## MOU signed for feasibility, predesign phase of Utica Impact Center project

The Mid-Utica Neighborhood Preservation Corporation (MUNPC) and the Community Foundation of Herkimer and Oneida Counties have signed a Memorandum Of Understanding (MOU) as the next step in development of MUNPC's Leisure Time Activity Center site on West Street in Utica as a collaborative multipurpose "impact center."

Under the terms of the MOU, the Community Foundation will enter into the feasibility and predesign phase of the project to explore how an impact center on MUNPC's property could provide services to residents of a diverse, high-need neighborhood.

"This is an important part of our commitment to community investment and equity," said Alicia Fernandez Dicks, president/CEO of the Community Foundation. "Collaborative centers that match non-profit programs and services with resident needs are part of our long-term strategy to build and rebuild vibrant neighborhoods in our two counties."

As part of its \$10 million, 10-year commitment to racial equity and social justice, the Community Foundation has been engaging with neighborhood residents and nonprofit partners. A community advisory group researched and discussed equity barriers and potential solutions for much of 2021, delivering its findings and seeking resident feedback and ideas at a public forum in October. With multiple partner projects and potential sites under consideration in Utica, MUNPC's West Street properties have been discussed for several months, and the Community Foundation and MUNPC hosted a cookout for residents at the Leisure Time Center in September to discuss a potential project for the site. A formal MOU, Dicks said, is the next step in the process.

MUNPC Board of Directors President, Attorney Oneka Roach-Campbell, said, "I am confident in the Community Foundation's collaboration with MUNPC and other like-minded organizations in our area. It is just what is needed to ensure that Black and Brown persons in Cornhill and surrounding areas get a proper piece of this equity pie. Together, we are putting boots on the ground to finally do the type of work that delivers much-needed programming and services to our

## Smullen prepares broadband bill for 2022 session

Assemblyman Robert Smullen (R,C,I,SAM-Meco) has drafted a bill in partnership with Sen. Joseph A. Griffo to strengthen and enhance broadband capabilities across all of New York. Dubbed the "Regional Broadband Expansion and Access Program" (RBEAP), the bill would help to decentralize the current "New NY Broadband" process and allow localities to work together and design regionally based plans to

ensure internet access to every citizen in their area. An avid proponent of expanded broadband infrastructure, Smullen is tackling the issue head-on.

"For too long, New York's broadband infrastructure has failed to appropriately accommodate the needs of New Yorkers in rural areas. My bill will help serve those people in New York with zero internet access by giving them the freedom to design their infrastructure

as needed," Smullen said. "With the COVID-19 pandemic hitting us, we truly became a 'remote world,' with work, school, telehealth and more dominating our means of business and communication. To support this ever-advancing technological leap, we need to recognize as a state that reliable broadband is becoming a necessity, not a luxury.

"The strength of the bill really lies in its ability to empower localities to coordinate with broadband companies on a level playing field. I look forward to passing this bill and helping the local townships secure the best broadband for their areas," Smullen concluded.

Smullen represents the 118th Assembly District, which includes Hamilton and Fulton counties as well as parts of Herkimer, Oneida and St. Lawrence counties.



## The impact reviews have on businesses

Online reviews have long been a mixed bag for small businesses. Though positive reviews can help businesses stand out from their competitors, negative reviews can be as harmful as positive reviews are helpful.

The marketing and consulting resource The Chat Shop says 31% of customers are interested in grocery store reviews, 60% are likely to read restaurant reviews and 70% rely on technology product reviews. Make an effort to discuss issues with a company before leaving a negative review. You may be pleasantly surprised with the outcome. There's no need to hesitate when leaving positive reviews. Simply explain why you were pleased.

1 tube of white frosting (with decorating tip)

Assorted small colorful candies, such as sprinkles and miniature silver drag-

Directions:

Place popcorn in large bowl. Place marshmallows and butter in medium saucepan over medium-low heat. Stir until marshmallows are melted and mixture is smooth. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla extract. Pour mixture over popcorn in bowl. Toss well to coat popcorn evenly.

Line a baking sheet with foil. Spray hands with nonstick cooking spray, then scoop up about 1 cup of popcorn mixture. Shape mixture into a cone shape, keeping the base flat. This forms the tree. - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/4 cup prepared chocolate-hazelnut spread
- 1. On a sheet of waxed paper, stir flour, baking powder and salt. In large bowl, with mixer at medium speed, beat sugar with butter until creamy. At low speed, beat in egg and vanilla until mixed. Gradually beat in flour mixture just until combined.
- 2. Divide dough in half; shape each half into a disk. Wrap each disk with plastic wrap and refrigerate about 1 hour or until firm enough to roll. (Or place dough in freezer 30 minutes.)
- 3. Preheat oven to 375 F. On floured surface with floured rolling pin, roll 1 disk of dough into 10-inch by



- Spread a little flour on a work surface. Turn dough out onto work surface and divide into 3 equal pieces. Sprinkle flour over dough as needed to prevent sticking and roll each piece of dough into a log about 8 inches long and 2 inches wide. Transfer logs to baking sheets, allowing space between for spreading.
- Bake 30 minutes and remove from oven (do not turn off oven.) Allow cookie logs to cool about 5 minutes and transfer to cutting surface. Cut logs diagonally into 1/2-inch slices. Place cookies back on baking sheets in a single layer. Return cookies to oven and bake 20 minutes, turning cookies over after 10 minutes. Cool cookies on racks and store in an air-tight container.
