

# Poland kindergarten students have Thanksgiving feast, balloon parade

Poland Central School District kindergarten students continued one long-standing Thanksgiving tradition and started a new one.

The kindergarten classes had their annual Thanksgiving feast on Nov. 23 and for the first time designed balloons inspired by the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade and had their own parade around school.

Kindergarten teachers Julie Dutcher and Carrie Roark said that after the Thanksgiving feast had to take place in separate classrooms last year due to COVID-19 restrictions, they were happy to find a way to safely bring the event back to the school cafeteria this year.

"They're very happy to be back with their friends again and able to move around," Dutcher said. "You have to give the students something to look forward to

and some sense of normalcy and fun again and this is a way we chose to do that."

Kindergarten students learned about Native Americans, Pilgrims and how and why the first Thanksgiving took place and the kindergarten Thanksgiving feast involved each student bringing in one food item to share with the group.

"I think it's important for them to see how everyone brings something to the feast and to be thankful for each other," Roark said. "It's an important time for friendship, kindness and togetherness."

It was nice that both classes could be in one place this year, Roark said.

"Luckily, we can be back in here this year with the other kindergarten students," she said.

The kindergarten classes also baked bread and

made their own butter on Nov. 22 with the bread cooking in the cafeteria ovens to be ready for the feast.

Before sitting down for their meal, the students who were dressed in turkey outfits made out of paper performed a dance to go along with the song "Pow Wow" by Jack Hartmann.

Kindergarten students had learned about the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade by reading in Scholastic News about how the floats are designed and created, so the teachers decided to let their students design and create their own decorated balloons for a parade this year.

Students spent a lot of time working on their designs and putting their balloons together, the teachers said.

"That turned out great," Dutcher said. "They loved it."

# Christmas in Little Falls is back

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas in Little Falls. The City of Little Falls invites you to save the dates. That's right – the dates. Christmas in Little Falls (CILF) returns with a two-day celebration. Friday, Dec. 10 and Saturday, Dec. 11 will be filled with festive events, specials and entertainment.

For over a decade, this staple event has offered a day filled with holiday cheer. Like so many things, the activities were postponed last year with hopes that CILF could return for 2021. This summer, a group of volunteers met at the LF Youth and Family Center to discuss a revival. The discussion centered upon how to maintain some of the more traditional pieces of the event and how to incorporate new features.

One of the most notable changes is the expansion to include Friday evening as a kickoff to the regular full-day event. The inaugural Celebration of Lights at Canal Place takes place 5:30-7:30 p.m. Sterzinar Park will transform into a winter wonderland of lights with a tree lighting ceremony, free tractor pulled wagon rides, outdoor musical entertainment, shopping, yummy eats, activities and more. Valley Cinemas will also host a screening of the Christmas classic 'Elf at 7:30 p.m. for just \$3/ticket.

The fun continues bright and early the next morning. Other new additions include a reading of 'Little Blue Truck Christmas' which is perfect for younger children and will take place at the Little Falls Public Library at 9:30 a.m. Guests can also have their photo taken with our very own little blue trucked decked out for the occasion. Then watch Jackson Street come alive as Candy Cane Lane with outdoor holiday-themed Reindeer Games for kids from 9 a.m. – 12 p.m. And Pause for All Paws invites you to the Youth and Family Center from 10 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. for Paw Patrol themed activities and goodie bags while supplies last. There will be face painting by Leysmy of La Take-ria and the NEW House of Flavor Bar & Grill located 622 E Main. Also, Valley Cinemas invites you to wear your favorite pajamas for 'Polar Express' at 1 p.m. for only \$3/ticket.

Saturday offers something new for the adults too with

a Schitt's Creek Christmas Party at the Elk's Lodge #42. Dress as your favorite character from the show for a chance to win an award.

Another new feature for 2021 is the Merry Chicksmas Market at Travelodge from 9 a.m. -3 p.m. This includes 20 vendors comprised of talented local female entrepreneurs and is brought to you by the women behind the popular Chicks Along the Canal event.

New businesses join the fun as well with Main Street Mercantile offering free family holiday polaroids, Chickweed Boutique's wish list event, and The Mustard Seed providing gift basket central.

