

He was involved with the Herkimer County Fair for over 40 years before he passed in 2012. 



William Johnson's victory on Sept. 8, 1755 was a significant event in the first year of the French and Indian War. It garnered evocative recognition for the Mohawk Valley resident. Our tour will visit each site associated with this important battle: Bloody Morning Scout, the Lake George Battlefield and Bloody Pond. Time permitting, we expect to visit Johnson's home, Fort Johnson, on our return from the battlefield. Lunch will be provided at the Lake George Battlefield Park.





Canning fresh tomatoes

There is no fruit as versatile as a tomato fresh from the vine. Canning the surplus further expands its versatility to hearty winter dishes, sauces, soups and juice.

You will need canning jars (inspect for cracks and roughness on the rim), screw bands, sealing lids, a canning funnel, a jar lifter or canning tongs, water bath canner with rack and a food mill or cone strainer (for puree).

Wash jars, lids and rings in soapy water. Rinse well. Cover with water and bring them to a simmer in a pot of water until ready to fill. Do not boil.

For all of the following instructions, add two tablespoons of lemon juice to each quart jar (one tablespoon per pint) to ensure a safe acidity level.

For whole or cut tomatoes: Submerge clean tomatoes in boiling water for 30 - 60 seconds or until the skins begin to crack. Immerse for a few seconds in cold water. Drain. Cut out stem. Slip off the skins. Cut as desired.

There are two methods for filling jars. For hot pack, add tomatoes to a pot of water. Simmer for five minutes. Ladle into jars. For cold pack, place toma-

toes into jars. For either method, top off jars with hot water, leaving 1/2-inch headspace.

For tomato puree: Core and quarter the unpeeled tomatoes. Simmer over medium heat for 22 minutes. Adjust heat as

needed to prevent burning. Press tomatoes through a food mill or cone strainer to remove skins and seeds. Fill jars with hot puree, leaving 1/2-inch headspace.

The canning process: Fill

your canner (with rack) about half full of water for pints and adjust for quarts so water will be one inch above the jars. Bring water to and maintain a simmer. Set a kettle to boil in case you need extra water.

Run a knife up and down the edge of the jar to release trapped air bubbles. Wipe the jar rim with a clean damp cloth, add the lid and turn the screw band on just until you feel resistance. Use tongs to lower each jar into the simmering canner.

Add boiling water to the canner if needed to cover jars by at least one inch of water. Cover.

Bring to a boil, and then keep the water at a steady, but gentle, boil for 45 minutes for quarts or 40 minutes for pints. Remove jars to a towel, leaving at least an inch of space between each.

Let cool for 12 - 24 hours. You may hear a popping sound as they seal. Check each jar by removing the band and pressing on the center of the lid. A sealed jar lid has no flex to it, and you can't lift it off.

Refrigerate or freeze any unsealed jars. Label and store sealed jars in a cool, dark place. When the north wind blows, put a pot of soup or chili on to simmer and enjoy the delicious pleasure that comes with preserving your bounteous harvest.



Do you compost? Use these tips to get the most out of yours

by Devon Johnson

Composting is a great way to use up house-hold food waste as well as boost garden productivity. Unfortunately, many gardeners make composting mistakes that can lead to problems like compost that fails to decompose or attracts rodents.

Greg Evanylo, Virginia Cooperative Extension specialist and professor in the School of Plant and Environmental Sciences, recommends that home gardeners implement these compost best practices:

- Make sure the compost pile is big. If space is an issue, decrease the pile surface area by creating a compost bin. The bigger your pile, the more heat it will generate. The average pile size should be a minimum of one cubic yard.
- Make sure to turn your pile to get oxygen into it. Without enough oxygen, the microbes will starve, and the pile will go anaerobic. This isn't good. Turning also ensures that all the waste is being

broken down evenly.

• Make sure to monitor your moisture levels. To do this, perform a squeeze test. Scoop a handful of your compost and squeeze. Does it leak any water? If so, the compost is too wet. When squeezed and no water comes out, but it sticks together, the moisture level is perfect.

"What gardeners are ultimately trying to achieve with composting is the development of a soil amendment that will improve the properties of their soil for gardening," Evanylo said.

Compost is useful for improving soil health, boosting beneficial microbial populations, recycling nutrients and increasing organic matter in the soil.

Composting is also good for the environment. Organic wastes in landfills get converted to methane, a potent greenhouse gas that contributes to climate change. When food scraps are recycled into a compost

pile, waste is kept out of a landfill.

Below are some compost dos and don'ts:

DO

Have a 2:1 brown to green ratio. For example, two parts dry leaves (brown) to one part food waste (green).

Have an average particle size distribution – some large pieces, some small, but mostly in the middle.

Monitor your moisture levels! Water the compost as needed, but not too

often or too much – do a squeeze test to check.

Bury food waste and keep covered with browns to help avoid insect and rodent problems.

DON'T

- Compost treated wood or chemicals (paint, pressure treatment, etc.).
- Inoculate your compost! Microbes exist nat-
- Compost meats, dairy or pet waste.
- Compost any diseased plants if the pile is less than 130° 150° .
