'No Irish Need Apply' event set for Feb. 23

Is the "No Irish Need Apply" construct fact or myth? Very few signs still exist that once read "No Irish Need Apply" and the ones that do exist were often proven to have been made up reproductions. Searches of classified ads from that time, however, tell the story that there was indeed a significant level of discrimination of Irish and many other nationalities emigrating to the U.S.

The political cartoons by Thomas Nast and published in Harper's Weekly and other print media of the day depicting Irish immigrants as violent, ill-tempered simians

played no small role in fueling the discrimination fires. It was not the landed-gentry class that made up the majority of Irish immigrants, but rather the agricultural laboring class fleeing famine and anti-Catholic discrimination by the British ruling class. These depictions were not new but followed the Irish across the sea - the British press were equally cruel.

Presenter Mike Carroll will show examples of 19th century cartoons and political pamphlets that indeed fomented the mid-19th century discriminatory practices towards the Irish and

other immigrants. We will further see how the Irish overcame this discrimination taking up powerful positions as civic leaders and fueling American progress.

About the Talk/Book

This is the story of a free black man, Jacob Francis of Amwell township, Hunterdon County, NJ, who was indentured out by his free black mother to the age of 21.

Five different men "owned his time" during his indenture and each provided a different experience for him. The last man lived in Salem, MA, and Francis lived there between 1768 and 1775 during the buildup to fighting in the American Revolution.

Francis enlisted in a Massachusetts Continental regiment in October 1775 and served through the siege of Boston, the New York campaign and the Battle of Trenton. When his enlistment expired on Jan. 1, 1777, he left the army and went back to his birthplace to find his mother and learn his family surname. He established himself in Amwell and turned out for active militia duty for the rest of the war.

In 1789 he married an enslaved woman named Mary whose master sold her to him on their wedding day. He freed her and together they raised a family of nine children. After their life of farming, Jacob and Mary moved into the village of Flemington about 1811 and lived there the remainder of their lives.

About the Author

William "Larry" Kidder was born in California and raised in California, Indiana, New York and New Jersey. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from Allegheny College. A U.S. Navy veteran with service in Vietnam, he considers teaching to be both his vocation and avocation, continuing in retirement after having taught for 40 years in public and private schools. For 30 years, Kidder has been a volunteer historian, interpreter and draft horse teamster for Howell Living History Farm.

New Herkimer BOCES LPN class aims to meet demand for more nurses

There are 15 local adults on their way to potential careers in healthcare thanks to an additional class started by the Herkimer-Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES Adult Practical Nursing Program this winter.

The decision was made in late 2021 to add a part-time nursing class starting on Jan. 3, 2022, in order to boost overall enrollment and provide more opportunities for adults looking for nursing careers.

The class filled up quickly with the maximum of 15 students accepted into the program in just three weeks, Herkimer BOCES Adult Practical Nursing Program Coordinator Sara Nicolette said.

"That's all I could fit in the room," Nicolette said. "There was such a demand that we had some people that weren't able to take the entrance test because all available test slots were taken."

The Herkimer BOCES Adult Practical Nursing Program, located at the Herkimer BOCES Remington Educational Complex in Ilion, provides education and training for adults in the region to become licensed practical nurses. In addition to

this one-time new class, there is a full-time class that starts in July and part-time day and evening classes that start in September.

Nicolette said she believes the new class filled up so quickly because of the need for more nurses in the healthcare industry.

"Currently, there's a tremendous shortage of nurses at all levels – especially LPN – so the salary has gone up with the demand," Nicolette said. "I think people have realized in our current economy that this is a field that gives them some financial stability."

Nicolette said the deadlines to apply for the next classes are June 1 for full-time and Aug. 1 for part-time day and evening.

"Based on current phone call volume, we are anticipating next year's classes to fill just as quickly," she said. "I am anticipating wait lists for the next classes, so people who are serious about it need to apply now."

