# Virtual New York State History Month series

The Schoharie Crossing State Historic Site in Fort Hunter will conduct its sixth annual Tuesday Talk series to recognize New York State History Month this October. This year it will be "virtual" and each week a speaker will present a topic connected to regional or New York State history. All presentations are free and open to the public. They will begin at 6:30 p.m. each Tuesday via the online platform Webex.

Tuesday, Oct. 20. The "Schuyler Sisters" have been causing quite a stir in the Broadway musical "Hamilton: An American Musical," but did you know that there were really five sisters? Learn what it was like growing up as a Schuyler as Serfilippi takes an in-depth look at the history of the Schuyler women, their daily lives and the impact they had in shaping their family's history.

Closing out the Tuesday Talks portion of our New York State History Month programs, join Amanda Massie and Valerie Balint for the presentation "Converging on the Canal: The 19th Century Through Food." Few things are more universal than a need for food. What people eat often relates to where they live and their socio-economic standing. The 19th century in America brought massive change to where people lived, and a growing industry often brought social uplift. At the center of much of this change was the opening and expansion of the Erie Canal and the people who lived and worked on it. Massie and Balint will discuss how the technology and ideas that moved along the Erie Canal shaped how Americans ate in the 19th century.

In addition, the site will also be offering several other online

programs during the month. On Wednesday, Oct. 21 there will be a presentation at 1 p.m. from Ashley Maready of the Erie Canal Museum about "The Life and Times of New York State Governor and Erie Canal Proponent DeWitt Clinton." # Earth soil soars to space station to aid agriculture

Cornell University doctoral student Morgan Irons just helped make space exploration history: For the first time ever, unmodified Earth soil is scheduled to be launched into space. Irons saw the soil she scooped from a Cornell farm organic plot sent into space on the evening of Sept. 29. It hitched a ride aboard a resupply mission bound for the International Space Station (ISS), orbiting about 254 miles above Earth.

On the space station, researchers have used hydroponic planting systems, seeds placed in engineered growth media and highly modified mineral soil, said Irons, but this experiment will be different.

"This would be the first time that natural, unmodified Earth soil and engineered biochar soils have been brought up to space," she said.

Soil aggregates consist of particles that bind to one another for carbon sequestration, nutrient retention and soil aeration. Aggregation is considered a soil health indicator that depends on fungal and microbial adhesives to bind mineral and organic matter.

Since natural and biochar-containing soils have never been studied in space, scientists don't know how they react without gravity.

"We don't know the role that gravity plays in driving soil biogeochemical processes," Irons said. "We want to fundamentally understand the impact of gravity on fungal and microbial systems, within the context of soil aggregate stability."

While Irons knows this study likely will be a step to help future long-term space missions take humanity deep into the solar system and beyond, the gravity experiments could lead to better understanding of soil's unique characteristics.

"Hopefully," she said, "this experiment in space helps farmers down here on Earth, so that we all can thrive and live sustainably."

Astronauts won't need to fumble with loose dirt in plastic containers and risk spilling it: It will be in 36 plastic self-contained vials, for a total of one-tenth of a pound of dirt from three experiments. One set will contain soil from around Ithaca, NY; another set will contain high-performance engineered soil containing biochar from the Ithaca-based company bio365, overseen by John Gaunt; the third set will be from Matthias Rillig, a professor at Freie Universität Berlin, Germany.

"This will be the first time that a soil ecosystem has left the confines of Earth and we study what it does," said Johannes Lehmann, professor of soil science and principal investigator of the project. "This is a bit of a nerdy historic moment, but I'm very excited about it."

# To your good health

Cologuard test worth risk of false positive

**Dear Dr. Roach:** I am a 77-year-old man in good health. At my recent annual physical exam, my physician ordered a Cologuard kit to be sent to me to screen for colorectal disease. I have never had symptoms of disease or problems with any part of my gastrointestinal tract. I had two colonoscopies at different times several years ago, the results of which were negative. When I got the kit, I read the patient guidelines and learned that the Cologuard test could result in false positives and that there is an unspecified increase in the risk of false positives for persons over the age of 75

A positive result from the test requires a follow-up colonoscopy, which is also riskier for elderly patients. Since I am in good health with no symptoms of any disease, I decided I did not want to risk a false positive result from the test, which would require a follow-up colonoscopy. Did I make the right decision? — E.G.

