Call for art at Schoharie Crossing

Schoharie Crossing State Historic Site is issuing a call for photography and painting submissions to be included in the 2020 art exhibit, "Waters Reflections: Seeing the Past in the Present." Photographers residing in New York State who want to showcase their work in a competitive, juried exhibition are encouraged to read the show description and submit original work within the theme by the deadline of May 24.

To recognize the ongoing commemoration of NYS Barge Canal heritage and the historic Erie Canal, Schoharie Crossing is hosting this fourth annual exhibition of talented artists. This year the focus will be on photography and paintings. Jurors have accepted the task of reviewing the pieces, and prizes will be awarded to those honored by the jurors. One will recognize a photographic work, and one will recognize a painted work.

The Erie Canal historic site and NYS Park is a great place for recreation such as walking, cycling, kayaking, fishing, birdwatching, picnics and more, providing memories and experiences for generations. The site supplies great views of nature as well and the historic canal structures are juxtaposed among the natural world of plants and animals along the Schoharie Creek and Mohawk River. The trails along old towpaths of the canal allow for a journey back in time. Flora and fauna thrive within the tranquility of the waterways, wetlands and open spaces of Schoharie Crossing, lending great inspiration for any artist.

The Erie Canal's vital importance is highlighted by the classic arches of the

Schoharie Creek Aqueduct and the impressive lock chambers that still exist at locations throughout Schoharie Crossing. Views of the Mohawk and Schoharie valleys can also be taken in as you explore this landscape.

Schoharie Crossing encompasses over 200 acres and spans over three miles in length – from the western end of the site at the Aqueduct boat launch, across the Schoharie Creek and east to Yankee Hill Lock and the Putman Canal Store. The site contains portions of the original 1820s Erie Canal as well as two sets of double locks from the Enlarged Era Canal and is adjacent to the Erie Canal of today. Lock E12 at Tribes Hill on the river is situated close to the site and provides access to witnessing the newest century old canal of today.

All along the site there is ample opportunity to explore your artistic skills, from photography to painting to sketches. Discover more on the Schoharie Crossing Facebook page or on the Friends of Schoharie Crossing Instagram and Twitter.

Carbon monoxide: Know the hazards

Montgomery County Public Health wants everyone to be warm this winter, but we also want you to be safe while heating your homes during these cold months.

Every year, many people get sick or die due to carbon monoxide poisoning from alternate heating sources. Carbon monoxide (CO) is a poisonous gas that can kill you in minutes. It is invisible, tasteless, odorless and non-irritating. Carbon monoxide is produced from burning fuels such as wood, oil, natural gas, propane, gasoline and kerosene.

CO is known as the "silent killer." It can prevent the body from getting oxygen. Symptoms can be flu-like: nausea, headache, dizziness, shortness of breath, sleepiness and weakness. In large amounts, CO can cause loss of consciousness, brain damage or death.

Public Health suggests these safety tips to help prevent CO poisoning:

- Make sure fuel-burning appliances are properly installed, operated and serviced by qualified technicians according to the manufacturer's instructions and local building codes.
- Properly vent all fuel-burning appliances to the outside of the house and make sure the vents are not covered with snow, tarps or other items.
- Consider buying a vented space heater when replacing an unvented one.
- Never use a portable generator, gas or charcoal grill or portable fuel-burning

camping equipment inside a home, building or shed.

- Open the fireplace damper before lighting a fire and don't close it until the ashes are cool.
- Move your idling car or truck outside the garage to warm up.
- Never use gas appliances, such as stoves, ovens, or clothes dryers, to heat your home.

Working CO detector alarms provide you and your family with warning signals and critical time to escape your house in case of a CO incident. Place CO alarms in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home. Test all alarms every month to make sure they are working properly.

If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning:

- Get out of the building and into fresh
 air.
- Call the fire department from outside the building.
- Call 911 if you or someone else is experiencing symptoms, or take the ill person to the emergency room. Tell the physician you suspect CO poisoning.

Don't let having a CO detector give you all the security you need to be safe. Preventing the problem is better than relying on an alarm.

Forms and documents you may need for your 2020 tax return

The deadline to file tax returns in 2020 is Wednesday, April 15. The IRS began accepting individual tax returns on Jan. 27, and people can file their returns in various ways.

