With the Governor's announcement that school buildings are closed for the remainder of the 2019-2020 year, we're able to accelerate the timeline for the capital project. You may have noticed that work at the Jr/Sr High School is already underway. in the coming weeks, you will begin to see work on the track and lower driveway of the Jr/Sr High School.



School Budget Vote: This year's school budget and board of education election will take place on June 9, 2020, exclusively by absentee ballot due to the COVID-19 public health crisis. Qualified voters will automatically be sent an absentee ballot with a postage paid return envelope. Anyone who meets the definition of qualified voter, but does not receive an absentee ballot, should contact District Clerk Rebecca Smith by email at becky.smith@fortplain.org to have one sent out. Qualified voters are defined as U.S. citizens who are 18 years or older and have lived in the district for at least 30 days prior to the date of the vote.

PreK and Kindergarten Registration: Registration is now open for incoming PreK students and incoming Kindergarten students who did not attend this year's PreK program. Registration appointments will be scheduled, to manage social distancing and adhere to the CDC recommendations for safety. To begin the process, visit the school website at www.fortplain.org and follow the link to the registration form. Once the form has been submitted, you will be contacted to set up a registration appointment, for the adult only. Before scheduling your appointment, please be sure that you will be prepared to bring:

*Birth certificate for the child

*Any court documents regarding custody

*Proof of district residency (mortgage statement, signed rent/lease agreement with full address listed, utility bill or government pay stub) *immunization record

*Name, address and phone number for three emergency contacts for the child

Please note: there are limited spots in PreK because of state education department regulations. Registration does not guarantee enrollment. If the number of registrations exceeds 36 students, then a random lottery will be held on July 10th, to select the students who will be enrolled. Parents will be notified of their child's enrollment status on that day.

4th Graders Study Conductivity: Fourth grade students received a special workshop in March, about electricity and conductivity. The fourth graders were visited by Canaioharie High School's computer science students. The high school group showed our students how to use a science kit called "Makey Makey." It allows kids to turn everyday objects into computer touch pads. Using common items such as playdoh, wires and paper clips, the students made working controllers. Next, they learned how bananas can serve as electricity conductors, and used them to power a piano keyboard. Finally, the class itself became an electrical conductor as electricity traveled from person to person and set off the piano keyboard. "The fourth graders have been learning about electricity and conductivity, and this workshop helped bring their studies to life," said Technology Integration Specialist Matt Heiser. Our students had fun learning and really appreciated all that the Canajoharie HS students had to teach them.



No one in this country should be afraid to go to the doctor because of the cost - especially during a pandemic. The American people deserve an emergency healthcare response that is simple, straightforcomprehensive ward. and cost-effective," said Sanders. "We should empower Medicare to pay all of the medical bills of the uninsured and the under-insured – including prescription drugs - for the duration of the coronavirus pandemic. When so many people in this country are struggling economically and terrified at the thought of becoming sick, the federal government has a responsibility to take the burden of healthcare costs off the backs of the American people. The legislation we are introducing today does just that."

New polling reveals overwhelming enthusiasm for Sanders' proposal. According to Data for Progress, 73% of American voters support Medicare covering all out-ofpocket health expenses during this emergency, including 58% of Republicans. In comparison, 55% backed a separate

proposal to cover the cost of insurance premiums through COBRA, a federal program that allows those who have lost their jobs to temporarily retain their former employers' health insurance coverage. When presented with evidence that Sanders' emergency Medicare proposal is significantly less expensive despite covering millions more people, 61% preferred Sanders' approach versus 14% who backed COBRA subsidies.

Sanders has previously argued that proposals to expand COBRA benefits with taxpayer subsidies would provide insurance corporations with hundreds of billions of dollars in windfall profits, but do nothing to cover those who had already lacked employer-provided insurance, or those who continue to be deterred from seeking medical assistance due to high deductibles, which require roughly \$1,800 on average in annual out-ofpocket spending before private insurance coverage kicks in.

Sanders' legislation, in contrast, would simply leverage the existing Medicare payment infrastructure to affordably and efficiently pay all costs of treatment for the uninsured, and cover all out-of-pocket costs such as copayments and deductibles for those who already have public or private insurance. The bill also halts medical debt collections, prohibits private insurance companies from increasing cost-sharing and requires ongoing data collection and weekly reporting on health disparities related to COVID-19. The legislation would be effective until a COVID-19 vaccine is widely available to the public.