**Answer:** Cologuard is a brand of test that looks at DNA in stool for evidence of cancer. Certain DNA mutations are highly suggestive of cancer. In addition, Cologuard does an immunochemical test looking for blood. Because it combines these two techniques, Cologuard is more sensitive than only a test looking for blood. Compared with colonoscopy, Cologuard is about 92% sensitive in finding cancers, meaning it will miss about 8%.

With improved sensitivity comes a lack of specificity, which means you could have a false positive result. The Cologuard can say that you have an abnormality when a colonoscopy would indicate normal. For 45% of people with a positive Cologuard test, no abnormali-

ties will be found upon colonoscopy. You are right that false positives are more prevalent in older individuals.

There are two reasons that I think the Cologuard is still a reasonable choice, despite the fact that it isn't as good as colonoscopy. The first is that I continue to recommend a screening test for healthy 77-year-old men, and although colonoscopy is my first choice, a normal Cologuard test prevents a need for colonoscopy, and a false positive would lead to the same colonoscopy you would have gotten anyway (although there probably is more anxiety after a false positive test).

The second is that a person with an abnormal Cologuard and a normal colonoscopy may be at risk for an abnormality that wasn't found on colonoscopy. A study looking at people in this category found a 25% risk of abnormality on follow-up colonoscopy, if the Cologuard was abnormal again one to two years later.

**Dear Dr. Roach:** I had lung surgery in 2014. The scar is still red and sore. I got no instructions on how to deal with it. Do you have any suggestions? — J.S.B.

**Answer:** That's a very long time for the scar to still be red and sore, and I would encourage you to have the surgeon or your regular doctor take a look. For people with redness and soreness in a scar shortly after surgery, I recommend silicone gel (there are many available), as it has been shown to be effective. Many people recommend vitamin E oil, but well-done studies have shown this does not help and may harm the cosmetic appearance.

# How to keep salad greens greener, longer Tips for extending life, crispness of salad greens

Salad greens are among the most perishable produce items, and keeping them crisp and fresh until consumed can be a challenge, said a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert. chased, they should be brought home as quickly as possible and put into the refrigerator.

"Buying high-quality produce from a reliable vendor or grocery store not only helps ensure you are getting the freshest possihard-sided container, then store them in the refrigerator crisper.

"If you have a salad spinner and plan to use the greens soon, you can clean them, spin off any excess moisture, then cover the spinner and place a week if you buy them at peak freshness and take the proper steps for storing them in your refrigerator.

When preparing greens, whether peeling the leaves from a head of iceberg lettuce or chopping up arucold running water to get the best results," she said.

Consumers should not wash produce with detergent or soap, Dittmar added

"Once rinsed, gently shake or agitate the leaves and thoroughly pat them dry between paper towels or spin-dry them in a salad spinner."

### Different means for different greens

"It is not recommended to rewash produce that is prewashed and packaged," Dittmar said. "At the store, you may find produce like bagged salads labeled 'pre-washed' or 'ready-to-eat.' If you see this label, then you can safely use the produce without further washing."

However, she said, if consumers do choose rewash produce already marked as such, be sure it does not come in contact with unclean surfaces or utensils, especially those that have touched raw meat, poultry or seafood or their juices. This will help to avoid cross-contamination.

# Other tips on storing different salad greens

• Whole heads of iceberg, romaine, bibb and other lettuce will stay fresher longer than leaves or chopped pieces. Heads of raw lettuce should be kept intact and left unwashed until ready to use. For romaine and bibb, remove any damaged or wilted outer leaves, place in a plastic bag or container and store in the crisper. For iceberg lettuce, keep the whole head wrapped in its original packaging and place in the crisper

drawer until ready to consume.

- Loose-leaf lettuce such as spinach or arugula are typically pre-washed and sorted, but still pick through the lettuce to remove any damaged leaves. Line a sturdy glass or plastic container with a few dry paper towels, then scatter your greens on top and cover with a lid. Leave some room for the air to circulate. If no container is available, use a plastic bag, but leave a small portion of it open so air can circulate.
- Kale is best if eaten soon after purchase, but it should keep for up to a week in the refrigerator. Store kale unwashed with leaves close together and wrap them in dry paper towels, then place in a perforated plastic bag or plastic container and put in the crisper.
- Spinach, Swiss chard and collard or turnip greens should all be stored in a plastic bag or container in the refrigerator crisper. These greens usually stay crisp for four days or longer if properly stored.
- For kohlrabi, cut off the greens and wrap in a dry paper towel and place in a perforated plastic bag or plastic container and store in the crisper. Kohlrabi leaves are among the most perishable of greens and will only remain crisp for two to three days. However, kohlrabi bulbs can last for up to two weeks if stored loosely in the crisper drawer of the refrigerator.