Before people can begin preparing their returns, they first must gather all of the necessary forms and documents. If any forms are not included. taxpayers may have to prepare tax amendments, which leads to more work and may delay the time it takes to receive a refund. Taxpavers who have questions about their returns can access 24-hour tax help via the IRS website at www.irs.gov.

According to eFile.com, an authorized IRS e-file provider, the following forms and documents may be needed in order for taxpayers to file their returns promptly and correctly.





Coronavirus sparks worldwide concern

The dawn of 2020 ushered in many newsworthy headlines, but few have turned the heads of the masses as sharply as the arrival of a novel coronavirus that was first identified in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China. In late 2019, Chinese authorities identified the new virus, which has resulted in scores of confirmed cases in China, and additional cases identified in a growing number of international locations.

Both the World Health Organization and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have closely monitored the coronavirus, which was named COVID-19 in mid-February 2020. The public is understandably concerned, but educating oneself about COVID-19 and coronaviruses in general can assuage some fears.

What is a coronavirus?

Medical News Today reports that coronaviruses typically affect the respiratory tracts of mammals. Coronaviruses are responsible for between 15 - 30% of common colds. They're also associated with pneumonia and severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS).

Coronaviruses were given their name based on the crown-like projections on their surfaces (in Latin, "corona" means "halo" or "crown"). Coronavirus antibodies do not last or work for very long, so a person who becomes ill can catch the same virus again a few months later. Also, antibodies for one strain of coronavirus may not be effective against other strains.

What is COVID-19?

In 2019, a new type of coronavirus not previously identified was discovered in China. Like other coronaviruses, this virus, COVID-19, can be spread easily from person to person, particularly through respiratory droplets acquired when someone with the virus coughs or sneezes. Most often people need to be within six feet of the infected person for contraction. The CDC says that COVID-19 also is believed to be spread from animals to people. It's currently unclear if a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has

the virus on it and then touching his or her own mouth, nose or eyes.

Those confirmed as having the virus reported illnesses ranging from mild symptoms like fever, cough and shortness of breath to more severe illness. Reactions to COVID-19 can differ from individual to individual. It's believed that symptoms of COVID-19 can appear in as few as two days or as long as 14 after exposure. Those who have been in China or around others who have visited from China and are experiencing cold or flu symptoms are advised call their physicians.

Prevention and treatment

The WHO says that if a person is healthy, they only need to wear a mask if they're taking care of another with a suspect-

ed COVID-19 infection. One also should wear a mask if one is coughing or sneezing.


Doctors advise that frequent handwashing, and in the absence of warm, soapy water, alcohol-based sanitizers that are at least 60% alcohol

can be effective in preventing transmission of COVID-19. Also avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands.

Currently, there is no specific antiviral treatment for the disease; people should receive supportive care for symptoms. However, research into antiviral drugs, such as those for HIV and influenza, are being tested for their potential efficacy against COVID-19, Research into developing a vaccine for this novel coronavirus also is ongoing.

Concerned individuals should speak with their healthcare providers for accurate, up-to-date information about COVID-19 as global health organizations continue to monitor conditions and treatments.

Offering some good news as winter (hopefully) wraps up, the National Dairy Herd Information Association (DHIA)'s Scholarship Committee awarded \$1,000 scholarships to 14 students across the nation. Judges evaluated applicants on scholastic achievements, leadership in school and community activities and responses to DHI- and career-related questions. One of the applicants deemed worthy of an award was Laura Littrell of St. Johnsville, NY.

Littrell said she grew up as a part of her grandparents' 75-head dairy farm,

where they maintain Holsteins. As she got older, she started taking on more responsibilities while also being very active in local FFA and 4-H groups. Today, she has eight of her own cows that she cares for and shows.

"I'm really into pedigrees and genetics and reproduction," she said. That interest led to her becoming an animal science major, concentrating in dairy, at SUNY Cobleskill. This autumn, however, she'll be transferring to finish her degree at Cornell University.

"My education shows me all the benchmarks for this industry. I'm always learning new things," Littrell said. "And I'm always making new connections and friends.'

She said she was definitely excited to learn she had won one of the scholarships from DHIA, as it is a highly competitive, nationwide program. The other winners this year hail from New York, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa and California.