"Healthcare is a right, not a privilege," said Gillibrand. "The COVID-19 pandemic has made clear that every individual needs access to affordable healthcare, and the Health Care Emergency Guarantee Act would cover everyone's out-of-pocket healthcare expenses during this emergency, regardless of insurance







Legislature must jumpstart New York's economy A legislative column by Assemblyman Robert Smullen (R, C-Meco)

As New York State begins the process of re-opening certain regions, there is also talk of re-convening the State Legislature. If and when the Legislature returns, either virtually or back in Albany, jumpstarting our state's economy should be one of our top priorities.

The COVID-19 health crisis has impacted the U.S. more severely than any other country around the globe. And with more than 300,000 confirmed cases, New York State has paid a high price in the number of people infected and the tragedy of lives lost.

To help contain the spread of the virus, thousands of businesses were required to close by the state. Our "Jumpstart New York" initiative provides a blueprint for economic relief in the short term and much-needed stability in the long term. Through federal and state actions, the plan offers financial relief and protections to small businesses and their employees. It removes costly regulatory burdens that stifle growth and opens doors for employers to receive critical assistance that will allow them to survive and succeed.

The plan recommends a range of state actions that can help pave the road to recovery, including creating a state business and nonprofit recovery loan program to help small businesses, and utilizing the Regional Economic Development Councils (REDCs) as vehicles for immediate economic recovery efforts instead of general economic development purposes.

In addition to cutting regulatory red tape, the plan recommends implementing the provisions of the "Small Business Emergency Recovery Act of 2020" that our conference proposed as part of the state budget. This action uses any money from unallocated state settlements to support small businesses and REDC local recovery efforts, as well as repurposing and utilizing funding for state capital programs to jumpstart the economy.

Coordinated federal actions recommended in the plan include directing future federal stimulus money to local governments and school districts to offset increased costs and the loss of tax revenue associated with COVID-19; capping unemployment insurance premiums; expanding the 0% interest rate to all Small Business Administration loans similar to the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) with interest paid by the federal government; and providing stimulus relief to sole proprietorships and LLCs that are unable to seek relief under existing programs.

The scale and severity of our current fiscal condition is unprecedented, and our people are feeling tremendous pressure. A commitment from state government to remove roadblocks that stand in the way of restoring lost jobs and creating the new jobs our economy needs will send a strong and clear message to the business community.

When the Legislature returns, we should use the proposals outlined above and all the tools at our disposal to jumpstart New York's economic engine. Busi-



ness owners and employees need to know that help is on the way. The economic health of New York State hinges on the success and prosperity of the small business community.

The grounds crew has brought back on a couple of seasonal employees, the mowing cycles have begun, and they are working on upkeep as well as some safety projects. As you may know, there are miles of towpath trails and some really great open spaces to explore here. The boat launch remains closed due to low and unsafe water levels in the Schoharie Creek and Mohawk River. NYPA and NYS Canal Corp. have announced their re-opening plan, projecting the Mohawk Valley portion of the system to be in operation sometime between July 4 and Aug. 10. This may mean that we can get the launch open by sometime in August. But, again, we are reliant on their operation of today's canal system for appropriate water levels and current.

As you are aware, we have had to postpone or cancel several of our programs for the season. The most recent cancellation was that of the 15 Miles Paddle series. With such uncertainly about the canal system and our ability to permit gatherings, we and our partners, the Arkell at Canajoharie and Down by the River Kayak Rentals, have decided this is the most appropriate action. We'll keep you updated on all of this through emails as well as on Facebook or other social media. You can find information about the site on our NYS Parks page as well. We continue to plan for the re-opening of the Visitor Center under new guidelines. The grounds of the site remain open for use. Follow social distancing guidelines.

Since we are unable to have a Friends of Schoharie Crossing meeting on-site, the presentation of "Who Wore It Better? The Trails of Progress and the Wise Future Face of America" was held online May 26. The "future face of America" that Thomas Jefferson spoke of in 1817 when writing to New York State Governor and Erie Canal champion DeWitt Clinton was one of internal improvements that would transform the early American Republic. He congratulated Clinton on the progress of a canal "...in a state wise enough to see that the common interest is individual interest, and rich enough to pursue it." George Washington had also received encouragement from Jefferson for his Potomac Company canal project but major obstacles confronted both Clinton and Washington in their efforts to connect the eastern waters to the new westward expanding nation. Both were successful in the long run in changing the political, economic and physical landscape of the nation, just in different ways. This presentation looked at the similarities and differences between DeWitt Clinton and George Washington as they navigate the waters of internal improvements in early America.

