





Avoid these common Halloween costume dangers

Children and adults may spend weeks planning their Halloween costumes. Movie or TV characters, political figures, horror icons or everyday heroes are among the most popular costumes each year.

Much thought goes into Halloween costumes, and equal consideration should be given to ensuring the costume is as safe as it is fun. The following are some common costume hazards and how to avoid them.

Flammable materials: According to the ASTM D1230-17 - Standard Test Method for Flammability of Apparel Textiles, some combustible fabrics used in the design of clothing "are potentially dangerous to the wearer because of such factors as ease of ignition, flame spread time, amount of heat released, and design of the garment." Quite often Halloween costumes fall under these dangerous classifications because

they are not considered everyday apparel. Materials may not be sturdy and federal requirements for clothing to be flame-resistant may be skirted. Some costumes can ignite in seconds. Others also may cause "flaming drip," which describes the melting of plastic material that leads to it separating from the rest of the costume. Flaming drip can cause secondary fires or burns to the skin. Look for costumes that list flame-resistance, even if they may be more expensive.

Invisible

Invisible stretchy bodysuits that cover the entire frame and head. Newer incarnations that are all black without eyeholes can be dangerous to wear because they limit wearers' ability to see clearly and be seen by others.

• Dangerous makeup: Halloween makeup may not be created in adherence to the same standards as regular cosmetics. Check ingredients for hazards and warnings about where the makeup can be applied, as some products are not recommended for use around

the mouth or eyes. Apply a small amount first to see if an allergic reaction occurs.

• Capes and flowing components: Costumes that have long, flowing parts, such as a costume for Ringwraith, a character from the "Lord of the Rings" trilogy, or even caped crusaders can be fire hazards. Parts of such costumes also can

get caught underfoot in doors (such as rotating entrances to stores) and even the gears on bicycles. Strangulation or falls can occur in these instances.

• Faulty footwear: Costumes that require the use of high heels, platform shoes or any other design that may impede the ability to walk safely should be discouraged. Not only can they cause foot discomfort that reduces time spent on the trick-or-treating circuit, but these costumes also increase the risk of slips and falls and twisted or broken ankles.

• Contact lenses: Colored or patterned contact lenses are popular components of some costumes. However, decorative contact lenses should not be used without a proper fitting by an eye care professional who sells reputable decorative contact brands. Also, never share contact lenses and always wash hands before putting in contacts or removing them from the eyes.



Dining out with unvaccinated children

Dining out safely and confidently has long been a coveted component of getting back to normal life after the pandemic. In spring of 2021, mask mandates were lifted in most areas and it seemed like dining out. and other activities were returning. However, new variants of the virus and breakthrough infections have added to uncertainty and raised some familiar questions about the safety of dining out, particularly with unvaccinated children.

Though COVID-19 vaccines are now available to people ages 12 and older, children younger than 12 remain ineligible for vaccination. As a result, families may once again be wondering how to navigate going out.

Epidemiologists and other public health experts agree that there is no such thing as zero risk when dining out. Families must conduct their own risk assessment before venturing out with unvaccinated individuals. The following tips can help parents assess that risk so they can make the

Check virus infection rates. Study the CDC risk levels for areas where you intend to dine out. This information is free and can provide valuable insight as to the safety of a given area.

• Opt for outdoor seating. It's generally safer to dine outdoors than indoors. According to Saskia Popescu, an infectious disease epidemiologist and assistant professor at George Mason University, when dining indoors people are eating and drinking without masks on. They don't know other people's vaccine status and they are there for prolonged periods of time, during which virus particles could be circulating through the air. Virus particles are dispersed outdoors more easily than in a crowded interior space.

• Dine at off-peak hours. If you must eat indoors due to weather or other circumstances, it may be better to dine during offpeak hours when the restaurant is largely unoccupied. This reduces the risk of con-



proof of vaccination status. A growing number of restaurants are not only requiring their staff to be fully vaccinated, but also their customers. New York City mayor Bill DeBlasio announced in late August 2021 that visitors to gyms and indoor dining establishments would have to be vaccinated beginning in September - showing proof of at least one vaccine dose. While requiring vaccinations is a hot-button issue across the globe, diners concerned about unvaccinated individuals should contact local restaurants requiring vaccinations to determine if ineligible persons can still dine there. If so, those restaurants may be safer bets than establishments with no such requirements.


• Wear masks as much as possible. Have unvaccinated children wear masks while walking through the restaurant and other crowded areas. They can pull down masks to eat and then put them back on

when they finish eating.

Dining out with unvaccinated children requires parents to carefully assess risk and make decisions that keep their children as safe as possible.
