

• Sept. 11, 10 a.m. - 2 p.m.: Book Arts – Journal Making

In this book arts workshop you will create two

open-spine, hardcover books. Participants will plan a journal or scrapbook, punch, fold their folios into signatures and then bind with two Coptic stitching methods. They will then cover their hardboards with decorative cover paper, assemble the parts together and it's a book! After making the journal we will venture out into the woods of Beaversprite for naturalist-led exploration and nature journaling. The cost for this workshop is \$65/person and includes all materials. Light refreshments will be provided, but registrants are welcome to bring a lunch.

• Sept. 18, 2:30 - 3:30 p.m.: Introduction to Nepalese Pulp-painting

During this workshop you will be introduced to the wonder of pulp-painting! The various colored pulp is produced from recycled T-shirts. This technique is inspired by the Nepalese paper makers who format sheets by pouring liquid pulp into large screens that are submerged under water. The screens are then lifted out of the shallow basin and allowed to dry in the sun. Each participant will be guided through the basic process on how to pour different colored pulp into a submerged screen to create one Nepalese pulp-painting. Good Housekeeping - Three-Cheese Pizza

This recipe features three cheeses with distinctly different textures and flavors – delicate, fresh mozzarella, creamy ricotta and chewy Pecorino Romano.

Ingredients:

- 1 pound fresh pizza dough
- 4 ounces fresh mozzarella cheese, coarsely shredded
 - 1/2 cup part-skim ricotta cheese
- 1/3 cup freshly grated Pecorino Romano cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon coarsely ground black pepper
 - 1 tablespoon chopped fresh

parsley leaves

Directions:

- 1. Prepare outdoor grill for covered, direct grilling on medium-low.
- 2. Cut dough into 4 equal pieces. On one end of oiled cookie sheet, with fingertips, spread and flatten 1 piece of dough to about 1/8-inch thickness. (Edge does not need to be even.) On same cookie sheet, repeat with another piece of dough. Repeat with a second oiled cookie sheet and remaining dough.
- 3. Place all 4 pieces of dough, oiled side down, on hot grill grate. Cook 2 to

3 minutes or until grill marks appear on underside (dough will stiffen and puff).

- 4. With tongs, turn crusts over. Working quickly, top crusts with mozzarella; then dollop with ricotta and sprinkle with Pecorino Romano cheese and pepper. Cover grill and cook pizzas 3 to 4 minutes longer or until undersides are evenly browned and cooked through.
- 5. Transfer to cutting board; sprinkle tops of pizzas with parsley. Cut into wedges. Makes 4 servings.

Tip: Look for fresh pizza dough in the dairy section of your supermarket, usu-

ally sold near the tortillas. (Frozen pizza dough is also available, but it takes several hours to thaw before it can be used)

• Each serving: About 435 calories, 15g total fat (7g saturated), 38mg cholesterol, 260mg sodium, 56g total carbohydrate, 2g dietary fiber, 18g protein.



Governor's Traffic Safety Committee announces results of statewide speeding enforcement campaign

The Governor's Traffic Safety Committee (GTSC) announced that law enforcement agencies across the state issued 23,087 tickets for speeding during Speed Awareness Week, which ran from July 31 - Aug. 8. During that time, officers also issued 37,746 tickets for other vehicle and traffic law violations, such as impaired and distracted driving.

"New York has zero tolerance for reckless driving behaviors, such as speeding, that needlessly put all those sharing the road at risk," DMV Commissioner and GTSC Chair Mark J.F. Schroeder said. "As the enforcement campaign showed, dangerous drivers will be caught and held accountable. I thank all law enforcement officers for their hard work ensuring safety on our roads."

This high-visibility equitable enforcement campaign is supported by the GTSC to stop speeding and prevent avoidable crashes caused by unsafe speed. The following tickets were issued during this year's campaign:

- Speeding violations: 23,087
- Impaired driving violations: 1,380
- Distracted driving violations: 1,185
- Move Over Law violations: 652
- Seatbelt violations: 2,359
- Other violations: 32,170

Total: 60,833

Speed Week is held each August when

fatal crashes involving unsafe speed are typically more prevalent. Data show that most fatal crashes where speed is a contributing factor occur between June and October. According to research by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, drivers who speed are also more likely to commit other traffic violations.

