



DMV reminds motorcyclists to renew registrations by April 30 Registrations can be renewed and most motorcycles can be registered online

The NYS Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) is reminding motorcycle owners to renew their registrations before they expire April 30.

Motorcycles are registered for one year and all motorcycle registrations expire on April 30. Renewals can be done easily online, and most motorcycles that are being registered for the first

time can be registered online. You can learn more about registering your motorcycle for the first time, as well as renewing your registration, on the DMV website at at https://dmv.ny.gov/registrations-0.

"New York is a beautiful place to ride in the spring and summer, and we want to make sure every rider has that opportunity. Renewing your registration online is fast, easy and convenient," said DMV Commissioner Mark J. F. Schroeder. "As the weather continues to get warmer, drivers should expect to see more motorcyclists on the road, so I urge everyone to watch for riders and share the road responsibly.

Motorcycles must be inspected at least once every 12 months at a station DMV has licensed to perform motorcycle safety inspections. Customers should look for a yellow and black sign reading "Official NYS Motorcycle Inspection Station." You can look up registered businesses on the DMV website.

You cannot renew a registration that is suspended or revoked; is expired for more than a year; or if the motorcycle has not been inspected in the past 12 months. If the registration is expired for

more than a year, you will have to reregister it at a DMV office or by mail.

To be operated on public roadways, motorcycles must have liability coverage. This applies to motorcycles registered out-of-state as well as to those registered in New York.

Drivers are reminded that they are likely to see an increase in motorcyclists sharing the road. Drivers should watch for and give motorcyclists' room, just as they should be increasingly aware of bicyclists and pedestrians who are more commonly out in the warmer months.

Safety tips for drivers:

- Always allow a motorcyclist the full lane width - never try to share a lane.
- Check mirrors and blind spots before entering or exiting a lane of traffic, and at intersec-
- Always signal your intentions before changing lanes or merging with traffic.
- Allow more following distance three or four seconds when behind a motorcycle so the motorcyclist has enough time to maneuver or stop in an emergency.
- Never tailgate. In dry conditions, motorcycles can stop more quickly than cars.
- Never drive while distracted

Safety tips for motorcyclists:

- Avoid riding in poor weather conditions.
- Wear brightly colored protective gear and
- a DOT-compliant helmet.Use turn signals for every turn or lane change.
- Combine hand signals and turn signals to draw more attention to yourself.
- Use reflective tape and stickers to increase conspicuity.
- Position yourself in the lane where you will be most visible to other drivers.
- Never drive while impaired.

nationwide, and the yearlong efforts to support its mission to remember the fallen, honor those who serve and their families and teach the next generation the value of freedom. GSW is a Congressionally-chartered nonprofit service organization established 1945. Its mission is to exist to preserve and enhance benefits to surviving U.S. military spouses and children; to help its members and their children face the future with courage and determination; and to honor the memory of their military spouses who made the ultimate sacrifice.

The signed MOU between the two groups outlines nine key agreements, such as establishment of a steering committee with a representative from each organization and collaborative volunteer efforts to provide



opportunities for joint event and community service activities that bring awareness to both groups' missions.

"Since WAA was founded, Gold Star Wives have been involved in the mission and its members play an important part in the sharing the stories of character and service we hope to teach to the country," said Karen Worcester, executive director of WAA. "This official partnership is long overdue, and I'm eager to start our work together. Our combined efforts will no doubt help to shape and inform the next generation of patriots."

The current national president of GSW, Nancy Menagh, has devoted her life to service, not only as a military spouse supporting her husband, Captain Philip S. Menagh, U.S. Marine Corps, but continuing on long after his passing and teaching her children the importance of sacrifice and character – both served in the U.S. Air Force. She said, "Our membership is made up of the men and women left behind. While our loved one made the supreme sacrifice, we are the ones left to live that sacrifice every day. We are an organization that serves ... our spouses served and we serve!"

This year, National Wreaths Across America Day will take place on Saturday, Dec. 18 at over 2,500 participating locations nationwide. "The experience of placing a wreath at the final resting place of one of our nation's veterans and understanding the healing that this simple gesture has for so many families and the opportunity it provides to share the stories of these heroes, makes this an important partnership," Menagh concluded





Fort Plain Museum welcomes award-winning historian/author


Description

It was 1778, and the recent American victory at Saratoga had netted the U.S a powerful ally in France. Many, including General George Washington, presumed France's entrance into the war meant independence was just around the corner.

Meanwhile, having lost an entire army at Saratoga, Great Britain pivoted to a "southern strategy." The army would henceforth seek to regain its southern colonies, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia, a highly profitable segment of its pre-war American empire. Deep into 1780 Britain's new approach seemed headed for success as the U.S. economy collapsed and morale on the home front waned. By early 1781, Washington, and others, feared that France would drop out of the war if the Allies failed to score a decisive victory that year. Sir Henry Clinton, commander of Britain's army, thought "the rebellion is near its end." Washington, who had been so optimistic in 1778, despaired: "I have almost ceased to hope."