Of course, there are classic events that return including live music. The LF High School student band will perform at Elk's at 10 a.m. Then the Edelweiss Schuplatters German Dancers take the stage at 11 a.m., followed by the Appalachian Still Band from 12-2 p.m., and finally The Brian Mulkerne Band from 3-5 p.m. The LF First Presbyterian Church will also be caroling along E. Main Street from 10 a.m. – 12 p.m.

Other classic CILF activities return including an 8 a.m. registration (\$20/runner, ages 12 and under free) at the Youth and Family Center for the annual Red Nose Reindeer Run organized by Rock City Runners. Feet hit the street at 9 a.m. when Santa starts this festive 5k and runners dressed in their best holiday outfits race throughout the city and end at Ed & Bud's for the award ceremony and to sip a Tom & Jerry holiday drink. Advanced online registration is also available. Santa will then tour the city in a firetruck and be dropped off at the Youth and Family Center at 10 a.m. for professional photos with guests until 12 p.m. Bob Critser, owner of DSP Images, offers free 4x6 print photos of this special moment. If you'd like to deliver a letter to Santa, you can visit Ed's Pizza Place for the drop box sponsored by Skye Financial Services.

Additional morning activities include the superhero pancake breakfast at the American Legion (8-11 a.m.), cookie decorating sponsored by White Rose Bakery at the Community Center (10 a.m. - 12:30 p.m.), H.A.L.O. tree

lighting at CVS (9:30 a.m.), toy collection at Dollar General (8 a.m. – 9 p.m.) and the Utica Zoomobile at LF Ace Hardware (11 a.m. – 1 p.m.).

Of course, free horse-drawn wagon rides return from 11:30 a.m. -2:30 p.m. to offer tours of historic downtown with pick-up & drop-off at the M&T Bank lot. There will also be open houses throughout the day at Paca Gardens, the Arts Center (MVCA), Showcase Antiques of CNY, LF Antique Center and the WCA. The LF Historical Society offers an outdoor exhibit as well.

In the theme of 'giving to others,' the Tipsy Server Race hits E. Main Street at 11 a.m. Come cheer on your favorite server as they race for charity trying not to spill their trays laden with drinks. Many organizations have benefited from this competition and the fun begins at Ruggiero's Trattoria.

Another charity-focused event challenges taste buds rather than racing skills. The popular Soup Fest coordinated by Think Local Little Falls runs from 11 a.m. – 2 p.m. For \$10, you can taste all the delicious soups and stews by the best chefs from Little Falls and all proceeds benefit local charities.

The entire city will be bustling with entertainment, activities, shopping and more throughout the day. Event planners encourage folks to review the full schedule of events to plan their day, keeping in mind the numerous local businesses that will be open and running specials for your holiday enjoyment.

# Poland first graders participate in Thanksgiving traditions including balloon parade

Poland Central School District first-grade teachers made sure their students took some of the last day of school before Thanksgiving break to participate in some Thanksgiving traditions.

First graders took an inschool trip to the movies to watch "A Charlie Brown Thanksgiving" in the school auditorium and paraded around the school hallways with balloons they decorated based on the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

Despite the limitations due to COVID-19 restrictions, first grade teachers Christina Kress, Kathleen Hess, Patricia Linneen and Sarah Barron were happy with the activities they were able to provide for students.

"We tried to make it as normal as possible, so the kids could still have fun and enjoy the traditions we would have in a regular school year," Kress said.

First graders read a book called "Balloons Over Broadway: The True Story of the Puppeteer of Macy's Parade" and read about traditions in Scholastic News, so the Thanksgiving movie and parade they participated in were an extension of those topics they learned in class

Kress said she and Barron

wanted to help start some traditions with the Thanksgiving activities during their first year as first grade teachers.

"Being new to first grade, we

wanted to come up with some new ideas to do some different things," Kress said.

Barron said the idea to watch "A Charlie Brown Thanksgiving" came from her personal tradition of watching it each year.

"It's nice to bring them some of these traditions at school," Barron said.

Along with watching "A Charlie Brown Thanksgiving," students ate the same food the characters in the film have for their feast: toast, jellybeans, pretzels and popcorn.

For the parade, students designed and decorated their own balloons, which were filled with helium and floated along as students carried them down hallways for other students and teachers to see. Students also made Snoopy hats, which tied into both "A Charlie Brown Thanksgiving" and the Snoopy float from the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

Even with following COVID-19 guidelines, there were still ways to give the students a memorable experience, Barron said.

"They're still able to have a fun day," she said.

