

Three finalists selected for the NY AEM-Leopold Conservation Award

State Ag Commissioner Richard A. Ball recently announced the three finalists who have been selected for New York's Agricultural Environmental Management (AEM)-Leopold Conservation Award. Last year, NY's longstanding AEM Award joined forces with the nationally recognized Leopold Conservation Award® program to honor one farm, and its nominating Soil & Water Conservation District, for its outstanding efforts to promote and protect the environment through the preservation of soil and water quality while helping to ensure farm viability for future generations.

Ball said, "Congratulations to our three finalists in 2021, who are shining the spotlight on the environmental Best Management Practices (BMP) that are taking place on farms across the state every day. These family farms have long been dedicated to conservation practices that protect our precious natural resources, such as our land and our water, on their own farms and in their communities. I thank them for their leadership in this area; they are an inspiration to other landowners."

Kevin McAleese, Sand County Foundation president and CEO, said, "Recipients of this award are real life examples conservation-minded agriculture. These families hard-working are essential to our environment, food system and rural economy.

Given in honor of renowned conservationist Aldo Leopold, the Leopold Conservation Award (LCA) recognizes farmers and forestland owners who inspire others with their dedication to land, water and wildlife habitat management on working land. The award is presented to landowners in 22 states.

The finalists for the 2021 NY AEM-Leopold Conservation Award are:

- Greenfield Farms LLC of Skaneateles in Onondaga County: The Greenfields are fourth-generation farmers growing 1.400 acres of corn, soybeans, hav, wheat and oats. Located in the Skaneateles and Owasco Lake watersheds, the farm has adopted no-till and cover crop conservation practices to reduce erosion and build soil health. The Greenfields volunteered to be part of AEM's Whole Farm Plan process in 1994. They use variable rate technology to apply just the right amount of lime and fertilizers required to grow crops.
- Honorone Farm of Canajoharie in Montgomery County: Scott and Kathie Rvan and their son Justin operate a 90-cow dairy farm where they are committed to voluntary implementation of conservation BMP systems utilizing the AEM program. The farm's use of cover crops, reduced tillage practices and buffer areas improve soil health, reduce erosion and protect water quality. Cattle are rotationally grazed on pastures with grasses specifically selected to retain soil and provide higher quality feed.
- Table Rock Farm of Castile in Wyoming County: Meghan Hauser and Maureen De Gloyer milk 1,250 dairy cows and grow 1,800 acres of corn, hay and peas. Table Rock Farm is a long-time participant in many research studies that improve soil health and encourage conservation, including a three-year cover crop study with American Farmland Trust. Since 2003, the farm has progressed through all the tiers of the AEM program. The dairy developed an innovative manure storage system that destroys methane, a greenhouse gas.

Earlier this year, NYS Soil & Water Conservation Districts were encouraged to identify and nominate the best examples of conservation success in their district. Applications were reviewed by an independent panel of ag and conservation leaders.

Sand County Foundation, a national nonprofit conservation organization, will present the \$10,000 cash award with the support of NYS Department of Ag & Markets, AFT, CCE, the Ida and Robert Gordon Family Foundation, Farm Credit East, the NYS Agribusiness Association and USDA-NRCS.

The annual award will be presented later this summer. The farm honored will also be featured in a video promoting their award-winning conservation practices.

The first recipient of the NY AEM-Leopold Conservation Award was Sang Lee Farms of Peconic in Suffolk County in 2020.



Bat awareness

Montgomery County Public Health would like to raise awareness to residents regarding recent reports of bat exposures. Bats reside throughout New York State in both rural and urban areas. Keeping bats out of your home is a good first step in protecting yourself against rabies. Bats are just one of the carriers of rabies; other vectors include raccoons, skunks and foxes.