Last year, there was an alarming rise in fatal crashes where speed was a contributing factor. According to preliminary data from the Institute for Traffic Safety Management and Research at the University at Albany's Rockefeller College, unsafe speed was a contributing factor in 314 fatal crashes in 2020, compared to 230 fatal crashes in 2019 – a 36% increase. The 314 fatal crashes last year resulted in 365 deaths including drivers, bicyclists and pedestrians.

Combined with education and enforcement campaigns, GTSC coordinates various traffic safety activities throughout the year and supports ongoing initiatives to improve pedestrian, motorcycle and bicycle safety. The GTSC also sponsors critical training for law enforcement, provides resources for teen drivers and their parents and promotes seatbelt use statewide. Organic gardening tip: Easy ways to stock your pantry

Are you flush with basil or parsley this September? Swimming in tomatoes? Facing a pile of peppers? Putting by food in season not only preserves those ingredients for future use, but it's also a cost-effective way to eat local, organic produce year-round and a great way to support your local organic farmers.

Roberta Bailey offers some simple suggestions for stretching your harvests into the winter months in her Harvest Kitchen column, "What to Do With That Bounty of Food You Grew." Her quick and easy tips for freezing fruits, vegetables and herbs are accessible for first-time preservers and seasoned stockpilers alike.

Berries and other fruits can be frozen without any processing. They're then ready to add to oatmeal, muffins or smoothies in the winter or to be made into batches of jam or juice and canned as time allows. Tomatoes and peppers are also simple to freeze, with just a little slicing required. Bailey's zucchini puree makes quick work of excess zucchini or summer squash, and can liven up soups and stews come cold weather.







Good Housekeeping – Fontina & Pepper Pizza

When cooked on the grill, homemade pizza becomes a gourmet affair. Add roasted peppers and fresh herbs to the mix, and you've got dinner suitable for company.

Ingredients:

1 pound fresh pizza dough

6 ounces Italian fontina or provolone cheese, shredded

 $2\ \mathrm{jarred}$ roasted red and/or yellow peppers, thinly sliced

1 tablespoon chopped fresh marjoram or thyme leaves

Directions:

- 1. Prepare outdoor grill for covered, direct grilling on medium-low.
- 2. Cut dough into 4 equal pieces. On one end of oiled cookie sheet, with fingertips, spread and flatten 1 piece of dough to about 1/8-inch thickness. (Edge does not need to be even.) On same cookie sheet, repeat with another piece of dough. Repeat with a second oiled cookie sheet and remaining dough.
- 3. Place all 4 pieces of dough, oiled side down, on hot grill grate. Cook 2 to 3 minutes or until grill marks appear on underside (dough will stiffen and puff).
- 4. With tongs, turn crusts over. Working quickly, arrange one-fourth of Fontina and one-fourth of peppers on each crust. Cover grill and cook pizzas 3 to 4 minutes longer or until undersides are evenly browned and cooked through.
- 5. Transfer to cutting board; sprinkle with marjoram. Cut into wedges. Serves 4.

Tip: Look for fresh pizza dough in the dairy section of your supermarket, usually sold near the tortillas. (Frozen pizza dough also is available, but it takes several hours to thaw before it can be used.) Or you can purchase dough from a local pizzeria; they'll usually sell it to you in 1 pound balls if you ask.

This childproofing checklist can help keep kids safe

It's not long before newborns who need their parents to cater to their every need become toddlers who can't wait to go exploring on their own. The curiosity can come quickly, which underscores how important it is for parents to childproof their homes.

Childproofing is essential in the nursery where children tend to spend much of their time, but it's necessary elsewhere in the house as well. The Children's Hospital of Los Angeles says fractures are the most common injuries among infants and toddlers as they develop a sense of curiosity and gain mobility. Head and mouth/tooth injuries are some additional injuries curious kids may suffer during this period in their lives. This childproofing checklist can help reduce the risk of injury.