"Salad greens are delicate and have a relatively short lifespan, and it takes some effort to keep them crisp and attractive," said Rebecca Dittmar, AgriLife Extension program specialist in nutrition, Kerrville, TX.

# Spend your green on good greens

Dittmar said it is important to purchase the freshest possible greens from a trusted location.

Once greens are pur-

ble product, it also helps ensure you are getting the maximum nutritional benefit from that product and are better protected from the possibility of foodborne illness," she said.

For maximum crispness, it's usually best not to wash the greens until you are ready to use them.

Dittmar said in her experience, the best method of preserving greens is to place them in a perforated or regular plastic bag or in the crisper for storage," she said.

She noted placing the greens in a plastic container or other hard-sided box also provides the added benefit of protecting the greens from being crushed or bruised by other foods in the same area.

While some recommend wrapping washed and dried salad greens in a moist paper towel before putting them into a plastic bag or container, too much moisture can be a problem.


"The concern with wrapping the greens or lining the bag or container with a moist paper towel is that introducing moisture in the bag could promote spoilage or pathogenic growth," she said. "However, once it is rinsed and patted dry with paper towels, storing the greens in a bag or plastic container lined with dry paper towels to soak up any extra moisture should be fine."

Generally speaking, it's possible to keep most salad greens fresh for at least gula or romaine, wash the produce under cold running tap water to remove any lingering dirt. This also reduces the presence of any bacteria that may be present.

"Both the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Food and Drug Administration recommend washing produce under

# Plant bulbs now for spring bloom

Do your future self a favor, and plant spring-blooming bulbs this autumn.

Depending on where you live, there can be a month or more after the snow recedes in spring until we see flowers. Planting spring-flowering bulbs shortens this window and packs a ton of color, contrast and liveliness against a backdrop of the slowly awakening earth. Spring- flowering bulbs are an incredibly hopeful presence in a time of cool temperatures and unpredictable forecasts.

The key to having bulbs bloom in spring is to plant them in autumn. The best time to plant is mid-September through October when temperatures are cooler. Autumn-planted bulbs need weeks of hibernation in a dark, moist and cool environment to slowly develop roots in preparation for spring.

There are many types, sizes and colors. Scilla, snowdrops and crocus

are small bulbs that look beautiful en masse. Scilla happily can spread under the right conditions, creating carpets of blue in gardens and lawns.

Tulips, daffodils and hyacinths tend to be taller with larger more vibrant colors. These bulbs are showstoppers whether spaced closely together or far apart.

To plant spring-flowering bulbs, choose a site with well-drained soil and full to part sun. For best results, get a soil test to determine your soil's fertilizer needs for bulbs. Fertilizing the soil at planting can help the bulbs stay healthy and larger in future seasons.

The depth of planting depends on bulb size although as a rule, plant bulbs at a depth of two to three times the height of the bulb. Depending on the number of bulbs, you can dig holes individually for each bulb or dig out a larger area and plant multiple bulbs in the hole.

Smaller bulbs like scil-

la, snowdrops and crocus can be planted closer to one another, about 1-2 inches apart, while tulips and daffodils should be planted 3-6 inches apart. Make sure that the tip of the bulb points up to the sky, and water well after planting.

To prevent squirrels, mice and other critters from digging up your tulip bulbs, use wire mesh to make a barrier around all sides and the top of the bed after planting. An alternative is to select bulbs that do not attract rodents. Daffodils are poisonous, for example, so rodents, as well as deer, will leave them alone.

In spring resist the temptation to cut back the foliage immediately after flowering. It is a good practice to trim back the seed head, but leave the foliage until it dies back and yellows. This allows time for the bulbs to send energy from the plant foliage back into the bulbs and will produce bulbs that are larger with showier flowers in the future.

While crocuses, scilla and daffodils can be

left in the ground yearround, tulips and hyacinths should be dug up after their foliage has dried out. Store these bulbs in a dry, well-ventilated area until time to replant in autumn.

To bring the joy of spring flowers inside, plant a tulip cutting garden. If you have a vegetable garden or raised bed with spaces that are opening up this autumn, use a small area to plant tulips for spring cutting.

Keep in mind that it will take at least a few weeks for the foliage to die back next year, which means that this part of your vegetable garden won't be available for planting until around mid-June. Plan to plant something in this area that can handle a later start date, such as cucumbers, summer squash, heat-tolerant greens or beans.

