The Family Counseling Center offers advice on dealing with seasonal changes

As spring slowly starts to make its presence known, the Family Counseling Center of Fulton County in Gloversville is offering advice on ways to lean into the change in positive ways.

Did you know that studies have shown "spring fever" actually exists?

Many of us feel a surge of energy as we shift from the cold, dark days of winter into the warmer days of spring. For those of us who have mood disorders, spring can bring manic behaviors such as the decreased need for sleep, increased goal-directed behavior, irritability and more.

Studies have shown that suicide rates actually increase in the spring and early summer months. Whilst the common perception is that changing seasons bring hope and excitement about the opportunities ahead, the idea of change can bring overwhelming anxiety, deep nostalgia of better times and melancholy for some - all of which may trigger depressive episodes.

How can you effectively lean into spring?

Carriebeth Epstein, a clinic supervisor at the Family Counseling Center, suggests the following options to help transition from winter into spring:

1. Get outside if you can or let nature into your home in some way.

The physical act of being in nature can actually have a positive effect on an individual's mental health. Studies have shown that being in nature (or even just seeing pictures of nature) can reduce fear, anxiety and stress - increasing positive feelings. Being out in nature can also have a physical impact on our bodies by reducing blood pressure, heart rate and stress hormones.

"Taking a walk and concentrating on the sounds, the way the air and the bark of a tree feel can automatically ground you in the moment," said Epstein. "Even opening up your windows on a nice day and letting the fresh air come into your home can elevate your mood.'

2. Look for moments of silence.

Meditation, yoga and journaling provide moments for silence and reflection. Mindfulness practices help to quiet thoughts, relieve anxiety and prepare you for a more restful sleep.

Starting a practice of gratitude can also help to increase positive thoughts, better relationships and overall emotional health. "Mindfulness can be found in all sorts of situations on a daily basis," added Epstein. "Taking a moment to reflect on how something sounds, feels, smells - forces an individual to ground themselves to the moment."

3. De-clutter and deep clean your home.

Spring cleaning not only clears out the cobwebs in our homes, it can clear out the clutter that impacts our emotional health. "Clutter can trigger anxiety,"

said Epstein. "A deep clean of your home can help to prepare you for the transition of the season and create a peaceful space to feel safe and relaxed in."

Poland aims to motivate middle school students with special lunches, awards

Poland Principal Greg Cuthbertson said similar events were started in the past – such as getting sub sandwiches for students – but then COVID-19 put the plan on hiatus.

"We want to try it again and get back to somewhat of a normal experience and celebrate the students," Cuthbertson said. "They should be celebrated."

Elementary students have PPP Assemblies where they receive recognition, and high school students can see a direct path to earning credits to graduate, but sometimes the reasons to strive for school success seem less clear in middle school, Cuthbertson said. Events to recognize high school students could still be added at some point in the future.

Cuthbertson also hopes that seeing students getting different lunch options will trickle down and help other middle school students to get their grades up or improve their behavior to get to participate in the future.

"Maybe it will motivate some of the kids to push themselves a little bit more," he said.

The lunch event on March 1 was for the second marking period. The plans are to keep doing the lunches for each marking period, Cuthbertson said, and he hopes at some point to start taking students out to restaurants for it.

Part of the idea is also to support local businesses, Cuthbertson said. The recent lunch was catered by Enzo's Pizza & Ristorante in Poland. The food served by Cuthbertson and school counselors didn't last long.

"Obviously, they enjoyed it," he said.







Network, explore and invest in Mohawk Valley rebirth


The Mohawk Valley Brownfields Developer Summit, created by a collaboration of the six Mohawk Valley counties and the Mohawk Valley Economic Development District, will take place April 12 and 13 at Fulton-Montgomery Community College in Johnstown. The summit will provide developers a dynamic in-person opportunity to network, explore and invest in Mohawk Valley Brownfield rebirth. According to Stephen Smith, executive director of the Mohawk Valley Economic Development District, "The summit will tie in the Mohawk Valley's economic leaders, the brownfield sites ready for restoration and America's brownfield developers looking to acquire sites for future economic growth.⁴

The signing of the historic Infrastructure and Jobs Bill has infused the brownfield program with \$1.5 billion and, along with Downtown Revitalization Initiatives (DRI) and Brownfield Opportunity Area (BOA) grants awarded to Amsterdam, Gloversville, Little Falls, Rome and Dolgeville, has given the Mohawk Valley unique economic development opportunities. 

To Your Good Health

by Keith Roach, M.D. Family History Includes Puzzling Advice About Oranges

Dear Dr. Roach: Sixty years ago, I married into a family that included a woman doctor in the generation before mine. My mother-in-law was always lamenting that she had never understood a little ditty that Aunt Doctor would always say: "Oranges are gold in the morning, silver at noon, and lead at night."

I finally solved the riddle. Every night I drink orange juice, I experience sleep disturbances all night. I shifted to orange juice in the morning: No more problems. Years later, I have been in two hospitals and rehab facilities that served oranges or orange juice at night. Changing to morning could have a positive effect on the comfort of many hospital patients. - G.R.

Answer: From my research, it appears this saying may have been intended to keep people from stealing oranges at night. However, oranges do have acid, which could predispose to heartburn, which might in turn affect sleep. The sugar load in an orange can cause short term high blood sugar, but in some people, the body's response can cause a temporary low blood sugar as well.