Horticulture and landscaping operations permitted to reopen statewide Equine operations permitted to reopen in regions that have reached state benchmarks as part of the NY Forward Plan

As New York State begins to reopen under Governor Andrew Cuomo's NY Forward plan, the horticulture industry, which includes greenhouse operations, nurs-

eries, sod farms and arborists, has been deemed as an essential service and these businesses are now permitted to resume business statewide in all regions. In addition, landscaping businesses can continue to operate statewide, and permissible activities have been expanded to include the care and planting of grasses, sod, plants, shrubs and trees

and the mulching, trimming and removal of these items. These businesses, which are considered lowrisk, must create a plan to reopen safely using guidance from the Non-Food Related Agriculture Summary Guidelines to protect public health.

State Ag Commissioner Richard A. Ball said, "As New York begins to slowly bring business back online, the horticulture and floriculture industry which are important to the agricultural economy are permitted to open across the state. This includes greenhouses and nurseries, even if they are not selling food-producing plants. Our equine businesses have also been permitted to resume dayto-day operations on a regional basis. All of our businesses must adhere to the designated standards, have a plan for how to open safely, and those new measures need to be in place to protect employ-

ees and consumers." In addition, gardening is also allowed statewide. This includes the cultivation of flowers, vegetables, herbs, fruit, trees, shrubs and more at home and in community settings and

locations. Equine operations

Equine operations are permitted to reopen as part of Phase 1 of the NY Forward plan, and only in regions that have reached the state's benchmarks and the proper criteria for reopening. Equine operations include activities such as the breeding, boarding, exercise and transport of horses, riding personal or for-hire horses at facilities and the oversight or instruction of riders at the operation. Equine operations must also follow the Non-Food Related Agriculture Summary Guidelines and Read and Affirm Detailed Guidelines for Non-food Agriculture.

• The site is open Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays weekly from 7 a.m. - 9 a.m., weather permitting.

• Testing is for adults who meet CDC and state and local guidelines on who should be tested, including first responders, healthcare providers and others with symptoms of COVID-19 and those in high risk groups without symptoms.

• Individuals must be 18 years and older.

• The testing site will require an appointment through Quest's Mv-QuestTM online portal and app, www.MyQuest-COVIDTest.com, which will screen and schedule appointments for those individuals that meet medical eligibility for the testing sites.

• Once on site, those being tested will need to wear a mask and stay in their cars for verification of eligibility criteria, ID check and self-administered test. For the safety of all those on-site, the

Fort Plain resident earns degree from WGU

SALT LAKE CITY - David Thomas of Fort Plain has earned a MBA, Healthcare Management, degree from Western Governors University (WGU). The online, nonprofit university has graduated over 178,000 students from across the country since its inception in 1997.

Since Jan. 2, WGU has awarded 6,313 undergraduate and 4,975 graduate degrees. Twenty warning signs of stress

Stress affects so many people and infiltrates so many parts of daily life that it can be tempting to write it off as harmless or just a normal part of being human. But the negative effects of stress are significant, and persons who can recognize that are in a good position to find healthy ways to cope with their stress.

The American Psychological Association notes that stress can take a considerable toll on a person's mind and body. Chronic stress, which is a constant stress experienced over a prolonged period of time, can increase the risk of hypertension, heart attack or stroke. In addition, the APA notes that chronic stress causes the muscles in the body to be in an essentially constant state of guardedness, which can potentially contribute to tension-type headache and migraines. And these are just two of the many ways the body is adversely affected by stress, which the APA says also has been linked to problems with the gastrointestinal, nervous and reproductive systems.

Since stress can contribute to such unpleasant and potentially life-threatening side effects, it's important that people from all walks of life learn to recognize the warning signs of stress. The American Institute of Stress lists the following among its 50 most common signs and symptoms of stress.

1. Frequent headaches, jaw clenching or pain

2. Gritting, grinding teeth

3. Stuttering or stammering 4. Tremors, or trembling of lips or hands

5. Neck ache, back pain and/or muscle spasms

6. Light headedness, faintness and/ or dizziness

7. Ringing, buzzing or "popping sounds"

8. Frequent blushing or sweating

9. Cold or sweaty hands and feet

10. Dry mouth and/or problems swallowing

11. Frequent colds, infections and/or herpes sores

12. Rashes, itching, hives and/or "goose bumps"

13. Unexplained or frequent "allergy" attacks

14. Heartburn, stomach pain and/or nausea

15. Excess belching and/or flatulence 16. Constipation, diarrhea, loss of control

17. Difficulty breathing and/or frequent sighing

18. Sudden attacks of life-threatening panic

19. Chest pain, palpitations and/or rapid pulse

20. Frequent urination
