



Kale for autumn harvest

If your kale plants succumbed to cabbage worms, don't fret. You can start a second planting in midsummer to enjoy a bountiful harvest in the fall.

Kale is a good choice for succession planting because it thrives in cool weather, tolerates frost and matures quickly (40-65 days). This also applies to other plants with the same attributes such as collard greens, Swiss chard and leaf lettuce.

Before you begin, check the average frost date for your USDA hardiness zone at planthardiness.ars.usda.gov. Using this information, you can compute an appropriate planting schedule.

After the summer solstice, the days get shorter and the air gets cooler. This causes plants to grow more slowly than in the spring. For this reason, it is important to include a couple of extra weeks to the "days to maturity" listing on your seed packet to determine a suitable planting date.

To find your midsummer planting date, add 14 days to

the days of maturity, and use this sum to count back from the average frost date.

As usual, remember to choose disease-resistant varieties. If you have kale seeds left

over from spring, use them.

Otherwise, this is a great time to try a new variety, such as red Russian kale (Brassica napus var. pabularia) with light blue-green leaves and purple stems. With 50 days to maturity, this colorful variety is a good choice for direct seeding in midsummer and makes a stunning addition to any vegetable plot.

To prepare your planting

area, begin by pulling the early-season plants that have bolted or look tired.

Weed the area and remove


Weed the area and remove the roots from the previous crops. Next, add some compost to replenish the nutrients and turn over the soil.

Direct seed the kale in a space previously occupied by a different vegetable plant. This practice of crop rotation helps balance soil nutrients and avoids propagating plant-specific diseases.

Once your seeds are in the ground, protect your seedlings from the sun. Add a layer of mulch, and keep the soil moist. If possible, use a shade cloth to keep the soil cool or take advantage of tall vegetables nearby to provide natural shade.

A shade cloth that completely covers your seedlings also can stop white butterflies from laying eggs on your plants. Later, this will prevent an infestation of cabbage worms.

During the cool days of autumn when other plants begin to slow down, kale continues to grow and develop a sweeter taste. You also may find that you will reap a better harvest in the fall since most insects do not survive cold temperatures.

Getting the garden ready for vacation

As we finally begin to emerge from the pandemic, and travel options are opening up, many of us are planning to be away from home this summer or fall. Just as we need to make arrangements for the care of our homes and pets, our gardens also will need some attention in our absence.

Other gardeners in your neighborhood may be planning trips as well, so it may be worthwhile to ask around. Take turns checking in on each other's gardens. As an added bonus, you can see how other gardeners manage their space and what they are growing.

There are some things you can do to ensure your garden is thriving when you return, even if you are fortunate enough to have a neighbor or friend who is willing to check periodically.

If your planned absence is a month or more in the future, begin to water your garden more deeply and less frequently now. This will help the plants adjust to going longer periods without water.

You also can try adding mulch to those beds that require more water. Straw is a great option for this. Avoid using hay as it can contain weed seeds.

You can make a simple drip irrigation watering system out of used plastic water bottles for plants that need to be watered regularly. Dig a hole near the plant to hold the upside-down bottle upright. Use a nail to poke a few holes in the lid of the bottle. Fill the bottle with water and place upside down in the hole you dug. Water will slowly drip out and keep your plant watered. This also is a great solution for containers that dry out quickly.

One to two weeks before travel, begin to work on clearing your garden of weeds. Getting the weeds out will maximize the water available for your garden plants and ensure smaller plants are not blocked from sunlight.

This is also the time to harvest everything that is ripe. Remove all the ripe vegetables from your garden and eat, share or preserve them. Those ripe vegetables will start to rot and make more to clean up on your

Keep an eye on the forecast just before you leave. If it looks like it will be dry during your trip, water the garden well in the days leading up to your departure.

Resist the temptation to fertilize plants just before you go. The plants will need more water because of the increase in growth.

Herbs, tomatoes and other vegetables planted in containers typically need frequent watering throughout the season so can suffer in your absence. Move them into a shady spot that is protected from wind.

