

Flannel: Fabric for the country soul

It took just one cold morning on the farm to ask my wife "Where are my flannel shirts hiding?" As I slid on my old, cotton friend, I knew it was fall. The glorious season of pumpkins, leaf peeping, no mosquitoes and the many hues of flannel. For a country boy, flannel is just necessary, like my Carhartts.

Essayist Deborah Knight remarked, "Flannel is an integral part of our national heritage. It's literally the fabric that binds us together." In my opinion, flannel is a fabric for the country soul.

The origin of flannel can be traced back to Wales as early as the 16th century. Flannel was originally made from carded wool or worsted varn. At one time Welsh, Yorkshire, Lancashire and Irish flannels differed slightly in character due largely to the grade of raw wool used in the several localities.

Originally it was made of fine, short staple wool, but by the 20th century, mixtures containing either cotton, silk or synthetic fiber became common. Nowadays, the softest, coziest flannel is 100% cotton. (For you old rockers, the use of flannel plaid shirts peaked in the '90s, when grunge bands like Nirvana and Pearl Jam used them as their trademark fashion statement.)

GQ Magazine remarked, "Weighty flannel shirts have been adopted and reinterpreted by just about every demographic and subculture imaginable: frontier loggers, WWII sailors, greasers, surfers, punks, skaters, West Coast rappers, grunge kids, rock climbers, contractors, mustachioed Williamsburg hipsters, farmers, yoga moms, tech bros and present-day NBA style kings. fabric itself: Resilient enough to take a beating on a jobsite, comfortable enough to swaddle up in on weekends, respectable enough to wear on a date or out to brunch with your folks or on a Zoom call with your

After the first flannel shirt of the season has been christened with leaf fragments and cat hair (because they love to snuggle in it), it seems the flood of this softer-than-your-duvet-cover fabric seeps into our daily lives as the temperature ticks downward. Flannel never leaves the practical fashion conversation - or our laundry cycle - between October and March. The sheets and pillowcases are transformed to flannel. The polos of summer are changed out in favor of colorful, brawny hues. Pajamas, bathrobes, long underwear and scarves are all put in play to fight Old Man Winter. Even the discarded flannel is used for cleaning, wrapping a newborn animal or mopping up grease in the shop.

When I go to buy flannel shirts, quality and origin are all over the board. I prefer companies like Woolrich, Duluth Trading and LL Bean when my budget allows. Trouble is, the bargain rack pseudo-flannel for \$12 also calls my name. It doesn't seem to matter which product I'm drawn to or eventually choose; I always find ways to rip, stain or shrink the darn things.

As a flannel-ista, I prefer vibrant colors, plaids and patterns. They always match with jeans and any kind of Carhartt clothing accessory. I've worn a flannel kilt in running the Highland Mudfest and what man about the town wouldn't dabble in a flannel man-scarf. The fabric's versatility is unmatched. I have to admit, however, that my favorite use is when my wife wears my soft shirt and cuddles with me on the couch. So now the farmer has made the proclamation: Flannel is also an extension of love.



Fall's a good time for a flower-bed makeover

Nobody ever said gardening offers instant gratification. With this limitation in mind, I dug and made over one of my flower beds last weekend.

For the plants, fall is a fine time for a flower-bed makeover. Cooler temperatures slow water loss from leaves, so plants can better tolerate being ripped out of the ground and roughed up before having their roots nestled back into dirt. Leaves still on these plants stimulate new root growth, helping plants re-establish in their new homes.

Try subjecting most plants to this brutal treatment in summer and many would die.

Why A Makeover Might Be Needed

The major impetus for my flower-bed makeover was some Siberian irises that had run amok, threatening to take over the entire bed. Perhaps you can't have too many iris flowers, but after the flowers fade, you surely can have too many iris leaves. Mine were taking up space in which other, later flowering plants could be strutting their stuff.

Much the same could be said for the daffodils in that bed. These bulbs evidently found the bed much to their liking, and bore many offspring who, in turn, bore many of their own offspring, and so on over the years. They presented a glorious and welcome sea of yellow each spring, but the yellowing leaves that followed were a sorry sight for too long. At least the iris leaves look reasonably prim the whole season.

Fall is also a good time for a flower-bed makeover because any deficiencies – lack of midsummer bloom, garish color combinations, too many irises and daffodils – are still fresh in mind.

My bed further suffered from becoming too much of a hodgepodge of various flowering plants. It had be-

come a home, although it was supposed to be only a temporary one, for many flowers that I had been given or purchased on impulse.