"I definitely want to go into the dairy industry after graduation," Littrell stated. 'I can't imagine doing anything else. I hope to keep breeding good animals and I plan to stay involved with other organizations once I age out of the ones I'm currently involved with."

Did you know?

Some taxpayers may be eligible for free tax help through a program offered by the IRS. The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program offers free tax help to people who generally earn \$56,000 or less, as well as persons with disabilities and people who are not fluent in English. People who are 60 years of age or older also are eligible for free tax help through the Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) program, which specializes in questions about pensions and retirement-related issues

The availability of volunteers that work with these programs can vary based on the amount of certified individuals with tax law expertise in a given area. As a result, anyone hoping to take advantage of these services should consider contacting these programs well in advance of the deadline to file their returns.

The deadline to file tax returns is Wednesday, April 15.

Letter to the Editor

This photo shows my dear and beloved friend, Mr. Skip Barshied. Skip passed away peacefully in January in his home in Palatine Bridge, NY. Skip was such an amazing human being who knew so many amazing, wonderful and unique people throughout all of Upstate New York and elsewhere.

I met Skip 20 years ago when my husband and I moved upstate to Palatine Bridge, also known as Stone Arabia. Standing behind me in the photo is another amazing gentleman, Mr. Joe Fowler. Skip introduced me to Joe. What all three of us had in common was that we loved art, antiques, collectibles and history. That is what brought all three of us together as neighbors and then close friends. I cannot say for sure but I believe that Skip had some of the most collectible antiques, art and historical artifacts in all of Upstate New York. When we first met it was at my 19th century general store and folk art gallery on my property in Palatine Bridge. Skip really seemed to love some of the work I made and said there were several people that he wanted me to meet. He would call me often to see if I'd go with him to homes of people who wanted to meet me and know more about my work. He introduced me to museum curators, writers, antique dealers, art collectors and old time farmers, just to name a few. He would also take me to his second property that to me was like a historical 18th century village that reflected what it was like to live and work in the early 18th century. He selflessly shared so many wonderful experiences with me, too many to mention, too many to count.

When this photo was taken, it would be the last time I'd get to spend with him, as the next day he peacefully passed away. I was shocked that he insisted that both Joe and I take a picture with him along with a 3-D folk art story I had given to him as a gift many years ago. He told me that he loved me and that he appreciated our 20 years of friendship and also that he wanted to take a photo of both Mr. Fowler and myself and the hand-framed folk art story quilt that he wanted Joe to receive as a gift from him.

Skip told us that he wanted the story of our art, antiques, collectibles, stories and friendship to be shared in the local newspapers because this kind of history is extremely important and should be recorded for future generations. In honor and in memory of a truly unique, intelligent, kind and special local historian I have done what he asked me to do. Both Joe and I have contacted a well-known newspaper in Upstate New York to tell the story of a man who the world should know about, a man who offered so many different people from all walks of life a story about American history, including the story of slavery in Upstate New York, one that he asked me to share to the world for posterity.

So long, my beloved friend. I loved you just as you did me. I will deeply miss you. You've contributed so much joy and meaning to my life and I thank you from the depth of my heart. Rest in peace, beloved friend and neighbor, Mr. Skip Barshied. Amen.

Scammers using fake novel Coronavirus phishing emails to target consumers online

The New York State Division of Consumer Protection (DCP) is alertconsumers about scammers taking advantage of fears surrounding the novel coronavirus. Scammers are using fake emails that contain harmful links designed to steal your personal information. While the New York State Department of Health, which is the medical authority on novel coronavirus in the state, has recently stated there are no confirmed cases of the novel coronavirus anywhere in New York, people should still be on the lookout for scammers looking to take advantage of public fears surrounding this issue.

"Unscrupulous scammers are taking advantage of the news of the novel coronavirus by trying to lure people into unknowingly providing their personal information," said Secretary of State Rossana Rosado. "Taking the necessary precaution to avoid coronavirus scams can help protect your hard-earned money and your identity."

"While the novel coronavirus is infecting people throughout the world, in New York State we have had no confirmed cases," said Commissioner of the New York State Department of Health Dr. Howard Zucker. "Unfortunately, the Internet is loaded with misinformation, but simple, proven precautions like washing your hands and staying indoors when you feel sick will help prevent the spread of infection all year."

