

Bat awareness

Montgomery County Public Health would like to raise awareness to residents of the area regarding recent reports of bat exposure. Bats reside throughout New York State in both rural and urban areas. Keeping bats out of your home is a good first step in protecting yourself and your pets against rabies. Bats are just one of the carriers of rabies; other vectors include raccoons, skunks and foxes.

To bat-proof vour home, use polypropylene bird netting, fly screening, sheet metal, wood or various caulking compounds to close or cover openings that allow entry to the roost. Bats like to roost in attics, behind shutters, under roofing or siding, the underside of a porch roof, between the house and chimney, vents, rafters. behind hollow walls and in other sheltered areas of homes and buildings. If you suspect bats are roosting in your house, watch for them leaving at dusk, and make sure there are no more bats coming from the roost Seal off any crevice observed, being aware that bats can enter through crevices as small as a pencil. The best time to bat-proof is late autumn through winter. Area wildlife and bat control specialists are available for hire in the surrounding area.

Bats infected with rabies quickly show signs. Avoid contact with any bat, especially one that is outdoors during the daylight, on the ground or paralyzed. Bats rarely attack humans: however. any physical contact with a rabid bat may transmit the disease. In some situations a bat bite could go undetected, such as when a bat is found in a room with a sleeping person, or next to an unattended young child or pet. If there is any chance that contact with a bat has occurred to a person or pet, or you are not sure if contact has occurred, capture the bat without touching it. If indoors, close windows, room and closet doors, turn on lights and wait for the bat to land. Wearing heavy gloves, cover the bat with a pail, coffee can or similar container. If the bat is not captured

or tests positive for rabies, every person and pet that had a reasonable probability of exposure should receive rabies post exposure treatment as soon as possible.

Immediately call Montgomery County Public Health 518.853.3531.

Removing gallbladder
didn't end gallstones

Dear Dr. Roach: My husband had his gall-bladder removed many years ago. In the past few years, he has had six ERCPs to remove gallstones from his bile duct, as he is still making them. He has been told to drink lots of water but that there is no pre-

ventive remedy. Do you have any suggestions for how to prevent these gallstones from forming?

— B.A.P.

Answer: Ordinarily, removing the gallbladder stops new gallstones from forming. Having a gallstone left after surgery is not uncommon, but it is very uncommon for people to make multiple new stones years

One possibility is a diverticulum of the common bile duct. The common bile duct drains bile from the liver and gallbladder into the small intestine — it drains pancreatic fluid, too. A diverticulum is a blind pouch. It's possible for a stone to form there, so you should find out if he has one. They should have seen it on one of the ERCPs (a special endoscopy that looks at the bile and pancreatic ducts). If present, a diverticulum can be removed surgically.

I asked my colleague at Weill Cornell, Dr. Arun Jesudian, for his expertise, and he said he has seen multiple stones in the liver due to parasitic infections, often in Asian patients. That may require surgical treatment. He also discussed doing a sphincterotomy, which is a procedure to open the end of the common bile duct, to let stones pass through easily. Your husband may benefit from expanding it. Finally, there is a medication to reduce gallstones, ursodiol (Actigall), which Dr. Jesudian feels had no real downsides and might well help.

Dear Dr. Roach: I'm a female, 53, who suffers from and is being treated for IBS. I have a history of colon cancer in my family. My family members and I go through regular screenings and so far, we've been clean. Once in a while, I wake up feeling a sharp, stabbing pain in my rectal area that lasts no more than 20-30 minutes before going away. These pains occur no more than once a month, sometimes every few months, but the pain often happens while I'm asleep and wakes me up. Luckily, there have been no bloody or black

stools or urine following this, much to my relief. I've tallked to my gastroenterologist about it, and he's as clueless as I am. I do exercise and watch what I eat. Could it be gas? At least the pain is short-lived, so it doesn't interfere with my daily activities or routine. — A.

