage fungi.

When planting a new garden, try to select phlox varieties that are powdery-mildew resistant. This is a good step toward preventing future problems.


Phlox paniculata 'David' is a 24-48-inch tall white-flowering garden phlox with resistance to powdery mildew. The 26-30-inch Purple 'Goliath' phlox (Phlox paniculata 'Goliath'), 36-inch salmon-toned 'Orange Perfection' (Phlox paniculata 'Orange Perfection') and 12-20-inch light blue 'Blue Flame' phlox (Phlox paniculata 'Blue Flame') also are good choices for powdery mildew resis-

For existing gardens, try to relocate your phlox to a new place in your garden. Try an area that gets more sun and has more airflow to see if this makes a difference.

Some varieties of powdery mildew prefer moist environments, while others are happy to live in dry conditions. If you have the fungi and your environment is very shady, moist and tightly spaced, relocating your phlox could make a difference.

Before transplanting, adjust your soil nutrients to see if anything improves. Get a soil test to make sure you match the best amendments to the plant requirements.

Still having trouble? Talk to the experts at your local greenhouse or nursery about their experience with different phlox varieties and how they manage powdery mildew.

Raspberry freezer jam: Savor the flavor all year long

Is there anything as delicious as a sun-warmed raspberry plucked from the bush and popped into your mouth?

The flip side of this simple summer pleasure is how fragile your freshly picked raspberries are and how quick to spoil. Fortunately, raspberries freeze well and are a tasty addition to baked goods, smoothies or yogurt. Another tasty option is freezer jam. Because the berries are not cooked, the flavor is distinctly fresh.

Here are some helpful tips for making raspberry freezer jam.

Do some research to learn when raspberries will be available in your area. The timing varies from early July to early fall depending on the varieties grown and the location of the berry farm.

but check that the brand you select offers a recipe for freezer jam. Some brands offer a reduced sugar version. Read the instructions and make sure you have everything you need.


Pick only ripe berries that separate from the core with a gentle tug. Avoid picking when the berries and bushes are wet with dew or rain. Wet berries mold very quickly.

The ideal containers for picking are shallow fiber or wood boxes that can be set into a basket hung from a belt loop. In a deep container, the berries in the bottom can get crushed and lead to rapid spoilage. Handle your berries gently.

If you travel a distance from home in a hot car, consider bringing along a cooler with ice packs or cool the car before heading for home.

At home, sort through your berries immediately, watching for debris and squashed or mushy berries. Place the fruit gently into freezer containers. Refrigerate or freeze within a day or two to preserve freshness. Immediate chilling can also prevent any problematic effects of spotted wing drosophila (go.uvm.edu/

No time to make jam? It will be just as good made later with frozen berries.

Remember, successful freezer jam is dependent or accurate measurement of the ingredients. Follow the recipe exactly. Measure carefully.

Whether using fresh or previously frozen berries, crush a single layer of berries at a time with a potato masher and measure. A quart-size glass measuring cup works grea for this. Measure the sugar into a separate bowl so tha you can begin again if you get distracted or lose count.

Follow the package directions. This generally involve: mixing the sugar and crushed berries, cooking the pec tin briefly and adding it to the berry mixture. Portion the jam into containers, cover and let it sit for a time Refrigerate or freeze. Your jam will keep several weeks in the refrigerator or a year or more in the freezer.

Six months later as the north wind howls and blows pull a jar of jam from the freezer, sit down with a mu of your favorite warm beverage, a slice of buttered toas slathered with raspberry jam, and revisit the sweet sen sations of summer.







Byrd named a mountain in Antarctica for Norman, and Col. Vaughan took some young people down there and climbed it on his 100th birthday.


Embarrassing? I suppose, but at least he learned the correct way to handle a dog team, right?