To bat-proof your home, use polypropylene bird netting, fly screening, sheet metal, wood or various caulking compounds to close or cover openings that allow entry to the roost. Bats like to roost in attics, behind shutters, under roofing or siding, on the underside of a porch roof, between the house and chimney, in vents, on rafters, behind hollow walls and in other sheltered

areas of homes and buildings. If you suspect bats are roosting in your house, watch for them leaving at dusk and make sure there are no more bats coming from the roost. Seal off any crevice observed, being aware that bats can enter through crevices as small as a pencil. The best time to bat-proof is late autumn through winter. Area wildlife and bat control specialists are available for hire in the surrounding area.

Bats infected with rabies quickly show signs. Avoid contact with any bat, especially one that is outdoors during the daylight, on the ground or paralyzed. Bats rarely attack humans; however, any physical contact with a rabid bat may transmit the disease. In some situations a bat bite could go undetected, such as when a bat is found in a room with a sleeping person, or next to an unattended young child or pet. If there is

any chance that contact with a bat has occurred to a person or pet, or you are not sure if contact has occurred, capture the bat without touching it. If indoors, close windows and room and closet doors, turn on lights and wait for the bat to land. Wearing heavy gloves, cover the bat with a pail, coffee can or similar container. If the bat is not captured or tests positive for rabies, every person that had a reasonable probability of exposure should receive rabies post exposure treatment as soon as possible. Immediately call Montgomery County Public Health 518.853.3531.

Family-friendly volunteering opportunities abound, and the following are some ways that families can give back together.



Choosing a theme can mind that the hours of direct sunlight can change over the course of the growing season.

Raised beds are a great choice for beginning gardeners. One or two 4-ft. x 4-ft. beds is a nice size to get started. Containers are another great option. A five-gallon bucket is a great size for a tomato plant. You can use smaller containers for other plants or combine some smaller plants in a large container. Grow bags are another inexpensive choice.

Know the first and last frost dates for your area to plan accordingly. You can search the National Gardening Association's website (garden. org/apps/frost-dates) or check the websites of garden and seed companies. Many have online search generators where you can put in your zip code to get

Do you love to make pizza with your family? Let's go through the planning process for this themed garden. The same process can be applied for other themed gardens.

Brainstorm ingredients you might need for your pizza. Think of everything from sauce to toppings to garnishes. Your list may be extensive and include tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, zucchini, spinach and basil.

Narrow down your ideas by researching space and sunlight requirements, and days to maturity to make your selections. Take your list to your local garden center for help choosing suitable varieties.

Plant your seeds or starts carefully, ensuring they have enough space. Make sure larger plants won't shade smaller plants later in the season. The little seedlings you plant now will grow tremendously over time.

Water your garden regularly and keep the weeds to a minimum. Consider using an organic fertilizer or adding compost during the growing season. Check your plant tags for any additional care your plant might need.

Soon enough, you'll have tomatoes for sauce, basil for pesto and several pizza-topping options you grew yourself!

Protect pets in hot weather

Warm weather brings many changes. Warm weather can make travel more enjoyable and affords people more time to comfortably enjoy the great outdoors.

It's best to keep safety in mind when soaking up the sun. That's important for all members of the family, including pets. Cats and dogs are as susceptible to heat-related illnesses as their human companions.

Recognize heat stroke

Pets can suffer from heat stroke, according to the American Red Cross. Certain breeds of dogs are highly susceptible, particularly those with short snouts, such as pugs and bulldogs. Excessive exercise in hot weather, lack of appropriate shelter outdoors and leaving a dog in a hot car may precipitate an episode of heat stroke. It's important to get the pet out of direct heat right away and check for signs of shock, which include seizures, a body temperature of 104° F or higher, stupor, increased heart rate, or excessive panting. Placing water-soaked towels on the pet's feet, head, neck and abdomen can bring down its temperature.

Be cautious of hot surfaces

Humans wear shoes on their feet for protection, but pets do not have that luxury. Think about how hot your feet can feel when you scurry barefoot across hot sand en route to the shoreline or to cross a deck to get to the pool. When the sun beats down on surfaces, those surface temperatures rise quickly. According to a 2010 study by Liberty Home and Pet Services, at peak

afternoon sun and an ambient temperature of 95° F in southern Florida, the temperature of cement was measured at 125° F, red brick at 135° F, blacktop at 140° F, and grass at 102° F. Individuals who think a car is safer for their dog or cat may be surprised the informal study measured 152° F on seat surfaces.