Scammers are using fake emails that claim to have information on novel coronavirus updates and include an interactive link where you can

look up the numbers of cases near you and more. The links, however, are harmful and redirect to web pages that steal your information instead of providing you with important updates.

DCP provides the following tips to protect yourself from novel coronavirus scams, and similar scams that typically arise with a major global event:

Don't click on links from sources you don't know. It could download a virus onto your computer or device. Make sure the anti-malware and anti-virus software on your computer is up to date.

Be aware of emails coming from unknown senders. Watch for emails claiming to be from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) or experts claiming to have information about the virus. For the most up-to-date information about the coronavirus in New York State, visit the New York State Department of Health website.

Ignore online offers for vaccinations. If you see ads touting prevention, treatment, or cure claims for the novel coronavirus, ask yourself: if there's been a medical breakthrough, would you be hearing about it for the first time through an ad or sales pitch?

Be aware of emails asking for donations. Do your homework when it comes to donations, whether through charities or crowd funding. Don't let anyone rush you into donating. If someone wants donations in cash, by gift card, or by wiring money, don't do it.

Be alert to "investment opportunities." The S. Securities and Exchange

Commission (SEC) is warning people about online promotions, including on social media, claiming that the products or services of publicly-traded companies can prevent, detect, or cure coronavirus and that the stock of these companies will dramatically increase in value as a result.

New York State is closely monitoring the novel coronavirus, which was detected in China. While there are thousands of cases there, no one has been diagnosed with this new coronavirus in New York State. For up to date information on the coro-

Family-style appetizers also are effective. Print out custom menus with the event title on top, or ask if the restaurant can make them.

Decide on bar service

Alcoholic refreshments can quickly consume a budget, so frugal hosts might need to reign in expenses in the this department. Wine and spirits can be expensive if they're not included in the restaurants price-fixed party package. It's perfectly


acceptable to offer some carafes of wine or pitchers of beer on the table and ask guests to pay for their own specialized drinks

8 oz rotelle or elbow macaroni Salt

- 1 cup bottled marinara or spaghetti sauce
- 1 package (8-oz, 2 cups) shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese
 - 2 cups all-purpose flour
 - 3/4 cup shortening or butter-flavor shortening

'Cotton ball' sensation is a sign of neuropathy

Dear Dr. Roach: I'm a 63-year-old male diagnosed with chronic myelogenous leukemia, Type 2 diabetes and coronary heart disease. I am 5 feet, 11 inches and weigh 240 pounds. I have two stents and take Sprycel for the CML. My levels are good, and the coronary disease is under control.

For a few years I've had what feels like "cotton balls" under the skin in the area of the balls of my feet. Now it feels like it's migrating to the arch. While not too uncomfortable, it is almost impossible to walk barefooted. Some type of foot covering is needed to keep from noticing the feeling. My doctor says it's the diabetes, and to lose weight or see a podiatrist. Other than losing the weight, do you have any opinion about this? - N.M.

Answer: Cotton-ball sensation is one way that many people describe the beginning of neuropathy, a general term for a variety of different conditions that affect the nerves of the body.

In a person with cancer (like CML, chronic myelogenous leukemia, a cancer of the bone marrow) and a new symptom, it is always wise to consider whether it could be due to the cancer, the treatment for the cancer or from something else. In your case, usually CML is not associated with neuropathy. However, the medicine you are taking, dasatinib (Sprycel), has been associated with a severe kind of reversible neuropathy. I read the case reports of this condition carefully, and I doubt that is what is going on with you, as the symptoms you have are different from those reported.

People with longstanding diabetes frequently develop a particular disease of the nerves, diabetic neuropathy. This almost always begins with sensation changes in the feet. I agree with your doctor that diabetes is the most likely

Seeing a podiatrist is absolutely a good idea. They can test you for this condition (usually a careful physical exam will make the diagnosis), in addition to looking carefully for any early signs or risk factors for injury or infection. You also should learn how to do a daily inspection of your feet and recognize the signs, so you can get to medical attention promptly should any damage to your feet occur. The podiatrist will make sure you have appropriate footwear.

