

SQSPCA announces formation of Helping Paws Society

in celebratory mode after the move to a state-of-the-art animal shelter in mid-July, the Susquehanna Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SQSPCA) is already looking to the fu-

In order to meet the growing need for SQSPCA

services and still cover ever-increasing recurring costs, SQSPCA officials have announced the launch of a new Annual Fund donation tier, the Helping Paws Society, aimed at securing donors at the \$1,000+ level.

"A generous benefactor has thrown down the gauntlet, so to speak," said SQSPCA Executive Director Stacie Haynes. "To help us build the Helping Paws Society, which will in turn increase operational support, this donor has offered to match donations of \$1,000 or more dollar for dollar, up to \$100,000."

Coming off an extremely successful capital campaign that raised more than \$5 million in just under three years, the SQSPCA is currently adjusting to life in both new shelter and thrift store facilities just 1.2 miles north of the former location on State Route 28 between Cooperstown and Oneonta.

"Our new shelter is comparable to a state-ofthe-art healthcare facility, with sophisticated and complex plumbing, electrical and HVAC systems designed specifically for our needs," Haynes explained.

These upgrades are not without continued associated costs, though, Haynes said.

"The reality is that the new building requires additional expense and investment to maintain," she continued, "and the shelter revenue streams don't come close to covering recurring operational costs, even prior to the

"The combined total of

adoption fees, thrift store sales and municipal contract income is far lower than our expenses, especially now, in light of the fact that the maintenance requirements of the new building are more complicated and more expensive," Haynes explained.

The SQSPCA is dependent upon philanthropy to bridge that gap.

"We are converting from capital campaign to Annual Fund mode not only to meet these new expenses but also to cover recurring costs that continue to escalate, such as insurance and wages," Haynes said.

The new facilities will further improve the daily lives of sheltered dogs and cats by better conforming to guidelines established by the Association of Shelter Veterinarians. Upgraded features include two entrances separating incoming animals from visitors and animals leaving for their new homes, a sterile surgery suite with safe recovery area, a fresh air

ventilation system to benefit visitors as well as animals under shelter care and convenient parking.

"A vibrant Helping Paws Society will allow us to continue these positive trends in the organization's efficacy as well as in the public services we are able to provide, and will ensure that we can maximize all the possibilities of the new campus," Haynes said.

Donor recognition of Helping Paws Society members will include a plaque in the shelter building and a reception later this year. The new shelter is located at 5082-5088 State Route 28, Cooperstown.

(singing, dance, drawing, etc).





Autumn rhubarb care

Are you one of those people who loves rhubarb pie, cake, sauce and even preserving rhubarb for off-season use?

Although not everyone enjoys eating rhubarb, few dispute its majestic beauty. Whether grown for aesthetics or food, this hardy perennial can be a long-lived addition to the gardening landscape.

Every five to 10 years you need to divide your rhubarb plants to prevent the roots from becoming too dense. Signs of this are smaller, more plentiful stalks and failure to produce stalks at the center of the plant.

While most gardening experts recommend dividing the roots in spring, it can be done successfully in autumn, if timed carefully.

Dividing and planting needs to be done early enough for the roots to become established but late enough that the newly transplanted root does not push up leaves instead of going dormant. Think mid to late September.

If you decide to wait until spring to plant rhubarb, you can prepare your bed now and be prepared for early spring planting. Rhubarb needs good drainage, plenty of water and fertilizer or compost.

To prepare the bed, you will need to dig out a three- to four-foot-wide

by two-foot-deep area for each plant. If your soil has poor drainage, consider creating a raised bed. An undersized bed may discourage optimal root growth and hold water leading to root rot.

Work three to four inches of compost or composted manure into the soil. If not planting until spring, cover the bed with an inch of straw mulch, and add an additional two inches after the ground freezes.

For autumn division, dig up your existing plant and divide at the natural weak points between buds with at least one or two buds per division. Plant your division in the

new location one to two inches deep with the bud on top.

Cover with soil and press down to eliminate air pockets. Be careful not

If you're not dividing your rhubarb plants this autumn, you can remove the stalks and leaves after the first killing frost. While fine for the compost heap, do not eat the stalks at this time. The oxalic acid, a powerful toxin in rhubarb leaves, moves into the stalks when the leaves are damaged.

Remove grass and weeds as they crowd the plants and can harbor insects that damage rhubarb. You can add a little compost or composted manure once the plant


is fully dormant. Adding too much in fall can delay dormancy needed for winter hardiness.

After the ground freezes, add about three inches of mulch to your existing rhubarb plants or new transplants. Waiting for the freeze helps the plant become fully dormant and discourages rodents from establishing routes under the mulch and snacking on your plants' roots over winter.

As winter waxes long, look for new rhubarb recipes to try so you will be ready for spring with a shovel in one hand and a spoon in the other!

- How often do you feel isolated from others?
- How often do you feel that you lack companionship?
- How often do you feel left out?

If you, a family member or a friend answered "some of the time" or "often" to any of the ques-

tions above, it may be time to seek engagement opportunities in your community.

Fortunately, the Herkimer County Office for the Aging can assist in offering ways to stay connected to others. In addition to this, the office also offers Animatronic Pets as a means of eliminating the effects of Social Isolation and loneliness. The basics of hunting seasons

Hunting has been around a long time. According to Britannica, hunting as many know it today began in ancient Greece. Various game were hunted to provide food, fuel and materials to make clothing and blankets. In the Middle Ages, hunting was the privilege of nobility and linked to land ownership. Hunting is now strictly regulated in many countries and is typically used as a

way to control wildlife populations that would otherwise overrun certain areas.

