

Webinar explores resilient home landscapes Oct. 16

Noted landscape consultant Dan Jaffe Wilder will present a virtual four-hour workshop Oct. 16 on building resilient home landscapes with native plants. The program is open to all interested gardeners and homeowners. The webinar will be offered via Zoom from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. Although free to attend, donations will be accepted to support garden education programming offered by University of Vermont (UVM) Extension Master Gardener chapters throughout Vermont. Wilder will walk participants through the process of establishing a resilient landscape from assessment of site and plant species and invasive species issues to ecological landscape techniques and longterm maintenance. He will draw from examples from his work at the Norcross Wildlife Sanctuary in Monson, MA; Garden in the Woods, a botanical garden in Framingham, MA; and his home landscape.

Wilder is the author and photographer of Native Plants for New England Gardens. He is an expert in native plant ecology, propagation, wildlife habitat construction and native edible landscapes and has consulted with botanical gardens, nurseries and wildlife refuges.



Utica Zoo prepares for decommission of sea lion exhibit Welcomes new female zebra from Disney. Visitors to see future expansion and updates in the coming year.



Don't Like it Either!" renovation campaign for the White-handed Gibbon pair, the Utica Zoo recognized that the California Sea Lion exhibit did not provide an ideal habitat for Porter and Munchkin. Porter, a male, weighs approximately 685 pounds while the smaller female Munchkin weighs 240 pounds. The pool built to 1986 standards at approximately 650 square feet is not optimal for the two animals to freely exercise nor for the expression of as many natural behaviors as a more complex environment will.

Exhibit concerns were confirmed during the Zoo's 2018 accreditation process by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA). The exhibit was not in line with modern zoological practices and did not meet AZA standards. It would have to be modified or decommissioned

Much like the 2015 "We if the Zoo was to maintain its accreditation. The cost to renovate and maintain the exhibit (\$8-10 million in 2018) was not feasible for the Zoo, and the well-being of the sea lions remained paramount. The difficult decision and steps to work within the network of AZA institutions to find Porter and Munchkin new homes began.

> The typically long search and transfer process was extended due to the COVID-19 pandemic, though recently the plan to move Porter to his new home developed quickly. Porter was moved to the Turtle Back Zoo in New Jersey on Sept. 27. Munchkin will remain at the Zoo until her transfer plans are finalized, which may be a few more weeks. While Porter and Munchkin were born in the wild, they were both assessed as non-releasable prior to their Utica arrival due to their comfort level with humans on the West Coast.

"We've been aware for quite some time that our community shares this bittersweet acknowledgment; we often hear our visitors say we LOVE the California sea lions, but we don't like their exhibit," shares

Utica Zoo Executive Director Andria Heath. "During the AZA inspection of 2018, it was pointed out that Porter can only swim 2.5 lengths of his body in the pool; that's when we came to terms that we needed to make this difficult decision."

According to Utica Zoo Director of Animal Care, Education, and Conservation Jay Pratte, one of the highest standards of animal care is to ensure that the animals are experiencing a positive welfare state.

"One of the key factors in this is maintaining habitats that are spacious and complex enough to allow the animals to express a wide range of species-typical behaviors," explains Pratte. "Sadly, our pool does not meet these requirements, but the Utica Zoo has some exciting developments to reflect this industry best practice."

"Directing the zoo's future can be complex; it involves not only the on-going welfare of living animals and funding the ever growing costs of caring and improving habitats but also the responsibility and opportunity to tell the story and conservation





DMV reminds New Yorkers to beware of flood damage before buying used vehicles

In the wake of Hurricane Ida, the New York State DMV warned consumers to take precautions against unintentionally purchasing vehicles damaged by flooding in the weeks and months ahead.

The DMV's website includes a link to the National Insurance Crime Bureau database. People looking to buy a used car can enter the Vehicle Identification Number and learn if the vehicle was ever flooded or stolen.

"A car is one of the biggest purchases consumers make, so DMV wants to make sure that you are getting what you paid for," said DMV Commissioner Mark J.F. Schroeder. "A car that has been through a flood can look fine from the outside but have substantial damage so we want to protect consumers by making it easy for them to check if a vehicle has been damaged by flooding."

Water from flooding can damage the engine or transmission, corrode wiring or harm the airbag or the vehicle's computers.

Some sellers will try to hide the damage by taking the vehicle from a flooded area and getting a new title in a different state before trying to sell it. Consumers should be aware when purchasing used vehicles with titles issued in mid-September this year or during other hurricane periods that they could be flood vehicles even if the title is not from the affected state.

DMV checks the history of every vehicle in NYS and will alert consumers if they have purchased a vehicle with a history of flood damage.

The DMV website includes information on the National Insurance Crime Bureau's VINCheck, a free service to help consumers determine if a vehicle has been reported as salvaged or stolen. When planning to purchase a used vehicle, consumers can search up to

five VINs per day. The NICB also offers a free brochure with tips on how to avoid post-disaster fraud, which is available at tinyurl.com/wpz6bsb6

DMV's website also offers tips on buying vehicles, including the protections available when purchasing a used vehicle through a private sale or from an auto dealer.