There is nothing like starting spring with the fantastic colors of spring bulbs. Planting bulbs now will pay off in incredible ways after a long winter.

There are two schools of thought when it comes to managing leaf litter at this time of year. Some people believe in leaving leaf litter as natural mulch on perennial beds and to provide habitat for beneficial insects. Others believe in removing dead leaves to prevent disease and discourage pests.

But did you know that piles of dead leaves and other plant refuse create a breeding ground for ticks? I didn't!

This past spring, while we were all confined to our homes, I was cleaning the layer of leaves left the previous autumn as protective mulch on my perennial beds. It was a therapeutic activity until I discovered an engorged blacklegged tick in my armpit and ended up on a course of antibiotics.

As a new resident of New England, I assumed that ticks were found in high grasses in summer and autumn. But during my virtual office visit, the attending physician informed me otherwise.

Apparently, ticks are alive and well throughout the year and can be found in leaf litter as well as high grasses and low-lying bushes. Moreover, springtime is particularly rife with small tick nymphs, which are harder to notice when attached to the body. My fear of contracting Lyme disease convinced me to learn to manage leaf litter while minimizing my exposure to ticks.

In a recent study on the abundance of ticks in leaf litter. Dr. Robert Jordan, a research scientist at the Monmouth County (New Jersey) Mosquito Control Division, noted that homeowners need to be aware that "accumulations of leaves and other plant debris provide ideal host-seeking and survival conditions for immature blacklegged ticks." His research results indicate that the common practice of raking or blowing leaves to dump

in edge habitats (where lawn meets woods) can result in three times as many blacklegged ticks in these areas the following spring.

With this in mind, mulching leaves seems to be a better way to manage leaf litter than blowing or raking unless you plan to bag the leaves to take to a composting facility or else dump them far away from outdoor seating or play areas in your yard.

I prefer mulching my leaves, and here are some of the reasons why:

- Mulching gets rid of the piles of dead leaves, which harbor ticks, creating an unfavorable habitat for these pests.
- One single leaf may take a couple years to decompose while mulched leaves decompose quick-
- Leaves mulched into your lawn will act as a natural fertilizer.
- Mulched tilled into your vegetable and flower gardens add

nutrients and organic matter to the soil.

- Mulched leaves make a desirable "brown" pile, the high-carbon component needed for your compost.
- Mulching is all-around easier on your back than raking or blowing and hauling leaves.

All it takes is a simple mulching mower equipped with double blades that cut the grass clippings and leaves into small pieces. Running the mower over a thin layer of leaves once a week or so is ideal, but you may need to mow more often to keep up.


If you are interested in saving the shredded leaves, collect them with the mower's bag attachment. Storing

a stash of shredded leaves near your compost pile makes it readily available to add to your compost pile to build healthy, odorless compost.

Some gardening websites suggest using shredded leaves as a layer of mulch on top of your flower or vegetable beds. In retrospect, this may create the very conditions you are trying to avoid since ticks thrive in a moist and cool environment.

Try mulching your leaves this autumn to reduce the tick population and improve your lawn and soil for free.



# Kovels: Antiques and collecting

# by Terry and Kim Kovel Art Deco figurine

There have been many ceramic companies owned by members of the Goldscheider family, which can confuse today's collectors. Friedrich Goldscheider moved from Pilsen, Bohemia, to Vienna in 1885. He started the Goldscheider Porcelain Manufactory and Majolica Factory, a company to make ceramics. He hired famous artists including Michael Powolny, Demetre Chiparus and Josef Lorenzl, and the company soon had an international reputation for excellent figurines and other art deco pieces. Friedrich's sons, Walter and Marcell, joined the company and the business became worldwide in the 1920s and '30s.

But Hitler's rules led to the family fleeing to England in 1938; their company was given to others but was no longer successful. Marcell started a Gold-

scheider factory in Staffordshire. Walter had a successful company, Goldscheider-U.S.A., in Trenton, New Jersev, after 1940, but he returned to Vienna in 1950 to revive their old company. He closed it after three years and sold worldwide use of the Goldscheider name to Carstens, a German company. They used it until 1963. About 1988, Peter Goldscheider made a small number of pieces in Austria. Recently, a major book about the Goldscheider family and their ceramics was published with more history, details, artists' names, marks and pictures. The added publicity will probably encourage higher auction prices.

*g:* I have a chair that looks like it is made of long, curved horns. When and where were these used?

