

# Rabies clinic set for Nov. 6

A rabies clinic will take place Saturday, Nov. 6 from 7 - 9 a.m. at the East Herkimer Fire Department, 193 Main Rd., East Herkimer.

All cats, dogs and ferrets three months or older must be vaccinated even if they stay indoors. Every dog and cat needs two rabies vaccinations one year apart, then one every three years. Bring the pet's rabies vaccination history to receive a three-year certificate. Ferrets must be vaccinated every year.

Dogs should be on a leash. Cats and ferrets should be in a carrier or pillowcase. No vet exams will be given.

A \$5 donation per pet is suggested to defray costs. Visit herkimercounty.org to view a complete listing of rabies clinics in the county. All clinics are by appointment and pre-registration only. Pre-registration will end at noon the day before for this clinic.

distress leading up to Monday. Zoo officials do not yet have a cause of death. A necropsy is being performed at Cornell University.

"It is with heavy hearts that we share the very sudden news of Ming Yue's passing," said Utica Zoo Executive Director Andria Heath. "The Cornell veterinary team is examining the cause, and it is customary for us to not receive the results immediately.

"This is an unexpected tragedy for all of us, and we recognize the impact this has on our visitors and the community at large," added Heath. "Please keep our staff in your thoughts. Every team member loves the animals we care for, and any loss is a difficult one." Ming Yue was one of two red pandas on exhibit at the zoo. She was born in 2013 at Prospect Park Zoo, Brooklyn, and came to the Utica Zoo in 2014 on loan through Assiniboine Park Zoo, Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada. She and her mate, Muse, have had two groups of cubs including Xiaobo and Mei Lin in 2019. Muse was born in 2011 and came the Utica Zoo from Red River Valley Zoo in 2012. Muse remains on exhibit.

Red pandas are currently classified as an endangered species, and the Utica Zoo works closely with the Red Panda Species Survival Plan to reverse this perilous trend.



The Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority (Authority) offers the following money saving and environmentally friendly tips to help "green" your Halloween," stated Samantha Brown, Authority Recycling Coordinator.

**Get creative with decorations.** Use natural Halloween decorations like gourds, pumpkins, mums and corn stalks – all of these can be composted when you are through with them. Turn recycled paper into window decorations like spiders, pumpkins or witch hats. Paint grocery bags Halloween white for ghostly effects or make a graveyard scene with paper tombstones. If you are purchasing new decorations, try to find items that can be saved and re-used year after year.

**Make your own costume.** Halloween would not be the same without a costume. Skip the racks of expensive, plastic costumes and come up with creative ideas for a home-made costume – you might even win the Authority's virtual costume contest! If you can't make your own, check out secondhand stores or host a costume-swap with friends. View the rules and prizes for the "Go Green for Halloween" Costume Contest by visiting our website at www.ohswa.org or our Facebook



**Collect your treats in reusable bags.** Instead of spending your money on plastic pumpkins or plastic Halloween bags, use old pillowcases or reusable shopping bags for trick-or-treating. You can even make them festive by decorating them to match your costume. The Authority is providing free reusable bags for children at its EcoDrops in Utica and Rome through Oct. 31 during regular business hours. Visit www. ohswa.org for locations and hours of operation.

**Stay local and walk instead of drive.** Stick close to home this Halloween and walk to help reduce air pollution and fuel use. It's also a great way to connect with neighbors and get some exercise.

**Compost your pumpkins.** You can add pumpkins, gourds, mums and corn stalks to your compost pile. If you do not compost at home, Halloween is a great time to start. If you live in a community where green yard waste is collected, place your pumpkins to the curb to be collected for composting. Green waste may also be delivered to the Authority's Utica and Rome EcoDrops for composting.

"Waste reduction and recycling is the easiest way to help the environment and have a direct impact here in the Oneida-Herkimer region. With a little creativity and mindfulness, we can make the holiday season less wasteful. Reducing the amount of waste, we create will conserve our region's landfill space, natural resources and energy," continued Brown.

# Smullen promotes broadband speed test for all New Yorkers

Assemblymem ber Robert Smullen (R,C,I,SAM-Meco) announced that a significant step in the fight for further broadband access has been taken. The New York State Broadband Program Office is now asking the public to provide input and data via a survey and an internet speed test, to see what the real picture is for broadband access for our citizens. Smullen has championed the issue of broadband access for Upstate New York since his election in 2018. This has become even more important during the recent pandemic, with schools having remote learning, seniors using telemedicine to get healthcare and people working from home.