Consider setting up drip irrigation using the plastic bottle technique discussed above. Watering spikes, which work in the same way, can be purchased at your local gardening center.

These tips will still apply for travel during September and October as the growing season winds down. You should prioritize being aware of the forecast and adjust watering accordingly. With the cooler temperatures of autumn, you will likely want to water less intensely before you leave.

When you return from your trip, check for ready-toharvest vegetables and tidy up any that have fallen or rotted. Water as needed.

Follow these tips, and your garden might not even notice you were gone.

To Your Good Health

by Keith Roach, M.D. Chronic vs. Acute Pain

Dear Dr. Roach: What is the difference between chronic pain and acute pain? How can I best describe my chronic pain when it is variable in intensity but negatively impacts so much of my life and my activities? Are there things my doctor should consider or suggest in my treatment or in communicating with me?

Answer: Acute pain is usually due to an injury or infection, and we expect healing to occur relatively quickly. Chronic pain is expected to go on for at least six months. In some people, acute pain is not treated adequately at the time of injury, and the brain and body learn to be in pain chronically.

The reason for pain is perfectly obvious in some cases, but in others, it is not possible to identify the exact cause of pain. Most times, pain is due to damaged nerves (neuropathic pain), injury or degeneration in the musculoskeletal system (osteoarthritis and many kinds of back pain), inflammatory pain (due to infection or inflammatory diseases like rheumatoid arthritis) and compressive pain (such as kidney stones or cancer).

Chronic pain affects many parts of your life, and an experienced doctor will ask about the effect of pain on your social life, mood (depression is very common), relationships, sleep, exercise and occupation. People with more severe problems will have limitations in their activities of daily living.

Many people with chronic pain have almost given up communicating the scope of the problems they have, as they don't like "complaining" all the time, or they feel their loved ones are tired of hearing about it. However, getting a thorough history of the effect of all these dimensions of pain is important for your doctor. Questionnaires like the Brief Pain Inventorv address more areas

of function than a typical 1-10 pain scale and may be useful to monitor response to treatment. Experts in pain management are more likely to have the knowledge and experience to communicate about pain effectively, and truly effective treatment for chronic pain requires understanding it.

There can be pain without suffering. Suffering is the emotional component brought on by fear: "How bad am I going to hurt today? Will I ever be able to work again? All of my relationships are suffering." Learning to live a function-centered life is key in the treatment of chronic pain. It isn't easy and requires a multidisciplinary approach.

The time of prescribing pain medications, especially opiates, without a comprehensive plan for long-term pain management, should be over.

Dear Dr. Roach: I'm a 79-year-young female and take one 200-mg tablet of magnesium oxide before bedtime to keep leg cramps at bay. I sleep really deeply and wonder if it has side effects or long-term consequences? I'm generally not a sound sleeper, so taking the MagOx daily seems to help me get a good night's rest. - .I L

Answer: Magnesium oxide in the low dose of 200 mg is quite safe for most people. It is often used as an antacid at up to four times that dose. Diarrhea is the major side effect. In people with kidney disease, magnesium should be used with caution, and only at the advice of a physician.

It doesn't help everyone with leg cramps, but it is effective for some people, anecdotally. I have not heard of it making people sleep more deeply.



Herkimer **BOCES** wasn't able to host a graduation ceremony last summer for the 2019-20







Safety first when clearing land

New homeowners often see their homes as blank canvasses. Looking at a home as a blank canvas is typically associated with its interior, but it also can apply to landscaping.

Homes are empty of furniture and decorative items like photos and art on the walls when new homeowners move in. That makes it easy to see the interior of a home as a blank canvas. But that's not always so easy in the garden or the yard, where brush, overgrown plants or trees and other eyesores might have been left behind by the previous owners. A landscape must be cleared out before it can be seen as a blank canvas. Though clearing land may seem like a straightforward process, no one knows what lies beneath overgrowth or neglected areas of a yard or garden. Do-it-your-selfers can typically clear land on their own, but some safety strategies should be kept in mind to ensure the process goes smoothly.





appropriate Personal protecequipment should be worn when clearing land. The appropriate PPE when clearing land includes attire and other gear that many homeowners likely already have on hand. A long-sleeve shirt, puncture proof pants and gloves and slip-resistant work boots should be worn when clearing land. Homeowners also may want to invest in a hard hat if they will be cutting branches off of trees or cutting trees down. A face shield also may be a good bet depending on the scale and potential dangers of the project.