A person or dealer who sells a rebuilt salvage vehicle must provide the new owner a disclosure statement regardless of the vehicle's age. The disclosure statement is located on the back of NYS title certificates.

A seller who fails to disclose the salvage history of a vehicle can pay a maximum fine of \$2,000 and any additional penalties described in the NYS Penal Law. If a salvage vehicle is rebuilt for use on roadways, the DMV must examine it before issuing a new title certificate or registration. The required examination is part of the NYS Auto Theft Prevention Program. The program includes vehicles that were issued a NYS Salvage Certificate and rebuilt salvage vehicles from most other states.

A NYS Title Certificate issued after the date of May 18, 1999 for a rebuilt salvage vehicle displays the brand "REBUILT SALVAGE." Some title certificates issued before May 19, 1999 also show this brand.

It's time to plant the garlic

I love growing garlic. In the Northeast, it is best planted in autumn because of its need for a dormant period of two months below 40 degrees. Just as the reality of summer's end sets in, planting the garlic is like planting the promise of spring. Seeing the little shoots emerge just be-

hind the receding snow are well worth the small effort required.

Plant your garlic in late September to mid-October. This allows it to put down some roots but not develop significant tops before the ground freezes.

Avoid planting garlic from the grocery store. It may have been treated to prevent growth. Store purchased garlic also may be a variety adapted to warmer climates with longer growing seasons.

Purchase garlic from growers in your area or from catalogues that are focused on the Northeast. Look into the numerous varieties available and consider trying several. Whatever your source, plant the largest cloves from the biggest bulbs available to you and save any small cloves for cooking.

Because garlic retains the genetics of the mother clove, you can plant garlic grown in your own garden and get excellent results. I save some of my best bulbs for planting.

There are two basic types: hardneck and softneck. Hardneck garlic produces five to eight large cloves. It also produces scapes, which are flower stalks prized by many as a garlicky vegetable.

Left on the plants, they

produce tiny seeds that can be planted but take several years to develop into normal-sized bulbs. Softneck garlic has 12 or more smaller cloves and no scapes.

Before planting garlic, incorporate compost or well-rotted manure to provide nutrition and improve soil quality.

Garlic does not like competition from weeds or getting too dry. In my sandy soil that tends toward dryness, mulching retains soil moisture and keeps my garlic nearly weed-free. I plant garlic in 4-footsquare beds divided into 16 1-foot squares. In each square, I plant nine cloves and mulch thoroughly.

Plan spacing with your preference for cultivating in mind. My square foot method does not easily yield to a hoe. Some gardeners plant cloves four inches apart in rows about eight inches apart for cultivating ease.

Consider whether your soil holds a lot of moisture. If so, don't count on mulch to keep down weeds and perhaps even implement raised beds to allow for proper drainage. Too much moisture can cause garlic to rot.


Plant unpeeled garlic cloves three inches deep with the point up, root down. Cover. Press soil gently, but firmly. Heavy mulching can help prevent winter kill and cloves being pushed up and out by frost but may need to removed in spring if the soil stays very wet.

Clean your tools, finish your fall chores and hunker down for winter knowing your garlic will appear with the daffodils to herald the start of another gardening season.

Simple safety protocols that can protect hunters

Hunting is big business in North America. In 2017, more than 15 million people hunted in the U.S. The National Shooting Sports Foundation reports that sportsmen and women contribute nearly \$9.4 million to the economy every day.

Millions of hunters take to forests and fields every year. Seasoned hunters and novices alike can benefit from revisiting some safety procedures before their first outing this season.

Weather

Weather should be a consideration whenever people spend a significant amount of time outdoors. Hunters typically leave before dawn and arrive home after dusk. Hypothermia is a very real risk for hunters who may be out in snow or wet conditions. It's possible to get hypothermia by overdressing as well. Sweating and then being exposed to dropping temperatures puts people at risk for hypothermia. Hunters should dress in layers with moisture-wicking materials and a water-repellant outer layer. In addition, check the weather forecast before heading out as a last second precautionary measure.

Firearm Safety

Firearm safety is a critical component of safe hunting. Hunters use rifles, shotguns and other firearms. Each gun is different, so hunters need to familiarize

themselves with new firearms before using them. The following are some additional firearm safety tips, courtesy of State Farm Insurance and Southern Land Exchange.

- Always treat a firearm as if it is loaded.
- Keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.
- Only point at what you plan to shoot.

Clearly identify your target and what is beyond it.
Fire within the zone-of-fire, which is the 45° area

directly in front of each hunter.

• Firearm chambers should be emptied when guns are not in use.

- Use appropriate ammunition.
- Never modify or alter the gun.

• Never cross a fence, jump a ditch or climb a tree with a loaded gun.