Hess said the activities were a great opportunity to have some joint experiences among all of the first graders.

"It was nice for everyone to be together," Hess said.

The students enjoyed creating their balloons, participating in the parade and showing what they made, Hess said.

"They were really proud of it," she said.

Linneen said students learned about Native Americans, Pilgrims, the history of Thanksgiving, the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade and more. Connecting that learning to fun activities is especially important for students the age of first graders, she said.

"It keeps them engaged, and they are way more likely to remember the history of the parade and Thanksgiving if you make it fun," Linneen said, noting that it can be hard to keep first graders focused. "So if it's fun and involves balloons and putting stickers and designs on balloons, then they're all about it."

# **Consumer Alert:**

# NYS Division of Consumer Protection offers tips for a safe holiday season

The New York State Division of Consumer Protection (DCP) recently alerted consumers to issues impacting the holiday shopping season. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the holiday shopping season will be rife with delays, higher prices and potential scams. Consumers should expect to have a lengthy wait for goods and holiday presents due to the continued supply shortages and shipping backlogs.

Secretary of State Rossana Rosado said, "The holiday season brings out the best of us as we share with family and friends in celebration of this special time of year. However, this holiday shopping season may be frustrating due to delays, higher prices and the risk of scams. To help consumers enjoy this festive time, the Division of Consumer Protection encourages everyone to follow these basic tips to have a smooth and safe holiday shopping experience."

The DCP advises consumers to exercise caution this holiday season. Scams and theft are common this time of year, and it is essential consumers continue to protect themselves.

Shop safely using these tips:

## Avoid Pandemic-Related Shortages

- Shop early this holiday season to avoid merchandise shortages and shipping delays. Experts advise to get shopping done ahead of time and avoid the last-minute rush to ensure your gifts arrive on time.
- Consider virtual gifts. Avoid shipping concerns altogether by gifting items that can be used online, such as streaming subscriptions, virtual gift cards or online learning classes. Always verify the source of online retailers and shop on secure sites to avoid scams.
- Shop local. Support small business and pick up direct from in-store locations for holiday gifts. Many local retailers are offering deals to encourage consumers to shop locally from neighborhood businesses. Continue following COVID-19 safety protocols when shopping in person.

# **Know Your Rights**

• Retailers must inform you of any changes to your

delivery. The Federal Mail, Internet or Telephone Order Merchandise Rule (the Mail Order Rule) states that your order must be delivered within 30 days unless otherwise stated at the time of purchase. If there is a delay, you must be notified. If the company cannot reach you to obtain your consent to the delay, they must, without being asked, promptly refund all the money you paid for the unshipped merchandise.

• *Review refund policies*. Retailers must post their refund policy. If it is not posted, the retailer is legally required to accept a return within 30 days with receipt.

# Savvy Online Shopping Tips

- Shop on trusted sites with retailers known to you. In the era of social media marketing and influencers, consumers are more exposed to sham businesses that advertise a premier product but only deliver a low-quality version of the advertised item, if they deliver anything at all. Use caution on trusted sites that host items for third-party sellers.
- Beware of third-party vendors. If redirected from a trusted site to a third-party site, read the seller's policies, review ratings, read consumer comments and most importantly do a broad internet search before making your purchase. Trusted retailers who host third-party sellers do not warranty their sales, thus you could get a substandard product or no product at all when you take the risk and purchase from an unknown third-party vendor.
- Do your research if you want to try a new site or retailer. Performing a broad internet search will provide you with important feedback from other customers. Read the comments within any social media advertisements. This will help you assess what to expect if something goes wrong.
- Read product specifications. Online marketing is geared to get you to buy, so it is important to understand the product you are purchasing and the terms of the sale to ensure you are getting what you want.
  - Comparison shop. Search other websites to compare

price, quality, return policies, delivery cost and speed. Buying the "cheapest" advertised price may cost you more when you factor in delivery charges in the short term or return policies in the long term.

# Tips for Using Credit Cards Online

• Check the website's encryption. It's easier than you think. Before entering your credit card information, make sure that the website's address begins with "https" and that there is a closed lock or unbroken key symbol in the lower portion of your window or up on

## Package & Delivery Scams

- Keep track of your packages. Package tracking and delivery scams are common during the holidays. Review the tracking information for your package and note any issues right away through the merchandisers' websites.
- Beware of phishing attempts. Another common scam this time of year is scammers using phishing emails and text messages and impersonating delivery companies (e.g. UPS, USPS, FedEx), banking and credit card companies, and other large retailers (e.g. Netflix, PayPal, eBay, Amazon), which often include links to sites attempting to steal your information. Always open a browser and type the company's website address yourself instead of clicking on a link in an email or text message.