Hunting limits and clearly defined hunting seasons are often spelled out in detail in local hunting laws. Wildlife commissions across states set up strict time periods that govern which game can be hunted. Legislation also dictates size limits and the amount of game that can be killed. The North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission breaks down hunting seasons into big game, waterfowl, small game, and webless migratory game birds. Seasons vary depending on where hunters live.

The hunting education resource Hunter-Ed says hunting seasons are determined by the type of animal, the environment and animal characteristics like

mating season. Wildlife biologists in various regions study animal populations and make recommendations on hunting seasons. "Open season" is when a species may be legally hunted, and tends to coincide with when the population of that species is at its highest, without interfering with breeding times.


Many hunters eagerly await "opening day" so they can start their hunting right away. The season is "closed" when hunters are no longer allowed to go after that game. Food shortages, extreme temperatures and low population numbers may affect season duration. Archery seasons tend to begin before firearm seasons in many states. Hunting outside of seasons is known as poaching and is punishable by law.


Turkey is typically hunted in spring or autumn. Migratory waterfowl hunting tends to open in late September and early October. The seasons to hunt deer, and their close cousins like caribou, moose and reindeer, open in late September and early October, continuing into November for firearms hunting.

Hunters will be required to obtain a hunting license. At the time of licensure, hunters also may be given tags for their game animals. A tag is a physical permit the hunter carries with them that must be attached to an animal immediately after it is felled. Hunters are reigned in by the number of tags they have, which will coordinate with game limits. The tag will need to be completed with the date and time of harvest and the location.





DMV encourages NY pro football fans to show pride in their team with NFL custom license plate

The New York State Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) encouraged professional football fans in New York to show their pride in the state's NFL teams by ordering their favorite team's license plate. Custom license plates representing the Buffalo Bills, New York Giants and New York Jets are available to order on DMV's website.

"The NFL season kicked off this past week, so this is a perfect time for fans to show their passion for their favorite team by ordering plates," said DMV Commissioner Mark J.F. Schroeder. "With an NFL custom plate, fans can display their pride in and appreciation for their team not just during football season, but all year long."

The initial charge for these custom plates is \$60; thereafter, an annual renewal fee of \$31.25 will be charged in addition to the regular renewal fee. NFL team plates can be personalized for an additional fee. Motorists are billed for the plates every two years when they renew their registrations. New York's NFL team plates are available for both passenger and commercial vehicles.

To qualify to purchase an NFL plate, a motorist must have:

- A valid NYS registration that does not expire within 60 days
- An up-to-date name and address on file with DMV
- · A credit or debit card that DMV accepts
- A valid email address for confirmation purposes

The quickest and easiest way to order NFL plates is online at dmv. ny.gov. Customers can also order custom plates by mail, at their local DMV office or by calling the DMV Custom Plate Unit at 518.402.4838.

In addition to NFL plates, DMV offers more than 200 different designs for custom plates representing other professional sports, military and veterans, regions of New York and more. Increased services come at a cost

Since 2015 – following restructuring, intensive work with Shelter Management Consultant Barbara Carr, and organizational rebranding - the Susquehanna Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SQSP-CA) has substantially increased its footprint throughout Otsego County and the surrounding region.

In the last year and a half alone, despite the global pandemic, the SQSPCA has:

- Started and maintains a pet pantry, and eliminated surrender fees, to help individuals and families facing financial difficulties
- Expanded its emergency boarding program for animals belonging to those in crisis
- Provides emergency medical care for animals outside the shelter walls

- Partnering with Otsego County Department of Health to organize and execute free rabies vaccination
- Formed the "PAWS (Puppy Mill Awareness with Shelters) Before You Pay" initiative in collaboration with the Humane Society of the United States, the New York State Animal Protection Federation, the ASPCA, and local shelters
- Absorbed and is continuing the Greater Oneonta Fund for Animal Responsibility (GOFAR) feline low cost spay-neuter clinic

Formed the Here to Help Hotline and Farm Friends Network to assist with an ever-increasing number of cruelty and hoarding cases and other situations involving farm animals such as pigs, horses, sheep, and

"Our intake and adoption statistics are also incredibly improved," SQSPCA Executive Director Stacie Haynes said. "Animal intake has increased by 143 percent over the past five years. Total animals cared for is up 129 percent, and adoptions have increased by a whopping 226 percent."

Length of stay for shelter animals has decreased by 55 percent at the SQSPCA, dropping from an average of 67.6 days in 2015 to 30.4 days in 2020.

In operation since 1917, the Susquehanna SPCA is a 501c3 nonprofit organization committed to caring for homeless, surrendered, and seized companion animals and finding them loving, forever homes. For more information or to donate, visit sqspca.org.

Did you know?

Hunters and non-hunters alike are familiar with bright orange coats, hats, vests and other gear that is worn during hunting season. Even though it seems counterintuitive to wear "blaze orange" in the fields or woods for fear that animals may spot you, hunters need not worry much. Deer typically cannot recognize blaze orange attire designed to make hunters visible to other people. According to researchers at the University of Georgia, a combination of factors make deer less likely to be startled by blaze orange. Deer have less binocular overlap than humans. Binocular overlap (the area

that both eyes view at the same time) allows focus on a single point and enables depth perception. Deer must shift their heads much more than humans to gain a good three-dimensional perspective of an object. Deer also have fewer cones in their retinas compared to humans. Cones are photoreceptors

that enable color vision and distinguish fine details. Furthermore, deer cannot readily perceive longer wavelengths of color, so oranges and reds appear more like brown or gray to them. However, deer can see blue colors more easily, so hunters may want to avoid blue jeans paired with their orange gear.