• Never rely on a gun's safety.

Additional Safety Tips

Hunters should always let others know where they will be when leaving in the morning. If something should happen, people back home can alert authorities if something goes awry. Always check equipment and maintain it properly. Equipment should include gear colored in hunter's orange. That extends to dogs if they are accompanying hunters on a trip. This makes hunters more visible to other hunters. Also carry a first aid kit, a charged mobile phone or a satellite phone to maintain contact with others in case of emergencies.

These are just some of the safety protocols that should be followed when hunting. Non-hunters should exercise caution during hunting seasons, particularly when entering forests and areas that hunters frequent.

The IRS has been sending "math error" notices to taxpayers. The notices list changes the IRS has made to the amount the taxpayers owe in tax or how much they will receive as a refund. If you receive

Smullen demands rescinding healthcare worker vaccination mandate

Assemblyman Robert Smullen (R, C, I, SAM-Meco) was joined by his Assembly Republican colleagues requesting the State Department of Health and Gov. Kathy Hochul reverse the mandate that requires healthcare workers to get vaccinated. With about one-fourth of total healthcare workers unvaccinated and learning that many concerned healthcare workers will be terminated due to forced vaccinations, Smullen hopes to prevent another rural healthcare crisis by keeping our frontline workers working and not infringing on their constitutional rights.

"The issue of vaccination is one of personal choice. It doesn't matter if you're a construction worker or an electrician or a politician or a healthcare worker," Smullen said. "With my colleagues and I predicting that onefourth of our total healthcare workforce may be terminated if mandated to receive vaccinations. we must strongly reconsider whether this is the best option for the state as a whole.

"Part of the pandemic crisis of 2020 was that our hospitals and healthcare systems were overwhelmed. I can't imagine how bad it would be if we had even fewer healthcare workers to continue to take care of people who are contracting COVID-19 or its variants," Smullen concluded.

Smullen represents the 118th Assembly District, which includes Hamilton and Fulton counties as well as parts of Herkimer, Oneida and St. Lawrence counties. this type of notice, it does not necessarily mean there was a math or computational error on your return. There are time limits to act if you think the notice is incorrect.

So far this year, the IRS has sent about 11 million math error notices. This is many times more than in past years. The IRS sent most of

these notices to taxpayers who filed a return seeking the Recovery Rebate Credit. Taxpayers claimed this credit on their tax return if they did not receive the full amount of the COVID-19 economic stimulus payments they believed they were entitled to. The IRS used these notices to advise taxpayers that it believed they were wrong and that all or part of their Recovery Rebate Credit was not allowed.

If you receive a math error notice and do not agree with it, you have 60 days from the date on the notice to contact the IRS and let them know you disagree. The phone number to contact the IRS is provided in the notice. There are still limited things you can do even if you miss the deadline.

Some math error notices the IRS sent taxpayers in early 2021 did not have any information about the 60-day deadline. The IRS is therefore correcting that problem by issuing new math error notices that give the taxpayer a new 60-day period to object. Be aware that the notices may not say "math error" on them.

If you have questions about this or other income tax issues, the Legal Aid Society of Northeastern New York's Low-Income Taxpayer Clinic (LITC) may be able to help. The clinic's services are free of charge. You can call the LASNNY Legal Line at 833.628.0087 and ask for our LITC. The Clinic does not generally provide tax preparation services.

are the most common injuries among infants and toddlers as they develop a sense of curiosity and gain mobility. Head and mouth/tooth injuries are some additional injuries curious kids may suffer during this period in their lives. This childproofing checklist can help reduce the risk of injury.

 Follow U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission crib safety regulations, which include fixed sides, a firm mattress and slats that are no more than 2 3/8 inches apart.

• Install UL-listed carbon monoxide detectors and smoke detectors on every story of the house and check batteries in detectors frequently.

• Install a temperature guard on the water heater and never set it above 120° F.

• Cover all sharp furniture edges and corners with safety padding or specialty bumpers.

• Block all open outlets with outlet covers or safety plugs.

• Place lockable covers on the garbage.

 Install stove knob covers.

• Use latches on any drawers, toilets, doors or cabinets within the child's reach.

• Anchor heavy furniture, such as televisions, bookshelves and dressers, to the walls.

• Install safety guards on windows.

• Pull the crib away from other furniture.

• Use cordless window blinds.

• Place gates at the top and bottom of stairs and use them to prevent access to rooms that are off limits.

• Store cleaning supplies, tools and breakable items out of reach or in a locked cabinet.

• When the child reaches 35 inches in height or can climb out of the crib, it's time to transition to a toddler bed.

• Choose toy chests or other furniture with spring-loaded hinges.

• Do not hang heavy wall art or shelving over cribs.

• Cover radiators, hot pipes, etc., with protective materials.

• Remove flaking paint and be sure to have paint tested for lead.

• Inspect the home for protruding nails, bolts or other hardware that can cause injury.