**A:** You have a very American chair. Chairs made of buffalo, elk or Texas longhorn steer

horns were made from horns left behind at slaughterhouses or discarded by hunters. The horns had a graceful curved shape and when positioned carefully, they created a chair frame with a curved back, legs and arms. An upholstered seat was added and, in some cases, some trim from other pieces of horn. Matching footstools also were made. The chairs were not made for comfort but were popular with hunters and those who wanted memories of the old West. There are pictures that show President Teddy Roosevelt and President Abraham Lincoln both had horn chairs that were gifts. Your chair could bring \$1,000 or more at auc-







# The Kitchen Diva

# by Angela Shelf Medearis Give mayonnaise that personal touch

I spend hours every day thinking about food. I'm the director of a non-profit health outreach organization and a certified health worker tasked with sourcing and distribut-ing food and essential supplies to underserved neighborhoods impacted by COVID-19. I'm also a chef, healthy food product developer, food writer and cookbook author with a passion for using unique ingredients -- produce, meats, herbs and spices -to create recipes as the focus of my work to use food as medicine.

Sometimes, all those hours concentrating on food become a problem when it comes to figuring out what I want to eat. When that happens, I turn to a simple, satisfying solution -- I make myself a sandwich. It's the perfect, versatile, hand-held meal for any time of the day!

Sandwiches range from slices of beef, turkey, chicken or seafood on wholewheat bread to roasted vegetables stuffed in a pita. Dressings, spreads and sauces can add a delicious depth and complexity to a typical sandwich and completely change its flavor profile.

A mealtime sandwich suddenly becomes more interesting with the addition of a beautifully flavored mayonnaise. Adding herbs, spices or fruit to homemade or a good-quality store-bought mayonnaise changes the flavor and can be made to complement a wide range of meats, seafood and vegetables.

Mayonnaise is made by creating an emulsion, in this case oil and egg yolks, two ingredients that normally don't combine. Egg yolks provide a rich, creamy base, while adding lemon juice or vinegar to the mayonnaise emulsion also helps deter any bacteria growth. Using the highest quality eggs ensures that safety concerns are reduced to a minimum.

All the ingredients for making mayonnaise, especially the eggs, need to be at room temperature. Take everything out at least 30 minutes before you begin. The lecithin in the egg yolks also helps to stabilize the emulsion ingredients, and lutein adds an important antioxidant that helps to maintain healthy vision.

The key to making an emulsion is adding the oil in a slow, steady stream.



The type of oil used in the emulsion changes the flavor of the mayonnaise. Do not use unrefined oils containing monoglycerides or extra-virgin olive oil, as the flavor is too strong, and the emulsion will separate. For best results, use regular olive oil, or combine it with vegetable oil.

Use this basic recipe for mayonnaise, and then add your favorite combination of herbs, spices and other ingredients to create a spread that will add a special zip to your sandwiches.

### Basic mayonnaise

For best results, avoid making mayonnaise during wet or humid weather, as it will affect the emulsion and the mayonnaise will have a greasy texture. For a richer mayo, use only the egg yolks.

1 egg yolk

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon dry mustard

1/4 teaspoon sugar 1/2 cup vegetable oil

- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 3 teaspoons lemon juice or white-wine vinegar
- 2 teaspoons hot water
- 1. Using a food processor, blender or mixer set on medium speed, combine the egg yolk, salt, dry mustard and sugar until well-blended and a pale vellow.
- 2. With the motor running, slowly drizzle the oils (1/4 cup at a time) into the yolk mixture in a slow, steady stream. Drizzle in 1 tablespoon of the lemon juice and a teaspoon of the hot water. Continue to alternate mixing in the oil and the lemon juice until all the ingredients have been combined. The finished mayonnaise will be

thick. If a thinner consistency is desired, whisk in 1 or 2 teaspoons of hot water.

3. Cover and refrigerate for at least an hour before using to let the flavors blend. The mayonnaise will keep about 4 to 5 days. Yield: 1 1/4 cups.

The following additions add a unique flavor to this basic mayonnaise recipe:

Spices: saffron, paprika, cumin, mustard, coriander, chilies, horseradish/wasabi, ground ginger, curry powder and nutmeg.

Herbal Flavors: dill, parsley, basil, oregano, sage, cilantro, chives, chervil.

Other Flavors: grated lemon or orange zest, chutney, sun-dried tomatoes, capers, anchovy paste, pureed avocado, roasted red peppers, lime juice, ground dried wild mushrooms, pesto sauce, barbeque sauce, hot sauce, pureed mango or crushed pineapple, soy or Worcestershire sauce, honey mustard, minced garlic, purple or green onions, olives, diced sweet or dill pickles.