- Follow U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission crib safety regulations, which include fixed sides, a firm mattress and slats that are no more than 2 38 inches apart.
- Install UL-listed carbon monoxide detectors and smoke detectors on every story of the house and check batteries in detectors frequently.
- \bullet Install a temperature guard on the water heater and never set it above $120^{\rm o}$ F.
- Cover all sharp furniture edges and corners with safety padding or specialty bumpers.
- Block all open outlets with outlet covers or safety plugs.
 - Place lockable covers on the garbage.
 - Install stove knob covers.
- Use latches on any drawers, toilets, doors or cabinets within the child's reach.
- Anchor heavy furniture, such as televisions, bookshelves and dressers, to the walls.
 - Install safety guards on windows.
 - Pull the crib away from other furniture.
 - Use cordless window blinds.
- Place gates at the top and bottom of stairs and use them to prevent access to rooms that are off limits.
- Store cleaning supplies, tools and breakable items out of reach or in a locked cabinet.
- When the child reaches 35 inches in height or can climb out of the crib, it's time to transition to a toddler bed.

- Choose toy chests or other furniture with spring-loaded hinges.
- Do not hang heavy wall art or shelving over cribs.
- Cover radiators, hot pipes, etc., with protective materials.
- Remove flaking paint and be sure to have paint tested for lead.
- Inspect the home for protruding nails, bolts or other hardware that can cause injury.

These are some childproofing measures parents can implement to keep kids safe. Parents can customize

The chance to take in idyllic landscapes and sun-soaked views is a big part of what makes road trips so appealing. When traveling during certain times of year, such as

spring and autumn, seasonal landscapes dotted with vivid colors can be especially stunning.

Prior to embarking on a road trip, travelers can't be blamed for

getting caught up in the sights they're on the cusp of seeing. But it's equally important that drivers take steps to prepare for unsafe driving conditions. Even if the forecast is nothing but sunny skies, driving conditions can suddenly take a turn for the worse. The following are a handful of unsafe conditions drivers may encounter on the road, and what they can to do to make it through such situations safe and sound.

- Aggressive drivers: Aggressive driving or road rage is a significant issue, more so than some drivers may recognize. A 2016 survey from the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety found that nearly 80% of drivers expressed significant anger, aggression or road rage behind the wheel at least once in the previous 12 months. The insurance experts at Geico recommend that motorists who encounter aggressive drivers do their best to stay away from them. Consider safely changing lanes, gradually slowing down or even exiting the highway. Geico advises against stopping, as that can lead to potentially dangerous confrontations. • Bad weather: Bad
- weather can include anvthing from snowfall to driving rain to thick fog. Though it's wise for drivers to consult the weather forecast prior to hitting the road, no forecast is 100% accurate, which underscores the importance of knowing what to do when conditions sud-

denly take a turn for the worse. If inclement weather appears unexpectedly, slow down and be sure to leave extra room between your vehicle and the vehicle in front of you. The automotive analytics firm J.D. Power notes that many experts recommend drivers double the cushion between their vehicles and the ones in front of them when driving in rain, snow, sleet, and other adverse weather conditions. Doing so can help to offset the slower brake time that occurs when driving in bad weather.

• Debris: Road debris can include anything from materials that get blown away from roadside work sites to falling rock to tire treads to items that fall off of other vehicles. The suddenness of and the potentially serious consequences of being hit by or hitting debris is why a proactive approach is ideal. Avoid tailgating so you have ample room to maneuver should anything fall into the road. It's also important to leave room on the side of your vehicle so you can swerve out of the way. On especially long road trips, share driving duties so whoever is behind the wheel is fresh and alert. Alertness improves reaction time, making it much more likely drivers can avoid debris.

The open road has its hazards. But drivers who plan ahead and know what to do when encountering adverse conditions can ensure road trips are memorable for all the right reasons.

To Your Good Health

Alkaline Diet May
Help Boost
Cancer Treatment
Dear Dr. Roach: What

is your opinion of the alkaline diet? I have several friends who have battled cancer, and they have adopted alkaline diets as adjuncts to their cancer treatments. Do alkaline diets assist in the treatment and prevention of cancers, or is it just another urban myth? – T.F.C.