Provide extra water

It's likely you will need to fill your pets' water bowls more frequently in warm weather than during other times of the year. Be sure to provide constant access to fresh water, even for young puppies that may be learning to house train.

Avoid cutting fur too short


If a veterinarian suggests a hair cut may be beneficial for keeping a pet cool or comfortable, resist the urge to shave down to the skin. Having at least one inch of fur will protect the pet from sunburn.

Outdoor hazards

Warm weather may bring out a high number of insects and wildlife. Use a flea and tick preventative product and medication to protect against diseases. Snakes, skunks, raccoons, foxes and other animals may be roaming around, and a scuffle with your pet can result in injury.

- Using damp hands, press mixture firmly into prepared pan. Refrigerate until firm, about 2 hours. Cut into 12 bars.
- Dip bottoms of bars into melted chocolate. Place on wax paper lined pan; refrigerate until ready to serve. Store in tight covered container in refrigerator.

• Voice concerns and keep communication



Securing a trustworthy pet sitter

Welcoming a pet of any kind into a home can be a lesson in love as well as one in responsibility. Pet owners must take various steps to ensure the safety and well being of a companion animal, and that includes providing for that animal while on vacation.

How long pets can remain at home alone depends on the pet, its age and its overall health. For example, an aquarium full of fish may be able to thrive for a week with the assistance of an automatic feeder. Dogs, however, will need daily bathroom breaks and feedings, said the Animal Humane Society. Adult dogs may be able to 'hold it' for 10 to 12 hours, but young puppies and elderly dogs likely need more frequent breaks outside.

Pet sitters can address pets' needs while their owners are away. But finding one that will care for a pet like he or she is a member of the family can take some time and effort. Hill's Pet Nutrition suggested beginning the process of finding a pet sitter by making a list of needs. Considerations to

include are whether the pet sitter should be in one's home or if the pet is to be brought to a pet care facility or a private sitter's residence. The pet may have particular health care requirements that also need to be addressed, such as a dog who requires insulin shots for diabetes.

While friends and family may be the first choices as pet sitters, there are benefits to using professional pet sitters. A professional sitter is properly trained in the care of many different animals, according to Pet Sitters International. He or she may have a local business license and be insured and bonded. Kefir is a nutrient-dense dairy product

airy offers a bevy of nutritional benefits that have been well documented throughout the years. Dairy is a great source calcium, which bodies need to develop and maintain strong bones and teeth. Milk, cheese and yogurt are popular sources of dairy, but kefir is another dairy product you may want to explore. Kefir is a cultured milk beverage that is formed by fermenting milk with a starter culture of key bacteria and yeasts. While North Americans may not be entirely familiar with kefir, it has been popular in Eastern Europe, the Middle East and parts of the Mediterranean for centuries. Kefir is formed by mixing a culture of yeasts and bacteria, called kefir grains, with milk. The kefir grains, which form a substance that looks something like cauliflower, will ferment the milk. As the milk ferments, it froths and thickens. The beverage will take on a sour flavor and sometimes it can be left to ferment longer and turn into an alcoholic beverage. Often kefir is mixed with other ingredients to make it sweeter and more palatable.

Kefir was traditionally made with camel, sheep, goat, or cow milk. Kefir grains would be added to the milk stored inside a skin bag that would be hung by a doorway. The bag would be shaken by anyone coming through the doorway to constantly mix the milk and keir grains together. It could take up to 18 hours for the kefir beverage to fully mature at room temperature.