Preheat oven to 325° F. Spread popcorn on baking sheet and spray lightly with the cooking spray. Combine remaining ingredients in a small bowl and sprinkle evenly over popcorn. Spray again with cooking spray and toss to coat evenly. Bake 7 minutes and serve warm. Yield: 2 quarts.

# Herkimer BOCES, VRS continue partnership through work by conservation students

Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES conservation students have been putting up signage on the neighboring Valley Residential Services (VRS) property in Herkimer to help prevent trespassing and are using skills from class to review the resources on the land.

Herkimer BOCES conservation instructor William Carpenter said the partnership is beneficial for students because students get to apply their learning on the property, which includes a pond and trees, and the students provide free work to assist VRS.

"I think it works - just being neighborly and helping each other out," Carpenter said.

Herkimer BOCES has a long-standing partnership with both VRS and its sister facility, Valley Health Services (VHS). Both facilities are under the Bassett Healthcare Network and are located in Herkimer. The Herkimer BOCES William E. Busacker Complex property at 352 Gros Blvd. in Herkimer directly abuts the VHS property behind it.

For many years until COVID-19 put the visits on hiatus, Herkimer BOCES special education teacher Alana Connolly's career awareness class would visit VRS to present to residents, sing for them and conduct gardening. Herkimer BOCES health science careers high school students participate in clinical experiences at VHS, and VHS works closely with the Herkimer BOCES Adult Practical Nursing Program - including sponsoring certified nursing assistants to become licensed practical nurses through the BOCES program.

Recently, new layers were added to

the partnership after Herkimer BOCES School Safety Advisor Jim Garcia approached VRS Administrator Jennifer Miller to get approval for some safety planning assistance from VRS.

"With our properties connecting, it

only makes sense to be on the same page for safety planning as it relates to emergency preparedness and site security," Garcia said. "By consulting with a New York State Department of Environmental Conservation officer and having him tour our land and advise us on the requirements for posting it, this ensured we are adequately versed in our rights and responsibilities as we strive to keep

the land secure, undisturbed and safe for our students. Those things are obviously paramount."

Garcia said Miller has been great to work with through the process.

"Strong community partnerships with our neighbors are a priority for us, and I'm thankful to have connected with her," Garcia said. "The fact that our conservation program is able to help them out as well in a collaborative effort is a bonus that benefits both organizations."

Wanting to help out in return, Carpenter and the summer program students studying conservation conducted gardening and beautification efforts at VHS, and students in the Conservation Career and Technical Education program continued efforts this school year with the signage.

Miller said VRS has 226 acres, so students working on the property helps free up grounds and maintenance staff for other work. "We find that really helpful," Miller said.

The residents in the assisted living residence also enjoy seeing students around and knowing they're helping on the property, Miller said.

"Hopefully, it gives the students a feeling of purpose of helping out their neighbors and the community," Miller said.

Carpenter and his senior conservation students also plan to submit a land management plan to VRS as a suggestion for how the pond, trees and other natural resources there could be utilized.

Between the signage work and the land management plan, students are able to practice using compasses, surveying land and managing aspects of land including wildlife, forestry, soils and natural resources, Carpenter said.

"The students are using all the skills they're learning in class for real-world applications," Carpenter said. "They're getting to actually assess the land and recommend how to best utilize the property."

Direct experience such as this can make a difference when looking for employment, Carpenter said. "Sometimes, that's what gets you the job," he said.

By helping VRS, conservation students are earning volunteer hours required by all schools for graduation and work-based learning hours required for Herkimer BOCES CTE programs, Carpenter said.

Carpenter hopes the land management plans lead to continued cooperation between Herkimer BOCES and

VRS because students could potentially map the property, conduct logging, study the pond and more.

Miller said she would love to have the conservation students present their ideas to VRS and the residents to see what else can be done going forward.

"We would love to continue to work with the students

in the program and enhance their learning opportunities and experience outside of the classroom," Miller said.

Miller said she is happy to have VRS involved with the community and forming partnerships among people of all ages.

"I think it's a wonderful thing," she said.