Oil Substitutions: Infused olive oils, sweet almond oil, canola oil, safflower oil, avocado oil.

Dear Paw's Corner: Every time I read an article about a badly behaved dog, the trainer says that the dog needs to relearn basic commands like sit. stay and lie down. Why would unrelated commands solve a behavior problem? — Edward in Albany, NY

Dear Edward: Every dog should be trained to respond to five basic commands: come, heel, sit, stay and lie down. Dogs need to obey their owner the first time and every time a command is issued.

That may sound a little harsh, but a dog that can"t be controlled is a dog in danger.

Owners need to be able to recall a dog that has slipped its leash before it runs into traffic. They need to make sure their dog will walk beside them and will sit calmly on command, especially when another

dog approaches. Their dog needs to stay in position when told to do so -- whether sitting or lying



Dogs aren't robots, though. Like us, their discipline and training will slip if not regularly reinforced. Think about how often you and I give in to temptation and take that second cookie (or third or fourth or fifth). Just as we humans sometimes need reinforcement of good habits, our dogs need regular reinforcement of basic commands.

When owners spend more time working oneon-one with their dogs, they frequently report that undesirable behaviors happen less often. The time and attention that owners give can quickly blunt attention-seeking behaviors.

Energetic young dogs can be a handful sometimes. If you are having trouble getting your dog to respond to basic commands, enlist the help of a professional trainer.

# Storing leftover garden seed

If you didn't use up all the garden seed you bought this year, much of it can be stored for use in next year's garden depending on the plant species. Seeds of some plants, such as corn, parsley, onion, viola (pansies), verbena, phlox and salvia, are not very long lived, lasting only one or two years at best. Other seeds, including beans, carrots, lettuce, peas, radishes, snapdragon, cosmos, sweet William and zinnia, will remain viable (capable of germinating) for three to five years.

Seeds need to be kept cool, dark and dry so that they retain stored carbohydrates and minimize fungal infection. You can keep the seeds in their original packets to preserve their labeling information. If you transfer the seeds to another container, be sure to label them with at least the plant name and the year the seed was purchased.

Either way, be sure the seed is as dry as possible before placing in storage.

One of the more practical methods for storing small quantities is to place leftover seed in sealable jars or other airtight containers and store in a cool, dark area, such as the refrigerator (not the freezer). A layer of powdered milk or uncooked rice at the bottom of the container will absorb excess moisture. Use a paper towel to separate the seed from the absorptive material.

When it's time to plant next season, you can do a germination test on a few seeds to see if they sprout before you plant the rest. But these days, many seed packets have only a few seeds to begin with, so the germination test may be a moot point. On the other hand, saving even a few seeds can make a big impact on next year's gardening budget.

# Paw's Corner

by Sam Mazzotta Treating a scratch under a dog's fur

Dear Paw's Corner: I took my Springer Spaniel, "Rog," for a walk in the woods this morning. When we got back, I noticed he was trying to lick a spot behind his shoulder. I found a thin scratch on his skin. I dabbed it with some antibacterial ointment, but that's about it. Will he be OK? -- Jessica in Jaffrey, NH

**Dear Jessica:** As long as the wound seems to be healing, Rog should be fine. Check the area

once a day and reapply antibacterial ointment. If it begins to appear puffy and red, or Rog seems very distressed by it, take him to the vet for further evaluation.

Most minor scratches on a dog's skin and paws can be treated at home using the household first-aid kit. You also can build a pet first-aid kit that is easy to access when you walk into the house. In addition to antibacterial ointment (avoid products with hydrocortisone), it should have antiseptic solution, water-based lu-

bricant like KY (not Vaseline), clean towels, an empty squeeze bottle (like a ketchup bottle), tick-removal tweezers, a muzzle, small scissors and a disposable razor to gently remove fur. (Electric clippers are an even safer option.)

To treat a small scratch or cut, fill the squeeze bottle with lukewarm water. Hold your dog securely, placing a muzzle on him to prevent bites if he gets agitated. Trim or shave away hair from the area. Gently clean the wound using the squeeze

bottle of water. Pat dry. Dab the antiseptic onto the wound, then apply antibiotic ointment. Cover lightly with a bandage if possible; otherwise, prevent your dog from licking away the ointment for at least 10 minutes. Check and reapply ointment daily as it heals.