Although both kefir and yogurt are cultured milk products, they do have some differences. Kefir contains several major strains of body-friendly bacteria that are not commonly found in

yogurt. These include Lactobacillus Caucasus, Leuconostoc, Acetobacter, and Streptococcus. Some research indicates that kefir can actually colonize the intestinal tract, creating beneficial probiotics that are efficient at resisting intestinal parasites and pathogens, such as E. coli. Kefir also contains highly beneficial yeasts. Some have touted kefir as being one of the most potent probiotic foods available. According to a 2011 article in the Journal of Dairy Science, the healthy bacteria in kefir can improve digestive issues and also may help in treating colitis by regulating the inflammatory response of cells in the intestines. Furthermore, components in kefir may play other roles in allergic response and inflammation as they relate to immune system

Many stores now stock kefir in their dairy departments alongside milk, cheese and yogurt. Those who cannot find kefir can make their own quite easily. Kefir grains can be purchased online and then mixed with dairy products of one's choosing. Kefir also can be made from "alternative" milk sources for those who have lactose intolerance. Soy, almond and coconut milks also can be used to provide many of the probiotic benefits found in dairy kefir.

Dust Mite Allergy Triggers Cough

Dear Dr. Roach: For months, I have had a persistent cough that I have been unable to get help with. I saw an allergist about three years ago and was told I am allergic to dust mites. I was first referred to a lung doctor where X-rays showed that my cheek sinus drains were completely blocked, and then to an ear, nose and throat doctor, who also confirmed this diagnosis.

This ENT doctor recommended I have surgery to unblock the drains and clear out the sinus area. I understand that sinus drainage can cause coughing and wonder if this would still make me cough. I sometimes cough until I can cough up something, and this seems to stop my cough for a while. I was using a nasal rinse for a while until about two weeks ago when it caused my nose to bleed. The ENT doctor prescribed antibiotics and oral steroids that did not make any difference. It doesn't seem to make any difference whether I'm home or sitting in the doctor's office, I'm still coughing. What is the best way to deal with dust mite allergy? - J.S.

Answer: There are many causes of chronic cough, but postnasal drip is at the top of the list. Dust mites are indeed a common allergen, and symptoms may include runny nose, watery eyes, sneezing and cough from postnasal drip. Specific treatment for dust mites should include physical barriers, such as covers for pillows and mattresses, and sometimes for other soft surfaces, like furniture cushions, but this is only part of an effective strategy. Removing as many fabrics as possible (draperies, carpets, stuffed children's toys) where dust mites can live is essential. Regular cleaning is necessary, and high efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filters for vacuuming have been shown to reduce dust mites. A low-humidity environment can be very effective in discouraging dust mites, and cooler air - especially at night - can reduce irritation of nasal passages caused by dry air. Many interventions for a prolonged period are necessary to reduce dust mite infestation and the symptoms associated with them.

This is critical, because the issue of the sinuses is probably secondary to ongoing allergic exposure. Fixing your sinuses will not fix your ongoing symptoms. Without control of the allergens, you will continue to have symptoms and may even develop sinus blockages again, no matter how good a job the surgeon does on your sinuses.

To your good health

Dear Dr. Roach: I am 90 years old. My husband and I donated blood as often as needed, over 100 times, but last week my doctor said I tested positive for syphilis. I about fell off my chair. I haven't slept for four nights. Have you ever heard of this? - E.

Answer: The screening test for syphilis, called the VDRL or RPR test, is not particularly accurate. About 1-2% of people will have a false positive result. Meaning, the test is positive but they do not have syphilis. There are many possible causes, such as infection and autoimmune disease, like lupus, but some people, particularly older people, will have a positive test for no identifiable reason.

In your case, I am sure it is a false positive, but your doctor may do a more specific test, such as an FTA-ABS, to be 100% sure. You shouldn't let it keep you awake at night.

Natural tick repellents to protect pooches

nificant concern for people across the country. According to an analysis of insurance records by the CDC, each year approximately 476,000 Americans are diagnosed and treated for Lyme disease. But Lyme disease is not the only tick-borne problem. Data from the CDC say instances of Rocky Mountain spotted fever and anaplasmosis grew by 244% and 396%, respectively, between 2009 and 2017.

Blacklegged ticks are typically the culprits in disease transmission. When this tick latches on to a host, bacteria that causes Lyme and other diseases can be transmitted if the tick remains attached for 36 to 48 hours or more. Ticks will attach themselves to any moving living target, including people. But individuals who own dogs may be at increased risk because dogs often bring ticks indoors. Dogs as well as humans can be susceptible to the same tick-borne illnesses.