Ferling provides the dramatic story of how and why Great Britain-so close to regaining several southern colonies and rendering the postwar United States a fatally weak nation ultimately failed to win the war. Ferling explores the choices and decisions made by Clinton and Washington, and others, that ultimately led the French and American allies to clinch the pivotal victory at Yorktown that at long last secured American independence.

Author bio: John Ferling is Professor Emeritus of History at the University of West Georgia. A leading authority on American Revolutionary history, he has appeared in many documentaries and has written numerous books, including Almost a Miracle: The American Victory in the War for Independence, Adams vs. Jefferson: The Tumultuous Election of 1800, The First of Men: A Life of George Washington, Setting the World Ablaze: Washington, Adams, and Jefferson in the American Revolution, and the award-winning A Leap in the Dark: The Struggle to Create the American Republic.

The Kitchen Diva

After trying spring mix, I've become a fan of the interesting combination of flavors and textures. Now one of my favorite spring pastimes is visiting my local farmers market and looking at all the varieties of lettuce greens at their colorful best.

Spring mix, also known as "mesclun," is a name used for a salad mixture of leaves of various species. The name comes from the Spanish word "mezclar," which translates as "to mix." Traditional mesclun

usually consisted of chervil, arugula, lettuce and endive.

Now, spring mix is typically made up of 16 fresh greens and lettuces of varying tastes and textures, including red romaine, baby spinach, radicchio, green romaine, red oak leaf, mizuna, red leaf, lollo rosso, arugula, red mustard, green

mustard, red chard, frisee and tatsoi. About half of the greens and lettuces are sweet and mild, while others provide a complementary, slightly bitter edge.

Spring mix is available year-round with a peak season in spring and summer. These delicate greens contain a punch of flavor and are packed with vitamins A, C and E, calcium and potassium.

Here's an overview of the many types of spring mix lettuce greens.

Arugula or Rocket — Typically has long, spiked, dark green leaves and a strong, peppery flavor, especially when the leaves are larger and wild-harvested. Cultivated arugula varies in intensity of flavor, so taste before using. Arugula adds a bold punch to salads or an intense note as an ingredient in hearty dishes.

Little Gem lettuce — A mixture of soft leaves with a slight crunch, similar to butter lettuce in texture.

Mesclun — A combination of tender, wild-harvested or cultivated young greens. Most mesclun varieties include greens with texture and peppery flavor such as curly endive, mezzaluna, mustard leaves, watercress, arugula, purslane, cress, Asian greens like mizuna, red kale and chicory, and a few herbs such as cilantro, basil or parsley.

Mache, corn salad or lamb's lettuce — Grows in a tight bunch of 4 or 5 leaves attached to a root. It has more flavor and texture than most salad greens, but requires more care when cleaning because grit and dirt tend to settle in the rosette-shaped leaves near the roots.

Dandelion — Greens are a dark emerald color and are bitter. They add a distinctive flavor component when added raw, but lose some of their sharpness when cooked low and slow.

Escarole — Has a subtle bite, hearty tex-

10 tips to recognize ripe fruits

(Culinary.net) Keeping fresh fruit around the house provides a healthier alternative when your sweet tooth comes calling. Understanding how and when to buy at the peak of ripeness (or just before, in some cases) can help you avoid food waste while keeping your doctor happy.

Consider these simple tips for recognizing ripe fruits:

- Strawberries: Check the area at the top of the berry near the stem and leaves. A ripe strawberry is fully red; green or white near the top means the fruit
- Watermelon: The "field spot," or the area where the melon sat on the ground, should be yellow, and a tap on the rind should produce a hollow sound.
- Cherries: Flesh should appear dark with a crimson color and feel firm.
- Blueberries: Similar to cherries, color should deepen to dark blue. A reddish or pink color may be visible in unripe berries.

- Blackberries: Look for a smooth texture without any red appearance. Because blackberries don't ripen after being picked, they tend to spoil quickly.
- Cantaloupe: You should detect a sweet smell, and the melon should feel heavy upon lifting.
- Peaches: A sweet, fragrant odor should be apparent. Skin should feel tender but not soft.
- Pineapple: Smell is again an important factor for pineapple - a sweet scent shows it's ready, but a vinegary one likely means it's overripe.
- Raspberries: Generally follow the same rules as blackberries. Best eaten within a couple days of purchase, a bright red color represents ripe berries.
- Bananas: A ripe banana features a peel lightly spotted without significant bruising. Your best bet may be to purchase bananas still slightly green and allow them to ripen at home.

Add the greens, tomatoes, cucumbers, dried cherries or cranberries, and sunflower seeds into a large bowl or platter. Sprinkle with the salt and pepper, and toss lightly with desired amount of dressing (recipe follows), then top with crumbled goat cheese. Serves 4.

Maple balsamic dressing

- 4 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
- 2 teaspoons pure maple syrup or maple-flavored agave syrup

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup olive or vegetable oil

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

Whisk everything together in a medium bowl until emulsified, or place all the ingredients into a jar with a tight-fitting top and shake until everything is well-combined. Store remaining dressing in the fridge for up to 1 week. Shake to recombine the ingredients before using. Makes about 1/2 cup.