"I'm optimistic we can now get the real picture of broadband access for our citizens in rural areas, now that the state is going to do a real survey," Smullen said. "I've pounded the broadband drum since my first day in office, and it's so important now that everyone participates in the speed test survey. We need to know who has what internet speed where, so we can make common sense decisions to get broadband to as many people as possible.

"The internet is a critical part of our lives. People use it for school, for work and for healthcare. It's not a luxury anymore, it's a necessity, and despite the differences between rural and urban life, we can't leave our citizens on the wrong side of the digital divide any longer," Smullen concluded.



Materials for the costume can include paper, cardboard, plastic bottles, plastic bags, cups, aluminum foil – anything that will help bring your costume to life!

Costumes will be judged based on creativity, use of recycled/upcycled items in the costume, originality and quality. Costumes that are purchased instead of handmade will not be considered.

The first place winner will receive a \$250 Amazon gift card. The second place winner will receive a \$100 Amazon gift card. Winners will be featured on the Authority's social media pages and website.

Parents and teachers: Submit a picture of the entrant in their creatively handmade recycled/upcycled costume by emailing samb@ohswa.org or by sending a direct message to the Authority's Facebook page (@ AmIRecyclable). Submissions must be received no later than Nov. 2. Include the entrant's first name, city/ town/village the entrant lives in and age. Winners will be notified on Nov. 5.

#### America Recycles Day Poster Contest

America Recycles Day, Nov. 15, is a day to recognize the importance and the impact that recycling has on preserving our environment as well as conserving energy and natural resources. To celebrate America Recycles Day, the Authority is sponsoring a Poster Contest to encourage youth to be creative about ways to reduce, reuse and recycle on a daily basis. This year's poster themes are proper curbside recycling, food waste reduction and the importance of reuse.

• Curbside Recycling – Potential ideas for this poster theme include showing what items can (or cannot) go into curbside recycling bins, how to prepare recyclables before placing them in the bin, recyclables being collected by a recycling truck or what curbside recyclables might get turned into later on.

• Food Waste Reduction – Potential ideas for this poster theme include sharing or donating food to people or animals, putting food waste into a compost pile instead of the garbage, delivering food waste to the Authority where it will be made into electricity through the Food2Energy program or taking care to store food properly so it stays fresh for as long as possible.

• Reuse – Potential ideas for this poster theme include using a reusable water bottle, lunch pail, grocery store bag or straw instead of a disposable version, donating clothes that no longer fit to someone that can wear them or upcycling your recyclables into something useful – such as making a plastic milk jug into a birdfeeder.

Students can enter in one of three categories: Grammar (K-6), Junior High (7-9) and High School (10-12). First place winners in each category will receive a \$250 Amazon gift card. Second place winners in each category will receive a \$100 Amazon gift card. Third place winners in each category will receive a \$50 Amazon gift card.

Winning posters will be professionally printed and displayed at various locations throughout the region to educate the community. Additionally, the Authority will utilize the posters in its public education program.

# Time for a children's vision checkup

As the routine of a school year settles in, families may direct their focus to factors that have nothing to do with school supplies or enrolling youngsters in extracurricular activities. For example, the weeks after families settle into a new school year routine can be a great time to have students' vision checked.

According to Prevent Blindness, the oldest eye health and safety nonprofit organization in the U.S., common vision problems in children include amblyopia (lazy eye), strabismus (crossed eyes) and refractive errors like myopia, astigmatism and hyperopia.

A recent study titled "Children's Vision and Eye Health: A Snapshot of Current National Issues, 2nd Edition" pointed out that vision has a critical role in children's physical, cognitive and social development. Furthermore, visual functioning is a strong predictor of academic performance in school-age children, according to the study. In fact, without early detection and treatment, uncorrected vision disorders can interfere with learning and impair children's development.

Parents and educators are urged to be aware of symptoms of common eye disorders in children, which include the following:

Rubs eyes a lot

• Closes or covers one eye to read or see

• Tilts head or thrusts forward

• Has trouble reading or doing other close-up work

• Holds objects close to eyes to see

• Blinks more than usual

• Complains things are blurry or hard to see

• Squints eyes or frowns



All children, and especially those who are having issues with their eyes, should visit with an eye professional annually to have their vision checked. In addition, parents can rely on Prevent Blindness in conjunction with Children's Vision Massachusetts and School Health for a new web resource to assess their kids' digital screen time use. Tips are available at preventblindness.org/childrensscreen-time-tips.




# Home Country by Slim Randles

"I don't think I need to add anything to that," said Bert.