• Contact your utility company. Overhead power and telephone lines are visible to the naked eye,

and homeowners should be conscious of those lines as they cut any high branches. But underground lines are not visible, and that can make clearing land dangerous. Homeowners are urged to contact their utility companies before they begin to clear any land so they can determine if any underground lines are beneath areas they intend to clear out.

• Get a lay of the land. Carefully inspect the area to be cleared prior to starting the project. Inspections can reveal the density of any vegetation that may need to be removed and reveal if there are any harmful plants like poison ivy growing. Many DIYers can remove small trees on their own, but a professional tree service may be necessary for large trees or those located close to

the house. Homeowners won't want to cut down a tree, even a small one, if it can potentially fall onto the house. In addition, homeowners who are unfamiliar with chippers or stump grinders may be better of hiring a tree service to clear trees.

• Don't go it alone. No one should clear land alone. Even small projects are best tackled by at least two people. Should someone get injured during the project, the presence of another person ensures someone can immediately call for help. In addition, clearing land can be more difficult than it appears, and having at least two people to pull old shrubs or carry tree branches reduces the risk of injury.

Safety should be the utmost priority as homeowners prepare to clear land on their properties.

Grilled Lobster Tails with Nectarine Sauce

A simply prepared dish that's sure to impress, perfectly grilled lobster with a sweet, spicy, citrusy sauce makes a complexly flavored and delicious main dish.

Ingredients:

- 2 nectarines
- 1 scallion
- Juice of 3 limes
- 1 lime
- 2 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil

1/2 teaspoon sea salt

1/4 teaspoon finely minced seeded habanero pepper

4 lobster tails

Directions:

- 1. In a food processor, puree nectarines, scallion, 2 tablespoons lime juice, 1 tablespoon olive oil, 1/4 teaspoon salt and habanero pepper. Transfer to a medium bowl and set aside.
- 2. Heat grill to medium-high. In a small bowl, whisk together re-

maining lime juice, olive oil and salt. Split lobster tails lengthwise, remove membrane if desired and brush meat with the lime-oil glaze. Place lobsters on grill, meat side down, and roast for 4 minutes; turn over to shell side and grill until meat is opaque and cooked through, 4 to 5 minutes more.

3. Transfer to a platter, garnish with lime wedges, and serve with reserved nectarine sauce. Serves 4.

home. The following are five pampering ideas to explore.


1. Take a nap



Grilling turns the breakfast tables on a beloved staple

Grillmasters insist that just about everything tastes a little better when cooked over a flame. Even though grilling often is reserved for lunch or dinner, there's something to be said about preparing breakfast on those hot grates as well.

According to Andrew Schloss and David Joachim, authors of the cookbook "Mastering the Grill: The Owner's Manual for Outdoor Cooking" (Chronicle Books), there's reckless abandon involved in standing by an open fire in a robe preparing breakfast. It can turn a mundane morning into one right out of a camping expedition. For their "Grilled French Toast," the extra crunch and slight char grilling provides catapults this breakfast staple to another level of flavor.

Grilled Stuffed French Toast Makes 4 servings

- 1 loaf Italian bread 8 ounces cream cheese, at room temperature
- 4 tablespoons confectioners' sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
 - 3/4 cup blueberries
- 5 eggs
- 11/2 cups half-andhalf or milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Pinch of kosher salt Oil for coating grill grate

1/4 cup Orange Honey-Butter Glaze (see below)

1. Cut off and discard a small diagonal slice from each end of the bread. Cut the bread on the diagonal into about eight 1 1/2-inch-thick slices. Cut a slit through the top crust of each slice to form

a deep pocket.