If eating oranges at night doesn't bother you, there is no reason not to stop, but oranges are on the long list of things which might cause sleep disturbance.

Dear Dr. Roach: I am an 86-yearold man in good health. My arms, from the wrist to my elbows on the top side, started turning black and blue two years ago. I've been to two doctors: One said he didn't know why; the other said it was age-related. What can I do for this so I can start wearing short sleeve shirts again? - R.K.

Answer: While an exam is necessary to confirm this diagnosis, the location suggests a condition called "solar purpura." The name suggests that sun damage is a cause of the condition, predisposing to bruising. One study found that bioflavonoids, found in many fruits and vegetables, may help. A topical vitamin A-derived cream, such as tretinoin, may help with the appearance. It is otherwise not dangerous.








Meet Methuselah, the oldest living aquarium fish

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Meet Methuselah, the fish that likes to eat fresh figs, get belly rubs and is believed to be the oldest living aquarium fish in the world.

In the Bible, Methuselah was Noah's grandfather and was said to have lived to be 969 years old. Methuselah the fish is not quite that ancient, but biologists at the California Academy of Sciences

believe it is about 90 years old, with no known living peers.

Methuselah is a 4-foot-long (1.2-meter), 40-pound (18.1-kilogram) Australian lungfish that was brought to the San Francisco museum in 1938 from Australia.

A primitive species with lungs and gills, Australian lungfish are believed to be the evolutionary link between fish and amphibians.

No stranger to publicity, Methuselah's first appearance in the San Francisco Chronicle was in 1947: "These strange creatures -

with green scales looking like fresh artichoke leaves - are known to scientists as a possible `missing link' between terrestrial and aquatic animals."

Until a few years ago, the oldest Australian lungfish was at the Shedd Aquarium in Chicago. But that fish, named Granddad, died in 2017 at the age of 95.

"By default, Methuselah is the oldest," said Allan Jan, senior biologist at the Academy and the fish's keeper.





Methuselah's caretakers believe the fish is female, although it's difficult to determine the species' sex without a risky blood draw. The Academy plans to send a tiny sample of her fin to researchers in Australia, who will try to confirm the sex and figure out the fish's exact age.

Jan says Methuselah likes getting rubbed on her back and belly and has a "mellow" personality.

"I tell my volunteers, pretend she's an underwater puppy, very mellow, gentle, but of course if she gets spooked she will have sudden bouts of energy. But for the most part she's just calm," Jan said. Methuselah has developed a taste for seasonal figs. "She's a little picky and only likes figs when they are fresh and in season. She won't eat them when they're frozen," said Jeanette Peach, spokeswoman for the California Academy of Sciences.

The Academy has two other Australian lungfish that are younger, both believed to be in their 40s or 50s, Jan said.

The Australian lungfish is now a threatened species and can no longer be exported from Australian waters so biologists at the Academy say it's unlikely they'll get a replacement once Methuselah passes away.

"We just give her the best possible care we can provide, and hopefully she thrives," Jan said.

Common cat health concerns

Content to keep to themselves most of the time, cats have a reputation of being more low maintenance pets than their canine counterparts. While they are very good at self-maintenance, cats are vulnerable to various illnesses and other health issues. It is imperative for cat owners to recognize symptoms of common conditions and seek veterinary help to keep cats as healthy as they can be.

Panleukopenia: Commonly called Panleuk or feline distemper, this is a virulent virus in the parovirus group. It is common among feral cats or other areas where large congregations of cats gather. PetMD says almost every cat will come in contact with this virus early in its life. Treatment for feline distemper occurs on a case by case basis, though fluid therapy to prevent dehydration and maintain blood pressure is a common course of treatment.

• Feline lower urinary tract disease (FLUTD): Estimates suggest as many as 3 percent of cats who visit the vet have FLUTD, which is a group of diseases with multiple causes. Symptoms include drinking more, straining to urinate, urinating in unusual

• Fleas: Cats are subjected to various parasites, including fleas. Cats that spend time both outside and indoors may be especially vulnerable to flea infestation. Hair loss, skin infections, flea dirt on the skin, and constant scratching and licking are signs of flea infestation. If left untreated, fleas can cause anemia.

• Feline leukemia virus (FelV): Feline leukemia was discovered in the 1960s and is one of the most commonly diagnosed causes of disease in domestic cats. FelV can severely inhibit a cat's immune system, advises the ASPCA.

• Feline immunodeficiency virus (FIV): Another virus that can affect cats' immune systems, FIV is slow-acting and may not show symptoms until years after initial infection. Cats may experience secondary




atching the first flowering bulbs appear from the thawing ground in spring is one of my favorite times of the year. Luckily we don't have to wait all winter to have spring blooms. A great way to do this at home is by forcing bulbs.

Forcing bulbs means tricking the plants into thinking it is time to bloom. Some bulbs such as tulips, daffodils, crocuses and hyacinths require a lengthy simulated experience of a cold, dark winter, followed by simulating a warm spring, to bloom. However, paperwhites and amaryllis can be forced faster without the weeks of artificial winter. Paperwhites will bloom within four to six weeks after potting, while amaryllis can take up to eight weeks.

It may be late in the season to order bulbs for growing indoors, so try your local garden center, farm supply or grocery store.