The first step to apply is by calling 315.867.2206 to schedule an entrance exam. More information is available by visiting www.herkimer-boces.org and clicking on the "Adult LPN Pro-

gram" button on the homepage.

The new part-time class that started on Jan. 3 takes place on three evenings per week and one or two Saturdays per month. The students in the

new class will integrate with the second-year part-time evening students in September 2022 and then will graduate as LPNs in June 2023.

"Especially with our part-

time classes, it allows people to pursue a nursing career and still work and take care of their family," Nicolette said. "It's off to a great start, and these people will graduate in 18 months."





Tax warrants now searchable on the NYS Tax Department website

The New York State Department of Taxation and Finance on recently announced the availability of a new search tool on its website to ease access to information about open tax warrants.

By making this already public information more easily accessible, news media, researchers and others who may be interested now have more efficient access to the latest balances owed by tax debtors.

"We are continually striving to enhance the way in which we interact with taxpayers, the news media and all New Yorkers," said Acting Commissioner Amanda Hiller. "This new search tool, which can be used by anyone at any time to access public information, is another step in our effort to improve the taxpayer ex-

The NYS Tax Warrants search tool is available 24/7 and doesn't require a log-in or account to access. It's updated regularly to provide current warrant balances, which was previously unavailable online and could only be obtained through an official request to the Tax Department Public Information Office.

This new search feature provides access to data on open tax warrants only. When a tax debt is paid in full, the warrant is satisfied and no longer accessible using the search tool. For information on a satisfied warrant, visit the NYS Department of State's Tax Warrant Notice System.

The Tax Department files a tax warrant with the appropriate county clerk and the NYS Department of State when a taxpayer with fixed and final tax debt fails to resolve it.

Center for Family Life and Recovery, Inc. includes suicide prevention services

The suicide of Miss USA 2019 Cheslie Kryst is shining a light on the stigma of suicide and mental health in the Black community. In 2019, suicide became the second leading cause of death in African Americans ages 15-24, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Minority Health. The suicide death rate for Black men was four times greater than Black women in 2018.

The pandemic has played a huge factor in people experiencing anxiety, depression, or other mental health disorders and it has been harder for minorities to access mental health and substance-abuse services. Suicide rates have increased among Black adolescents in recent years. Black girls in ninth through 12th grades were 60% more likely to attempt suicide compared to white girls the same age.

The Center for Family Life & Recovery, director of Prevention Services, Jodi Klostrich urges "Let's talk about it, ask the questions, get involved, be supportive and lessen the stigma surrounding mental health. Everyone struggles in their life with something, no one is im-

mune to life's challenges and there is no discrimination regarding mental illness or addiction. What is critical to saving a life is recognizing someone is struggling and really having a difficult time and asking them questions while being supportive. When someone is having an increased risk of mental health challenges this can increase the risk of suicide."

the door. I worry that he will get run over by a car or attacked by a coyote. He will look at me when I call, but that is it. - Kelly in Fort Myers, FL

Dear Kelly: You can teach cats to respond to certain commands, and calling them is one of those commands. I know that Billy can learn to do it, because he clearly recognizes your voice. He just doesn't see the value in returning to you right away.

So it's important to help Billy "see" the value in returning when you call. You do this through training

> that uses positive reinforcement - a favorite treat or food. Here's how:

> Come up with a noise that you can make just before Billy gets a treat or dinner. A whistle, a clucking noise, little even a song.

Just before







you open his can of food or treat bag, make that noise. Do it at every feeding and treat time.

- Set aside five minutes, twice a day, for reinforcement training.
- During training, make the noise, wait for Billy to respond, then give him a treat. Back up a couple of feet and repeat.
- · Gradually increase the distance during each session until Billy comes running when you call.

Once Billy associates that specific noise with a reward, he'll come back every time you call. Make sure to always reward him when he comes, even if it's just lots of praise. He'll be far less likely to stay out if he escapes, and you'll have much greater peace of mind.


