Utica First Insurance Company renews presenting sponsorship for Boy Scouts Golf Classic

The Leatherstocking Council Boy Scouts of America is proud to announce that Utica First Insurance Company has renewed its presenting sponsorship of its annual golf classic. by Cary Davis, the On-Foot Fisherman

Reflecting back to the trout season of 2021, we can count our pleasures and our pain. The record amounts of rains felt in Central New York since June made for rather challenging conditions for stream fishers this season. This fisherman experienced some productive days stalking trout as I have each season. The difference this year - the windows of opportunity were rather narrow.

This trout season did not end on Oct. 15 because on most inland streams in NY, fishing with artificial lures is permitted. Anglers may not possess trout; it's catch and release only. I do no fishing after October due to the fact that deer season begins to open so I leave the woods to the hunters for obvious safety reasons. **The On-Foot Fisherman**

Once I used to own a boat, a small, 13-foot Gheenoe, built like a canoe but with a flat back that could accommodate a small 5 hp or trolling motor. I mainly lived in Florida then and chose not to put the boat in saltwater. The small lakes and ponds in West Florida held nice largemouth bass but too many alligators as big as that boat inhabited those waters. No thanks! Getting caught in a small vessel in the gators' own territory was not the excitement I was seeking. I only used that boat when I returned to Upstate NY (my home state) on vacation. I sold that boat in 1995 and have been on foot ever since, and probably always will be. I see much more nature up close when fishing on foot. Once an older fisherman told me, "Well, heck, all those folks fishing in boats fish near the shore anyway." So my feet are my only vessel now.

My primary approach to fishing the trout streams of Central NY is by wade fishing. I am not afraid to get into the water and get wet. This technique is always preceded by a careful assessment of water conditions: water level. temperature, force of current and access points to the water. Even when familiar with the body of water, I always give respect to the dangers that surround entering any body of water by wading. I have done this for many years and I do not suggest ever entering water you are not sure of. Only wade in waters that are compatible with your own swimming abilities.

wade fishing, When I wear long pants – not waders or hip boots that can fill with water if you fall in. This serves me well. Wading allows me to present bait from a distance to the intended hole. Fishing above the hole when water levels are up and presenting bait (or below the hole when fishing dry flies) allows me to sneak up on trout. Once a wary trout is spooked and scared into a hiding place the chances of that fish biting have been lost.

Having fished using the wade method in the High Sierra of California for the three strains of trout found here as well as cutthroat rainbow trout, and the inner coastal waterways of West Florida catching seatrout, red fish, flounder and snook, I always seem to discover more nature by wading. Enough cannot be said for the solitude that can be experienced by having a section of stream to yourself and really immersing yourself in the beauty nature provides for free. New York State has an abundance of

natural beauty to offer the sportsperson and our local waterways exemplify this.

Wading during the very early season (April and May) is something I rarely do. Ice cold streams and rivers can be unsafe. My best success comes later during late May through mid-July most years. A trout's metabolism is greatly slowed down in icy waters, and feeding habits are slowed as well. Water temperatures in streams of 54° - 70° F has yielded the most productive trout feeding days for me. I try in April but with minimal success.

This Season

The trout fishing season of 2021 was one that required patience of local



June provided some promise as the normal rise and fall of stream levels offered some nice catches of brook trout in Otsego County. The brown trout woke up a bit in Montgomery. When streams warmed following a nice gully-washing rain I found Mepps spinners and Mickey Finn streamer wet flies to prove irresistible to three different

brown trout in one hole after early morning worm fishing slowed.

Then came July, with more rain than a person or a fish could ever want. With some locations in Central NY receiving 10 inches or more of rain in a three-week period, fishing came to a halt. Local streams, the Mohawk



River and the Erie Canal had far too much water for sporting activities to go on safely. Ask our friends in Fonda, who saw Rt. 30A transformed into a raging torrent of water dumping onto Rt. 5 and the village. The community of Western (just outside Rome) saw the upper Mohawk River breach its banks at least a couple of times this year, causing damage to roads and property there. Not really primetime fishing!

