# Pond fish stocking

Trout can live in water between 33° and 75°, but they make their most rapid growth in water of 50° to 65°. Not only do trout make their fastest growth within this temperature range, but they are less susceptible to parasites and diseases. It's not likely that you will be able to keep the water temperature in your pond within this range all year, unless you have a constant source of cooler water from a spring or well.

Brook trout prefer a water temperature range of  $65^{\circ}$  or less, and most are acid tolerant. They grow well in ponds 10 feet deep or shallower ones that are spring fed and may reproduce in ponds fed by gravel bottomed streams and springs. They are easily caught, with a life span of three to four years.

Rainbow trout prefer a water temperature range of 70° or warmer and are good for ponds eight feet deep or deeper, best in clear ponds. They are very acid sensitive, but grow quickly, with a life span of five years. The number of trout a pond will support depends on

its surface area, water quality, and size of fish. The standard autumn stocking rate for four- to six-inch fingerlings is 300 to 400 per surface acre.

Largemouth bass will spawn in smaller farm ponds with a water depth of four feet or more. Remember, bass usually reproduce as two-year-olds and occasionally not until the third year. For best results, try to avoid fishing the pond until the bass have spawned. The pond should then provide many years of fishing fun with occasional stocking of feeder fish such as fathead minnows. The recommended stocking rate for two- to four-inch bass is 100 - 125 per surface acre along with 500 - 600 minnows per surface acre.

Unlike bullheads, catfish cohabitate with most other fish species and they will not overpopulate a pond or stir up the bottom. Catfish spawn in small holes in the side of the pond just below the water line. A muskrat hole or eight-inch tile usually works well but they will rarely reproduce in spring fed ponds as the water

temperature is too low. They are a decent fighting fish and can get up to five to 10 pounds, depending on the food source. They will feed on smaller fish but prefer something easier to catch such as tadpoles or algae. When supplemented with a commercial fish food, both catfish and bass will grow much faster. The recommended stocking rate for six- to eight-inch catfish is 75 per surface acre.

All orders to the Herkimer County Soil & Water Conservation District must be prepaid and received, with a copy of your stocking permit or farm fish pond license, no later than Sept. 17. The pick-up date is scheduled for Sept. 30 at 9 a.m. sharp. The Herkimer SWCD office is located in the COR Business Park, 5653 State Route 5 in East Herkimer. A reminder letter will be sent out to confirm the pick-up date and time.

# Good Housekeeping - Country-Fair Cheesecake

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups chocolate-cookie crumbs
- 5 tablespoons margarine or butter, melted

Sugar

- 4 8-ounce packages cream cheese, softened
  - 4 large eggs
- 4 1-ounce squares semisweet chocolate, melted

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 325° F. In 9-by-2 1/2-inch springform pan, with hand, mix chocolate-cookie crumbs, melted

margarine or butter and 2 tablespoons sugar. Press mixture onto bottom of pan.

- 2. In large bowl, with mixer at medium speed, beat cream cheese until smooth; slowly beat in 1 1/4 cups sugar, scraping bowl often with rubber spatula. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition, just until blended.
- 3. Pour half the batter into a medium bowl; stir in melted chocolate until blended. Remove scant 1/4 cup chocolate batter and reserve. Pour remaining chocolate batter over crust. Carefully spoon white batter over chocolate bat-

ter; gently smooth top

- 4. Spoon reserved 1/4 cup chocolate batter into small heavyweight plastic bag; cut small opening in corner of bag. Pipe chocolate batter on top of white batter in parallel lines 3/4 inch apart. Draw toothpick or tip of knife across lines at 3/4-inch intervals, alternating first in one direction and then the other.
- 5. Bake cheesecake 55 minutes until just beginning to brown around edge (center may not seem set); cool in pan on wire rack. Cover and refrigerate cheesecake at least 4 hours or until

well-chilled.

- 6. To serve, dip metal spatula in hot water to gently loosen edge of cheese-cake from pan; carefully remove side of springform pan. Makes 16 servings.
- Each serving: About 400 calories, 29g fat, 121mg cholesterol, 305mg sodium.

# Oberacker announces local library grants

State Sen. Peter Oberacker (R/C-Schenevus) announced that community libraries throughout the 51st senatorial district have been awarded a total of nearly \$300,000 in public library construction grant funds

"Our libraries are vital educational resources while also serving as community gathering places," said Oberacker. "In many of the towns and villages that I represent, the local library hosts public meetings, delivers key services to residents young and old and is the most recognizable building in the community. During the COVID-19 pandemic, our local library administrators and volunteers have faced new challenges and developed creative solutions to continue to safely serve the public."