Many people with diabetes benefit from weight loss, but the important thing is to be sure your diabetes is under good control. This is achieved through good diet, regular exercise and medication, if needed, in addition to weight loss in people who are overweight.

Dear Dr. Roach: Due to cancer, my prostate was removed about seven years ago. My PSA reading has increased since 2012 from 0.09 to 0.304. Should I be concerned? I am 78 years old and in relatively good health. - B.D.

Answer: PSA readings can go up and down, but a threefold increase could mean that the cancer is coming back, and you should see the specialist taking care of your prostate cancer to discuss getting additional testing.

Not having disease for seven years after treatment is a good sign, but the PSA test is pretty specific for cancer recurrence if two separate readings are above 0.2. You may need additional therapy, but only further investigation will show how concerned you need to be.



Elective Fair:

In late December, the Jr/Sr High School held an Elective Fair, to help students decide which courses to take next school year. Students in grades 8-11 were invited to participate in the fair. Students went from table to table, listending as a teacher from each department gave out information about the many course offererings the students have to choose from. The students are able to review course lists and descriptions, and ask questions to help them determine what they would like to take in the next school year. The Elective Fair also helps the teachers and guidance staff to determine how much interest their in various course offerings. Many students came away feeling like they had a solid directon for next year, and what classes to take to help them further their future goals.

AR Sandbox Debut: Mr. Ted Arndt's class at the Jr/Sr High School recently began to use their new Augented Reality (AR) Sandbox. The large wooden box of sand creates topographic maps, using computer gaming software and a projector. The software projects a map over the sand, showing every little hill, valley and "water" spot. As students manipulate the sand with their hands, the map changes in real time. If sand is moved into a pile, a hill or mountain is formed. If they dig a trench, it will show as a low spot or as a potential water location. Students can move the sand around to determine the best places for building a town or project. Mr. Arndt's students explained that the sand is very fine and white, to better allow the computer graphic to be most visible. They mist the sand with a little coating of water, to make the sand easier to pile up. Several pieces had to come together to operate the system, including a gaming computer with a very large memory and fast processor, an x-box camera, and an LCD projector. The AR Sandbox was made possible with a grant from the Upper Montgomery Retired Teachers Assocation. The sandbox was constructed by teachers Ted Arndt and Kreig Herother, and the technology pieces were assembled and installed by the class paraprofessional Mike Broady. The students are enjoying showing the project to visitors and students. They are working on a write-up, which explains how the system works and what it can do. They look forward to making some formal presentations to other classrooms.



Puppets in Education: The Puppets in Education program stopped at the Harry Hoag School recently, presenting a show called "A Day of Feelings." During the program, students learned about their emotions and how to appropriately handle feeling sad or uncomfortable, while also learning to change a bad day into a good one - making themselves feel both proud and happy instead. Puppets in Education is an offshoot of the Vermont Family Network. It is in its 39th year, serving more than 10,000 children and adults annually to address a range of topics that affect students each day. The program was made possible by a donation from Fucillo Chevrolet of Nelliston, who also donated ten puppets to the schools so that children can continue their creative education.

Kristy's Closet Opens: The Jr/Sr High School now has a place there students in need can go to get clothing and toiletries, which are donated by staff and community members. The closet was designed, engineered and then constructed by Kreig Heroth's Technology and Design Class. They measured the available space, and came up with a plan for shelving, bins and hanging racks. Using a computer program allowed them to try different layouts, and see how it would look when it was finished. They eventually determined the most functional design and began the building phase. They built wooden shelves, assembled galvanized clothing racks, and cut out wooden labels for the shelves. "It was the hardest I've ever worked on a project, because I wasn't just building something for myself," junior Storm Lounsberry said. "I'm proud of it. It feels great knowing it will help people." The school is now accepting donations of new and gently-used clothing in all sizes for teens and young adults. Typical items needed would include: jeans, leggings, sweatpants, sweatshirts, t-shirts, and new underwear and socks. The closet also stocks toiletries that some students don't always have regular access. to: toothpaste, toothbrushes, soaps and shampoos. "I'm so excited about this opportunity given to me to spearhead this program for our young adults," said Student Conduct Coordinator Kristy McFee, for whom the closet is named. "I attended Fort Plain CSD from third to twelfth grade, and I've lived here all my life. This is something I can give back to the community that I live in."