Floods and flood waters are not pretty. We experienced flooding 15 years ago in Montgomery County and I hope to never see that again. Flooding also changes the characteristics of local trout streams. Those floods I recalled then took away some bends and eddies in some streams that I had come to know for years. I can report that the trout population did not suffer then, and NY DEC did a good job of preserving trout spawning beds in the affected streams. My observations from this year's high water indicate the character of local streams I fished have not been seriously compromised. The integrity of stream banks appears to be sound.

August provided two more productive fishing days. A productive day on the stream is determined by the aggressive nature of the trout strike and number of strikes felt that day. The ability to get bit or catch a number of trout that day in known trout-inhabited waters are the determining factors.

This season I caught at least 60 trout in eight or nine good days. I only go fishing if I think the conditions are right. I kept six trout all year. I practice CPR on fish: catch, photograph and release on healthy trout. Most years I have at least a dozen good days on the waters but this year there were just not as many good days. I saw the streams this year stay higher than any other year in the past 25 years. These high water levels made things very difficult for stream fisherpersons, not to mention the Canal and Old Mohawk River bed that I enjoy wading most years between Herkimer and Little Falls, above Little Falls and below Five Mile Dam. These bodies of water were not navigable by boaters or approachable by waders all summer.

Most years, during our drought or near drought conditions, I am able to

wade fish for smallmouth bass and walleyed pike on the Old Mohawk. I missed fishing the Old Mohawk River this year. The old river exists in its natural, pristine state, unaltered as a life-giving stream, as it has been for hundreds of years. It's easy to understand why indigenous people and early settlers made their homes along the banks of this waterway. All anglers suffered due to the flood-like conditions this year.

Trout Trifecta

"Trout Trifecta" is a feat I try to accomplish each year, when brook, brown and rainbow trout are all caught in local streams. Some years I am able to complete this task in one day; it took a couple of days this year.

One Smart Trout

There is one trout I know that is still swimming (I think). This brown trout was smart! As I baited with a nightcrawler one June morning at sunrise, I slid my bait into a large

trout hole with a huge rock at the back of the hole. As soon as the line drifted around the rock this fish slammed the bait. I leaned

my backbone into a firm hookset and was positive I had hooked the fish well. The 16-inch-plus brown trout broke water and I

could see this prize in all its vivid colors. While I waded across the stream

to get a better angle for landing the fish with my net, this fish starts swimming straight at me. I was above the hole and that trout darted between two rocks at the head of the hole just below my feet. My line was stuck. I tugged the line time and again to free line and fish while being careful not to break the six-pound test leader.

When pulling didn't work, I handed the line bit by bit until I reached the leader. Sliding my hand between the rocks I located the split shot weight 14 inches above the hook. Then I pulled up the hook leader and ... no hook, no trout! This trout swam toward me and executed an escape plan that, in all my years of fishing I had never seen. I thought, "Guess this will keep me coming back."

I tried to catch this fish two more times this year without success. It wouldn't bite – or some other fisher-

persons got lucky! Perhaps a more hardy strain of trout will evolve and render a more educated stream fisherman from this brief skirmish. This trout had probably been in the stream at least three years and had most likely been hooked before. This again demonstrates to me that the German brown trout is the smartest species of fish I have encountered and is one cunning quarry worthy of its sporting reputation.

Where Have All the Old Fishermen Gone?

When I was a teenager, just getting serious about trout fishing, I would go out fishing with my Uncle Pappy Mentis to local trout streams he knew. We would always see Mr. Browers, Mr. Reese or one of the Countryman brothers as they were coming off one or the other stream. They would always show us their catches of trout and discuss what baits they used or other bits of



local land owners. Also, some nice trout holes have been created where culverts cross roads. These large holes many times hold trout and are good places to begin if stream trout fishing is new to you. You get less snags here too. Be careful of your surroundings and take precautions to prevent ticks from attaching to you that can spoil your party.

The sale of fishing licenses is directly tied to NY DEC trout stocking programs throughout the state each year. The past few years have seen a reduction in stockings in Central NY streams. Some local streams have not been stocked the last two years that had always been stocked in past years. Montgomery County streams have experienced the greatest reduction in trout stockings. Turn a friend or family member on to fishing. I hope you'll find the cost of a fishing license to be an investment well worth the enjoyment derived from the fishing experience. **Off Season Dreamin'**

Take the time during cold weather months to upgrade and organize your fishing gear for next season. It is also a good time to practice your knot tying for trout rigs. Knots to know:

• Nail knot – leader to fly line

• Double loop square knot – leader to hook loop

• Improved clinch knot – fly to shock tippet leader or line to lure

Major benefits to early holiday shopping

Some people begin their holiday countdown the day after festivities have concluded. 