The grants are from \$14 million in capital funds for public library construction and broadband infrastructure projects provided in the 2020-21 state budget. In the 2021-22 state budget, the legislature provided \$34 million for projects that will be announced in summer 2022.

"Libraries are historic landmarks in many cases and technology and accessibility upgrades can be costly. The state construction aid will help as communities make needed improvements to meet new and evolving needs," added Oberacker.

Public library construction grants help local libraries and library systems to construct new library buildings, create additions to existing structures, update electrical wiring to accommodate computer technology, meet standards of energy efficiency, renovate facilities to provide full accessibility to library users with disabilities and provide meeting rooms to accommodate community needs. New furniture, shelving and equipment, including computer equipment, can be purchased for new or newly reconfigured or renovated space. Renovations designed to provide accessibility for those with disabilities are a high priority. Broadband infrastructure projects are also eligible.

New York's public libraries are in urgent need of renovation and upgrading. A recent survey showed a documented need for public library construction and renovation projects totaling more than \$1.5 billion. More than 52% of the over 1,000 public library buildings in communities across New York are over 60 years old. Another 31% are more than three decades old. Projects earning funds included:

- The Richfield Springs Public Library, \$28,819, for window replacements in order to save on fuel and the preservation of the collection.
- The Frank J. Basloe Public Library in Herkimer, \$97,581, to build a new Children's Room in the main lobby, convert current Children's Room into a quiet research/study area and to build a new storage closet.
- The Jordanville Public Library, \$30,458, for renovation of the walls, ceiling and floors in the current History Room, a former restroom and hall; updating electric and lighting; building safe storage; and drilling well.

# Governor's Traffic Safety Committee announces results of statewide speeding enforcement campaign

The Governor's Traffic Safety Committee (GTSC) announced that law enforcement agencies across the state issued 23,087 tickets for speeding during Speed Awareness Week, which ran from July 31 - Aug. 8. During that time, officers also issued 37,746 tickets for other vehicle and traffic law violations, such as impaired and distracted driving.

"New York has zero tolerance for reckless driving behaviors, such as speeding, that needlessly put all those sharing the road at risk," DMV Commissioner and GTSC Chair Mark J.F. Schroeder said. "As the enforcement campaign showed, dangerous drivers will be caught and held accountable. I thank all law enforcement officers for their hard work ensuring safety on our roads."

This high-visibility equitable enforcement campaign is supported by the GTSC to stop speeding and prevent

avoidable crashes caused by unsafe speed. The following tickets were issued during this year's campaign:

- Speeding violations: 23,087
- Impaired driving violations: 1,380
- Distracted driving violations: 1,185
- Move Over Law violations: 652
- Seatbelt violations: 2,359
- Other violations: 32,170



Speed Week is held each August when fatal crashes involving unsafe speed are typically more prevalent. Data show that most fatal crashes where speed is a contributing factor occur between June and October. According to research by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, drivers who speed are also more likely to commit other traffic violations.

Last year, there was an alarming rise in fatal crash-

es where speed was a contributing factor. According to preliminary data from the Institute for Traffic Safety Management and Research at the University at Albany's Rockefeller College, unsafe speed was a contributing factor in 314 fatal crashes in 2020, compared to 230 fatal crashes in 2019 – a 36% increase. The 314 fatal crashes last year resulted in 365 deaths including drivers, bicyclists and pedestrians.

Combined with education and enforcement campaigns, GTSC coordinates various traffic safety activities throughout the year and supports ongoing initiatives to improve pedestrian, motorcycle and bicycle safety. The GTSC also sponsors critical training for law enforcement, provides resources for teen drivers and their parents and promotes seatbelt use statewide. # Organic gardening tip: Easy ways to stock your pantry

# SQSPCA seeking fosters, adopters for influx of working dogs

It's quite literally raining cats and dogs at the Susquehanna Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SQSPCA).

For several months, the shelter has been chipping away at a triple digit surrender waiting list for cats. Now shelter staff face a perfect storm in the making, having taken in 14 dogs unexpectedly on Sept. 8, with another 10 dogs that arrived on Sept. 11.

The dogs arriving are thanks to a partnership between the SQSPCA, Best Friends Animal Society and the Humane Society of Louisiana. The unexpected arrivals – from an Otsego County hoarding case – are mostly large breed working dogs.