Make A Plan

Diving into this opportunity to redo the whole flower garden, I make a plan on paper. A good idea is to sketch not only the usual bird's-eye view, delineating groups of each kind of flower, but also to sketch from a human's-eye view - that is, the garden as you would see it from ground level, emphasizing the height, texture and form of each plant.

In this human's-eye view, I was able to rough out pleasant-looking undulations of spiky irises, delphiniums and gayfeathers, soft mounds of asters and spireas, and tall and pompom-topped coneflowers and black-eyed Susans. A backdrop of butterfly bush and the lacy leaves and flowers of baby's-breath should (I hope) knit everything together.

And then the actual work begins. To thin out clumping plants like irises, slide a garden fork beneath a clump and give the clump a slight lift. Then, pushing two forks or two shovels back to back down the center of the clump, pull the tops of the two forks or shovels apart to pull apart the clump. Replant parts of the clump and give away the rest to a fellow gardener for

And the daffodils? Just dig them up, separate the bulbs by hand, and replant the largest ones.

Readying the Bed For Winter & Beyond

Everybody's back in place now, and to ensure that roots start growing right away, I've given the bed a thorough soaking. Following that came a topdressing of a couple of inches of wood chips - except for the delphiniums, hungry plants that they are, which had compost tucked around their stems before the chips

Mulches seal moisture into the soil, and also keep soil temperatures from dropping as low or as fast as in unmulched ground. That gives roots more time to grow before temperatures turn frigid. Mulches also reduce the alternate freezing and thawing of the soil that during the winter can heave newly rooted plants up and out of the ground.

There is a downside to this autumn flower-bed makeover: The bed does look forlorn, for now. But a makeover isn't an annual affair, and everything will look perky in spring. Yes, I could have waited until spring for this makeover. But there are too many other things to attend to in the spring garden.





At a time when the average length of stay for SQSP-CA animals is at an historic low, 26.2 days versus 79.5 in 2016, Audrey is the shelter's longest resident at 185

"Thanks to Subaru, special needs animals like Audrey have their moment in the spotlight too and can find their perfect match," Haynes said.

Thanks to Cooperstown Rotarians and The Rotary Foundation, the Susquehanna Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SQSPCA) is one step closer to establishing its own animal dental service program.

In May, Rotary Club of Cooperstown officials submitted a Community Grant request on behalf of the

SQSPCA for the purchase of dental models, equipment, charts and other resource materials. On July 22, President Judy Steiner-Grin received confirmation that the grant had been approved.

"Cooperstown's Rotary Club is part of an international fellowship of people who believe in service above

self in each community and around the globe. This grant continues the local club's contribution of money and time," Steiner-Grin said. "This financial contribution is one of many local efforts. We are an active organization of people with heart, glad to help our community thrive."

the Susquehanna, pollinator garden projects which Rotarians hope to coordinate with the CCE's Garden Gateway along Route 80, and others.

Among the items purchased by the SQSPCA with these grant monies are:

- transparent canine and feline dental models that enable the veterinarian to better visualize the location of roots during dental procedures and allow technicians and assistants to learn dental anatomy more easily
- dental success kit including procedural productivity tools and client educational materials
- barrier sealant applicator gun and cartridge to reduce plaque and tartar formation
 - canine and feline dental charts
- CLS solution to reduce bur cutting time and mask mouth odors
- Prophy paste to remove dental plaque and external stains, and to further reduce retention of plaque

"This grant comes at an ideal time," said SQSPCA Executive Director Stacie Haynes. "Our new medical suite includes a wet treatment table, and thanks to the tremendously successful SHELTER US Campaign, we were also able to purchase state-of-the-art dental equipment.

"These materials are the next step in the process as we get ready to begin performing dental treatments on our animals in-house," Haynes said.

Previously, the SQSPCA lacked the necessary equipment and was outsourcing most of the dental work. Dr. Julie Huntsman, the shelter's lead veterinarian, has extensive experience in dog and cat dental procedures and is excited to start using the new machines.

"Unfortunately, we have never had a dental unit onsite and, as a result, we have had to send our dogs and cats out for any necessary dental work. These procedures come at a high cost. In the first quarter of 2021 alone we spent more than \$3,500 on feline dental procedures, an average of almost \$1,200 per month for routine cleanings, surgical extractions and radiographs," explained Haynes.

"These animals were surrendered to us with extreme dental issues that prevented them from eating properly, often causing severe discomfort and/or pain, and we could not rehome them without properly addressing their serious dental issues," she added.

Thanks to the capital campaign, and with the assistance of the Rotary Club of Cooperstown, the SQSP-CA can now treat most dental problems in-house at roughly half the cost and simultaneously decrease the length of stay for animals treated at the shelter versus those treated off-site.