Answer: Irritable bowel syndrome is a common problem, found more frequently in women, that ranges from annoying to life-changing. Although it does not predispose to cancer or reduce life expectancy, IBS can have dramatic effects on a person's social and work lives.


The hallmarks of IBS are bowel changes (diarrhea, constipation or sometimes both, alternating) and abdominal discomfort. The discomfort is usually described as cramping, but it is not unheard of to be described as sharp or stabbing. I believe a colonoscopy is appropriate to be sure IBS is not actually a different problem, such as inflammatory bowel disease. Black or bloody stools would be concerning for IBD not IBS.

Your symptoms are not typical for colon cancer, which often has no symptoms until it is quite advanced, making regular screening is so important.







The Kitchen Diva

by Angela Shelf Medearis We all scream for ice cream

It's hot, and like many of you, one of my favorite ways to cool off is with a bowl of ice cream. Vanilla ice cream continues to be America's flavor of choice. Ice cream's origins are known to reach back as far as the second century B.C., although no specific date of origin or inventor has been indisputably credited with its discovery.

We know that Alexander the Great enjoyed snow and ice flavored with honey and nectar. Biblical references also show that King Solomon was fond of iced drinks during harvesting. During the Roman Empire, Emperor Nero (A.D. 54-86) frequently sent runners into the mountains for snow, which was then flavored with fruits and inices

by a Chatham Street, New York, merchant show that President George Washington spent approximately \$200 for ice cream during the summer of 1790. President Thomas Jefferson's slave chef, James Hemings, is said to have a favorite 18step recipe for an ice-cream delicacy that resembled a modern-day Baked Alaska.

Around 1800, insulated ice houses were invented. Manufacturing ice cream soon became an industry in America, pioneered in 1851 by a Baltimore milk dealer named Jacob Fussell. Due to ongoing technological advances, today's frozen dairy production in the United States is more than 1.6 billion gallons annually.


Wide availability of ice cream in the late 19th century led to new creations. In 1874, the American soda-fountain shop and the profession of the "soda recipe and variations from

- 6 eggs
- 2 cups milk
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups whipping cream
- 1 tablespoon vanilla
- 1. In medium saucepan, beat together eggs, milk, sugar and salt. I thought shingles was an old person's disease: What everyone 50+ needs to know

(BPT) – Father, business owner and Rhode Island native Steve B. was forced to spend the holidays sidelined with shingles at the age of 51.

"I look forward to the holidays every year. In addition to the fun and festivities of the season, I get a little downtime to enjoy my favorite things: spending time with my family, working out and watching sports," Steve said. "But that holiday season, I felt an odd burning pain I'd never felt before."

is at risk of contracting shingles, also known as herpes zoster. When chicken-pox becomes dormant within the nerves, it can reactivate later in life, causing shingles. Shingles typically presents as a painful, itchy rash that develops on one side of the body and can last for two to four weeks.

Shingles kept Steve from doing the things he loved the most. "I never call out of work. Because of shingles, I missed three days. As a proud father of a high school athlete, I never miss one of my daughter's basketball games. Because of shingles, I missed three games."

After a long two weeks from the start of his symptoms, Steve began to feel better. He never considered vaccination and thought he was too young to contract the disease when, in fact, approximately one in three people in the U.S. will develop shingles in their lifetime.

"My experience with shingles affected everyone around me. My wife and children, used to seeing me energetic and lively, were blown away at how worn out I was for days on end. After seeing the impact of this virus, both my business partner and brother ran out to get the shingles vaccine."


Steve learned firsthand that shingles doesn't play favorites. As a GSK spokesperson, Steve wants to educate others about shingles symptoms, risks and the importance of vaccination. He insists,

"Don't assume you aren't at risk due to age – talk to your doctor about how you can help prevent shingles from happening to you."

If you're 50 years of age and older, talk to your doctor about vaccination against shingles. Vaccination will help reduce the risk of developing shingles and the potential long-term pain from post-herpetic neuralgia, a common complication caused by the disease.