Answer: A diet high in fruits and vegetables may have a beneficial effect on cancer treatment. in combination with the best cancer treatments available, whether they are surgical, chemotherapeutic or radiation-based. Some of the "alkaline diets" I have read about do emphasize fruits and vegetables, and they may help and certainly will not hurt. However, there is no diet that is a substitute for comprehensive cancer care.

The body has powerful mechanisms for maintaining an exact pH, regardless of the acidity (or alkalinity) of the food you eat. Both the lungs and the kidneys work together to maintain the body's pH at a slightly alkaline 7.4. Only with severe illness will the body's pH come out of its narrow range of normal, and when it does. that portends a poor outcome without immediate treatment.

The mechanism by which fruits and vegetables have been shown to benefit some cancers is not precisely known, but it probably has to do with healthful components of the food, not through any effect on body alkalinity.

Dear Dr. Roach: I am a 67-year-old male in excellent physical health.

The only issue I have is occasional bouts of vertigo. These episodes started when I was about 44 years old. My symptoms are varying degrees of dizziness and, with extreme episodes, nausea. The frequency has increased the past couple of years to about every two weeks.

I do the Epley maneuver to relieve the symptoms, which go away one or two days after doing so. Epley is the only treatment available that works for me. Is there any new research or treatments for this? I am also curious about what foods might be contributing to the onset of vertigo. – R.W.

Answer: Vertigo is a sensation of movement when there isn't any. Most often, people will describe a spinning sensation. Others say the world is spinning but swaying or tilting are other descriptors. Although dizziness is a very nonspecific term, vertigo has a fairly limited number of diagnostic possibilities. Further, the fact that you get better with the Epley maneuver (more on that below) tells me the diagnosis is very likely to be benign paroxysmal peripheral vertigo.

Each ear contains an organ of balance, also called the semicircular canals, which work by the movement of hair cells inside those fluid-filled bony structures. Sometimes small crystals (called otoconia) form in one semicircular canal. These press on the hair cells and cause the two organs of balance to send conflicting signals to the brain about movement, which is perceived as vertigo. Diet is not likely to have a significant effect on causing or treating like other repositioning maneuvers, is designed to move the crystals out of the semicircular canals. Recurrence of vertigo after a successful Epley maneuver is not uncommon, but recurrences as often as every two weeks for over 20 years is outside my experience. I have read about surgical options for refractory BPPV, but I have had success referring patients to vestibular rehabilitation, performed by trained occupational or physical therapists.



Should I Give My Dog a Lyme Disease Vaccine?

Dear Paw's Corner: A fellow dog owner mentioned to me at the dog park that he had given his spaniel a vaccine to prevent Lyme disease. I'm wondering if I should do the same for my dog. How old should a dog be to receive the vaccine? Does it really protect dogs? – Clint F., Saco, Maine

Dear Clint: While it's known that a Lyme vaccine (there are four different vaccines available today for dogs) does confer protection against contracting the disease from ticks, veterinarians are still debating whether it's necessary to vaccinate dogs.

You can read two vets' opinions on this in a recent issue of Today's Veterinary Practice at todaysveterinarypractice.com with one for vaccination and the other not so sure.

If you live in an area where Lyme disease is frequently diagnosed, and your dog loves being outdoors, you may want to consider the vaccine for your dog. If you only take your pet to the dog park and otherwise don't spend much time exploring outside, a vaccine may not be necessary.

The vaccine can be given to dogs as young as eight to nine weeks, and booster shots are recommended after the first shot.

Even if you vaccinate your dog, you need to continue tick and flea prevention measures. Check your dog's coat after every jaunt outside and quickly remove ticks. Mow the lawn regularly to discourage ticks and other pests from hanging out; if they're still a problem, treat the lawn to deal with a flea or tick infestation.

Not all ticks carry Lyme disease, but some carry other serious diseases, so keeping them off your dog and out of your home is a good idea.