According to Haynes, the Cooperstown Rotarians have been a tremendous help to the SQSPCA before, during and after the move to the new facility.

"When the SQSPCA needed help to move from the former building to the new campus, the Rotary Club of Cooperstown was there to help with hands, hand trucks and a willing spirit," Steiner Grin added.

"Rotarians will assist us as trained volunteers, both helping to prepare the service area and the dental instruments," said Haynes.

The Mohawk Valley Out of the Dark-

ness Community Walk is one of more than 550 Out of the Darkness Overnight, Community and Campus Walks being held nationwide this year. The walks are expected to unite more than 300,000 walkers and raise millions for suicide prevention efforts. Last year, these walks raised over \$21 million for suicide prevention.

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

4 tablespoon butter or margarine, cut up Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 375° F. In large bowl, stir granulated sugar and cornstarch until blended.

2. Peel, core and slice pears into 1/2-inch-thick slices. Add pears and lemon juice; toss to coat. Pour pear mixture into shallow 2 1/2-quart glass or ceramic baking dish; spread evenly.

Garden Journal: Your new favorite garden tool

As this year's gardening season draws to a close, unlike shovels, rakes and trowels, a garden journal is a tool you can start using now. Whether you're new to gardening or a seasoned veteran, a garden journal is a great way to organize all the information you've collected related to your garden. And autumn just might be the best time to begin.

A garden journal is an invaluable re-

source for planning over the long winter months. In it you can capture details that are fresh in mind today but may not be by the time spring arrives and questions pop up. For example, if you ordered bulk mulch this year, next year it would be helpful to know how much you ordered and if it was the correct amount needed.

As you put your garden to bed, take a good look around. Ideas that occur to you while working in the garden this year may fade by next spring. Jot them down. $\,$

Is there a bed you want to expand or plants that should be replaced in the spring? Make a note. Is there a shrub that would be happier after pruning? Check when the best time to prune that plant will be and mark it on the calendar.

Is there something you'd like to spend some time researching now that the physical demands of the garden are winding down? Add it to your winter to-do list.

Renovations or a new project might come to mind. Make some sketches. Write down what you envision. Take measurements if needed.

Don't forget to include your successes (and those not-successes). Celebrate what worked and make note of what needs to be changed. All this information will be useful as you plan for next season over the coming months. You also can use a garden journal to record pest and disease outbreaks, so you can be prepared next year before any damage starts.

A garden journal can be a beautiful bound book of blank pages to fill with anything related to your garden. Or it could be as simple as a monthly wall calendar to record garden-related dates, such as anticipated and actual first and last frost and freeze dates, or unusual weather, such as prolonged rain or drought and planting and harvesting dates

An easy way to start is with a threering binder you can customize to your own needs. It is the perfect place to help organize your previous soil test results and track the results of any soil amendments you have added. Including a monthly calendar makes tracking relevant dates easy.

Templates for specialized pages are available online. Or you can easily make your own using a word processing program. Pages to track online orders, seed-starting specifics, plants acquired and seasonal or monthly tasks, as well as challenges and how they are handled, are all good sections to include.

An assortment of blank pages (plain, ruled, dot grid, graph) are handy for taking notes or sketching design ideas. Plastic pockets in a variety of sizes can hold packing slips for mail-ordered plants, plant tags or seed packets, all for easy reference. A set of dividers makes locating and retrieving information easy.

Whether you choose to go for the basics or a customized catchall, paper or even an electronic version, the most important thing to remember about creating your garden journal is to make it all about what will work best for you.



12 tablespoons (1 1/2 sticks) unsalted butter (no substitutions), slightly softened and divided

1/2 cup sugar

1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour

Directions:

- 1. In heavy 2-quart saucepan, melt 6 tablespoons butter over low heat. Cook butter 8 to 12 minutes, stirring occasionally, until butter solids at bottom of pan are a rich brown color and butter has a nutty aroma. (Be careful not to overbrown butter; it will have a bitter flavor.) Pour browned butter into small bowl; refrigerate until almost firm, about 35 minutes.
 - 2. Preheat oven to 350° F. In large bowl, with mixer at medium speed, beat sug-

- 3. With hand, mix flour and salt into butter mixture just until crumbs form. (Do not overwork dough; shortbread will be tough.) Pat shortbread crumbs into ungreased 9-inch round tart pan with removable bottom or cake pan.
- 4. Bake shortbread 40 to 45 minutes, until browned around the edge. Let cool in pan on wire rack 10 minutes.
- 5. Remove shortbread from pan to cutting board. While still warm, cut shortbread into 16 wedges. Cool wedges completely on wire rack. Store cookies in tightly covered container. Serves 4.