SQSPCA Executive Director Stacie Haynes reflected on the events leading up to this situation.

"In response to the devastation caused by Hurricane Ida, the New York State Animal Protection Federation put out a call for help to New York shelters with empty kennels," Haynes said. "Louisiana's animal shelters and rescues, some of which still do not have working electricity or running water, are trying desperately to rebuild. We had 15 open kennels at the time, so we agreed to take 10 dogs."

Then, the unthinkable.

"This morning we responded to a situation of unintended neglect in which an Otsego County resident found themselves unable to maintain the necessary levels of care and medical attention for a growing number of dogs," Haynes explained. "These dogs are a mix of Great Pyrenees, Cane Corso and Newfound-

land of varying ages. Most have not been spayed or neutered. They are currently being treated for worms and fleas, many are emaciated and a couple have injuries. Although they have not been properly socialized, they are not aggressive to the best of our knowledge."

Given that these are large breed working dogs, Haynes said it will be difficult to ask other local shelters to help, as many are already struggling with space issues or capacity for care of such big, energetic breeds.

"If you have ever thought about adopting or even fostering a working dog, now is the time," Haynes emphasized. "These dogs do not do well in a shelter environment – they need

space and a job to do. Our adoption counselors are standing by at 607.547.8111."

Farms, country living and fencedin yards would be ideal for these dogs. They cannot live in apartments, Haynes said.

Farther from home, thousands are in crisis in the aftermath of Hurricane Ida, including many animal shelters and rescue facilities. Thanks to the Humane Society of Louisiana, the Best Friends nationwide network and a web-based application called Trello, the SQSPCA was able to select dogs to be transported north for rehoming.

"These are not hurricane dogs," Haynes clarified. "These are dogs from shelters or rescues affected by the hurricane. As these dogs are moved out of Louisiana to places like the SQSPCA, space is freed up for animals displaced by the hurri-

cane, whether as owner surrenders or for temporary boarding."

Some of the dogs which have arrived in Cooperstown – Simone, Big Emma and Igor – are from facilities in New Orleans that still don't have power or water, Haynes said.

In spite of everything, Haynes remains both excited and optimistic.

"We're counting on local media, social media and word of mouth to get these big working dogs out of our shelter and on to greener pastures, and to get the southern dogs into good homes as well. There seems to be a shortage of adoptable dogs in Otsego County – our length of stay for dogs is currently just 19 days, so we don't think we will have any problem rehoming any of them," she said

Haynes added that the transfer of ownership of the working dogs to the shelter is a nod to the effectiveness and importance of the SQSP-CA's "Here to Help Hotline" first implemented earlier this year.

"A local dog control officer, recognizing a situation that was not cruelty but rather someone desperately in need of help, reached out to us and staff mobilized immediately. It's important that our donors understand the many public assistance programs that would simply not be possible without their continued support," Haynes said.



Sunflowers are a fantastic, long-lived flower to celebrate the end of summer. Now is a great time to observe sunflower plantings in your community to enjoy their beauty and think about how you might like to grow them next season.

others are made up of rich browns, oranges, reds. pale yellows and everything in between.

Certain varieties grow with one large head on a single stem, and others grow multi-branched with multiple flowers that fan out from the center. Some grow a few feet tall, while others tower above fences. There are so many options

Sunflowers (Helianthus annus) are multi-season plants with an important presence throughout the year. In late autumn, their colors bring a brightness to the receding greens of the summer garden.

If the stalks are left up through the winter, sunflower heads dry and provide seeds for birds and squirrels (and potentially entertainment for you). Their strong structure also is infinitely interesting to look at against the stark whites and grays of the winter landscape.

When browsing seed catalogues this winter to order seeds for next year's garden, consider many varieties of sunflowers that can be grown in home gardens in northern climates.

Sunflowers are easy and inexpensive to grow. They can be started easily from seed and come in many varieties and colors. Some are bright yellow with brown centers, while

within your landscape. Sunflowers can be started indoors in late spring. However, if you decide to

start them inside, be careful. Sunflowers produce taproots and don't appreciate their roots being disturbed. Using pots made of biodegradable material can help when transferring plants from indoors to outdoors.

For direct seeding in the garden, wait until after the last frost in spring to plant. Choose an area that gets full sun with well-drained soil. Personal experience has shown me that woodchucks and deer enjoy eating young sunflower plants, so keep this in mind if you struggle with keeping these animals away each year.

I have tried fencing off whole beds or garden spaces and using wire baskets to protect individual plants when they are young. This has produced varied results, but in my