DMV, DOH encourage New Yorkers to register as organ donors

In honor of Organ Donor Enrollment Day, which took place Oct. 7, the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles and the Department of Health is urging New Yorkers to consider becoming organ donors.

By registering with the NYS Donate Life Registry (donatelife.ny.gov), people can offer hope to thousands of New Yorkers awaiting a life-saving transplant.

According to the U.S. Organ Procurement and Transplantation Network, 8,787 NY residents including more than 110 children are currently awaiting a life-saving transplant.

"It gives me great pride

that DMV plays such a critical role in getting people to enroll as organ donors," said DMV Commissioner Mark J.F. Schroeder. "There is no greater gift that one can give than life, and I hope all New Yorkers who have not yet registered will consider doing so today."

"New York's fight against the COVID-19 pandemic has taught us how valuable life is and the decision to become an organ donor is one of the most significant and selfless decisions a person can make," said Dr. Howard Zucker, NYS Health Commissioner. "Enrolling in the NYS Donate Life Registry is a simple way each of us can save the lives of up to eight people. Organ donation is truly lifesaving."

Aisha M. Tator, executive director of Donate Life NYS, said, "We are proud to be working with Governor Hochul and her administration to inspire New Yorkers ... to take action. to save lives and to heal our state through organ and tissue donations by enrolling today in New York's Donate Life Registry. One organ donor can save eight lives and restore health to 75 more people through tissue donation. I am confident that New Yorkers will choose to give hope to the 8,500 people who are in need of a lifesaving transplant by enrolling themselves as organ and tissue donors. On Organ Donor Enrollment day, and on every day, New Yorkers can take this important step and give the gift of life at donatelife. ny.gov/register."

Helen Irving, president and CEO of LiveOnNY, said, "Over the past year and a half we have seen New Yorkers support each other in remarkable ways. Signing up to be a lifesaving organ donor is one more simple way to help your neighbors. I hope ... we are all able to come together in support of organ, eye and tissue donation to bring hope to those awaiting a lifesaving transplant." Nationally, 17 people die each day while awaiting a transplant, according to the federal Health Resources and Services Administration. A person is added to the wait list every nine minutes, and one organ donor can save up to eight lives. While 90% of adults nationwide say they support organ donation, only 60% are registered.

Registering through the DMV is among the simplest ways to sign up to be part of the organ donor registry. By far, the majority of people who enroll as organ donors do so through DMV. The agency enrolled more than 5.7 million of the 6.8 million consenting organ donors.

DMV customers can register as an organ donor by completing the donation section of their driver license or non-driver ID renewal application, by completing the voter registration form, or by visiting the DMV website at dmv.ny.gov.

New Yorkers can also enroll in the NYS Donate Life Registry at donatelife.ny.gov.

Other ways people interested in becoming donors can enroll in the Registry include obtaining health insurance through the NY State of Health Insurance Marketplace or by mailing a completed enrollment form to the NYS Donate Life Registry.

In recent years, NY took steps to boost organ donor enrollment. In 2017, 16- and 17-year-olds became able to enroll in the Registry and the NYS Health Insurance Marketplace became a portal for registry enrollment.

Under Lauren's Law, the DMV includes on its license renewal form the choice for New Yorkers to enroll in the NYS Donate Life Registry. Customers are required to check one of two boxes about organ donation for their application to be processed. The law is named for Lauren Shields, a Rockland County resident who received a life-saving heart transplant at age nine and who is now a strong advocate for organ donation.

DMV also offers a Donate Life custom license plate to raise awareness and support critical research. When a consumer orders the plate, \$20 of the annual fee is provided to the "Life – Pass It On Trust Fund," which is used for organ donation and transplant research and educational programs promoting organ and tissue donation. Plates can be ordered on the DMV website at dmv. ny.gov/plates/life-pass-it.