Pet parents are urged to use some sort of flea and tick preventative medication for their companion animals. But it's important that pet owners recognize that many such products will defend against ticks only after they've latched onto a host. According to the Hills company, a pet food manufacturer, oral and topical tick medications work by killing ticks through doses of certain compounds that are not potent enough to harm most pets, but are effective at terminating ticks. Many flea and tick products do not repel parasites. Therefore, pet owners may want to take added measures to keep ticks off of their pets. While it is best to discuss all-natural tick repellents for dogs with a vet, these methods are generally considered safe.

• Turmeric oil: A 2018 study published in Ticks and Tick Borne Diseases indicated turmeric oil was effective in keeping ticks

from hanging onto a dog's coat. The percentage of dogs with ticks attached to the legs or belly who were sprayed with turmeric oil suspension was significantly lower than that of unsprayed dogs and dogs sprayed with an orange oil suspension.

• Geranium oil: Gardeners have long relied on geraniums as natural repellents against many pests. The plant has a woodsy, musky fragrance. A 2013 study published in the Journal of Agricultural and Food Chemistry found the oil has repellent activity against nymphs of the Lone Star tick.

Pyrethrins/Pyrethroids: These are a group of botanical insecticides that work by altering the nerve function in insects, resulting in death of the parasite. Compounds are extracted from chrysanthemum flowers. Low toxicity means they can be applied directly to a pet's coat, according to the pet

health resource PetMD.

The pet guide Top Dog Tips suggests other natural oils like lavender, peppermint, citrus, rose, basil, cinnamon and lemongrass can be effective tick repellents for dogs. Dilute these oils in wa-

ter or a carrier-oil like olive oil before spraying on a pet. While many of these repellents are effective, nothing is 100% foolproof, so individuals should always check pets (and themselves) after being in tick territory.

What to know about outdoor living spaces

Home trends come and go. What was popular as recently as a decade ago may have lost some luster in the eyes of today's homebuyers. foolproof. Some pets can get under or over fences, which means additional precautions may be needed. Pet owners can try burying chicken wire under the ground at the base of the fence or install a tall or smoothfaced fence that cannot be jumped or scaled.

Wireless pet containment system

Wireless systems use sensors on pet collars that are triggered when pets breach the perimeter barrier set on the fences. Certain systems use an audible correction on the collar, while others may employ a static correction that is startling but not harmful.

on other nuisance behaviors such as urine marking or baying. Generally, vets recommend desexing animals before they are able to breed, which also reduces overpopulation.

Designate a safe room

Pets may attempt to escape when they hear loud noises or become confused. This may occur during a house party, when fireworks are going off or even during thunderstorms. During storms or celebrations, keep a skittish pet in a dark, quiet room with comforting bedding and toys.

These strategies can reduce instances of pets wandering away from home.

1. Leave no trace

According

In addition to carry in/carry out policies for belongings and trash, Leave No Trace components involve making an effort not to disturb any plants and animals, hiking in appropriate areas, and using care when camping. 2. Manage pet waste

The Environmental Protection Agency estimates that, in the US, pet dogs produce more than eight billion pounds of feces each year, which equates to three-quarters of a pound per dog every day. Dog waste can contain bacteria and even cryptosporidium, a parasite that infects humans.

Even though animal waste is organic, leaving

smells bad and attracts flies and vermin. It's important for park visitors to pick up after their companion animals.

3. Reduce waste

It can take roughly 450 years for a plastic water bottle to biodegrade. Even if they finally break down, bottles made from polyethylene terephalate (PET) can leave toxins in the soil and threaten fresh water. Use a reusable bottle instead of a single-use alternative when visiting the park. If plastic bottles must be used, be sure to place them in recycling containers around the park.

4. Volunteer

Individuals can volunteer to pick up trash at their local parks. Various conservation groups and organizations organize trash pick-up events each
