

Poland brings back assemblies to celebrate elementary students for positive behavior

For the first time in 21 months, Poland Central School District recently held a PPP Assembly to

"It's been a while since we've done one of these, Cuthbertson also addressed how much has changed since the last PPP Assembly. "Things

Cuthbertson told students that being "prepared, productive and proud" is a good way to approach each day of school. "That's a good motto to have even when you're an adult," he said.

After taking student comments about what character means, Cuthbertson added his thoughts. "I look at character as the person you are," he said. "We're here to celebrate everybody's character." Cuthbertson also repeated – with students joining in – a statement about how character develops.

The last PPP Assembly before COVID-19 impacted schools was on March 6, 2019, and the PPP Assembly returned on Dec. 17, 2021, with Poland Principal Greg Cuthbertson and school counselors presenting awards to students in kindergarten to fifth grade.

"I think it's important that kids get recognized and they have some celebration of the good things they do," Cuthbertson said. "These kids have been through a lot, and we've missed out on a lot of opportunities to get together and celebrate accomplishments like this. We're just trying to get some normalcy back – as much as we possibly can."

The recent PPP Assembly looked much different than the last one almost two years ago. During the time that passed, the school theater where the assemblies took place was remodeled through Capital Project 2020. During the recent assembly, students sat distanced from each other and wore masks, and the assembly was split into two sessions to allow for

job adjusting to wearing masks and following all of the requirements without complaining or causing issues, Cuthbertson said. "They've been awesome," he said.

'It's been a while'

The idea behind the PPP Assemblies is to provide some positive reinforcement to students and help motivate them to contribute to the school with strong character and good behavior so they can be recognized at the next assembly, Cuthbertson said. He and school counselors hope to continue the PPP Assemblies going forward.

The recent assembly was split into a session of kindergarten to sec-



The atmosphere affected Brown too.

"I was nervous mainly because we hadn't played a concert in so long," he said

For Kraeger, it was also her first concert at Poland.

It felt strange for her to be in a different venue with a different setup and crowd than she was used to from her previous job, she said. There was a lot of nervousness among students – particularly younger students – with the return to putting on a concert, but the preparation paid off, she said.

"The concert went much better than I anticipated," Kraeger said.

'Just made sense'

Kraeger started working at Poland Central School District on Sept. 21, after fulfilling her required 30-day notice with Utica City School District, where she worked as a music teacher for the past 13 years.

It would have been nice to start with Poland at the same time as school started for students, but the delay did give Kraeger the opportunity to say goodbye to her Utica students and gave Poland students a chance to get used to the idea that their former music teacher, Jocelyn Rauch, had left the district, Kraeger said.

"It wasn't ideal, but there were blessings in it," Kraeger said, of starting on Sept. 21.

Kraeger is a graduate of Holland Patent Central School District. She then went to college at the Word of Life Bible Institute for two years. Next, she earned her music education degree from

Baptist Bible Seminary, which is now known as Clarks Summit University.

Around February 2006, Kraeger started doing per diem substitute teaching at Poland and continued to be a substitute at Poland and Holland Patent through June 2008, before starting at Utica.

Kraeger said she decided to become a music teacher because of her own interest in music.

"I was a musician myself – singing and playing piano and violin – so when I had to pick something that would work for a job, music education just made sense," she said.

Some of Kraeger's earliest memories are of singing in the choir pews at church, so her interest in music came naturally.

"I think I just liked it," she said, "and my family nurtured that."

Her grandmother put her into piano lessons at the end of first grade and she started playing violin in third grade.

Those beginnings led to where she is now, teaching general music to students in kindergarten through sixth grade and leading the vocal music program.

'So much nicer'

In March 2020, when schools closed to in-person learning due to COVID-19, Brown maintained a presence with students virtually and had discussions about music. About three weeks into it, he went into school and sent instruments home to students, and he was able to conduct individual, virtual lessons with students.

For the 2020-21 school year, in-person learning returned at Poland, but band classes weren't able to be held.

"It was absolutely no band," Brown said. "General music and study hall is what we did.'

This year, Brown is the band teacher and gives instrumental applied music lessons for grades 4-12. He also teaches one section of general music for third grade and one section for fourth grade, as well as general music for seventh grade.

It's good to be back closer to normal with general music classes this school year and to be back to teaching instruments and band, Brown said.

Kraeger said she is happy to be teaching general music this year in a music classroom. She said it's great that Poland had in-person classes for the full 2020-21 school year because at Utica, she didn't return to in-person teaching until March 8, 2021, almost a full year after the pandemic first affected schools.

After virtual teaching, hybrid teaching and visiting other classrooms, Kraeger said she's happy to have students visiting the music classroom this year at Poland.

"It's so much nicer because students can come into the room and use the music equipment and instruments," she said. "I'm very much a fan of hands-on



times, my eyes welled up with tears. Gratitude is a wonderful feeling – especially this time of year."

ing buses at Poland Central School District.

School Transportation Department staff gathered on Nov. 30 to celebrate her retirement in the bus garage with food, laughs and some tears. Renodin said the celebration meant a lot to her.

"They're family, when vou've been here this long," she said.

Renodin's final trip through her bus route as a full-time driver wasn't behind the wheel. Instead, school Transportation Supervisor Eric Taylor drove and allowed her to enjoy the experience from a different point of view.

"She's been driving the bus for 35 years, and I thought it would be nice to do for her - give her one last ride on her bus with her students," Taylor said. "She was pretty emotional."

For Renodin's retirement party, not only did current Transportation Department staff attend, but some retirees returned to wish her well. This included Bob Tabor, who was the school transportation supervisor when Renodin started, and three former bus drivers: Karen Smith, who retired in May 2021; Margaret Santmier, who retired 3.5 years ago; and Ann Johnston, who retired 7.5 years ago.

v name is Maci Harvatine, and I am a Susquehanna County Dairy Maid. I'm in the fourth grade at Mountain View Elementary School and I love Peanut Butter Pie. Today I will share my favorite recipe with you.

Crust:

- 1 1/2 cups crushed graham crackers
 - 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup melted butter In a small bowl combine the crumbs and sugar. Add the butter and mix well. Press in the bottom and sides of an

ungreased 9-inch pie plate.

Bake at 375° for 8 - 10 min-

utes and cool or refrigerate for 30 minutes. If you don't want to make your own crust you can always buy one in the

8 oz. cream cheese (at room temperature)

- 1 cup powder sugar