- 2. In a medium bowl, mix together the cream cheese, 3 tablespoons of the confectioners' sugar, and the almond extract. Stir in the blueberries and spoon the filling equally into the bread pockets. Lay the stuffed slices of bread in a shallow 4-quart baking dish, such as a 15-by-10-inch dish.
- 3. Clean and dry the bowl, then use it to whisk together the eggs, half-and-half, vanilla extract, salt, and remaining 1 tablespoon confectioners' sugar. Pour the mixture evenly over the bread. Carefully tilt the pan and swirl the egg mixture to completely coat the bread. Let sit for 30 minutes, or cover and refrigerate for up to 8 hours.
- 4. Heat the grill to 350 F for a gas grill, medium ash for charcoal, and medium ash for wood.

5. Brush the grill grate and coat it with oil. Put the French toast on the grill and cook until nicely browned and crisp on the outside, about 5 minutes per side. Transfer to a platter and, using a pastry or basting brush, brush both sides with the Orange Honey-Butter Glaze.







What would you do if you had 1,416 days to live? That is the heart-breaking question the staff at Montgomery County SPCA had to ask resident Rocky recently. "This week, we received the unfortunate news that a tumor that was removed from Rocky has come back positive for cancer," said Michael Buckley, Interim Executive Director of the MCSPCA. "Rocky has been diagnosed with Keloidal Fibrosarcoma, and has been given an estimated survival time of 2-3 years. We were all shocked to hear it, but it made us work harder than ever to find the right family for this wonderful dog. He deserves a loving home for these remaining years."

Buckley explained that since the tumor is only a grade one, Rocky's time

with his new family could be longer, and it is very unlikely the tumor will grow in other places. The tumor most likely will grow back in the original area and will require continued surgeries to remove it when it does come back.

The staff circulated a memo with an imagined response from Rocky to his news. "1,416 days?!

That is like 9,912 dog days, I could do so much! I could go for a long walk or go for a car ride to get a hamburger and go for another walk! I have endless energy, so I really like going for walks. Make more friends! I would really like to have a dog friend to play with, I bet I could make a lot of friends in all that time! But that still leaves me with so many days! Maybe my walks could turn into hikes, or boat rides? I have never been on a boat, but maybe I will love it! The world is just a beautiful place, and I want to be able to see it all!"





here is in the splashing of the creek a great spray of diamonds. As each youngster sails like an astronaut out on the tire swing, then releases the hold on the earth to flail, suspended in time and space for that brief second or two, there is a timelessness, a postponement of all things evil and destructive, an affirmation of joy.

The swimming hole in Lewis Creek has been there since Indian times, of course, and the tire swing was probably preceded by simply a rope with knots in it. It is one of the summer lodestones of our existence. Each summer we have to make our pilgrimage in the hot sun to the hole below the little waterfall, to the place where Lewis Creek widens and deepens for the benefit of hot, dry people before becoming just a creek again. And in this widening of the creek, this sacred place in our summer lives, we also play witness to the passage of years.

Across the creek from the tree with the tire swing, the gravelly bottom extends gently with almost no current for 10 feet or so. This is the baby beach, where

squealing tots are allowed to cool off without benefit (or hindrance) of any more covering than the smiles of their parents. As the children grow, they venture farther out into the current of the creek and test their strength against the forces of nature. By the time a youngster is eight or 10, the seduction of the tire swing becomes overwhelming and the flailing of the arms and legs against the blue of the sky begin. Later still, when gangliness becomes fluidity and sleekness, and we want to make catlike moves to attract the opposite sex, the tire is used as a swinging platform for exquisite dives into the deep part of the creek where the big trout lie in cold holes.

And as we age, and we watch our children come to love the hole in Lewis Creek, and as we sip lemonade in the shade as our grandchildren work their ways up the swimming hole chain of life, we can look at the splashing of the creek and see, with each sleek dive, with each laughing bellyflop, the diamonds of the creek sent skyward, and the laughter stays with us and keeps us strong and makes us feel rich, and fortunate.



It is unnecessary to say the hole in Lewis Creek is an important part of our lives, because it, along with so many other treasures of the years, really is our lives.


